ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The residence at 11 Elm Street was built c.1804 in the Federal style. This 5x2 bay, wood frame, 2 story building sits on a granite block foundation. The building is clad with wood clapboards. The hip roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Two brick chimneys are located on the interior sidewalls. The center entrance contains a 6-panel wood door flanked by fluter pilasters with a full entablature. The fenestration is symmetrical. Windows contain 6/6 wood sash with plain surrounds and a molded drip course. The cornerboards are thin and plain. The cornice is boxed. Bay windows project from the wall plane on the first floor, side elevations. A balustrade articulates the hip roof at the ridge lines. A 3x2 bay, wood frame, 1-1/2 story barn with a side gable roof and ventilator sits toward the rear of the property.

The Federal style was the dominant style in the United States from about 1780 to 1820. The Federal style was a development and refinement of the preceding Georgian style. The style drew on English buildings, especially those designed by the Adams brothers. Robert Adams had traveled to Italy and the Mediterranean to study the original classical buildings. Robert Adams and others like him returned to England with sketch books full of detailed drawings of the Greek and Roman monuments. Adam then popularized a number of the classical design elements such as pediments, columns, and symmetrical spatial planning which became some of the hallmarks of this style. The exteriors of Federal houses have few elaborations other than the fanlight and accentuated front door. Among the elaborations that sometime occur are roof-line balustrades, Palladian-style windows. The goal was to create a light and delicate design in contract to the heaviness of Georgian architecture.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE:

This house was built by Melzar Adauis a sea captian and decendent of Francis Adauis. Soon after construction, the house was purchased by Dr. P.L. Nichols, and later his heirs. By 1903 the owner is listed as Mrs. Eba Nichols. This is an excellent example of a Federal style building, one of the best in Kingston.


