ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The residence at 264 Main Street was built in 1876 in the Italianante style. This 3x4 bay, wood frame, 2-1/2 story building sits on a granite block foundation. The building is clad with wood clapboards. The front gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. One brick chimney is on the west slope of the main bock. A second brick chimney is located on the east roof slope of the rear ell. The sidehall entrance is not visible (covered by enclosed porch). A porch wraps around from the facade to the east elevation. The windows in this porch have 1/1 sash. The porch is articulated with single brackets at the cornice line with engaged Doric columns supporting the roof. This porch and the garage were added c. 1920 (Sanborn maps). The fenestration is symmetrical, windows contain 2/2 wood sash with flat surrounds and a molded drip cap. The cornerboards are thin and flat. The boxed cornice is enhanced with paired brackets. A 2 stall garage with front gable roof and clad with wood shingles is located at the rear of the property.

(#64) 1876 - autumn - Mr. Alden S. Bradford built a house. Lot adjoining No. 10 (266 Main Street) - on the east. This lot Mr. Bradford purchased of Mr. George McLaughlen - \$450. It came to him by his father Elisha. (Mr. Timothy Franch Jr., one of the original purchasers - with Mr. Tupper - md his daughter - Mr. Bradford - Mother - Two sisters - occupy this house - Lydia and Lucy. Moved in Dec. 1 same year.

Notes, E.F.D. Mr. Alden S. Bradford, for many years one of the Selectmen of Kingston, his mother, and his sisters Lydia and Lucy, all lived here the remainder of their lives. After the death of Lydia, the place was sold to frank C. Woodward, formerly of Tinkertown, Duxbury, whose widow and daughter still own and occupy, in 1942.

This property is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places as a contributing building to a Historic District (Area B). This district is eligible under Criterion A (associated with events that have made a contribution to the broad pattern of our history) as a building which is part of a linear village on Main Street which has evolved from a village area to a residential neighborhood (there are few commercial establishments on Main Street - they have shifted to areas near the railroad) but the architecture in this linear district continues to tell the story of the evolution of this area through the variety and high quality of the architectural styles (Criterion C: the building embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction - as a contributing architectural member of

this district.)
