pump direct into the pipes, as is done under the Holley system of water works, adopted by many towns, a saving can be made over the above estimates of at least \$5,000, and the works can be put in a cost of not exceeding \$35,000. The bonds of this town for the amount necessary to pay for the works can be placed at a rate of four per cent without doubt.

Provided the works cost the sum of \$40,000, the interest on the debt created would be \$1,600 per year, and it is the opinion of your committee that the receipts from water takers would soon not only pay this annual interest in addition to the running expenses, but accumulate in a reasonable time a sum sufficient to pay the entire water debt.


We would, therefore respectfully recommend that the town take immediate action in this matter by the appointment of a committee with powers to make application to the present Legislature for such charter or bill as may be necessary to enable the town to obtain a water supply, and to issue its bonds in payment of the construction of the works herein described, or such modification of them as circumstances may make necessary.

To the above sum add the State and County Tax of \$3730 12 allowing them to be the same as last year, and we have a total \$17.005 12 to be taised. Should the Corporation and Bink Taxes, to be received from the state be the same as last year, which was \$6378 94 it will leave about \$10,625 00 to be raised by direct tax.

If the valuation of the town is not very much decreased, (and we see no reason why it should be) and our recommendations are adopted, the rate will probably be but little, if any higher, than last year.

We have reduced the recommendations from last year for highways, owing to the fact that the roads are to be dug up for laying water pipes, which will prevent making repairs on that route, and those roads being in quite good condition, it may not be advisable to expend much on them, the present year. As the town has been ordered by the County Commissioners to build the road leading on to the Nook, we recommend \$2500 co for highways and \$1000 oo for the Nook road.

REPORT.

FELLOW CITIZENS:-

During the past year, we have endeavored to perform the dotics imposed upon us in as satisfactory a manner as possible; working together harmoniously, and, as we hope, for the best interests of the schools.

Much to our regret, two of our associates were obliged to resign before the close of the year. This we considered a great loss; they being in some respects, the best qualified of our number for the work in which we have been engaged. While deeply regretting this loss, we congratulate ourselves on having had their able assistance through the most important part of the labors of the year; nothing being left for us to do, except to complete as successfully as possible, the work already in progress.

For various reasons, we decided to give the schools our personal supervision, rather than delegate that duty to a Superintendent. The members of this committee have individually visited the schools at various times, thus becoming intimately acquainted with the condition of each. If cause for dissatisfaction was found, the matter was thoroughly investigated and measures taken to remedy the difficulty.

Throughout the year there has been but little friction between the committee teachers or pupils; the teachers having governed over pupils in a discreet and kindly manner, thereby winning our hearty approbation. The greater part of the children in this town we find to be of good natural abilities, contteous and well disposed towards tich teachers, thus making the duty of visiting them in their schools a very pleasant one. A few boys (and only a few) seem inclined to exhibit a species of rowdyism in school, on the street, and in public assembles, for which this committee decline to consider themselves responsible. Seldom, if ever, does a child who is under wholesome discipline at home, conduct himself in an unbecoming manner abroad. Whenever a boy is heard whistling, hooting or otherwise disturbing a public meeting, it is safe to conclude that he is a source of trouble to his teacher, made so in part by the neglect of his parents to train him in proper self-respect and respect for the rights of others. Incompetent guardians of youth, when informed of the misdemeanors of those under their charge, will often reply, "Well, you know, boys will be boys." To this we heartily agree; but fail to understand why of necessity they should be had boys; and refuse to believe that a had boy is any must a boy than a good one is.

If parents would realize that a symmetrical education includes the development of the moral and physical faculties, as well as the intellectual, they would not consider their responsibility for the education of their children ended, by sending them to the public schools. In these schools, attention is specially given to training the mental powers; though a strong moral influence may be exerted by teachers, who if fitted for their positions will labor in season and out of season, to inculcate high moral principles. Though they may labor faithfully much will still depend on home influence. As our schools we now conducted, the physical education is entirely left to the parent; and, as a sound mind can exist only in a sound body, we would advise parents to see to it that the physical powers keep pace with the moral and intellectual, thus forming a well balanced character.

There is one defect in many of our pupils to which we would direct your attention, and that is the lack of ability to concentrate the mind. Some of our best disposed children suffer from this cause, spending perhaps hears over work that might easily be accomplished in a quarter of the time, if they could only fix the attention. It is painful to see the amount of exertion some ambitious pupils are obliged to make to overcome this difficulty. Many educators complain of this evil; and most, believe it to be the result of the habit indulged in by so many of the rising generation, of spending much time in reading sensational or frivolous stories, one after another, in endless succession, thereby weakening the retentive powers of the mind. This defect can be remedied but only by determined effort on the part of the child. Mnemonics may, in the near future, be considered an indespensable study in our common schools.

It would be for the advantage of all our schools, if parents would not allow their children to be absent from school except from unavoidable causes,—as sickness or bad weather. Many are allowed to stop at home for the most trivial causes. School goes on while they are away at work or play, and when they return, it will often be days before they can make up for lost time, even if their absence was but ene day. Some bright and capable pupils always take low rank in their chasses simply for this reason. Those who insist on punctuality on the part of their children do them a great kindness, though the child may not appreciate it at the time. Pupils who rank highest, are the ones who are always on hand to take advantage of every bit of instruction given to the class. By doing this, even the duffest student will receive some benefit, on the principle that constant dropping will wear away a stone.

The close of the year finds our schools, generally, in a flourishing condition, with a corps of teachers who are capable, and deeply interested in their work. We have been obliged to elect six new teachers the past year, giving to that duty considerable time and thought. In most cases we have felt satisfied with our choice and are assured that

nearly all the parents feel the same. The High School has torcived an extra amount of attention on account of the resignation of Mr Ridler, which took effect at the close of the Spring Term, much is the fee gret of many of the pupils both past and present. Being consinted that the work in this school was more than any one teacher exceld for form thoroughly, after considering numerous applications, we decided to engage Mr. John McDuffle, Jr. and Miss Sarab B. Faunce to take charge of the school. They have labored faithfully to raise a to a -higher standard than it has heretofore attained; and the pupils, with few exceptions, have shown a willingness to lighten their Library, both by carnest endeavors to excel in their studies, and unquestioning obedicuce to wholesome rules and regulations. Two or three boxs lane shown a spirit of insubordination, much to the annoyance of thes trackets, and the larger number of their companions who desire that the school should bear a good name in town. This is an evil with which no High School teacher should be called upon to contend. They who are old enough and advanced enough to be members of such a selook should be eld enough to understand the laws of courtesy, and rest; enough to practise them; scorning to take part in low and bounds pranks searcely fit for a clown at a circus. This is a matter on which parents can exert a powerful influence by insisting that their children shall not be insubordinate in school even if the teacher be districted to them. If teachers are proved to be unjust in their rules, andaly severe in their punishments, or partial in their actions, they are work for the position, and any parent would be justified in requesting their removal; but never justified in encouraging a rebellion.

We have thought best to alter the Course of Study for the High School, omitting several branches which cannot be taught to adminise in the time allowed them, and substituting others which seem to us more important. As it now stands, there are no elective branches—all being considered indispensable to a thorough High School course. We would advise the parents to incite their children to complete this

course, rather than leave the school at the end of a year or two, because they think a knowledge of the higher branches can never be of use to them. How is any parent in this country to know what sphere his child may be destined to fill! What right can be have to hold back or discourage such child from availing himself of all opportunities offered for increasing his store of knowledge, and also his chances of taking a high position among his fellows? How many people do no meet who go sorrowing through life because they learned too much in school? There is not the old excuse for this in the cost of books, for by the present laws, the poorest child in town is as well supplied with these as the richest. There is much taught in all schools that may never be of practical value to more than one or two, while the mental discipline acquired in the effort to grasp the subject,— must be of immense value to all.

When we consider the Public School in its true light-not as a place in which to crain the mind with a quantity of facts that will probably be forgotten before the child reaches maturity-but as a place in which to lay the foundations of an education that will never be completed till he draws his latest breath; in which to develop the intellectual faculties; form habits of application and self-control; smooth-off the sharp edges of character by contact with companions of various dispositions; make acquaintance with the best authors of this and former generations, thus forming a taste for the best in literature; acquire such a knowledge of the history of our own and other countries that he may follow with intelligent interest the progress of events in all parts of the world and, possibly, take part in directing those events; obtain such an insight into the principles upon which our government is founded, that he may be in some measure, prepared to take active part in that government, or in any case better fitted to become a useful citizen of this great Republic where, especially, no man liveth to himself or dieth to himself, but all are parts of one great whole; -- we shall not expect our High School graduates to have a smattering of everything in the heavens above or the earth beneath, but be satisfied if they are prepared to go on increasing their knowledge, tall they become good and noble men and women.

For life is one long term of school;—escape from it we cannot, but must go on learning its lessons and bearing its penalties, till Death summons us to pass through his mystic portals to receive our final diplomas.
