The Selectmen in accordance with the requirements of law, report that the guide-boards of the town are in proper order.

We are now paying one hundred and seventy-five dollars per month to the families of volunteers as State Aid. To meet this increased demand, we have been obliged to borrow seven hundred dollars, in addition to what was raised for that purpose the last year. There is still funds in the treasury to continue the payment another month, when bills to the amount of about eleven hundred dollars will become due, which will nearly exhaust the funds in the treasury. It will then be necessary to borrow money until the collection of taxes to be assessed, of which we recommend should become due on or before the tenth of October next.

STATE AID.

One of the most important part of our duties, the past year, has been the distribution of State Aid to the families of volunteers. And the most perplexing part has been to discriminate between parents claiming it who are or are not entitled to receive according to the just interpretation of the law, which provides only for its allowance where there is a necessity for it, and where the parent was dependent upon the volunteer when mustered into the service of the United States; one of the rules of the State Auditor, distributed for the guidance of disbursing committees, declares that the father and mother are not entitled to aid unless in want, and have been substantially supported by the son before he entered the service; yet, with a full knowledge of this law, *State Aid* is insisted upon as a right where abun-

dant evidence exists that the son was dependent upon the parent instead of the parent upon the son; our rule, the past year, has been to allow aid in all cases to the wife and children of the volunteer, unless the fact was known at the time of enlistment they were not dependent in any way upon the husband or father for a support.

If injustice has been done a single claimant, it has not been in consequence of indisposition to investigate the cases within our control, as both time and patience has been most liberally bestowed upon every case referred to us for decision.

The amount disbursed by the *Town Treasurer* in aid of families of volunteers, for the year ending December 31, 1862, was \$1,524.96. This amount will be reimbursed to the Town at the time of paying the State tax.

OUR TREASURER AND COLLECTOR.

The labor of collecting and disbursing the money of the town the past year has increased the duties of the Treasurer, all of which he has most cheerfully performed, at less compensation than has heretofore been paid, and the energy and promptness with which he has made his collection, the manner in which he has enforced the rules in relation to cost and interest, justly entitles him to the credit of being a faithful and impartial officer.

REPORT OF THE

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

REPORT OF THE
SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE
OF KINGSTON,

FOR THE YEAR 1862-63.

FELLOW-CITIZENS: Your Committee beg leave to submit the following as their Report for the school year just passed:

DISTRICT No. 1. The Primary School, in the care of Miss Cynthia D. Brewster, who has been in this school a number of years, and has succeeded in her work this year in her usual happy manner.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL. In this school we employed Miss Lucia R. Robbins for the year; she worked very hard for the good of the school, and gave good satisfaction in the District. At the closing examination there appeared a slight want of energy in the recitations, especially ampng the boys, which perhaps was unavoidable under the circumstances; yet the school was very good.

DISTRICT No. 2. Primary School, taught by Miss Catharine D. Russell, one of our most thorough and painstaking teachers, and her pupils showed their training at the close of the school. She gave us the most interesting and pleasing exhibition of the year, from the fact that her pupils were prompt in obedience and thorough in their attainments as far as presumed to know. There were some new, interesting, and useful exercises by this

school which might be introduced into other schools in town, we think, with good effect.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL. This school was taught by Miss Nancy R. Sever. We can only repeat what has already been written of her abilities as a teacher. She was most exacting and unflinching in her efforts, her whole mind being devoted to the welfare of the school, even while apparently off duty. This vigilance and assiduity did much in preparing the way for her successor in office, Mr. W. H. Faunce, who taught the winter term.

DISTRICT No. 3. The summer term by Miss Carrie E. Soule. This teacher, by her winning and affectionate manner, conciliated the unruly members of the school, and thus made a fair school, which otherwise would probably have failed in government.

The winter term commenced by Rev. Mr. Steele, who kept three weeks, when finding that he did not, and probably would not give satisfaction, left without ceremony. The school was continued by Mr. Chandler B. Branan, who succeeded in interesting a number of scholars who have oftentimes been irregular in attendance, and deserters at the close of the school. In this school we could see a marked improvement in the deportment, both at recitations and at their seats, all owing to energy and discipline. There were other improvements, creditable both to pupils and teachers.

DISTRICT No. 4. The smallest school in town, taught by Miss Lydia B. Ring, for the year. She made quite an improvement in this school, especially among the smaller scholars in the winter term.

DISTRICT No. 5. Under the charge of Miss Arabella Ryder for the summer term. This teacher we think is one of our best. She made her pupils feel the effects of thorough, persistent work during the whole term of service.

The scholars, at the closing examination, were ready to respond with promptness and despatch to almost any question fairly given them. The smaller children had an interest in the examination which is not common in mixed schools, with us at least, as they are not always prepared to add anything to the credit of the teacher or pleasure of the visitors.

The winter term by Mr. Edwin T. Horne.

There was a slight defect in the government of this school.

DISTRICT No. 6. This school, in summer, in the care of Miss Abby F. Peterson, did not make a very imposing exhibition at its close. The teacher and her scholars coincided in their ideas of school affairs, therefore everything passed along nicely, except the acquirement of the knowledge necessary for children of their age.

Winter term, taught by Mr. Philander D. Leonard, another first-rate teacher in every sense. He, having the true theory, is both able and willing to put it in practice for the benefit of his charge, and his own benefit as well. His theory being that prompt obedience is the first requisite; second, thorough drill; and, third, persistent work of both of teacher and pupil.

In conclusion, we must say that the schools for the year are equal to an average of our schools in former years, having had four first-rate teachers and schools, certain; and only two below good out of thirteen different teachers employed during the year, — making a high average of good schools.

From the experience and practical observation permitted to us, we have made up our minds that strict discipline and thorough drill, in the rudiments, should be the first on the programme for the regulation of our system of Common School Education; for, without both of these, our schools will fail in their purpose more or less as circumstances may vary.

If our children, when young, are taught in loose and superficial manner, which is too prevalent in community, it will be

almost impossible for them ever to succeed in the work of life,
—*true development.*

It seems to us to be a self-evident fact, that the surest way to have good schools, is to employ those who intend to make teaching their business, and therefore have a name to make or keep, and thus will be obliged to work for their own good as well as the good of the school : besides, this class of teachers, as a general thing, are much better qualified for the business than those who take a school to piece out their funds or as a stepping-stone to some other and more lucrative position in society. If we find teachers who have the true qualifications, they should be retained if possible in town, for the reason that a certainty costing a little more is better than an uncertainty that may possibly be as good. We have had a number of good teachers, the past year, who are worthy to be sustained in their good work.

Some of the most prominent of the opposers of an advanced school begin to see where they missed it, former years, in opposing the establishment of such a school in this town ; some of them begin to feel it, or have felt it, where we feel most sensibly—in the *pocket.*

A few individuals in town, who are able, are paying more to private schools for their children than it would cost extra to support a public school equal to or better than any private school in the country.

If our system of Common School Education is founded on justice, and the true principles of Republicanism, then let us have it carried out so that every child can have the same advantages, and such advantages that all will be satisfied without seeking further at private schools, which are directly opposed to the system of education adopted by the Commonwealth.

Another year has past and gone, and we still are in a war-between Despotism and Republicanism, Slavery and Liberty, Ignorance and Education, produced by the predominance of an ignorant common class, under a government by the people

who have the name of being free, but who have been governed by an aristocracy the most determined ever known.

Now the only hope for us is to overpower that governing class, and introduce our system of Common Schools, where it is almost, if not entirely, unknown.

It must be very evident to every one who has looked at this matter candidly, that where the education of all the children by law is carried out in the most thorough manner, there we find the people ready and willing to uphold the government in its time of trial. If the subject is traced through, in all its phases, in different parts of the country, we shall find that Common School Education and Loyalty obtain about in the same ratio.

A government by the people will stand or fall as learning or ignorance predominate ; therefore, if we would preserve our institutions, we must see to it that our schools do not languish for the want of support either in money or sympathy.
