

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The residence at 94 Summer Street was built c. 1860 in the Italianate style. This 3x4 bay, wood frame, 2 story building sits on a granite block foundation. The building is clad with wood clapboards. The front gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A brick chimney is located on the east roof slope, toward the front and on the west roof slope toward the rear. The entrance is obscured by a one story, hip roof enclosed porch. The porch is enclosed with windows with 6/6 wood sash with solid wood panels below. The windows in the main house contain 2/1 wood sash with flat surrounds. The cornerboards are thin and flat. The cornice is boxed with returns. The east elevation, second bay, 1st floor, has a 1x1 bay enclosure which contains a secondary entrance. A 2 story bay window and a 1 story bay window on the west elevation. A round arch window is located in the gable of the facade. A 2x3 bay, 2 story ell is on the rear of the building.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE:

Charles T. Faunce lived in this building in 1876. It is believed that Faunce was a builder. He was hired by the town of Kingston in 1902 to help build a lockup in the cellar of the Town House. By 1903 Charles H. Drew owned this building. C.H. Drew was a water commissioner for Kingston. He resigned the position in 1927 due to a problem with a leaking reservoir built in 1923. Evidently the townspeople expressed that they had lost confidence in the commissioner and his resignation was sought.
