The duties of an Overseer of the Poor are becoming more and more perplexing and complicated. By an act passed in 1911, to take effect in August 1916, whereby a residence of five years, in certain cases, gives a settlement, has caused changes to be made which in some cases are favorable to this town, in others to our disadvantage, and it is difficult to estimate what consequence may follow in the near future. There has been charged to this account about \$400, which should have been carried to the account of Soldiers' Relief for which no appropriation was made. Under the law a soldier or soldier's widow cannot be regarded as a pauper. In consequence, aid must be granted and charged to State Aid, Military Aid, or Soldiers' Relief. \$222.00 has been charged to Soldiers' Relief, which makes the sum paid for aid, \$3,145.78.

There should be credited to this account about \$500 due from other towns, a part of which has already been paid into the Town Treasury.

Article 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the purchase of a combination chemical and hose car and the equipments.

The polls will be open for the election of officers, and for the vote on the license question at 6.30 A. M., and may be closed at 1 o'clock, P. M., and the meeting will be open at

2 o'clock, P. M., for the transaction of such other business as may legally come before it.

The School Committee beg leave to submit the following report:

It is the policy of the Committee to make such changes as would raise the standards of instruction and conditions of school work to the level of the best practice elsewhere in the state.

In an endeavor to raise the standard in the High school the school was placed on a two session basis beginning with the opening of school in September. This may have worked to the disadvantage of some but the Committee feels that if it is given a sufficient trial it will work out to the advantage of the greatest number.

Owing to the epidemic of paralysis prevailing in the fall the opening of the grade schools was deferred for two weeks.

In connection with the financial account it is hardly necessary to mention the increasing cost of everything.

The cost of supplies has been kept down to a minimum, but will require a considerable increase for the coming year largely owing to the fact that the price of supplies is 115 per cent. higher at present than two years ago. Coal is another item that is likely to show a marked advance.

A comparison of the cost per pupil in average membership between Kingston and the State as a whole might be of some interest. The average for the State for the school year 1915-16 was \$42.55; for Kingston, \$27.00. This shows that the cost per pupil in average membership for Kingston is about 631/2 per cent. of that for the State as a whole.

Every passing year emphasizes the need for a new High school house. The amount of money that would be needed to put the present building into such condition as is necessary for present needs, and with modern sanitary conveniences, would go a long way toward a new one. And after this expenditure we should still have a building which would be far from ideal. Your committee believes the town should have a modern High school building sufficient for the needs for years

to come. Such a structure would be a source of pride to the town, would be conducive to a better school and community spirit and would enable the teachers and pupils to do better work in all departments. The present sanitary inconveniences are very bad and the class rooms are ill arranged and in some cases too small.

During the past year all minor repairs have been affended to. Besides this, new fire pots were placed in the furnaces at the Howland's Lane building, and at Stony Brook the building was painted inside and out and a new porch built.

Considerable has been done towards laying out playgrounds at the new building at Rocky Nook and it is hoped to complete this work during the coming summer.

At the Upper Center Primary a new fence should be built and at Silver Lake a new floor laid and the walls tinted.

For the ensuing year the Committee asks for an appropriation of \$15,200, based on the following estimates of receipts and expenditures:

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Committee and Citizens of Kingston:

I have the honor of submitting to you my second annual report. Following it you will find attendance and census data and a chart showing the distribution of pupils in the grades according to age.

Teachers.

The past year has seen but few changes in the teaching force. On January fourth Miss Ruth Myra, teacher of the first grade at Rocky Nook died after a very short illness of scarlet fever. She gave promise of being an excellent teacher and it is much to be regretted that so promising a young woman should be cut off at the outset of her career. Miss Marion Parshley, of Winchester, was elected to the vacancy. After serving in the first grade for the remainder of the school year Miss Parshley was transferred to the second grade following the resignation of Miss Helen Kapff. Miss Helen B. McCarthy, of Marlboro, was elected to the first grade position left vacant by Miss Parshley in September.

At the end of the school year Miss Winnifred Thomas severed her connection with the high school in order to accept a similar position with increased salary in Middleboro. Miss Sara I. Mansur, of Epping, N. H., was elected to fill the vacancy.

The small number of changes in the teaching force made it easier to maintain a higher standard of work during the last fall term. The schools enter upon the new fiscal year with only two teachers who have not seen a year's service in the town.

The writer in an investigation completed in 1914, found, in harmony with the results of other investigation along the same line, that although the salaries of teachers in Massachusetts increased considerably between 1897 and 1910 the cost of living had increased so much faster that the actual buying power of the teacher's salary had decreased something over twenty per cent. On accommendation of a subcommittee appointed to examine into the matter this committee voted in June to adopt a salary scale which will in the course of a year approximate the average salaries paid last year in those towns of this state most like Kingston in population, number of teachers employed, valuation and rate of school expenditure per thousand dollars of valuation. For the amount of money spent the town gets a greater amount of service and a higher grade of service from the teacher than from any other employee, and in order to attract and hold good teachers in the face of the present living cost it should be the interest of every parent surely, and of every citizen who is interested in Kingston's children to see that the sentiment of the town becomes such that the school committee may feel free to make further increases.

Curriculum.

During the summer the committee voted to adopt the State courses of study as they were received by us. These courses are made up for the first six grades only and to date we have secured and put into effect the courses in English Expression (including spelling, composition, grammar and oral reading), English Literature, Music, Physiology, Penmanship and Arithmetic. These courses were endorsed by the Massachusetts Superintendent's Conference in 1915 in the following resolution:

"We favor the thorough trying out of the State courses of study now in preparation to the end that there may be greater uniformity in educational practice and less loss of time when a child moves from one community to another."

Each course is the product of committees of superintendents and normal school instructors working in cooperation with and under the direction of Mr. F. G. Wadsworth of the State Board of Education office. In other words instead of being the work of any one individual they embody the results of the experience and study of many.

Tentative courses have been placed in operation in the seventh and eighth grades. These have been made up by your superintendent in such a manner as to harmonize with the aims of the courses for the first six grades. Further changes in the courses for these two upper grades will be necessary before we can feel that the courses provided meet our needs completely.

We have also made a change in our reading system throughout the grades. At the beginning of the calendar year we had a number of different series of readers in use, more or less worn out and not intended to grade into each other. The material to be read also varied in quality. A new series was adopted which overcame these difficulties and was otherwise pedagogically sound. Being properly graded and having a consistent aim they constitute a course in reading. They aim at and secure more rapid and comprehending reading. One teacher reports that the primary pupils have read more actual story material than previously at this time of the year. This is likewise true of other portions of the town.

Phonographs.

At Maple Avenue, Silver Lake and the Center Primary buildings the teachers, pupils and interested parents have worked together successfully to secure Victrolas. Last spring the High School Alumni Association placed sufficient money in the hands of the principal to purchase an Edison Diamond Disc Phonograph. These machines are all valuable additions to the school apparatus as through them it is now possible, where records are wisely selected, to bring the best music to

the pupils. The value of such music to the child is incalculable and we are under considerable obligation to all who have helped to make it accessible. Additional records are needed but care should be exercised that the music they produce be the best. The best is none too good for your children. While the records we already have are for the most part good there is need that even more care be used in their selection lest we lessen the power to discriminate between the best and the ordinarily acceptable. The phonograph might be of considerable value in securing the best pronunciation in French and it is possible to obtain excellent renderings of passages in English Literature which are of inestimable value.

Pluy Apparatus.

Another valuable addition to the school equipment is the play apparatus erected in the rear of the Maple Avenue school house. This has been secured at very slight cost by virtue of the contribution of considerable spare time and labor by a member of the school board. There is danger in mental development to the exclusion of that of the body, and in the exercise of the eye, tongue and finger muscles to the too great exclusion of the larger muscles of the trunk and limbs. The apparatus at Maple Avenue represents a sane and sanitary tendency and the idea should be extended to the other schools. Preparatory steps have already been taken at Rocky Nook and there should be something of this sort done at an early date at Silver Lake where there is plenty of room.

The High School.

The college entrance certification privilege (see my 1915 report) which had been taken from us has been regained so that last June it was possible for us to certify in whole or in part three graduates to Boston University, Colby College and the Massachusetts Agricultural College, the two last named being represented on the New England College Entrance Board.

Last spring Mr. C. D. Kingsley, agent of the State Board of Education, inspected our high school in order to determine whether or not it should be accorded the privilege of certification of its graduates to Massachusetts Normal schools. We were accorded the certification privilege in class B. Class A schools may certify any graduate but a class B school may certify only those in the upper half of the graduating class and then only when they have attained a mark of 80 or better in ten of the fifteen units required for graduation.

Mr. Kingsley offered the following reason for refusing us the certification privilege in class A: "The Kingston High School does not meet Requirements 9, 16 and 17, for class A high schools given in the enclosed circular." For the benefit of readers of this report I give the text of the requirements mentioned.

eonsideration shall be given to the needs and plans of all pupils. The school shall offer to first and second year pupils subjects that will be of definite value to them even if they do not remain more than two years in high school. So far as the finances of the school permit and the demands justify, courses shall be offered in household arts, manual training, commercial subjects, music, drawing, and the usual college preparatory subjects.

"16. The condition of the school building and its surroundings is an important factor in the influence of the high school. Hence the general appearance of the school rooms, halls, buildings and yard, the care of books and supplies and the condition of the blackboards must receive proper attention.

"17. The number and character of class rooms, recitation rooms and laboratories and the equipment of the school shall be such as may reasonably be expected of the town maintaining the high school."

Mr. Kingsley continues:

"In order to meet Requirement 9, I would suggest that the

program be revised so as to include Community Civies and Biology, as these subjects are of marked educational value for all pupils, and are of definite value to pupils who do not continue more than two years in the high school. I should also urge greater attention to drawing and the early introduction of work in Household Arts and Manual Training.

"The present school building is very far from meeting the needs of a modern high school. It would be necessary either to entirely remodel the present building or to erect a new building in order to have a structure that would meet modern needs.

"I desire to suggest the consideration of the desirability of a longer school day. Enclosed please find a statement that I have prepared setting forth the advantages as I see them of the two session day. With a longer school day and the introduction of Household Arts it would be possible greatly to promote the health interests of the pupils."

Mr. Kingsley's recommendations regarding Requirement 9 we have partially met by introducing Community Civics this year. This course has proved well worth while and has called forth favorable comment. The Biology could well follow next year, as well as greater emphasis on Drawing if we have a longer day. Household Arts and Manual Training could not be properly accommodated in the present building, and Requirements 16 and 17 can only be well met by radical treatment.

It is not my intention to present a full arraignment of the defects of the high school building but for the benefit of those who may wonder why the building is not still serviceable I will make the following points. The Commercial Department room is too small. Typewriting practice which could and frequently should go on during a period when the teacher is occupied with a shorthand or bookkeeping class if the typewriters were behind a glass partition must now be taken at such odd moments during or after school as the pupil may be able to fit into his own schedule and that of the department. The

best laboratory work can be done only when the laboratory or a portion of it is free from other uses sufficiently to allow apparatus for a prolonged experiment to remain in position for the experiment for two or more days. This cannot be done in the present building for the reason that several other classes meet daily in this room. On the other hand these classes are hindered because of lack of board space and writing facilities.

To go from one room to another involves considerable passing through a third room to the annoyance of the teacher and pupils in that room. It also involves passing through a cold hall during the winter and results in lowering the temperature in rooms that it is difficult to heat without this added difficulty.

Sanitary provisions are not as good as those in the homes of many of the pupils. A public building in the center of this town should be equipped with water flushed toilets, well lighted and ventilated.

The building not only lacks in convenience but in that beauty which should be present in all school buildings. Educational practice and experience demonstrates that the effect of modern high school buildings is to stimulate scholarship, increase enrollment, make for school spirit, improve disciplinary conditions, increase teaching efficiency, and to be a source of local pride. It can hardly be contended that our present building is a worthy instrument in any one of these directions.

In further harmony with the recommendations of Mr. Kingsley the committee voted to place the high school on a two session basis in September. A statement of some of the reasons for the two session plan has been given to the public through the press, and a fuller discussion by Mr. Kingsley is presented in full as a supplement to this report. As a matter of fact there have been most serious violations of the laws of hygiene in the way of insufficient time being allowed for dinner after school was dismissed at one-thirty. Some had nothing more

than the same kind of lunch that they had at the twenty minute recess. Physical health and even sanity are jeopardized when such conditions prevail, and the best work of the school is not realized. We spend much time in the grades teaching hygiene. It would seem that we should do what we can to conserve the results we thus secure.

Modern high schools must present a larger field and a wider range of material in order to make themselves of service in the way of fitting their pupils for the conditions of life. As at present organized one would expect that everyone entering our high school expects to become a member of one of the learned professions or to enter a business office. While I believe in a broad culture to such degree as it is possible I also believe that such a culture is not likely to be effective in the life of the individual or that of the community unless it is accompanied by, or founded upon a training that will enable the individual to make a better living and to improve the general standard of living. We are, therefore, in my opinion, under obligation to offer at our earliest opportunity something in the way of training in the homemaking arts and to encourage the boy who wishes to enter a trade by the introduction of some form of training that will be effective in helping that boy to make a better living. Drawing, instead of being, as many think, merely a fad, is one of the most practical items in our course. All these things take time, and time can only be secured in the quantities needed by a lengthened day. To lengthen the day with one session would be an impossibility.

Aside from the matter of make up work as usually interpreted there is a growing practice and a good one in high schools which provides that those who are for any reason below the desired standard in any subject or subjects be required by extra supervised study to attain a satisfactory standing. This extra study must necessarily follow the usual hours for the pupils who are up to grade. Most failures are due to temporary lapses and if taken in time and treated in this way

may be avoided to a large degree. This, again, demands a lengthened day, at least for some. A lengthened day, however, would also mean a rearrangement of our present hours, so as to get the work in during the winter months before the afternoon is too far gone.

At the last commencement we departed from our usual practice to the extent of having someone come in from outside and address us. The plan proved to be a popular one, and we will do it again. Mr. Wadsworth's message was timely and pertinent.

In a recent address to the New York City principals, the Acting City Superintendent of Schools gave voice to the following:

"As the impossibilities of yesterday become the probabilities of today and the realities of tomorrow, our attitude toward changes should be sympathetic. Changes must be met by changes; every advancement must demand a re-examination of our aims, methods and organizations."

This is the spirit we are trying to preserve in the administration of Kingston's schools. At the same time we are not making light-hearted shifts to follow the direction of every wind of doctrine. Nothing is proposed for adoption by the Committee or superintendent unless it is accompanied by evidences of its advisability. The changes of today are no more marked than at any other time but they may be made with greater safety for it was never before as possible for school officers to readily find out the best practices elsewhere, and never before have such elaborate tests, surveys and experiments been made for the guidance of the administrator. We are taking advantage of these opportunities and our recommendations are based on judgments we have come to in the light of them.

Your Committee is asking you for an increased appropriation for the coming year, and there is the matter of a new high school building already before you. This may mean a heavier burden of taxation, but, in the words of Benjamin II. Hill, "Education is the one subject for which no people ever paid too much. Indeed, the more they pay, the richer they become. Nothing is so costly as ignorance and nothing so cheap as knowledge." And we may well give heed to Sir Oliver Lodge's advice, that "We should put our heads together so as to spend the public money wisely and well, and then, we should spend it. Private thrift, public expenditure; that is the way to raise a town or a nation in the standard of civilization."

In closing I wish to thank the Committee and my fellowteachers, and the townspeople for their interest, loyalty and cooperation.

OPINION OF CLARENCE D. KINGSLEY, AGENT FOR HIGH SCHOOLS, REGARDING THE DESIRABILITY OF THE TWO SESSION PLAN, DECEMBER 1, 1915.

"The present tendency in high school practice in the United States is decidedly in the direction of a longer school day. The two session plan appears to me to be better than the one session plan for the following reasons:

"1. Health of Pupils. High School pupils are at an age when health is a matter of prime importance. Regular meal hours, nourishing food, and plenty of time in which to cat slowly are very important. Under the one session plan these requirements are seldom met, while the two session plan makes it much easier to meet these requirements.

"Under the one session plan many pupils leave home so early that they do not secure a proper breakfast. They ordinarily eat an inadequate lunch and eat it hastily at recess time, and when they reach home the noon meal of the family is over and consequently they either eat nothing or secure another inadequate lunch. As some families have only supper at night, many of these pupils can hardly be said to have secured a single adequate meal.

"Under the two session plan the pupils do not have to leave home so early in the morning and they can have, in the middle of the day, an adequate lunch period in which those who live near home may go home and eat lunch with the family, and those who bring their lunch may have an adequate time in which to eat it. Many schools are now serving some hot food at noon for those who are unable to go home; but even when this cannot be done, the longer lunch period seems to me decidedly beneficial.

"The one session plan calls for a long period of mental work with only a slight break, whereas under the two session plan it is possible for the pupils to come back to their work in the afternoon refreshed, and neither session is long enough to induce serious mental fatigue.

"2. Study at School. We think that seven periods, none of which are less than forty minutes in length, are highly desirable, as this affords time for more study at school. We find that many high school pupils do not have facilities at home that make it easy for them to do school work; while the school-room is equipped with desks and ink, and reference books are near at hand.

make up Work. It is necessary in the high school that pupils should have an opportunity to obtain individual help from teachers on points of difficulty, and that teachers may have some time in which pupils may make up work lost on account of absences. Under the one session plan it is necessary either for the pupils to remain at the end of the long session, which does not seem desirable because they are fatigued and unable, therefore, to profit by the special help, or else they must come back to a special session in the afternoon. While this special afternoon session works well when there is a large amount of make-up work to be done, pupils dislike to come for such a session when their problems can be easily disposed of at a conference of a few moments at the close of school.

"4. Attitude toward School. Under the two session plan pupils come to regard school work as their main business. When they leave school they will find that the business world is conducted on the two session plan and, consequently, the two session plan in the high school affords a better preparation for the serious duties of life. Moreover, the members of the community are likely to have a higher regard for the high school and its work when the pupils are not spending their afternoons aimlessly.

"5. The School Program. It is difficult to arrange a school program with only six periods so as to offer the necessary electives and at the same time avoid conflicts. The introduction of practical work and the provision of double periods for laboratory work make the seven periods almost indispensable.

"The most serious objection that can be raised to the two session day, in my opinion, is that some pupils find it necessary, in order to continue their high school education, to work during the afternoons. Where this necessity exists, I believe we should do all in our power to aid such pupils to continue their school work. They cannot, however, expect to do the full amount of school work if they are to be employed in the afternoon. Any attempt to have them do so will result in poor work on their part or in the lowering of the standards of the school. Consequently, I would recommend in this case that such pupils be ordinarily required to take only three instead of four subjects. If it is necessary for these pupils to take a fifth year in order to complete the high school course, it seems reasonable that they should be required to do so, especially inasmuch as the courses which they do take may be standard in quality.

"In conclusion I would say that it seems to me that the two session plan is better both for those pupils who live so near they can go home to their lunch and also for pupils who must bring their lunch."
