

## ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The residence at 9 Landing Road was built c. 1840. This 4x3 bay, wood frame, 2 story building sits on a granite and brick foundation. The building is clad with wood shingles and asbestos shingles. The side gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A brick chimney is located at the center ridge. The facade entrance is off-center and contains a contemporary wood door. The entrance on the south elevation contains a early 20th century door with flat surrounds. The cornerboards are thin and flat. The cornice is boxed with returns. A one story shed roof porch runs across the soputh elevation. It is supported by square posts. A gable projects in the center of the roof slope on the facaed. A Queen Anne window enhances both gable ends of this building.

## HISTORICAL NARRATIVE:

The building at 9 Landing Road is a bit of a mystery. Based on a plan of Landing Road made in 1836 by John Gray, there is one house in this location. The question is: is it this house or the building located at 3 Landing Road, (see Inv#298 - 3 Landing Road for discussion). The house which appears on the 1836 map was owned by William Stetson. According to Johnson-Melville's book (p.331) William Stetson had a tanyard from 1844-1861 on the Jones River near what is now #175 Main Street. By 1879 the owner was John Murrary. Murrary's ownership continued through the early 20th century.
