ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The residence at 145 Summer Street was built c.1900 as a Queen Anne cottage. This 3x4 bay, wood frame, 2 story building sits on a brick foundation. The building is clad with wood shingles with a horizontal belt course between the 1st and 2nd floors. The side gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A brick chimney is located at the center ridge. The entrance is recessed on a entrance porch which is formed under the slope of the gable roof. The two bays adjacent to the entrance project from the building wall in a two story gable bay. The entrance contains an early 20th century wood bay with a large, square glass pane in the upper section. The entry porch is supported by turned brackets. The windows contain 2/1 vinyl replacement windows with flat surrounds. A Queen Anne window with a colored glass boarder is adjacent to the entry and a second one is found in a shed roof dormer above the entry. A two story rear ell and one story screen porch are new additions to the building.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE:

This is a typical building form built in the early 20th century. Machine made lumber and building elements were easily acquired and put together in a variety of forms. This building was built by C.H. Childs. Information of Childs was not available. The house has been altered and a rear addition has displaced the balance of the original building form.
