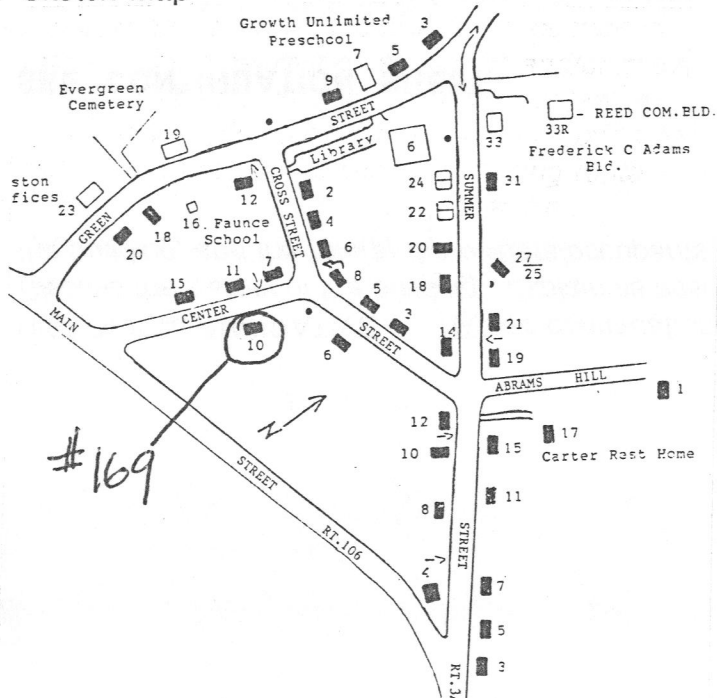


Sketch map

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The residence at 10 Center Street was built c.1950 as a bungalow. This 3x3 bay, wood frame, one story building sits on a rock faced *concrete* cement block foundation. The building is clad with wood shingles. The hipped roof, with exposed rafter tails, is covered with asphalt shingles. The center entrance has a contemporary wood door with flat surround. The hipped roof extends past the facade wall to form an open porch supported with square posts. A shed roof dormer pierces the hipped roof. The windows contain 6/1 wood sash. A newer 1x1 bay addition on the north elevation sits on a *concrete* cement block foundation.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE:

This building was built c.1950 and was used as the Mayflower Church parsonage for a period of time. Bungalows are common in south Kingston where they were built as summer homes near Rocky Nook however, bungalows in the center of Kingston are less common and it is interesting that this building style was chosen for this use.

Statement of Significance by Deirdre Brotherson
