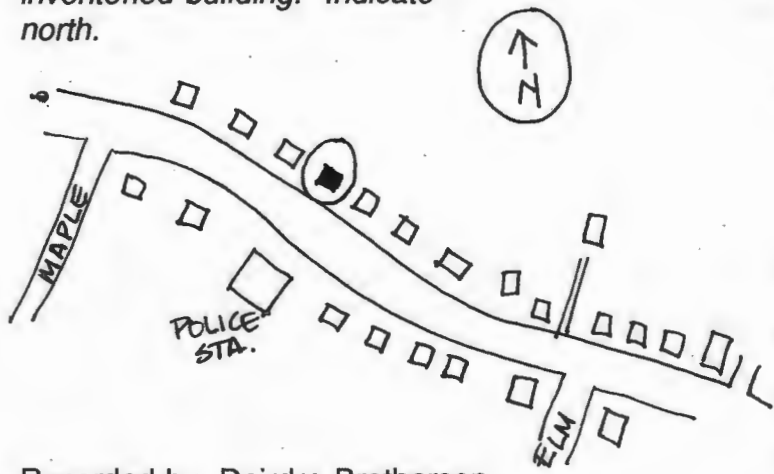

Describe architectural features Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The residence at 243 Main Street was built in 1910 in the Cape style with a side gable roof. This 5 x 2 bay, wood frame, one-and-a-half story building is rectangular in plan and sits on a concrete foundation. The building is clad with wood clapboards. The side gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. One brick chimney is located in the center of the house. The center entrance contains a wood panel door flanked by half sidelights with a molded surround. The windows contain 6/6 vinyl sash with molded surrounds. The cornerboards are thin and flat. The cornice is thin with a shallow molding.

A one stall garage is attached to one side of the building. It contains an arched opening with double doors opening outwards. A one story room with a recessed porch is attached to the other side elevation.
