9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

This land was originally owned by Gov. William Bradford's family; Capt. Robert Bradford, great great grandson of the governor, sold this land to Ebenezer Hall in 2nd quarter of 1700s; Hall built the "old house - the only house I ever saw a diamond glass window in," according to Capt. Bartlett, who also said "one of the French neutrals (dis-tributed in 1755) [Acadians] lived in this old house." Capt. Joseph Bartlett bought the house in 1773; his son, Uriah Bartlett died in 1818 and Capt. Charles Adams (who lived in what is now 278 Main St.) bought it, took down the old house and later sold the lot to Luther Phillips, who built the present house.
