# ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

This residence was built c.1800 by Oliver Sampson as a full cape. This 5x2 bay, wood frame, 1-1/2 story building sits on a granite foundation. The building is clad with wood shingles and has a side gable roof covered with asphalt shingles. A brick chimney pierces the roof at the center ridge. The center entrance contains a 6-panel wood door with a flat surround and a 5-light transom. The windows contain 6.6 sash with flat surrounds. A small one story building is set lower than the main cape and appears to have been built in the 20th century. A one stall garage is also on the property.

#### HISTORICAL NARRATIVE:

Hall's Brook, which runs parallel to and then crosses Brookdale Street was one of the earliest industrial areas in Kingston. The year after the town's incorporation (1727), Ephriam Holmes' land on Hall's Brook, just above Brackett Sawmill pond (INV#366) became the site of the first iron forge in Kingston often referred to as "The Old Forge." The brook also supported a very active sawmill built before 1750 and owned by the Chandler family for over 100 years. The sawmill, also used at one time as a gristmill by Nathan Lucas, burned in 1924. The Davison-Dennett sawmill areas powered by electricity, is the successor to the Chandler family sawmill. In the early 20th century Hall's Brook was dammed and used for growing cranberries in the Brackett & Low Cranberry Meadow.

This building was built by Oliver Sampson in c.1800 and he occupied the building for most of the 19th century. In 1903 Mrs. E.S. Terry is listed as owner. Unfortunately, information on Oliver Sampson was not uncovered during this survey. The Sampson family was prolific in this area but specific information on Oliver has not been found.
