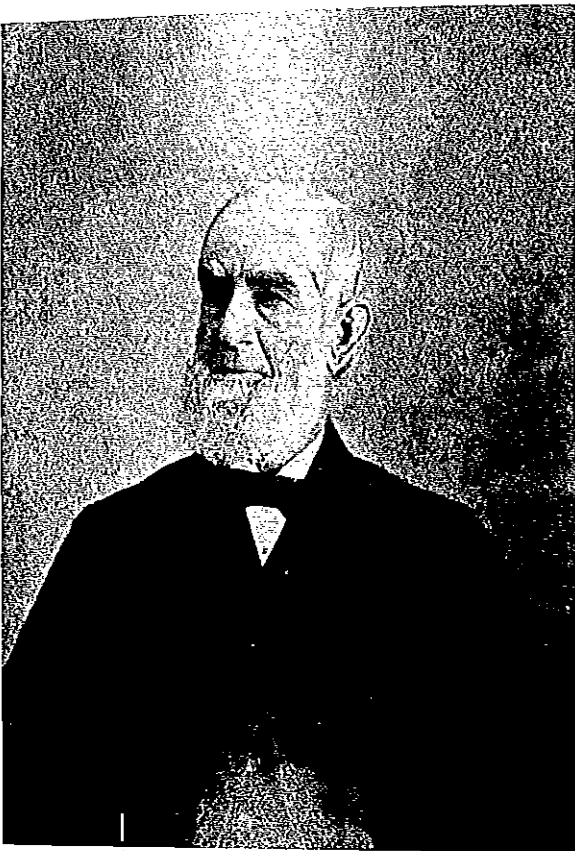

ANNUAL MARCH MEETING.

In pursuance of a warrant duly served the inhabitants qualified to vote in town affairs met at their Town Hall on Monday, the sixth day of March, 1905, at 9 o'clock A. M.

The meeting having been called to order by the Town Clerk, Mr. Galen E. Pratt was chosen moderator.

The following officers were chosen by ballot:

SELECTMEN, ASSESSORS AND OVERSEERS OF THE POOR.—Thomas W. Bailey, Alexander Holmes and William J. O'Brien, and they were sworn by the Moderator.

TOWN CLERK, TREASURER AND COLLECTOR OF TAXES.—Henry S. Everson, and he was sworn by the Moderator.

AUDITOR.—Lemuel R. Ford, sworn by the Clerk.

WATER COMMISSIONER.—Edward G. Brown.

ROAD COMMISSIONER.—E. Elbridge Atwood.

CONSTABLES.—Ellsworth C. Bailey and Ephraim Pratt, who accepted the office, and were sworn by the Clerk.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE FOR THREE YEARS.—Joshua De-

Iano and John T. Thompson; for two years, Harvey A. Soule.

TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC LIBRARY FOR THREE YEARS.—Elbridge H. Chandler, Harvey A. Soule; for one year, John P. Farrington.

TREE WARDEN.—Daniel Weston.

On the question shall licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors be granted in this town?

66 voted YES. 203 voted NO.

The meeting for the transaction of other business was opened at 3.30 P. M., and the following persons were chosen to fill other offices, and the following votes were passed:

POUND KEEPER.—Caleb E. Bailey.

FIELD DRIVERS.—Arthur M. Bonney and Howard L. Ryder.

SURVEYORS OF LUMBER.—Stillman B. Small, Walter C. Hammond and M. Parker Delano.

SURVEYORS OF WOOD.—E. Elbridge Atwood, Alexander Holmes.

FISH COMMITTEE.—Wendell O. Chandler, James A. Hickey and John N. Drew.

TOWN HOUSE COMMITTEE.—The Selectmen.

FENCE VIEWERS.—Alexander Holmes, Carl C. Faunce and Nahum Sampson.

Voted. That the care of the Burying Ground be placed in the hands of the Tree Warden.

Voted. That no payment be made from the treasury except upon orders from the Selectmen or by direct vote of the Town authorizing the same, and that no order upon the Treasurer shall be paid after the Collector shall have received his warrant for the collection of taxes until the person in whose favor the order is drawn shall have paid his tax.

Voted. That all taxes be paid on or before October tenth next, and that the Collector proceed to collect, by legal process, all taxes unpaid after that date.

Voted. That interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum be charged on all unpaid taxes after the 10th of October next.

Voted. That the Treasurer be authorized to hire money with the approval of a majority of the Selectmen in anticipation of the taxes of the current year, and to be paid from the same.

Voted. That the financial year of the Town close Dec. 31, 1905, and that the Annual Town Meeting be held on the first Saturday in March, 1906, and opened at 6.30 A. M.

Voted. That the Water Commissioners employ a superintendent and clerk, at an expense not exceeding \$600.

Voted. That the reports of Committees and Town Officers as printed be accepted.

Voted. That E. Elbridge Atwood and Alexander Holmes be excused from serving as jurors, and to add the names of Howard L. Rushton and Elwood B. Chandler to the list.

Voted, That each member of the fire companies be allowed a salary of \$8.00 per year, and 50 cents per hour additional for actual service at fires.

Voted, That the School Committee be paid for services as follows: To the Chairman, \$50; the Secretary, \$25, and \$12 to each of the other members.

Voted, That the Selectmen petition the State Highway Commissioners that the part of Summer street, from the R. R. Crossing to the Junction of Summer and Tremont streets, and that part of Tremont street within the Town limits, be taken charge of by the Commonwealth, and that if the Commissioners do not consider this location, that they build in some other part of the Town one mile or more.

Voted, That the Water Commissioners and Charles H. Drew, and James L. Hall be and they hereby are authorized to settle all claims which the Town has or may have against the City of Brockton for the taking of the water of Silver Lake.

Voted, That the thanks of the Town be and hereby are extended to Mr. David Delano, in testimony of its appre-

ciation of his many years' service as an officer of the Town, and that a copy of this vote be sent to Mr. Delano.

Voted, That the Selectmen be a Committee on Old Home Week.

Voted, That the salary of Selectmen and Assessors be \$300 each, for Overseers of the Poor \$50 each, and \$50 additional to the member who shall take charge of the tramp house.

Voted, That the salary of the Treasurer and Collector be \$600.

Voted, That \$10 be paid to Galen E. Pratt for services as Moderator.

Amount expended in support of highways. \$5,172 90

On March 7, 1905, the Selectmen petitioned the State Highway Commission for a State Highway leading from the Railroad Station to the Duxbury line, via Summer and Tremont streets. On April 14, the Commission allotted the sum of \$4,500.00 for the construction of a portion of the same. Releases have been obtained from the abutters and a layout has been filed, with the Town Clerk, from

the Duxbury line, via Tremont street to the house of Mr. Berry and via Summer street from the Berry house to the Stony Brook school house. The contract for the construction of this highway was awarded on the 22d of September last, and the work must be completed by June 1st, 1906. The Selectmen have assurances from the Highway Commissioners that a further allotment will be granted sufficient to complete the highway to the Railroad Station in 1906.

REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

Needed repairs and improvements of school buildings have been made during the past year. The school houses at Rocky Nook and Stony Brook have been repainted. The roofs of the Northwest buildings have been reshingled. Water has been supplied to the Wapping school house by a driven pipe.

Some changes have been made in the High School building, but they can hardly be considered other than makeshifts, because something had to be done. The upper room of the building not having been made sufficiently capacious, some of the pupils of the school have been seated in the room below with the fifty grammar pupils. Besides, members of the High School, in passing down to the laboratory on the lower floor are obliged, either to go outdoors, regardless of the weather, or disturb the grammar school by going through its room.

What has been suggested, if an extension of the High School building should be made at the rear, accommodations would be provided for the seating of all the High School pupils in the upper room, where they properly belong. This arrangement would allow for increasing membership. With the rear addition to the building, the front lower hallway, which is now narrow, might be widened, and a door provided so that pupils could pass directly from the lower hallway into the laboratory.

HAND AND EYE TRAINING.

Hand and eye training affords invaluable mental and moral discipline, and members of the State Board of Education are now urging this strongly. It stimulates the practical intelligence in a way that must react on the rest of school work and tends to correct the abstract and unreal nature of much school work by establishing in the minds

of both the teacher and pupil the sense of connection between the work of the school and the work of everyday life.

"The manual and industrial training," observes Principal Baldwin of Hyannis Normal School, "which our fathers got on the farm, along the shore and on the sailing vessel, was invaluable. Few of our children, however, receive any training at home which takes the place of that old-fashioned New England 'bringing up.' The school must, therefore, furnish the best possible substitute, along with such training in literature, history, science, art and kindred subjects as the best schools afford. Now, it seems to me, that the home should do all it can for the child, then the school should take him, and recognizing what the home has done and is doing, should build upon this, supplementing and rounding out each individual child, helping him to discover his own powers and to make the most of himself."

A promising beginning in voluntary school garden work, on the part of teacher and pupils, has been made lately at Rocky Nook, and at the Center Intermediate School, and in school needle work in vacation time in some sections of the town.

By extending the school sessions forty-five minutes for one or more days, in a week, as has been done in some towns, the boys could take voluntary garden work in the seasons for it, or light work with tools, and the girls take sewing, without encroaching on the time formerly devoted to other services. The expense would not be large. The training acquired would be practical and valuable. It would supplement both learning and develop respect for skilled manual labor.

HIGH SCHOOL TRAINING.

"It has been said in the past," observes Superintendent Cole, Wrentham, "that the High School seemed to be more

for those who wished to go to college: that the poor man's child did not get much out of it. While there was some truth in this statement, that condition of affairs has changed, and the tendency today is to put High School training on just as practical a basis as possible. To this end commercial courses are being established by nearly all cities and towns having a high school worthy of the name. These courses include not only commercial branches, but also typewriting and stenography.

Superintendent Loring, in his report for 1905, remarks: "As the consequence of the popularity of the course in bookkeeping there seems to be a growing desire for an opportunity to take up the study of shorthand and typewriting. That this would be a popular addition to our course I have no doubt. That it would also be a valuable one to the school I feel sure."

A business course is in accord with the demands of the times. The actual work of a commercial course should equal that done in the corresponding year of the college course.

During the past year there have been but two changes

in the corps of teachers. Because of ill health Miss Merrill declined a re-election as Supervisor of Music, and Miss Lottie C. Baker, of Brockton, who had acted as her substitute the preceding term, was elected her successor. Early in the fall term Miss Moran of the Northwest school accepted a call to a school in her own town and was succeeded by Miss Alice M. Stone of Andover. Both of these have taken up their work with enthusiasm and are rendering efficient service.

There has been a commendable spirit in all the schools. There has seemed to be more independent work on the part of the pupils and a larger feeling of personal responsibility. The table of membership and attendance shows the usual increase in the average membership and average attendance, although the total membership is about the same as last year. It is gratifying, however, to note that with these increases the percentage of attendance has also increased over that of last year, which in turn showed a substantial gain over that of the year before. Nevertheless, the fact remains that there are still too many cases of absence for trivial reasons.

During the spring term an exhibition of the work of the schools was held in the town hall. The purpose was to illustrate the work of the pupils in their everyday life in school rather than to display something specially prepared for the people who attended. Not a few expressed surprise at the character and breadth of the work which is being done in our schools, even though they had before been familiar with some phases of it. The exhibition was of much interest also to the teachers themselves, showing as it did the progress in the various subjects as they were taken up in the several grades.

Last spring an experiment was made in the Center Intermediate and Rocky Nook Grammar schools of preparing and cultivating school gardens. Much interest was mani-

fested by the children who took part in the enterprise. At the Rocky Nook school the only plot of ground available was at the rear of the school grounds. Loam and dressing were procured by the pupils and beds were staked out and prepared for planting, only to be trampled down by some person or persons to whose perverted intellect this undoubtedly seemed rare sport. The ground was prepared again, and again was trampled down. The persistence of the pupils, however, finally won and the garden was planted. Vandalism appeared again, however, as the vegetables approached maturity, and a fine lot disappeared the night before they were to have been sent as a gift to the chairman of the school committee, who had taken much interest in the undertaking. The flowers fared better and furnished many bouquets for the adornment of the school room.

At the Center school the pupils did not meet so many discouragements, and the garden plots were successfully cared for and much enjoyed by the children.

Notwithstanding the difficulties we have met I believe that gardening is a form of activity to be encouraged in our schools. The work connects itself naturally with the other subjects studied and gives much material of the best kind for use in those studies. The children who have had a part in the gardening have shown an interest of a most wholesome kind. It has been fun, but it was no joke. They were not working for marks, for the work was extra and entirely outside of the regular work of the schools, and entirely voluntary on their part. Our greatest problem for extending the work is the lack of suitable places for the gardens about the school houses. It may be that the solution will be found to be to encourage the children to cultivate individual gardens at home, and to foster their interest by some sort of an inspection or exhibition.

It has long been felt that the condition of the grounds about the Center Intermediate school house was not in

keeping with the building and a beginning has been made of improving their appearance in accordance with a plan proposed by Miss Newman. This is to include the seeding or sodding of the plot in front of the school house, and also the margin of the sidewalk, and the setting out of some shrubbery and plants in front and on the slope beside the building. The work has been done almost entirely by the pupils and friends of the school, directed by Miss Newman and Miss Baker. It is believed that the interest aroused by this personal effort will go far in protecting the work when it is completed.

During the past year we have been fortunate in our freedom from contagious diseases in the schools. The children from one family in which there was a case of scarlet fever were quarantined for the period required by the statutes, but there was no spread of the disease. The teachers are instructed to exclude any suspicious cases until they can be investigated, but some form of systematic medical inspection seems called for.

The objects of such inspection have been summed up as follows:

- (1). The identification of all pupils needing medical care.
- (2). The prompt exclusion from school of all pupils suffering from transmissible diseases.
- (3). The exclusion from school until appropriate medical treatment has been begun of all pupils suffering from other than transmissible diseases.
- (4). The detection of defects of sight and hearing and of deformities that may be corrected or improved by medical aid.

The growing recognition of the importance of this subject is indicated by the following paragraph from the address of Governor Guild to the General Court:

"I would suggest that you consider legislation contem-

plating a more general medical inspection of school children, as now practiced in some localities, notably for the discovery of infectious diseases and physical defects. A child may be a dullard at school and a failure in life because of undiscovered defects in eyesight or hearing. There are, to quote one line of work only, children now struggling for education through pain, ailing little creatures, backward in their lessons, tortured with racking headaches, who only need relief of a complaining set of nerves by a pair of properly adjusted glasses to transform them to healthy, happy children, capable of assimilating all the benefits of their school work."

In conclusion I wish to testify to the harmonious relations which have existed in all departments of our school organization, and which have contributed in no small degree to the efficiency of the work the past year.
