The Trustees of the Frederic C. Adams Public Library submit the following, viz.:—

The Board of Trustees organized as follows: Horatio Adams, Chairman; Harvey A. Soule, Secretary. The Town Treasurer, as provided by law, acting as Treasurer of the Board of Trustees.

The Library was dedicated and opened to the public August 4, 1898. At that date the Library had upon its shelves, 3,809 volumes. Since which time there has been donated twenty-eight volumes, as follows:

There have been several gifts to the Library during the past five months. Mrs. Cornelius A. Bartlett presented a photograph of Mr. Ichabod Washburn, and parties have given a Willard clock, wheelbarrow, umbrella stand, door mat and other useful articles, and thus saved the town something like \$50.

The Trustees ask and recommend that the town appropriate \$800 to pay the running expenses of the Library from January 1, 1899, to March 1, 1900.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

Attention is called to the amount of uncollected taxes for the year ending Dec. 31, 1898, as reported by the Collector, and to the fact that the amount is increasing from year to year. Within a few years this item has increased from \$50 to more than \$2,600.00. It needs no argument to show the manifest injustice of this course to those who promptly pay their taxes each year. The amount uncollected is not available and is too uncertain a quantity to take into account in making up the sum to be assessed for the coming year. There should be some remedy applied for this condition of things. If the expenditures of the town are greater than the people can afford to pay, reduce the appropriations. If they are not, then charge interest on all taxes unpaid after the time assigned for payment, or failing in this, and as a last resort, advise the Collector that he must collect by the methods fixed by law, unpleasant as such a course may be.

The bills paid on account of an injury to Israel H. Smith upon the highway at Parting Ways, just after the

great storm of Feb. 16, 1898, were charged to the contingent Account, and this with an unusual expense of Special Police caused the overdraw in this account. As it is hardly probable that a similar accident must be provided for the coming year, the sum of \$1,600 is recommended.

Under Chap. 561 of the Acts of 1898, providing for soldiers and sailors in the volunteer service of the United States, and for their families, the Town is paying \$16 per month. It is therefore necessary that the appropriation for State Aid be increased to \$600.

Considering the large sums that have been expended in the School Department for a new building, new furnishing and repairs within the past two or three years, and that there has been paid more than \$7.500 in this department the past year, the recommendations of last year seem sufficient.

The Overseers of the Poor report that 403 tramps have been entertained during the year. The tramp house has been occupied nearly every night since September by one or more, the largest number at any one night being 11. The expense attendant upon their support is trifling, except the destruction of beds and bed clothing and the furnishing of a few cords of wood, together with the well-earned sum of \$25 paid to the Superintendent. The expenses of the Poor Department are increasing, and the demands for aid at the beginning of the year 1899 are unusually large. An increase of \$200 to last year's appropriation is thought to be advisable.

With the foregoing comments in view, the following recommendations for appropriations for the current year are presented for consideration at the annual meeting to be held March 6, 1899:

There are a few accounts yet to be settled on account of this new supply which the Water Commissioners are anxious to have paid as soon as they can make satisfactory settlements with the parties interested.

There have been thirteen new services put in during this year, and two of the old lead service pipes have been taken out and replaced with tin lined lead pipe.

The only leaks that have developed were in hydrants and water gates, and six hydrants and three gates have been repaired by the superintendent, and are now in good order and the whole system of pipes in connection with the works are in first-class condition.

Water is furnished free of charge to— Five school houses. Six schools. Three hose houses. Town house. Almshouse. Four watering troughs. Seventy-two fire hydrants.

The above sum must be acknowledged as a credit to the Water Works, in addition to the receipts actually paid in by individuals for water furnished.

Atwell, 206 feet, a section from Crescent street, past the house of Adam Smith to other houses on that roadway. 612 feet, and another section from Evergreen street into the street laid out by W. W. Myrick, of 136 feet.

The financial report is very unsatisfactory, owing to a few bills not having been presented. Therefore, they cannot come out of last year's appropriation. This makes this year's expenditures in some places appear too little; and next year will make the same departments seem overdrawn.

There is a quantity of supplies on hand from past years, and more books and supplies have been delivered to the schools this year than we have bought. This does not appear in the report.

At the beginning of the school year the Committee decided to unite with the Trustees of the Public Library in employing a janitor for the High and Intermediate schools and Library, each paying a part of the salary, and thus securing the services of a competent person for all. H. Waldo Foster was elected to the position, and so far the arrangement has been perfectly satisfactory. Later it appeared that the Town's property at Rocky Nook was not getting proper attention, and Obed Ripley was employed as janitor.

This has given good results. As this arrangement includes all small repairs, we think it will in the end prove a saving to the Town.

Stony Brook school room has been furnished with a new stove, and fresh paint and paper.

Center Primary has long been in bad condition as to the interior, looking dark and dirty, and the furniture badly scarred by the efforts at wood carving of many generations of school children. The seats were also a misfit in the majority of cases and uncomfortable. We have had the room provided with modern seats and the walls painted and papered, giving a fairly pleasing effect.

At Rocky Nook the walls and woodwork have been painted and made clean and pleasant as possible.

The ventilator provided last year was not entirely satisfactory, but with the addition of a new jacketed stove, the arrangement seems complete, and gives good satisfaction.

Wapping school house had several times been in danger of fire from the old chimney, so we thought best to build a new chimney from the ground, getting rid of the accumulation of soot above the ceiling, as in the old chimney, and also made a ventilating shaft at the same time.

The interior has also been freshened and made more pleasing to look upon.

If we want our children to enjoy going to school we must make the school room as attractive and comfortable as possible. Then, too, the effect of a clean, whole and as far as possible artistic school room is, in itself, no small part of the education of the child, and stimulates both pupil and teacher to better efforts. In all cases the teachers and children have aided greatly in beautifying the rooms, bringing and arranging pictures, etc., for their enjoyment, showing a quick appreciation of the effort made for them.

As usual we find ourselves troubled to know what todo with the children for their greatest good. The number coming from Stony Brook and Center Primary to the Intermediate school already fills it and gives the teacher as many as she can do justice to. We have been obliged to keep this grade back at Rocky Nook, this term, as used to be done before there was an Intermediate school. This arrangement gives too many for one teacher, at Rocky Nook, and brings together so many different ages and grades in one room as to seriously interfere with the good of all.

After careful consideration we have decided that the greatest good for all concerned would come from building a new school house; somewhat nearer Plymouth line than the present one, for the smaller children. And use the present building for an intermediate grade.

We therefore ask you to give this your careful thought; discuss it at Town Meeting and, finally, appropriate money enough for a suitable lot and building, if, in your judgment, it is the thing to do.

We wish to call attention to the new law regulating the employment of children. As this is a matter very closely affecting the schools, the committee feel a deep interest in its enforcement.

See Chapter 494 of the Acts of 1898:

Chapter 494.—An Act to regulate the employment of labor.

SECT. 1. No child under fourteen years of age shall be employed in any factory, workshop or mercantile establishment. No such child shall be employed in any work performed for wages or other compensation, to whomsoever payable, during the hours when the public schools of the town or city in which he resides are in session, nor be employed at any work before the hour of six o'clock in the morning or after the hour of seven o'clock in the evening.

Sect. 2. No child under sixteen years of age shall be employed in any factory, workshop or mercantile establishment unless the person or corporation employing him procures and keeps on file and accessible to the truant officers of the town or city, and to the district police and inspectors

of factories, an age and schooling certificate as hereinafter prescribed, and keeps two complete lists of all such children employed therein, one on file and one conspicuously posted near the principal entrance of the building in which such children are employed, and also keeps on file a complete list, and sends to the superintendent of schools, or, where there is no superintendent, to the school committee, the names of all minors employed therein who cannot read at sight and write legibly simple sentences in the English language.

Teachers' Meetings.

Teachers' meetings have been held regularly. Alternate months have been given to the study of suitable subject

matter, and the intervening months to some question of method. In April Mr. MacDonald, agent of the State Board of Education, kindly offered an address to the teachers on "The Art of Questioning"; later, by permission of the School Committee, two talks were given by Miss Robinson of Plymouth—one on Drawing from Nature and one on Design. Miss Robinson, who has charge of drawing in the Plymouth schools, was able to illustrate her talks by a number of examples from the work of the school children, which were of great help to us.

Courses of Study

Since September the teachers have been furnished with typewritten outlines of subject matter and references to books in the library. Typewritten outlines of courses in Arithmetic, English History and Geography have also been prepared. We have tried in these courses to leave out non-essentials and to take up essentials in such a way as to awaken permanent interests.

The courses in history and geography are given below:

History.

Grade iv. (Oral.) September and October.—Indian Life. Story of Columbus.

November and December.—The Pilgrims in Plymouth.

January and February. - Franklin, Lincoln, Washington,

March and April.—The Pilgrims in Holland. Paul Revere.

May and June. — Decoration Day. Grant, the Birthday of the Flag, the Battle of Bunker Hill.

GRADE VI. (Reading.) Autumn.—"The Story of the Indians." Hiawatha.

Winter, — Montgomery's Beginner's History.

Spring. — Poems and Stories from New England History.

Grade vil. Discoveries, Settlements, The Colonial Period.

GRADE VIII. The Revolution. The Period of Expansion.
The Civil War,

Geography.

GRADE IV. Local Geography.—(a.) Natural features; hills and valleys, slopes, plains, kinds of soil, divides, brooks and brook basins, bodies of water, shore forms, etc. (b.) Study of local occupations. (c.) Study of map of Kingston. Descriptive Geography.—Form and size of the earth: Slopes of the earth. World ridge—primary highlands, secondary highlands. Continents and oceans. South America. North America.

GRADE v. Frye's Elementary Geography, complete.—Study of products in connection with countries. Asia: rice, tea and coffee, bamboo. Europe: oranges and lemons, raisins and currants, salt. Grade VII. The British Isles.—British interests on the route to Asia: Gibraltar, Malta, Crete, Cyprus, Suez Canal, Aden. British possessions in Asia. Australia and other British possessions in the Pacific. British possessions in

Africa. British possessions in America.

Grade VIII. Physical Eurasia.—Teutonic countries: Norway, Sweden and Denmark, Holland and Belgium, Germany, Switzerland.

Latin countries: Spain and Portugal, France, Italy.

Greece, Austria-Hungary, Ottoman Empire, Russian Empire, China, Japan,

These courses are put into the report in the hope that they may be useful to parents who like to take part in their children's education. It will be seen how much better some of the work can be done by the home than the school. A drive to find the course or the mouth of the Jones river, or a climb up Monks Hill, is a valuable geography lesson for children in the primary school. Later, a personal account of a trip, a picture, or a timely magazine article read in the home circle will not only help the child of that family, but enables him to contribute something to his class. We have received valuable outside help in the geography classes this year. The stores in town gave interesting information about the various food products, and the Boston & Albany, Boston & Maine and Fitchburg railroads furnished a great variety of maps and folders, useful in the study of New England. Through the kindness of the Fitchburg railroad each pupil in the sixth grade was provided with a map of Boston for study. Books and photographs have been loaned in many instances.

DECORATION OF SCHOOLROOMS.

Much has been done this year to make the schoolrooms attractive. The primary, Rocky Nook, Stony Brook and Wapping schools have all been freshly painted, and the primary school has been provided with new desks. Stony Brook school is most generously provided with pictures.

Through the thoughtful kindness of Captain Sampson it is furnished with fine portraits of Washington, Lady Washington, Grant and Lincoln. They have also some English prints—illustrations of the four seasons, in color.

The children in Wapping have contributed money enough to buy 125 of the Perry pictures, which are mounted on green cartridge paper in such a way as to form a frieze above the blackboards. They decorate the room beautifully and furnish fine illustrations for lessons in history, geography and literature. The primary school has several appropriate pictures. Next year it would seem advisable to tint the walls of the intermediate school. Then we should be glad of some good pictures there.

GIFTS TO THE HIGH SCHOOL

The High school was presented this year with a fine portrait of Mr. Ridler, given by his former pupils in the school. The school has also been fortunate in receiving substantial addition to its library. The senior class gave an entertainment at the end of the winter term which netted fourteen dollars and eighty cents for the puropse. Later, a concert was given to add to the fund, and at the annual meeting of the High School Association books of the value of twenty-five dollars were given to the school.

In all, the addition to the library amounts to fifty-eight volumes.

Music.

It is a pleasure to point out some practical results of the good musical training which the schools are getting. Members of the graduating class of the High school furnished delightful music for their entertainment, gave two numbers of the concert program, and sang for the reception of the High School Association; while the entire school, by invitation of the Post, rendered the "Battle Hymn of the Republic" at the Memorial services, besides singing most acceptably for the graduating exercises. The children of the lower schools sang, by invitation, "America," and the Battle Hymn at the Monument services on Memorial Day, This is a sort of service which the schools can render, and will give gladly whenever they can do so without special preparation.

MOTHER'S MEETINGS.

Three mothers' meetings were held during the summer term; one for mothers of the children in the primary school, at the house of Mrs. Waldo Cole, one for the mothers of the intermediate children, with Mrs. Mercer Ford, and one for the mothers of the grammar school children, with Mrs. Crowell. The subjects discussed were. "Home Occupations for Little Children," "Home and School Interests," and "Character Training." We ought to have such meetings regularly. They would prevent misunderstandings between the home and the school and promote the sense of a common interest. Mothers can see more clearly than teachers the effect of school life upon their children; on the other hand, they ought to be in direct relations with the school, instead of depending upon the inaccurate impressions which children often unintentionally give.

INCREASED INTEREST IN THE SCHOOLS.

The increased number of visits made to the schools and the beauty of co-operation of parents, whenever it has been called for, seem to show a growing good will on the part of the community. This may well continue until every parent is familiar with the school in which his children spend so many hours, and the teachers are made to feel equally welcome in the homes of the children. A closer acquaintance will reveal more clearly the warm love and interest which

the teachers feel for their pupils. Whatever success the schools may have had in the year just closed is due to their faithful work and high aims.
