#### ANNUAL MARCH MEETING.

The inhabitants of the Town of Kingston qualified to vote in town affairs, in pursuance of a warrant duly served, met at their Town House on Saturday, the 3rd day of March, 1906, at 6.30 o'clock, A. M.

The meeting was called to order by the Town Clerk, and Mr. David C. Freeman was chosen Moderator.

The following officers were chosen by ballet:

Voted. That the care of the Burying Ground be placed in the bands of the Tree Warden.

Voted That no payment be made from the treasury except upon order from the Selectmen or by direct vote of the Town authorizing the same, and that no order upon the treasurer shall be paid after the collector shall have received his warrant for the collection of taxes until the person in whose favor the order is drawn, shall have paid his tax.

Voted. That all taxes be paid on or before October tenth next, and that the collector proceed to collect, by legal process, all taxes unpaid after that date.

Voted. That interest at the rate of six per cent, per annum, be charged on all unpaid taxes after the 10th of October next.

Foled. That the treasurer be authorized to bire money with the approval of a majority of the Selectmen in anticipation of the taxes of the current year, and to be paid from the same.

Voted, That the financial year of the Town close Dec. 31,

1906, and that the Annual Town Meeting be held on the first Saturday in March, 1907, and opened at 6.30 a. m.

Voted. That the Water Commissioners employ a superintendent and clerk at an expense not exceeding \$600.00.

Poted. That the reports of Committees and Town officers as printed be accepted.

Foled, That E. Elbridge Atwood, Roscoe G. Berry, Henry S. Everson and Henry Sturtevant be excused from serving as Jurors, and to add the names of Chester A. Baker, William H. Brown, Thomas E. Flynn and Lewis H. Keith to the list:

*Foted.* That each member of the fire companies be allowed a salary of \$8.00 per year, and 50 cents additional for each hour of actual service at fires.

*Voted*, That the School Committee be paid for services as follows; to the Chairman, \$50; the Secretary, \$25, and \$12 to each of the other members.

Voted, That the Selectmen be a committee on Old Home Week. Voted, That the salary of Selectmen and Assessors be \$300 each; for Overseers of the Poor, \$50 each, and \$50 additional to the members who shall take charge of the tramp house.

*Voted,* To accept the road as laid out by the Road Commissioners, and that the Selectmen petition the County Commissioners for authority to lay out over the bridge.

Voted, That Article 8 be postponed to some future meeting.

Voted, That the sum of \$200 be appropriated for electric lights on the streets, and the placing of the lights be left in the hands of the Selectmen.

Voted, That the Highway Surveyor receive a salary of \$800.

Voted, That the appropriation of \$4,500 for Highways shall include the excise tax from the Street Railway Company, and the salary of the Highway Surveyor.

Voted, That \$10 be paid to David C. Freeman for services as moderator.

#### SPECIAL TOWN MEETINGS.

At a special Town Meeting held May 28, 1906, the following votes were passed:

Voted that the committee chosen by the Town to settle with the City of Brockton be authorized to purchase for the town an electric motor or motors of such power and design as in their judgment shall be suitable, and install the same at the pumping station.

Voted, That the Committee chosen to settle with the City of Brockton be authorized to contract with the Plymouth Electric Light Co. for the extension of the lines of that company to connect with the pumping station.

Voted, That the committee chosen by the town to settle with the City of Brockton be authorized to purchase such additional pumps and other machinery, and other apparatus

as may in their judgment be necessary for the proper operation of the pumping station.

At a meeting held June 29, 1906, the following vote was passed:

Voted, In order to provide money to be expended for the improvement of the water works, including power therefor, as voted at the special town meeting held May 28, 1906, that the Treasurer be, and hereby is, anthorized to borrow a sum not exceeding five thousand, five hundred dollars, and to issue therefor the notes of the town each for the sum of five hundred and fifty dollars, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 4½ per cent, per annum, payable semi-annually, dated August 1st, 1906, and payable one at the end of one year from said date, and one at the end of each year thereafter until all are paid. The said notes to be signed by the treasurer, and countersigned by a majority of the Selectmen. Moderator for both special meetings, Galen E. Pratt.

Under the so-called Veterans' Exemption Act of 1906, property to the amount of \$18,065.00, and Polls to the number of 15, have been exempted in the assessment of the current year. Seven requests for abatement have been granted by the assessors, after the fact had been established that each doubtful case came within the provisions of the statutes. The amount of the property upon which the tax was thus abated is, \$4,600.00, making a total of \$22,665.00, being the property of twenty-nine persons exempted under the provisions of Chap. 315, Acts of 1906.

It would seem from the wording of the statute that the Veteran who wishes an exemption from the assessment of a poll tax, must make application therefor each year before the assessors' books are closed.

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#### SCHOOL ACCOMODATIONS.

According to the school report of 1895 the average membership of the schools of Kingston was 272, and according to the report of 1905, the average membership was 405, showing an increase in ten years of 133. This remarkable gain has more than kept pace with new accommodations. The high school is now short of suitable rooms in consequence of increased membership. It has been found necessary to seat some pupils in the grammar school room, and to resort to other make-shift arrangements.

The room occupied by the lower primary school is only about fifteen feet by twenty-eight feet. It is too contracted for the nearly 50 pupils crowded into so limited space.

"The size of schoolrooms," as stated by Dr. Prince of the State Board of Education "should depend upon the present and prospective number of pupils. There should be sufficient space for the seats and desks of pupils, recitation seats, platform and desk for teacher, and apparatus. In determining the size of rooms reference should be had also to proper heating, ventilation, and to ease in speaking."

"If the number of pupils is fifty, or likely to be fifty, the size of the room should be 28 feet or 30 feet by 36 feet. For the sake of good order the gathering of a large number of pupils into one room should be avoided so far as possible."

"Windows should be placed if possible at the left and behind the desks of the pupils. The window surface of a room should be from one-eight to one-fifth of its floor surface. Windows should not be in front of pupils as they sir in their seats."

The number of cubic feet of air vitiated by each child, in a primary school whose pupils are small, in one hour is 2,000. Hence, for such a school adequate space and proper ventilation are absolutely required.

The Committee would call attention to the unfortunate condition of the lower primary school, and to the necessity of prompt relief.

# THE EDUCATIONAL VALUE OF SCHOOL GARDENS.

George H. Martin, Secretary of the State Board of Education has lately spoken of the wide spread and rapidly growing interest that is being shown in school gardens.

"There are three reasons," he said, "why the work should be spread until it becomes universal. The first is because it appeals to the instinct of the child, who loves to watch the development of the plant that he is caring for. It creates in him a love for the beautiful in nature. In a short time he sees the fruits of his labor in the exquisite blossoms and plants that adorn his plot of ground. This feature gives it an inestimable value in the molding of the child's character."

"The second reason is that it allies itself with other school activities and brings reality and vitality into the work of the school and the scholaste life of the child. School gardening gives the child a better general knowledge of the ordinary work he is engaged in and helps him with his mathematical and literary work."

"The third reason for this work is the social possibilities and conditions. The school has been too much separated from the home, but this work of the child appeals to the parents and brings them to see what he has accomplished in his school gardening. It has grown to be one of the most valuable factors possible in public school life."

Gardening as a form of manual training has peculiar merit of being voluntary exercises carried on in the open air outside of regular school hours. There were, the past year school gardens, or rather perhaps more properly, home gardens under the care of pupils in the Center Intermediate and the Rocky Nook Grammar schools. These gardens were at the homes of the pupils but they were the subjects of reports at school, the pupils keeping note books in which they entered their observations as to the planting, cultiva-

tion, harvesting, etc. The number who had gardens in the two schools was about sixty. Much interest was shown and the pupils were always glad to report to the Superintendent their progress when he asked for it as he did at frequent intervals.

In addition to garden work, the pupils of the Silver Lake school have formed a sewing circle under the supervision of the teacher, and will devote to voluntary work at the schoolroom once a week one hour, outside of regular school time.

"Manual training," it has been truly said, "is more and more considered of the highest value in general education, as a stimulus to mental effort and development. The saw, the hammer, the needle and cloth are not ends in themselves—they are rather agencies through which the child may solve problems of production and achievement."

#### THE PUBLIC LIBRARY AND THE SCHOOLS.

Most of the education which a person gets comes from the reading of good books. If the schools teach the children how to read and neglect to teach them what to read, the reading they learn, outside of the school to like is just as apt to be a hinderance as a help in their education. Parents and teachers have no more important duty than the control of the reading of children. Among the recognized privileges of teachers now outrank the cultivating a fiking of good books, and making them easily accessible to their pupils.

The public library, and Kingston has one with an ample supply of choice literature, should always be considered as a part of the public school system, and so far as possible be used as such. Would it not be well for the Superintendent to make a list of those books, which would be suitable for pupils to read in connection with history, geography, litera-

ture, and manual exercises, and have pupils make selection from this list.

In the high school it may be possible to require pupils to read outside of school hours, in connection with their school work a number of approved books. In lower schools pupils might be asked to read during the year three or four books, suggested by their teachers.

An unusually large number of changes in our teaching force must be recorded this year. At the close of the spring term Miss Dunbar and Miss Alice Stone, after terms of service of seven years and one year respectively, resigned their positions to marry. Later on Miss Shearer, for three years an assistant in the High School, accepted a more desirable position in Salem and we received her resignation. Miss Eva Stone who had been with us for six years as teacher of the Rocky Nook Primary school resigned to pursue a course of advanced study. Miss Packard, who in her twelve years of service in our schools had had in her charge successively the Primary. Intermediate, and Grammar Schools, resigned her position to give her attention to private tutoring.

The vacancy in the High School was filled by the selection of Miss Sally Freeman Dawes of Island Creek, a graduate of Radcliffe. Miss Packard was succeeded in the Grammar School by Mrs. Annie B. Fales of Newport, a teacher of long and successful experience. Miss Faunce was transferred from Wapping to the position made vacant by Miss Dunbar's resignation, and the Wapping school was put in charge of Miss Harriet B. Thompson of Plympton, a graduate of our High School who had been teaching in the western part of the state. Miss Curran was transferred to

the Rocky Nook Primary school and was succeeded at Stony Brook by Miss Celia M. Richardson of Wohurn, a graduate of the training school of that town.

At the close of the winter term, Miss Baker resigned her position as Supervisor of Music and was succeeded by Miss Georgiana E. Taylor of Dover who in addition to the special training of the New England Conservatory is a normal graduate and experienced teacher.

Naturally with so many changes in the schools a little time was necessary for things to get to running as smoothly as before, but I have been pleased to observe how readily teachers and pupils have become acquainted and have adjusted themselves to the new relations.

Last June, inasmuch as out of the fifteen pupils in attendance at the Northwest school at the close of the term only six were residents of this town, it seemed a measure of economy to close the school and furnish transportation on the cars to the schools at the center of the town. was no opposition on the part of the parents of these pupils Aside from the and the school was accordingly closed. question of economy and far more important, is the advantage to the boys and girls of the opportunity of mingling with pupils of their own age in the larger schools. The rivalry resulting from the larger classes has also been useful in stimulating to better application to the studies. That there are disadvantages connected with the transportation is not to be denied but they may be minimized by the cooperation of the parents with the school authorities so that they are outweighed by the advantages.

At the beginning of the present school year, in response to a growing demand, it was decided to extend the commercial course in the High School by the addition of Stenography and Typewriting. Miss Florence M. Holmes was engaged to give instruction in these subjects forenoons. Miss Holmes is a graduate of our High School and of the Plymonth Business School, and has had successful experience in teaching these branches.

Typewriting machines were provided and a class of eight-was formed. The greatest need was for a suitable room, one of the dressing rooms being all that was available. Not-withstanding this the class has been most enthusiastic in its work, the members showing themselves ready to put in an amount of time far in excess of that called for in the schedule.

It is the purpose of the school to require of those electing this course a degree of proficiency in fundamental subjects that shall make them capable of taking and holding positions of responsibility when they shall have perfected themselves in these special subjects. The course is not an easy one. It is intended to give mental discipline as well as mannal dexterity, and one who is not willing to do close, hard work is worse than wasting his time in taking it.

In my report last year I referred to the work that had been done in school gardens. The past year we followed a different plan, the gardens being at home and the pupil reporting on his work. Quite a good deal of interest was shown last spring, some good gardens were made and cared for, and a few of the pupils realized substantial profits from the plots under cultivation. The reports that were made of the progress of the gardens were in some cases very interesting and showed careful observation and thought. The work furnished the best kind of material for use in connection with the school work and I have no doubt many of the pupils have clearer ideas of some of the terms they have been using in more than one of their branches of study from their work out of doors in the garden and the reports they made of that work in the school.

During the year 1906 I issued twenty-six "Age and Schooling Certificates." The enlarging of the woolen mills has increased a demand for child labor that was brisk enough

before. The employers, so far as I know, are without exception careful in the observance of the law, but constant vigilance is necessary to guard against the efforts of some mercenary parents to secure certificates for children under age or to obtain duplicates to dispose of to those unable to get them in a lawful manner.

Another phase of the matter is the effect which a child who knows that he is to leave school for work when he is fourteen will often have upon the school of which he is a member. Too often a reckless bearing and neglect of school duties, put on it may be to cover his regret at being compelled to leave school, serve to unsettle the entire room.

Of the measures passed by the last General Court one of the most important in its effect through the schools upon the community provided for medical inspection of pupils and buildings. Intelligently administered it should prove a safeguard against the spread of disease and of great value in discovering and bringing to the notice of parents cases needing attention which otherwise might not be recognized promptly.

The same statute provides for the examination of each pupil for the discovery of any defect in sight or hearing. This examination is made by the teacher, following directions which have been carefully prepared by experts employed by the State Board of Health. The parents of children who are found to have defects are notified that they may secure proper attention.

Of course the benefit to be derived from the operation of this law will be in proportion to the readiness of the parents to co-operate with the school. The teachers are faithful in their efforts to make the law of practical use, and I trust they may have the encouragement of support on the part of the parents.

While our percentage of attendance has steadily increased year by year until it is now ninety-four the fact remains that

there is still a considerable amount of unnecessary absence.

Between the ages of seven and fourteen the State laysclaim to the children and asserts an authority over them to which even that of the parent is subordinate, declaring that they must attend school all the time that it is in session. It gives authority to the teacher, acting under the direction of the superintendent, to excuse cases of necessary absence, but that she may judge of the necessity the reason for it must be known to her. For this reason she is instructed to require a note of excuse from each pupil returning after an absence. In case any parent allows a child to be absent ten half days within six months the law provides that he may be brought before a court and fined.

Now all this is not for the sake of the school but for the child. It is his right to be kept regularly in school. If he is permitted to stay out for trivial reasons he is defrauded of his right and the parent as the party responsible for it is answerable to the law. Regularity in attendance is essential to good work and many a child fails to be promoted or goes on to a class for which he is poorly prepared chiefly because of his irregularity. But even this is not the worst effect. The habits formed in school days are those which are likely to persist through life. Is it not worth while then to make every effort that they may be such as shall be of permanent value?

The fall term found two of our schools badly overcrowded. At Rocky Nook extra seats were put down in the Intermediate room until they numbered forty-nine, and when these were insufficient relief was sought by transferring some of the pupils to the school of corresponding grade at the center of the town. At the Lower Center Primary when the forty-four seats were filled the overflow was sent to Stony Brook.

Further adjustment may be necessary as conditions arise, but the root of the whole difficulty in this case lies in the fact that this room is woefully unsuited to the needs of a school of the size of Miss Faulkner's. Teacher and pupils are working at a tremendous disadvantage and it is a wonder that she has been able to send on classes as well fitted as hers have been. Any relief for these conditions short of removing the cause by providing adequate accommodations for the school can be only temporary in its effect. Prompt action is imperative.

In closing this repot 1 wish to testify to the earnestness and fidelity which our teachers have shown in the discharge of their duties in their several schools. But few people realize the responsibility which devolves upon the teacher. How often this burden of responsibility seems almost more than she can bear she herself alone can know. And she alone knows the courage and strength brought by the word of appreciation from the parent of a pupil or another interested in the school. Would that these words might be more frequently expressed!

### EXTRACTS FROM THE STATE LAWS.

Acts of 1906, Chapter 502.

Section 1. The school committee of every city and town in the Commonwealth shall appoint one or more school physicians, shall assign one to each public school within its city or town, and shall provide them with all proper facilities for the performance of their duties as prescribed in this act.

Section 2. Every school physician shall make a prompt examination and diagnosis of all children referred to him as hereinafter provided, and such further examination of teachers, janitors and school buildings as in his opinion the protection of the health of the pupils may require.

Section 3. The school committee shall cause to be referred to a school physican for examination and diagnosis every child returning to school without a certificate from the board of health after an absence on account of illness or from unknown cause; and every child in the schools under its jurisdiction who shows signs of being in ill health or of suffering from infectious or contagious disease, unless he is at once excluded from school by the teacher; except that in the case of schools in remote and isolated situations the school committee may make such other arrangements as may best carry out the purpose of this act.

Section 4. The school committee shall cause notice of the disease of or defects, if any, from which any child is found to be suffering to be sent to his parent or guardian. Whenever a child shows symptoms of smallpox, scarlet fever, measles, chickenpox, tuberculosis, diptheria or influenza, tonsilitis, whooping cough, mumps, scabies or trachoma, he shall be sent home immediately or as soon as safe and proper conveyance can be found and the board of health shall at once be notified.

Section 5. The school committee of every city and town

shall cause every child in the public schools to be separately and carefully examined and tested at least once in every school year to ascertain whether he is suffering from defective sight or hearing or from other defect or disability tending to prevent his receiving the full benefit of his school work, or requiring a modification of the school work to prevent injury to the child, or to secure the best educational results. The tests of sight and hearing shall be made by teachers. The committee shall cause notice of any defect or disability requiring treatment to be sent to the parent or guardian of the child, and shall require a physical record of each child to be kept in such form as the state board of education shall prescribe.

#### Chapter 44, Section 6, R. L.

A child who has not been vaccinated shall not be admitted to a public school except upon presentation of a certificate signed by a regular practicing physician that he is not a fit subject for vaccination. A child who is a member of a household in which a person is ill with smallpox, diptheria, scarlet fever, measles, or any other infectious or contagious disease, or of a household exposed to such contagion from another household as aforesaid, shall not attend any public school during such illness until the teacher of the school has been furnished with a certificate from the board of health of the city or town, or from the attending physician of such person, stating that the danger of conveying such disease by such child has passed.

#### Chapter 44, Section 1, R. L.

Every child between seven and fourteen years of age, and every child under sixteen years of age who cannot read at sight and write legibly simple sentences in the English language, shall attend some public day school in the city or town in which he resides during the entire time the public schools
