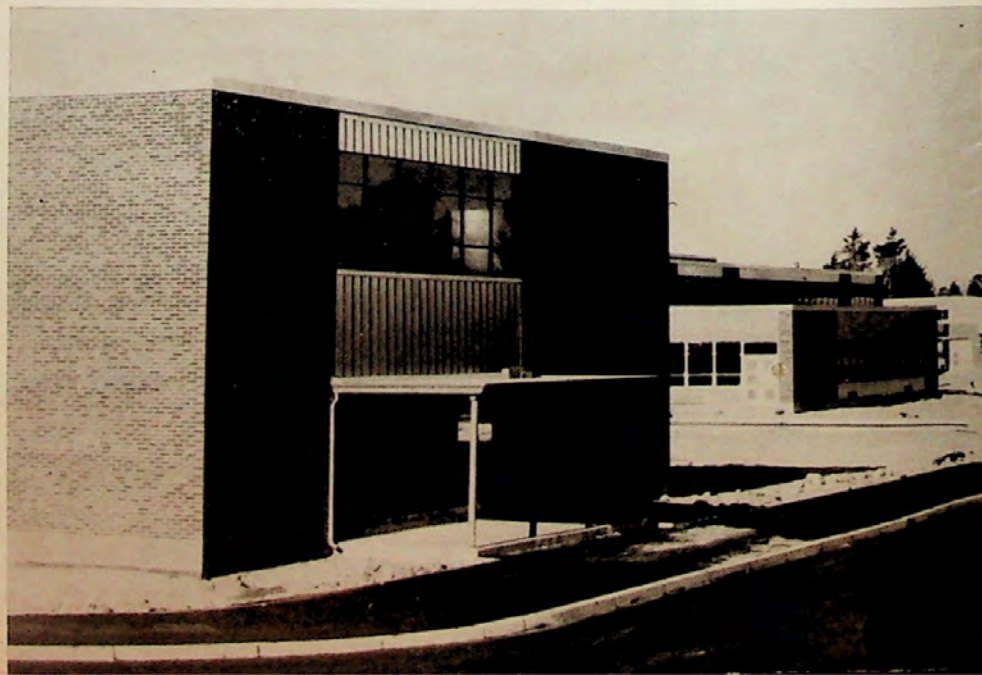
EXPLANATION OF OUR THEME
