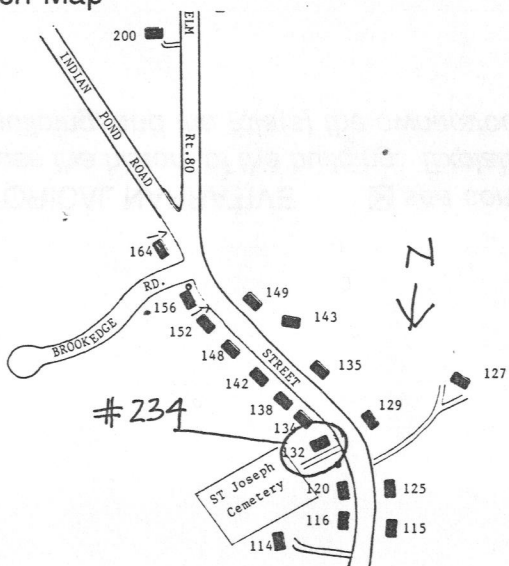




Sketch Map

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The residence at 132 Elm Street was built c.1900 as a Queen Anne cottage. This 3x4 bay, wood frame, 1-1/2 story building sits on a brick foundation. The building is clad with pattern wood shingles. The brick chimney is located at the center ridge. The sidehall entrance contains an early 20th century wood door with a large square glass pane in the upper section and has flat surrounds. The windows contain 2/2 sash with flat surrounds. The cornerboards are flat, the cornice is boxed with returns. A one story porch stretches across the facade of the building. The hip roof is supported by turned posts with drop pendant brackets. A 1x1 rear ell contains a secondary entrance.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE:

The building is a typical Queen Anne cottage built around the turn of the century (1900). The patterned shingles are unique and a hallmark of Queen Anne design. This part of Elm Street contains a mix of 19th and 20th century buildings and has an excellent representation of each.
