## ALARMS.

The department have responded to six alarms during the past year, as follows: —

April 1. — Alarm rung at 10 A. M. for fire at the old Cobb house, owned by C. W. Saunders, and occupied by C. W. Saunders, Martin B. Sloan, and Henry Reinhardt; cause, defective chimney; total loss, insured, \$1,000.

June 18. — Alarm rung at 5.45 o'clock P. M., for fire which destroyed the house and barn owned by George Bradford, what was known as the Noah Prince place; cause, unknown; loss, \$2,000; no insurance.

May 25. — Alarm rung for fire in woods near Patrick Smith's; no damage.

Nov. 2. — Alarm rung for fire at house of George W. Cushman, 1032 P. M.; damage, \$100; insured.

Dec. 15. — Alarm rung for fire at Evans & Atwood's slaughter-house; damage trifling.

Dec. 16. — Alarm rung for fire at house occupied by Charles McCarty; no fire.

We suggested in our report for 1890 that more hydrants be placed in different parts of the town, but as nothing was done about it, we were obliged to expend one-half of our small appropriation for the purchase of 200 feet of hose, to be divided equally between Hose



Companies Nos. 1 and 3, making a total of 1,900 feet in good order in the Department, but not until after we had lost the old Cobb house. We also purchased a Callahan Shut-off Nozzle, which did good service at the Walter Cushman fire, where it paid for itself many times over. Instead of flooding the house with water, as would have been the case with the ordinary kind, we used simply that amount which was actually necessary to put out the fire, and we recommend that two more of the same kind be purchased for Companies Nos. 2 and 3.

When we make up the amount to be appropriated for the coming year we do not consider and cannot include that amount which is to be paid, and which has always been charged to our account—the services of the men at fires. The fact that it has always been placed there makes it appear to have been overdrawn, and should be placed on the Contingent Account.

We have concluded to wait for the next appropriation before we paint the houses. The amount which we ask for the maintenance of the Department for the year following is \$200.

The Fire Department is in better condition to-day than any time since its organization, and it is the earnest wish of the Board of Engineers to keep it so.

There was a balance due the Maglathin Bros. for cash paid for putting in water-wheel at factory, amounting to \$30.14, which was deducted from the rent due April 1, 1891, leaving a balance of \$219.86 due from them for rent which was collected and paid over to the town Treasurer in due time and form.

On December 8th, examined the hydrants in company with Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, Joshua Delano, Jr., and found three of them to be leaking; had a man from the Coffin Valve Company Works come and repair them and they are now all in perfect repair.

There has been two leaky hydrants at Cobb & Drew's works taken out and repaired at their expense.

There has been two nuts broken in hydrant tops on account of imperfect material, which has been repaired by the Coffin Valve Company without cost.

Everything connected with the water-works is in good condition, no leaks being developed in the main or service pipes during the year.

There has been fifteen connections made this year, making a total of 251 connections with the main-pipe, and 299 water-takers.

### ADDITIONAL WATER SUPPLY.

At a special meeting of the Town held Sept. 14, 1891, the Water Commissioners were authorized to construct a filter gallery on the general plan reported by a committee on additional water supply at said meeting. Mr. James L. Hall was chosen a committee to act with the Water Commissioners.

There has been constructed a conduit of brick arch 20 inches wide and 21 inches high, and 10-inch drain pipe 1,280 feet, 6 inches in length, at a cost of \$3,123.31; 1,090 feet, 10 inches of brick arch and 189 feet, 8 inches of pipe, located as follows: From the well to catch basin, or first manhole, 61 feet of pipe; then arch 192 feet, 10 inches; then pipe 128 feet, 8 inches; then arch 898 feet. There are twelve manholes, each 20 inches wide and 4 feet long, with covers securely fastened down and locked. It will be noticed that the length of the conduit is some 180 feet longer than was reported by the committee on additional water supply to be necessary, but owing to the small quantity of water obtained from the distance trenched, about 700 feet, and as the water was more abundant in that vicinity, it was deemed advisable to make the extension. It was intended to use a portion of the old brick arch, but it was found it could not be done, and on the contrary it was an additional expense to get it out of the way. This, with the quicksand encountered, has made the cost of construction much larger than was estimated.

On the 16th of September the work of construction was commenced at a point about 400 feet from the well and a brick arch was constructed, 898 feet in length to the land of Waldo Washburn. On this section there was no serious difficulty met with, but in constructing the 400 feet from the well to connect with the section first constructed there was a great and serious difficulty encountered in consequence of quicksand. In the construction of the gallery, it was

found more advisable to build a brick arch instead of brick walls and iron covers, as reported by committee on water supply, as it would be cheaper and much better.

The material used in the work was 56,000 bricks, 83 casks of cement and about 12,000 feet of lumber.

In regard to the quantity of water obtained, it was found by measurement, taken in January, 1892, that the gallery would yield about 50 gallons per minute, and the combined yield of the well and gallery was 91 gallons per minute. When the water in the gallery is drawn to its full capacity it flows foily, owing to its running through and over the quicksand, but by keeping back water in the gallery and keeping the flow more gradual, it flows clear and acceptable.

In making up the cost of construction there is nothing included for services of commissioners or committees.

The land damages were expected to be \$150; \$50 to F. W. Fuller; \$50 to Mrs. C. Bartlett, and \$50 to Mrs. Joseph S. Robbins, that being the same paid parties previously, but we find since writing the above that Mrs. Robbins is not willing to accept \$50 for damages and makes a claim of \$100, and it has been agreed by her and the commissioners, to leave the matter of damages to referees, each to choose a man and they to choose a third man and to abide by their decision.

We think that the recommendations for school purposes, in the Selectmen's report, will be sufficient for the ensuing year.

A vacancy occurred on the committee at the commencement of the year, by the resignation of Dr. Barstow, which was filled, after due notice, by the choice of William H. Burges, who holds until the end of this year, when it will be necessary to choose for the remainder of the term (one year).

The committee organized with Henry B. Maglathlin as chairman, and Caroline W. Holmes, secretary.

In May our superintendent, Miss Helen Holmes, resigned, and the secretary was chosen to fill the position, and served till October, when Charles L. Reed was appointed, and has served up to the present time.

In view of the difficulty of securing efficient and steady supervision, your committee feel desirous of putting before the town for action the matter of uniting with other towns to secure a superintendent, and have therefore requested that an article be inserted in the warrant for the annual meeting to that effect. Where towns unite in this manner the State will aid by such a gift as will procure skilled service. Our appropriation of \$250 united with that of two or more towns where the aggregate number of schools is no more than fifty and not less than thirty would give a salary sufficient to secure trained superintendency, and not be any more expensive than the present arrangement.

Towns and cities in this Commonwealth are now under supervision, that contain seventy-seven per cent of the schools, and eighty-four per cent of the children, and forty more towns have voted in favor, and will put it in operation as soon as arrangements can be made for uniting. The testimony being so strong in its favor, and the expense being no more than at present, we hope the town will act favorably.

The spring term of the schools will commence April 4, and continue twelve weeks.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

### *To the School Committee of the Town of Kingston :*

In submitting to you the report of the schools for the past year, I am glad to be able to report good work done and satisfactory progress made in nearly all respects. There has been no friction between teachers, pupils, and parents; and this is true, notwithstanding the careful grading of the classes at the beginning of the year and the consequent failure of more than the usual number to be promoted. After the first disappointment, all seemed to recognize that it was decidedly best that those who had not reached the required standard should take another year in the same grade. In order to maintain the efficiency of the schools, the standard for promotion should be kept high; and it must be realized by scholars, that if promotion is to be obtained work must be done and well done. One thing that should be guarded against, however, is the fact that the brightest pupils may have their ambition checked by the impression that they can go only as fast as the class as a whole. Those who are able mentally and *physically* to do more work should be given the opportunity. This should not be taken as a recommendation of forcing a scholar; far from it; it is maintained simply that as a scholar of less ability is required to take more time for his course, so one of greater ability, who can do extra work as easily as others can do the required work, should be allowed to take the course in less time, bearing constantly in mind

that the scholar's health is of more importance than his studies.

At the beginning of the year the course of study in the High School was changed slightly, and United States history was put in the upper grammar grades, Eggleston's book being used. Thus scholars who never reach the High School get a knowledge of their country's history, and all are better prepared for its more thorough study later.

The school year for the High School has been lengthened to forty weeks so as to conform to the law. All other schools have thirty-seven weeks. In this connection, attention is again called to the requirement by law that children between the ages of eight and fourteen must attend school thirty weeks per year. By the middle of the year a number of scholars from one school had been absent more than was allowable for the whole year. After being warned, however, they attended with sufficient regularity, so that no further action was found necessary. This law should be rigidly enforced, and no hesitation should be felt in prosecuting its violators if necessary.

For the last four months the one-session plan has been tried in the High School, the session continuing from 8.30 to 2, with an intermission of twenty minutes at noon. The change was desired by the great majority of the scholars and has worked very well. The continuous session has not proved too great a strain, and the work has been fully as good since the change was made. There has been altogether too much tardiness, however. The practice of being late is very bad for the school, and also for the scholar, who is thus forming a bad habit which will not be broken easily. Parents ought to see that their children start earlier, so that there may be no difficulty in being on time. The teacher can-



not bring about the desired result unless aided by the parents.

The plans of the former Superintendent have not been changed in any respect, as only time and care are needed to bring the schools under the general system outlined by her. It is greatly to be regretted that she could not be induced to retain her work of superintendence, in which she had started so well. The work in nature study has been carried on in the different schools in accordance with the plan adopted by the Plymouth County Teachers' Association.

It is to be regretted that there have been so many changes of teachers in two of the schools, for, however good the new teachers may be, the change always causes an interruption of the school work that is simply a loss of so much time. At the beginning of the year Miss Baker was transferred from the Centre Primary to the Stony Brook School. Here her influence was at once felt in the rapid improvement of the school. After two terms here, however, she resigned to accept a better position in another town. Miss Curtis, her successor, not being satisfied with the school, resigned after four weeks, and was succeeded by the present teacher, Miss Campbell. At the Centre Primary, Miss Baker was followed by Miss Chandler, whose careful and thorough work produced excellent results. On her resigning to accept a better position, Miss Holmes was given entire charge of the school for three weeks, at the end of which time she preferred to return to her former position as assistant, Miss Hartford being engaged as principal. The school is too large for one teacher, however successful, to do the best work. At the end of the summer term Miss De Normandie, to the regret of all connected with the school, resigned her position as assistant in the High School in order to continue her studies. Her long

acquaintance with the scholars, as well as her ability as a teacher, made her work especially valuable. Miss Ela was elected to the vacancy.

In October, in order to lighten the work in the Stony Brook School, the highest class was transferred to the grammar school, a distinct gain for the school, and for the scholars, who are thus given an additional year with those with whom they are to complete their course.

In the High School the work of the scholars has been very satisfactory. Especial praise is due to them for the zeal shown in purchasing a piano, at a cost of \$300, for the school-room, and paying for it since June. The use of the instrument has caused a great improvement in the singing. Four young ladies of the school also held a fair for the benefit of the school library, over fifty dollars being gained. Those who wish to know of the work of the school are always welcome visitors. More is being done with the result that the grade is being raised, and I have no hesitation in saying that in two years the school ought to be fitting its graduates for college, as well as technology, in all but Greek, which is fast disappearing as a requisite for a college course. The function of a high school is not merely, or even primarily, to act as a feeder to the colleges, for it is certain that most of our young people end their school-life on or before graduating, but it should create a desire for something higher, and not the feeling that one's education is complete with the high-school diploma. The influence on the school by those who are going on is always good, and will be increased if all can feel that they are ready for the next step, even if they do not take it. The school needs a laboratory and increased facilities for scientific work, as well as a larger library of reference books.

The fact that the grammar school is still under the charge of Miss Russell speaks for itself. Her work has been harder than usual this year, because of the larger number, resulting from the transfer of the class from Stony Brook. There is a probability that this room will be overcrowded next year, on account of the entrance of a larger class than will go from there to the High.

The North West School is so small that a saving to the town as well as an improvement in the work would result if arrangements could be made to bring the children to the centre. In this way the work could be more carefully graded, more time could be given to each recitation, and the scholars would have the added stimulus of larger classes. In fact, if all the schools in town could be brought together in one centrally located building, the experience of other towns has shown conclusively that the work would be greatly improved, and the running expenses would be less than under our present system. An intermediate school would then relieve the primary schools, where there are now too many classes for the best work. Our teachers are taken away by towns who pay no more than we, but have schools of one and two grades instead of five. This may not be feasible now, but it ought to be kept in view as a condition to be attained.

The Silver Lake School, under the charge of Miss Blackman, has shown commendable spirit in obtaining its organ.

In all the lower schools greater variety of reading matter is badly needed. Different books could be used in the different schools, and then exchanged from time to time. This would require a very small extra expense at the beginning, but it would result in a vast increase of interest and consequent improvement. Many books are worn out, and will have to be replaced, necessitating a generous appropriation.

I desire to recommend securing the services of a trained superintendent, who gives all his time to such work. Of course, Kingston cannot do this by itself, but doubtless an arrangement can be made with the neighboring towns of Duxbury, Marshfield, and Scituate. The entertainments given for the piano fund, in addition to the work of his own school, have made it impossible for the present Superintendent to give the time that should be given to the other schools.

Furthermore, a teacher is not so familiar with methods for other grades as a superintendent ought to be. Most earnestly, therefore, is the above recommendation made.

In conclusion, I wish to urge upon parents and citizens in general the importance of letting scholars and teachers know, by visiting the schools, that you are interested in their efforts. It will encourage all, and be an incentive, if they feel your direct personal interest in them.

Regular monthly meetings the third Monday evening of each month, when it is desirable to have all bills presented.

At the annual meeting in March elections must be made for two members of the committee for three years, and one for an unexpired term of one year to fill a vacancy.
