

are in session.— The superintendent of schools or, if there is no superintendent of schools, the school committee, or teachers acting under the authority of said superintendent or committee, may excuse cases of necessary absence. The attendance of a child upon a public day school shall not be required ^{**} if his physical or mental condition is such as to render such attendance inexpedient or impracticable. Every person having under his control a child as described in this section shall cause him to attend school as herein required: and if he fails for five day sessions or ten half day sessions within any period of six months while under such control to cause such child, whose physical or mental condition is not such as to render his attendance at school harmful or impracticable, so to attend school he shall, upon complaint by a truant officer and conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than twenty dollars: *provided, however,* that no physical or mental condition which is capable of correction, or which renders the child a fit subject for special instruction at public charge in institutions other than the public day schools, shall avail as a defence under the provisions of this section unless it shall be made to appear that the defendant has employed all reasonable measures for the correction of the condition, or the suitable instruction of the child. Whoever induces or attempts to induce a child to absent himself unlawfully from school, or employs or harbors a child who, while school is in session, is absent unlawfully from school shall be punished by a fine of not more than fifty dollars.

In pursuance of a warrant duly served, the inhabitants of the Town of Kingston qualified to vote in town affairs met at their Town House on Saturday, the 2d day of March, 1907, at 6.30 o'clock A. M. Voted, That the care of the Burying Ground be placed in the hands of the Tree Warden.

Voted, That no payment be made from the treasury except upon orders from the Selectmen or direct vote of the Town authorizing the same, and that no order upon the treasury shall be paid after the collector shall have received his warrant for the collection of taxes, until the person in whose favor the order is drawn shall have paid his tax.

Voted, That all taxes be paid on or before October 10th, next, and that the collector proceed to collect by legal process all taxes unpaid after that date.

Voted, That interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum be charged on all unpaid taxes after the 10th of October, next.

Voted, That the Treasurer be authorized to hire money with the approval of a majority of the Selectmen in anticipation of the taxes of the current year, and to be paid from the same.

Voted, That the financial year of the town close Dec. 31, 1902, and that the annual town meeting be held on the first Saturday in March, 1903, and opened at 6.30 A. M.

Voted, That the Water Commissioners employ a superintendent and clerk at an expense not exceeding \$600.00.

Voted, That the reports of committees and town officers as printed be accepted.

Voted, That the Selectmen be and hereby are authorized and instructed to place the Collector of Water Rates under bonds for such amount as they consider fair and safe for the interest of the Town.

Voted, That Frank L. Cole and Walter C. Hammond be excused from serving as jurors.

Voted, That the Selectmen be directed to provide a suitable stone to be placed in the Pilgrim Memorial Monument at Provincetown, Mass.

Voted, That the sum of \$200.00 be appropriated to copy for the State Archives and for publication by the New England

Historic Geological Society under Chapter 470 of the Acts of 1802, the vital records of the town to the year 1850.

Voted, That each member of the fire companies be allowed a salary of \$8.00 per year and fifty cents additional for each hour of actual service at fires.

Voted, That the School Committee be paid for services as follows: To the Chairman, \$50.00; the Secretary, \$25.00; and \$12.00 to each of the other members.

Voted, That the Selectmen be a committee on Old Home Week.

Voted, That the salaries of the Selectmen and Assessors be \$300.00 each; for Overseers of the Poor, \$50.00 each, and \$50.00 additional to the member who shall take charge of the tramp house.

Voted, That the sum of \$300.00 be appropriated for street lights, to be left in the hands of the Selectmen to be arranged with the light company for the same.

Voted, That the salary of the Treasurer and Collector be \$600.00.

Voted, That the salary of the Highway Surveyor be \$800.00.

Voted, That \$10.00 be paid to Galen E. Pratt for services as Moderator.

APPRECIATION OF A BROADER EDUCATION.

Movements are underway that materially change the High School course of the present. There is a growing demand that more attention shall be given to the physical training of pupils; that manual training and instruction in the domestic arts shall form a constituent part of the High School course, and in which even those who are looking towards the liberal professions may share.

"We are," says Payson Smith, Maine State Superintendent of Schools, "confronted by a condition, not a theory. Education is preparation for work. Our present school system, excellent as it is, provides only a one-sided education. It aims to train only the mental powers. There is an element of justice in the demand of a young man who intends to become a worker with his hands, that the same attention be given to one who will be a worker with his brains. We educate teachers, machinists, decorators. The one is provided with all the preliminary equipment at the public expense, the other must leave school at an early age and pick it up. Only our larger city schools do ever fit young men and women for business."

The question of equality of manual training and intellectual training is a question of justice. The 98 per cent. of the rising generation who must fight the battle of life with their hands, should certainly receive equally as much consideration as the 2 per cent. who go to college. Where manual training has been introduced into schools it has attracted many pupils, who find in the old style of schooling nothing that appeals to their taste or desire."

"As a rule," says J. W. MacDonald, Agent to the State Board of Education, "the schools that have broadened the most have grown the most. The principal changes in High School courses the past year, as for a few years preceding, have been in the direction of studies and training that fit pupils for industrial and commercial occupations. A good many of the larger High

Schools now offer substantial commercial or business courses, including bookkeeping, typewriting, stenography, commercial geography and arithmetic, banking, etc., together with studies that aim at general education, culture and intelligence."

"Industrial education," observes George H. Martin, Secretary of the State Board of Education, "is getting everywhere a more and more responsive hearing, and private and public resources are becoming available for the new education."

WORKS NO DISADVANTAGE TO THE SCHOOL.

Owing to the limited accommodations of the Lower Center Primary school room, it has been found necessary to put its pupils on three hour time. One section of the school will hold the three hour session in the forenoon and the other section a like session in the afternoon. As far as advancement is concerned this half-time attendance will work no disadvantage to the pupils, for by the end of their second year they will be found to have accomplished as much as their mates who have been on full time.

There is substantial agreement, it has been admitted, among experts in both education and physiology that far too much is attempted with children under six years of age. They should not be confined to the restraint of the school room for more than three hours. The tasks assigned them should be adapted to their mental and physical development, and great freedom and opportunity given for muscular training. There are many schools throughout the land that take children at six years of age, and after eight years of elementary instruction, put them into the High School as well fitted as pupils having nine years' course. In general, the necessity that compels a three-hour session *works no disadvantage to the school*, but rather the opposite.

THE PUBLIC LIBRARY AND THE SCHOOLS.

The public library should always be thought of as a part of

the public school system and so far as possible be used as such. Teachers should be allowed special privileges in the way of taking books helpful to their pupils' work; and the library trustees may perhaps be willing to provide a limited number in duplicate of such books as the teachers may especially desire their pupils to read in connection with their history, geography or literature. Pupils of the high school and pupils of the grammar school grades could read at home a certain number of books having relation to school work.

Teachers should not only give pupils a careful appreciative introduction to a few of the best books, but they should also try to advise them in forming profitable habits of reading. In private talks with individual pupils, and in occasional general exercises, many valuable hints may be given in regard to what books to read and to re-read.

Librarian Thurston, Newton Free Library, alludes thus to a good practice:—"Books and pictures are constantly selected to be sent to the schools to aid in the school work, and an attempt made, with the help of the teachers, to influence the reading."

CHANGES IN TEACHING FORCE.

At the close of the spring term Miss Thompson, who for the past year had successfully taught the Wapping school, resigned her position to enter the Bridgewater Normal School. Her successor, Miss Florence B. Staples of Hanson, continued the school very satisfactorily until the Christmas vacation, when, finding it too difficult to continue going to and from school daily and unable to find a boarding place near the school, she also resigned. At this point we were fortunate in securing Miss Inez E. Bates of Plymouth, a former teacher of the Stony Brook school, who enters upon her work enthusiastically and with the skill of a trained teacher.

At the beginning of September Miss Stormes, who for seven years had had charge of the Rocky Nook Grammar school and who had made a place for herself in the community not bounded by the four walls of the school room, asked that she be released that she might accept a much more desirable position. The resulting vacancy was filled by transferring Miss Marston from the Rocky Nook Intermediate, and that in turn by bringing Mrs.

Browne from Silver Lake. As her successor there, Miss Isabel K. Daley of Gloucester, a graduate of Salem Normal School, was chosen. It is very gratifying to report that all these teachers are doing well in their new positions, and that the work has gone on with a minimum of loss on account of the changes.

At the close of the fall term Miss Richardson, who for over a year had taught the Stony Brook school, left the profession, resigning her position to marry. Miss Richardson had done excellent work in her school, work which we trust will be continued by her successor, Miss Ethel C. Bryant of this town, who is a graduate of Bridgewater and who has been well recommended by the superintendents for whom she has taught.

During the spring term Miss Dawes was obliged to be out on account of illness and Miss Grace A. Lowe was secured as a substitute. I am pleased to report the recovery and return of Miss Dawes at the beginning of the fall term.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

The past year has been notable for the amount of sickness among the pupils. Aside from the minor ailments, colds, etc., which have been unusually common, measles and whooping cough have been so prevalent as to interfere seriously with the work of several of the schools. Cases of diphtheria and scarlet fever have occurred, but by prompt action their spreading was prevented. If isolation could have been as strictly required in the other cases I have no doubt their spreading could have similarly been controlled, to the great advantage of our schools. As the law is the child must be excluded from school, but no provision is made to prevent his associating with his schoolmates outside of school hours. Much may be done by parents, as has been shown in some instances, to lessen the danger of communicating disease without interfering with the activities of the children, and it is upon the parents that we must rely.

The past year is the first that we have had medical inspection in our schools, and I wish at this time to express my apprecia-

tion of the fidelity with which Dr. Swope has filled the office of school physician. He has been prompt in responding to the calls of the teachers, and this year they have been numerous, and his investigations of cases referred to him have been thorough. The results of such service are such that they cannot be compressed into mere statistical tables or estimated in dollars and cents. The cases with which he has had to deal fall into two classes: those with which the wellbeing of the whole school is concerned, as cases of contagious or infectious diseases, and those in which the health and welfare of the individual are primarily affected, as defects of sight and hearing, adenoids, etc. In several cases that come to my mind where parents have been notified of the presence of such defects, not previously suspected, and proper attention has been given, marked improvement has resulted in the children's work in school. The form of the notices sent to parents has caused some criticism but it is sufficient to say that they are of the form prescribed by the state authorities and are furnished by them.

SINGLE SESSION AT THE LOWER PRIMARY SCHOOL.

With the beginning of the winter term it was arranged that the second grade of the Center Primary school should attend in the forenoon and the first grade in the afternoon. This plan was adopted for two reasons. The room was badly over crowded and the greatest economy of effort was demanded to make up so far as possible for the loss sustained on account of the prevalence of whooping cough the previous term. The present arrangement allows the formation of many divisions in each grade, permitting an amount of individual work that was before impossible. While it must be recognized as an emergency measure, the results so far are very satisfactory.

SCHOOL EXHIBITION.

In May, following a custom that may now be considered established, an exhibition of the work of the schools was held at

the town hall. In the variety and quality of the work shown, as well as in the interest manifested on the part of the community, this one did not suffer by comparison with those that had preceded it. Teachers and pupils were alike commended by the appreciative audiences. A feature that attracted much attention was the work exhibited by the recently organized class in stenography and typewriting. The singing by the pupils of the several schools also called forth hearty applause. While the exhibition has its place in the economy of the schools, and while I am grateful to all who visited it and to those who have since said kind things about it, I would suggest that the place to learn what is being done in the schools is the school room itself, and that the teachers are always glad to welcome those who are interested in the work.

MEMORIAL DAY.

Memorial exercises were held by the village schools this year in the town hall the afternoon before Memorial Day. The Grand Army and Relief Corps were invited to co-operate, and furnished several addresses and patriotic selections that held the close attention of the halffull of children, impressing upon their minds, as I believe, the solemn meaning of the day as never before.

THE HIGH SCHOOL.

At the beginning of the fall term of the High School it was found that a class of eighteen wished to take the course in stenography and typewriting, a high tribute to the success of the first year of its operation. Arrangements were made to have Miss Holmes give her services the whole day instead of forenoons only. Two new typewriting machines were added to the equipment, and, as no room was available in the High School building for the enlarged class, a room was hired in a house nearby which provides comfortable accommodations.

There seem to be two widely different errors of opinion in re-

gard to the work of this course. Some believe that these subjects cannot be successfully taught in public schools, that the preparation will lack thoroughness, will not be up-to-date, etc. At the other extreme are those whose faith in the schools is so great that they would expect a hundred per cent. of success. In a way the private commercial schools would seem to have the advantage, in that their patrons are a picked class and moreover have that intimate interest that is derived from the fact that they *feel* the cost of the course. On the other hand, many who attend these institutions have not had the advantage of a High School course and must go into their work with that much narrower preparation. To our pupils we offer a well selected course of study by way of preparation, ample equipment, and skillful instruction. What each student will get from his work depends upon himself. Faithfulness and native ability are both determining factors, and as these vary in the individuals so will there be variety in the results achieved. The standards of attainments that have been adopted are such as experience has shown to be necessary for general efficiency. That a pupil may somewhat fall short and still succeed in some positions is true, but none should feel satisfied to continue below the established standard.

I have spoken at length concerning the commercial course in the High School because it is of so recent introduction. Some statement of the general work of the High School will probably be of interest. Taken altogether I believe the condition of this school at the present time is the best that it has been at any time since I have had knowledge of it. The relations between teachers and pupils are more harmonious and there seems to be an excellent spirit in the school. Last summer the school received the approval of the College Examination Board which carries with it the privilege of certification to colleges that are members of that association, normal schools, etc.

There are a few particulars, however, in which I believe we may assist the teachers in increasing the efficiency of the school.

Our course of studies has become almost entirely elective and as a consequence there are occasionally classes much smaller than can be economically conducted. Authority should be given the principal to withdraw subjects not elected by a reasonable number, leaving it to be taken at a later year, except in the case of those pupils requiring it for their preparation for higher institutions. Again, it might be well to establish a pretty definite course to be pursued by those planning to enter the normal schools instead of leaving so much to the choice of the individual. Further, there are always some pupils who from their physical condition, outside interests, or other reasons are unable to carry the full required work satisfactorily. With three-fourths of it, it may be, they would not be overburdened and the results would be satisfactory, with all of it, failure results in each subject. Now the parent who wishes her child to study instrumental music, or what not, and to give the necessary hours of practice, is right in considering this an essential part of the child's education, but she may be unjust in expecting the daughter to make the same progress in school as a schoolmate of equal ability whose time is not so fully engaged. Still more unjust it may be to lay the blame upon the school. If a parent whose child finds the work of the school too difficult to carry in its entirety with a reasonable amount of outside preparation, would consent to have the subjects divided so as to have the work of three years, it may be, done in four, more satisfactory results would follow. At present the principal can only advise, and if the advice is not followed, do his best to keep the pupil from falling behind. A rule giving him authority to act in such cases would, I believe, be a useful one.

BETTER ACCOMMODATIONS NEEDED.

I have already referred to the need for more room for the High School. For our present demands the whole building would be none too much. The grammar school does its work at a great disadvantage, for in the same room with its nearly

fifty pupils the remainder of the seats must be utilized for the overflow from the High School room above. The Laboratory, used also as a recitation room, can be reached only by going out of doors or passing through the grammar school room; and in either case some confusion and interruption is inevitable. The classes in stenography and typewriting lose time in going to and from the room hired for their use.

Conditions at the primary school have been too often referred to to require description. The crowding in the lower grade rooms is being relieved by holding half day sessions for each class, but that should be only a temporary expedient. A sub-committee of the School Committee was appointed last spring to investigate conditions and to make recommendations. They reported unanimously that increased accommodations were necessary and that in considering their relief we should have in mind the needs of both the high school and the lower schools. They presented plans for relieving the condition which met the hearty approval of the committee. On consulting with the Selectmen, however, it appeared that the time was not opportune to ask the town for the erection of a new building. It was represented that large bills in connection with the litigation with the city of Brockton must be met, and when the award should be made would be a better time to agitate the matter of building a new school house. The basement of the town hall was offered to the committee for the use of the Lower Primary school and it was planned to use it for that purpose. After consideration, however, it did not seem that this would be suitable and schools were opened in the fall in the same rooms as before. It is to be hoped that prompt action will be taken to improve the present state of affairs which are entirely out of keeping with the generally progressive policy of the town.

In conclusion I wish to testify to the fidelity with which teachers and supervisors have discharged their several duties the past year, and to the harmonious relations that have existed be-

tween the various elements that go to make up the school system. It has been a year of faithful, conscientious effort, the results of which are to be seen in the condition of our schools.
