ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The residence at 144 Summer Street was built c.1850 in the Greek Revival style. This 3x4 bay, wood frame, 1-1/2 story building sits on a brick foundation. The building is clad with wood shingles. The side gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A pair of brick chimneys are located at the ridge. The center entrance contains a 20th century wood door flanked by pilasters. A hip roof door hood protects the entry and is supported by square posts. The windows contain 6/6 wood sash with flat surrounds and molded drip caps. The building's corners are enhanced with pilasters. The cornice is boxed with returns. A one story, shed roof ell connects a 2 bay front gable garage to the main house.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE:

This house was built c.1850 by Warren N. Everson and remained in his possession through the early 20th century. The Everson family was one of the original settlement families in Kingston but information on Warren Everson has not been uncovered. Another Everson - N.S. Everson - lived in the house next door - 140 Summer Street (INV# 289).
