

**ARTICLES OF THE WINTER MEETING,**

TO BE ACTED UPON MARCH 26TH, 1881.

- 1st.—To choose a moderator.
- 2d.—To choose all necessary town officers.
- 3d.—To hear reports of Town Officers and committees and to act thereon.
- 4th.—To determine the mode of repairing highways, townways and bridges.
- 5th.—To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for defraying town charges.
- 6th.—To see if the Taxa will authorize the treasurer to have money in anticipation of taxes and to act thereon.
- 7th.—To revise and accept a list of persons prepared by the Selectmen.
- 8th.—To see if the town will permit a Soldiers' monument to be erected on the green provided the sum necessary for its purchase may be raised by subscription.
- 9th.—To see if the town will repair the Nook road from the main street to the house of George Grozenger.
- 10th.—To see if the town will adopt measures for the better drainage of the main street.
- 11th.—To see if the town will purchase a lot for the Story Brook School House.
- 12th.—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to grant licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors under the provisions of Chap. 90 of the Acts of the year 1875.
- 13th.—To act on any business that may legally come before said meeting.

At the last March meeting it was voted that the Selectmen be authorized to purchase a Stone Crusher, Engine and Roller, for use on the Highways at an expense not exceeding \$1500, and draw upon the Treasury for that amount. A subsequent vote authorized them to make investigation and if they thought it inexpedient to purchase this year they may be relieved from the duty.

Accordingly two of the board visited Brighton and Watertown, were shown the Crusher in operation, made acquainted with the details of the work of preparing the stone for the road, witnessed the work of macadamizing road in all its stages and although one of the member, at least, was credulous at first, the investigation fully convinced both that a purchase of a part—the Crusher and Roller—would be a good investment if run by water power. Consent was obtained from two parties to attach one to such power, and the board then decided that it would be expedient to purchase a part of what was authorized. Mr. Holmes went to Connecticut, made the purchase, it was attached to the mill power of Mr. Frank H. Holmes, was set at work, and the Selectmen have no reason for changing our minds as to the benefit to be derived from its use. There is no doubt, however, that a small engine that could be moved from place to place would increase the efficiency of the Crusher as it could then be located in the neighborhood of the work to be done.

The first stone crushed was for the Green Road, and it is without doubt the best piece of road in town, and the cheapest if we take into account the time it is likely to remain good as compared with others that must have an annual outlay of hundreds of dollars to make them even passable at some times in the year. There are places that sadly need similar treatment now.

One near Plymouth line, one near the North West forge, one near the factory of K. W. Stetson and through Stony Brook neighborhood. Others can be named equally needy and we have no hesitancy in saying that the crushed stone as prepared by the Blake Crusher is the best material ever put upon our roads.

There was more done to the Green Road than was anticipated by way of drainage, which with the cost of macadamizing made the expense exceed the appropriation by one thousand dollars.

The bridge near the house of Kimball W. Stetson cost more than the appropriation, as it was found necessary to take up the entire bridge and build it anew.

The question of better drainage on Main Street was referred to the Selectmen and they are of the opinion that for a small outlay, the water from the house of Edward D. Chandler to the head of the Green Road could be carried down the Mill hill through a drain laid under the road, making the lowest place in the gutter near the house of Lothrop T. Holmes.

# POLICE REPORT.

In accordance with a vote of the Town at the last March meeting, the undersigned, Policemen of Kingston, submit the following report:

It is not an easy matter to write out, in full, all the duties or acts of a body of Police, even in a small town like this, neither would it be wise to publish all the particulars. Our movements are not always known, nor should they be. We are frequently called upon by parties who have need of help, and we have always made it a point to respond to the call, when we thought it was our duty, however disagreeable it might be, and have kept our own counsel. It is often wiser by judicious management to avoid making an arrest than by hasty words or deeds to precipitate one, and we have had the good fortune of being obliged to make but one arrest during the year just passed, though we have taken care of several persons at times when they could not take care of themselves.

We have attended public evening meetings, patrolled the streets on Sunday evenings and at other times when public or individual interest required. The middle aged men and women who sit quietly at home are seldom aware of danger to themselves or property till it is passed and are not apt to appreciate the situation if they learn afterwards that a drunken carousal of parties from home or abroad had been broken up, and that the Police whose duties are of so little moment in the eyes of some of our citizens were on the alert guarding them from molestation and their property from destruction.

That there ought to be but little occasion for the services of a policeman in a town like Kingston, where no license is granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors, where so few are destitute of some education in the common school and can at least read and write, and where there is so little extreme poverty, we admit, Still we claim that the office is no sinecure at times, nor is it a position that many persons would willingly assume at any price, much less for a salary of less than one dollar per week,

It seems unnecessary to specify more particularly the items in the last accounts, since the amounts so nearly correspond with those of the Town Report.

It is six years since the Wapping and Indian Pond schools were united. This was an experiment and a few had little hope or expectation that the one discontinued might be opened again at no distant day. But the most hopeful are obliged to admit that it will not be advisable to open the house again for school purposes for years to come, if ever. The Union school has decreased in numbers, from year to year, and nothing but an aversion to wiping out the schools so long established in the several neighborhoods of the town, prevents the Committee from discontinuing the Indian Pond school and distributing the scholars in the Centre Grammar and Primary. A class graduating from this school to the High School, at the beginning of the next term, reduces the number to four, who will not be as well accommodated by the change as they are now. The Spring is the best time to make the change, since new classes are formed at that time, and should it be done in April, a less appropriation would be required for the ensuing year. As it is uncertain what course will be pursued by the Committee, a part of which is yet to be chosen, the same appropriations are recommended as last year. Our Centre schools are largest because parents send children into them that belong elsewhere. Although we have no school districts, there must be some line fixed by the Committee, and children within certain limits assigned to particular schools, or else a few schools will be crowded and others eventually discontinued. This state of things is complimentary to some of our teachers, but we trust parties having especial interest in their own children, will keep in mind the public good, and not oblige the Committee to seem arbitrary in the matter. That some of our schools and teachers deserve especial notice and words of commendation for the work done the past year, we feel certain, but since to particularize would be for the most part a repe-

tion of last year, we refrain. We cannot expect perfection but may expect improvement in some cases. Some of the schools are conducted certainly in a more interesting manner and with better results than others. A teacher should be acquainted with the transactions of the day, and a newspaper is quite an important text-book. The dry book of geography is made palatable by a seasoning of live issues, and Greenleaf's Arithmetic, with all its good points, is immensely improved by a little spice from the daily bulletin. Some new account of storm, fire or flood may be located, the arrival of steamers from foreign ports may be made use of, prices and values may be taken from the prices current and applied to computations of bonds and rates of interest. The location of a river, lake, or city, fixed in the mind of the pupil by associations of the day's occurrence makes the task a pleasure and the point gained is of much more consequence than if the time had been spent in locating Lake Okechobee with a certainty that repeated reviews will be necessary to enable the pupil to remember it, or to spend the time reducing a long line of numbers into prime factors to find a common divisor, when a simple example in short division will give all the child can fully comprehend.

We certainly wish that the High School might be better appreciated, especially by our boys. The Primary school of fifty scholars has three boys to one girl. In the High School the girls exceed the boys in number, and the graduating class from year to year is composed almost altogether of girls. There was one boy in the graduating class last year, none this year, and none for the year to come. Why this apathy on the part of the boys we would like to have answered. There is probably no better opportunity given for study than the country High School. No one need feel that because we have not the large libraries and social advantages of the city, that a country High School is poor and barren, or at all inferior to many in larger places. One of our well-known authors has said, "Blessed is the literary man, the public man, the man of the pulpit, who was bred among the fields and woods and brooks, who has known the ocean in all its moods, and with whom the sky, with its country blue and its silver stars, and all its machinery and phenomena of Summer and Winter storms, has been an open and favorite book." If there is anything in the conduct of the school that can be remedied, let us learn what it is and proceed at once to make such changes as are necessary, and as soon as may be. If it is necessary

that boys shall be taken from the school to aid in the support of a family, which we believe is not often the case, there is some excuse, but when they are allowed to loiter round our public places without aim or purpose, and with almost a certainty of contracting vicious habits, the parents must be thoroughly absorbed in their own affairs or shockingly careless of those whose after life is almost sure to be a wreck. That the Town, in its corporate capacity, has not been deficient in providing the means for obtaining an education by all our children, the following tables will bear testimony.
