

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The residence at 127 Summer Street was built c.1850 as a half cape. This 3x2 bay, wood frame, 1-1/2 story building sits on a granite foundation. The building is clad with vinyl siding. The side gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A shed dormer projects from the front roof slope. The entrance contains a wood panel door flanked by half sidelights and pilasters with a molded lintel. The windows contain 6/1 and 1/1 sash. A bay window projects from the south elevation. A one story ell is attached to the rear elevation.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE:

The early inhabitants of this building are unknown but by 1876 John Waterman owned this property. The architectural integrity of this half cape has been diminished due to the addition of vinyl siding, the shed dormer and the rear ell.
