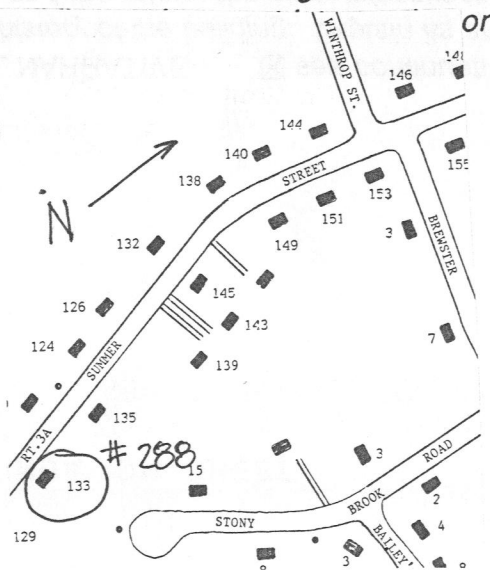

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**ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:**

The residence at 133 Summer Street was built c.1920 as an American Foursquare. This 4x4 bay, wood frame, 2 story building sits on a brick foundation. The building is clad with wood clapboards and shingles. The hip roof is covered with asphalt shingles. The center entrance contains a wood door with an oval glass pane. The windows contain 1/1 sash. The cornerboards are thin and the cornice is boxed with an extended overhang. A one story hip roof porch is supported by square posts and runs across the facade. Two story bay windows are on the facade and south elevations. A hip roof dormer projects from the front roof slope.

**HISTORICAL NARRATIVE:**

This house was built in the form of an American Foursquare, a popular early 20th century building form. The form of the building remains but the cladding and windows have been replaced and impact the architectural integrity of the building.
