REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN
AND OTHER TOWN OFFICERS

ANNUAL MARCH MEETING.

In pursuance of a warrant duly served the inhabitants of the Town of Kingston, qualified to vote in town affairs, met at their Town House on Saturday, the second day of March, 1918, at 6.30 a. m. The meeting was called to order by Henry S. Everson, Town Clerk. Walter H. Faunce was chosen moderator. The following officers were chosen by ballot:—

Selectmen—Walter H. Faunce, Albert E. Holmes, Frank C. Woodward.

Town Clerk—Henry S. Everson.

Assessor—Albert E. Holmes, for three years.

Auditor—Ezra S. Wright.

Treasurer—Henry S. Everson.

Water Commissioners—Fred C. Chandler, for 3 years.

Overseers of the Poor—Albert E. Holmes, Walter H. Faunce, Frank C. Woodward.

Surveyor of Highways—Warren S. Nickerson, for 1 year.

Constables—Howard S. Rushton, Louis F. Bartz.

Collector of Taxes—Henry S. Everson.

Tree Warden—Charles H. Childs.

School Committee—Fred G. Brackett, Frank S. Chandler.

Trustees of Library—Frank W. Maglaflin, Arthur W. Pierce.

The following officers were chosen upon nomination:

Pound Keeper—Charles E. Low.

Field Driver—James P. Bonney.

Surveyors of Lumber—George B. Holmes, Stillman B. Small, Thatcher Baker.

Surveyors of Wood—George B. Holmes, Fred G. Brackett.

Fence Viewers—Alexander Holmes, Truman H. Fuller.

Fish Committee—George E. Cushman, Leander Raymond.

Voted, That the Town House and burial ground be placed in charge of the Selectmen.

Voted, That not less than 50 voters present at a Town meeting shall be considered a quorum.

Voted, That the highway surveyor be paid a salary of \$900, the same not to be included in the annual appropriation for highways.

Voted, That no payment be made from the Treasury, except on orders drawn by the Selectmen or by direct vote of the Town authorizing the same.

Voted, That after the Treasurer receives his warrant for the collection of taxes from the Assessors, he shall pay no order on the Treasury until the person in whose favor the order is drawn shall have paid his tax.

Voted, That the taxes are made payable on or before the 15th day of October next, and the Treasurer be authorized to collect by legal process all taxes remaining unpaid after that date.

Voted, That the Treasurer be authorized, with the approval of a majority of the Selectmen, to hire money in anticipation of taxes to be paid from the taxes of the current year.

Voted, To adopt the following resolution:

Whereas, Congress has proposed to the States an Amendment to the Federal Constitution known as the Prohibition Amendment, whereby is prohibited the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes, to become valid as a part of the constitution when ratified by the legislatures of two-thirds of the States as provided by the Constitution: and whereas that amendment is now being considered by the Federal Relations Committee of the Legislature of Massachusetts, and will later be considered by the Legislature.

Be it resolved by the voters of the Town of Kingston in Town Meeting assembled on this 2nd day of March, 1918.

That they recognize the immediate need of efficiency and economy as an essential factor in the winning of the great war in which we are now engaged and believing in National prohibition as the only effective method of prohibition, petition the Federal Relations Committee and the Legislature to take immediate action towards the ratification of the amendment.

That copies of this resolution be sent to the Committee of Federal Relations Committee and to the Senators and Representatives of this District.

At this date, January 17, 1919, the Legislatures of 36 states have ratified the amendment.

Voted, That the Water Commissioners be authorized to purchase a motor truck.

Voted, That we confirm the action of the voters at the last annual March meeting, whereby they voted to contribute the sum of \$1,000 in aid of the construction of the highway at Rocky Nook by State Highway Commission.

Voted, that the sum of \$500 be appropriated for the purpose of constructing a building for the protection of highway machinery, and that the construction be left in the hands of the highway surveyor.

Voted, That the sum of \$400 be added to the amount of \$600 recommended by the Selectmen for the fire department.

Voted, That the salary of the Treasurer and Collector be increased from \$600 to \$800.

At a subsequent town meeting held July 5, 1918, a town way as laid out by the Selectmen was accepted and the sum of \$300 was appropriated for its construction. The sum of \$1,000 was appropriated in addition to the sum of \$2,000, appropriated at the annual March meeting for aid on account of the German War, making the amount of appropriations for all purposes,

CONTINGENT ACCOUNT.

There has been paid and charged to this account the sum of \$2,528.54. The appropriation of \$2,500 is overdrawn on ac-

count of two accidents upon the highway for which damages were paid to the amount of \$244.77. There will probably be no necessity for a larger appropriation for the coming year.

STREET LIGHTING.

An appropriation was made for this department of \$950. Four new lights have been added to the number of last year and \$896.88 has been expended. More lights are desired.

SUPPRESSION OF CRIME.

The uncertainty attending work of this department renders any preparation a difficult problem. The use of intoxicating liquors in the past has been the cause of much trouble. What effect the amendment to the Constitution just ratified by at least three-fourths of the States in the Union, will have, cannot yet be estimated. \$102.41 has been paid the past year for the services of officers that present conditions seemingly require and we have no reason to suppose that the requirements will be less for the year to come.

SUPPRESSION OF MOths.

There has been expended \$1,355.67 and there has been reimbursed to the town by the state, \$326.77. A large part of the money spent and charged to this department is for work done on the estates of individuals who ought to attend to the work themselves or invite the moth superintendent to do the work for them and pay for the work done.

POOR.

The appropriation for this department was \$2,200, and for Soldiers Relief \$500. By recent enactment of laws by our Legislature a part of the assistance given and charged to the Poor Account must now be charged to Soldiers Relief and accordingly \$1,110.80 has been charged to Poor Account and \$176 to Soldiers Relief. New cases have recently arisen that will probably continue for some years and which will reduce the unusually large balance of this year.

HIGHWAY.

In this department there was appropriated, for the construction of a building for the protection of Highway machinery, \$500 00
For a piece of new highway at R. N. Park, 300 00
For general highway purposes, 5,900 00

Total amounting to	\$6,500 00
There was expended in building of new highway,	\$216 55
There was expended in construction of building,	281 32
Upon the general highway, including surveyor's salary,	6,531 05

This indicates an overdraw of \$389.54, which is excusable inasmuch as it was expected that an excise tax from the electric road of about \$700 would be added to the sum appropriated by the town and which sum has not been paid. Consequently the work upon the highway was prematurely closed. Of the amount expended upon the general highway \$900 was paid for superintendence, \$950 for oil, coal tar and machinery and the balance for labor. The sum of \$4,293 has been paid upon the order of the Massachusetts Highway Commission in aid of the construction of Main Street at Rocky Nook.

STATE AID.

At the said March meeting the sum of \$2,000 was appropriated for aid and in July \$1,000 was added on account of large sums called for in consequence of the German war. There has been paid to nine soldiers who were engaged in the Civil War of 1861, \$504; to nine widows of such soldiers, \$168. To fathers, mothers or wives on account of the German War \$1,280, making a total sum of \$2,252. It is probable that the amount paid on account of the German war will soon be reduced unless it should be continued by subsequent legislation.

TOWN HOUSE.

There has been expended for heating, lighting, repairs and janitor services the sum of \$359.53, and there has been paid to the Town Treasurer \$172 for use of the hall, leaving a net cost to the town of \$187.53. The appropriation was \$200.

TREE WARDEN.

Of the sum of \$100 provided, \$46.50 has been paid.

SURETY BONDS.

The sum of \$117 has been paid.

WATER BONDS.

One bond of \$500, with interest due of \$70 has been paid, leaving three bonds of \$500 each, for future payment.

WATER DEPARTMENT.

There was an appropriation of \$1,700 made for this department and at the same time the Water Commissioners were authorized to purchase an auto truck. The truck was purchased at an expense of \$860, and has proved a source of great convenience and in many cases a saving of expense. This purchase together with cost of repairing the damages to water pipes occasioned by the unusual severity of the weather in Nov. and Dec., of 1917 caused an overdraw of \$1372.70. For particulars see report of the Commissioners. Total expenditure, \$6,073.71.

BURYING GROUND.

Nothing has been expended although a little work was done. Help of the kind needed was unattainable. It will not be necessary probably to make appropriations hereafter for the care of the ground. The Selectmen have a letter from Mr. William L. Ames of Worcester, whose ancestors for generations lie within the older part of the ground, in which he offers to give to the town the sum of \$7,500 in trust, the income thereof to be used for the care and preservation of the ground and the monuments erected thereon on condition that the town will accept the gift and the provisions imposed. The inhabi-

tants of the town will be called upon to act upon the acceptance at the annual March meeting if not at a special meeting before that time.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The expenses of this department have been unusually large. Bills to the amount of \$1,587.81 having been paid. An auto truck has been purchased and \$1,011 paid for it. It must be regarded as a great advantage on account of the saving of time in reaching a burning building, inasmuch as the first few minutes of it decides the fate of the building. This change in the method of reaching a fire ought to reduce the annual expenses of this department. The fire company building at Stoney Brook seems to be of no further use and might well be disposed of. There has been paid and charged to forest fires \$183.93 and there have been no disastrous woods fires.

ICHABOD WASHBURN BENEVOLENT FUND.

The Trustees of this fund have filed with the Selectmen their annual report which shows the income of their investments to have been \$127.50. There has been \$37.50 paid for surety bonds, and the balance has been distributed as follows:

To 27 widows,	\$241 00
To 17 single women,	119 00

Receipts from the several recipients are on file.

By Chapter 49, of the Acts of 1918 the inhabitants of this Commonwealth, who were engaged in the military or naval service of the United States in the present war before the

passage of the act and those who hereafter engage in said service shall be assessed for, but shall be exempt from, the payment of all poll taxes assessed upon them for the year 1917 and during the continuance of the war. In consequence of such legislation it became necessary to abate about 100 poll taxes. Still the collector shows a long list of uncollected taxes. The payment of a tax is often looked upon as a requirement for which we get "no quid for the quo." In some cases this may be true, but generally it must be conceded that there is much that we enjoy of a public nature that each should be willing to contribute his bit towards its support. The influenza from which so many have suffered and the extremely high prices of all commodities that enter into the support of our homes and families has made the duties of a collector more unpleasant than is usually the case. On this account some little allowance may be granted to the Collector for permitting so large a number to delay in meeting these obligations.

In view of the foregoing statements the following recommendations are presented for your consideration at the annual meeting in March next.

In memory of my mother, and to contribute to the preserva-
 tion of the Old Burying Ground of Kingston, where my an-
 cestors and many of the early residents of the Town lie buried,
 I wish to establish a Memorial Trust Fund, and beg to sub-
 mit the following proposition.

I will give to the Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston the
 sum of \$1500.00, in trust nevertheless, for the purposes and
 with the conditions herein set forth, viz:

(1). The principal sum shall be invested and reinvested,
 as circumstances may require, by the Selectmen of Kingston,
 or by their successors to that office.

(2). The income from said principal sum shall be expend-

ed by the Selectmen of said Town, or by their successors, for
 the care, preservation and improvement of the Old Burying
 Ground, its boundaries and the stones, monuments and struc-
 tures contained therein. The "Old Burying Ground" being
 understood to include the ground given by Major John Brad-
 ford to the 1st Parish of Kingston, with any additions made
 thereto by said Town.

(3). The Fund shall be known as the Lucy Prince Ames
 Memorial Fund.

(4). The Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston, at their
 next annual meeting shall by vote accept, with the conditions
 as set forth, the gift herein tendered.

Upon receipt of your advice that this tender has been ac-
 cepted, I shall take pleasure in forwarding to the Treasurer
 of the Town of Kingston my check for \$1,500.00.

Article 6. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$100 for the benefit of the County Farm Bureau, and choose a Town Director as provided by Chapter 273 of the Acts of 1912, and to act anything thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will appropriate any sum in aid of the extension of the work done by the Massachusetts State Highway Commission on Main street at Rocky Nook.

Article 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Water

Commissioners to extend the water pipes on Howland's Lane, on petition of Thomas W. Baldner.

Article 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open for the election of officers, and for the vote on the license question at 6.30 a. m., and may be closed at 1 o'clock p. m., and the meeting will be open at 2 o'clock p. m., for the transaction of such other business as may legally come before it.

WATER COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

WATER COMMISSIONERS REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1918.

The freezing and bursting of the water mains, and the transportation of water to supply families whose service pipes were frozen, during January and February, 1918, caused heavy expense.

The widening of the street at Rocky Nook and Seaside forced us to make many costly changes in the water system there, and the shortage of water power at the pumping station was compelled us to use electric power in its place. These items, added to the higher cost of all labor and supplies, will explain why the appropriation of \$4,100.00 was overdrawn. The Auto Truck that was purchased has proved to be so useful that it is now considered to be indispensable. The dam at the pumping station is leaking so seriously as to make it questionable whether the Town is losing or gaining by continuing its use. A concrete dam, properly constructed, would enable us to utilize much power from water that now runs to waste through the many small leaks.

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

During the month of August, Mr. George A. Coe, superintendent of schools, resigned, to accept a more remunerative position and after many meetings of the joint committee of the school superintendency union the present superintendent, Mr. Howard W. Dunn was elected. We believe Superintendent Dunn will receive your individual and collective cooperation in the

performance of his duties. The school committee believes he deserves it.

During most of the year the committee meetings have been held without the presence of one of its members, who was called to the colors in France, where his cheerful presence and encouragement are no doubt as truly appreciated, as they are missed by the school committee. We earnestly hope that Dr. Swope may return in time to be a candidate for re-election to the school board.

The influenza epidemic has seriously interfered with the school continuity and considerable time has been omitted from the regular sessions. Much of this time, however, will be made up in the grades where it is safe to arrange for longer study periods. In the primary grades, however, the committee feel it would be unwise to attempt making up this lost time.

Much needed repairs have been attended to and the volume was by no means small. While labor and material have been high we believe economy has been practiced in keeping our school buildings in good condition, with the exception of one unused building, situated at northwest Kingston, the disposition of which we submit to the citizens of the Town for consideration.

The new building at Rocky Nook has been painted, at comparatively light expense. The upper Center Primary has been shingled. The lower Center Primary put in good condition, especially the interior which is now pleasantly conducive to the best efforts of its small pupils.

We have made a careful examination of all the school buildings and have made an estimate of the cost of essential repairs. Extensive repairs must be made to the high school building this year. It seems unwise to spend the amount of money necessary to repair this building which at best is so inadequate for the requirements of today, but we must assume this expense as there seems to be no prospect of a new building.

With regard to the supply of fuel we feel that we were ex-

tremely fortunate in having secured the required amount early last year. Winter opened very early with severe cold weather and in spite of the best efforts of our janitors some rooms were uncomfortable. Great inroads were made in the coal supply during that period, but with the schools closed on account of the epidemic, and a fortunate change to mild weather the situation has been somewhat equalized.

Notwithstanding the conditions which have prevailed during the past year we feel gratified that the appropriation has been only slightly overdrawn.

As a result of careful investigation into the financial requirements for the maintenance of our schools during the present year, we recommend the appropriation of \$18,500.00.

So that the general public may be conversant with what State authorities are planning for the future, much of which will become law, we quote from the report of a special commission on education appointed by the state legislature, as follows:

"Massachusetts School Fund.—A new plan for the distribution of present State school fund is recommended. The new distribution takes into consideration the actual needs of the town and its valuation.

"General School Fund.—The commission recommends a general school appropriation amounting annually to approximately \$1,000,000.00. This fund is to be derived from the proceeds of the income tax. The fund is to be distributed to all cities and towns so as to assist in supporting education and in equalizing educational opportunities. Under the proposed act aid shall be given the different cities and towns for the salaries of teachers. The bill also provides for supplementary re-imbursements for cities and towns having a low valuation per pupil. These supplementary re-imbursements vary in amounts from \$50.00 to \$300.00 for each teacher employed. The object of the supplementary re-imbursement is to equalize still further the financial burden in the support of our public schools.

"Compensation of teachers.—A minimum salary of \$650.00 for all teachers in the public schools, this bill applying to all cities and towns within the commonwealth.

"Americanization.—Points out imperative need of teaching aliens the English language, submits a bill for a vigorous campaign of Americanization among immigrants, and for an appropriation to carry on the work under the direction of the state department of education. Perfecting the schools for foreign born adults making them more efficient as a means of Americanizing the foreigner.

"Physical Education and Medical Inspection.—Physical training is a necessary part of education in the public schools. Provides for the appointment of a State director of physical education, who shall be a physician also. The bill recommended provides that every city and town shall appoint one or more school physicians, one or more school dentists, a director of physical education and training, and one or more school nurses. Two or more small towns may unite in employing such persons. Provision is made for the thorough physical examination of all children both in public and private schools.

"Curriculum.—Suggestions for the improvement of the curriculum recommendations for a longer school day and year, the discontinuance of the ninth grade, and the establishment of junior high school, the organization of studies in high school with a view to meeting the needs of all the students.

"College Entrance Requirements.—Recommends greater flexibility in college entrance requirements. Also that preparatory courses in high schools be adapted to the educational needs of the students rather than merely to fit for college requirements.

"Raising School Age and Minimum Requirements.—The completion of the eighth grade as the minimum requirement instead of the fourth, as at present, and raising the school age in September 1920 to fifteen years and September 1921 to sixteen. Pupils completing the eighth grade between the ages of fourteen and sixteen may be granted working certificates.

"Vocational and Trade Schools.—More prevocational education and an opportunity for children to "find themselves" the continued support and extension of trade education as one of the best means of producing more skill.

"Vocational Guidance.—Points out the need for a State director of vocational guidance and recommends that such guidance should extend throughout the elementary grades and secondary schools. Suggests that the vocational guidance should aid the child in choosing the right studies and schools as well as his life's work."

In closing we suggest to parents and all interested in the development of our school children the great need for suitable equipment in our schools for teaching domestic science to our girls and manual training to our boys. The latter perhaps to both boys and girls. We trust that in keeping with the suggestions made by the special commissioners on education in a state wide campaign, as quoted in this report, this equipment may be obtained at an early date.

It is hoped that we have made our position with relation to the ever progressing program of education clear, also our reasons for recommending the amount for appropriation.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Report of the Superintendent of Schools of the Town of Kingston:

Mr. Chairman and members of the school board, I hereby submit my first annual report as Superintendent of the Schools of the Town of Kingston.

Just as sure as the Nation is facing a period of reconstruction, so are the public schools facing such a period in every city, town and hamlet in our country. Our schools have rendered a magnificent service to the world. The boys who gave their all and those who offered their all, were only reflecting the teaching of the public school and the ideals which it is striving to hold before the youth of the land.

In the past and at the present time in most of the communities the schools are working along the same lines that they were twenty years ago, encouraging the child to be good because it was right that he should be; telling him that the study of English was of benefit to him. Likewise that the study of square root was needed to develop the brain. These and similar motives were held up before the child to arouse his interest. What has been the result? We are facing depleted Grammar grades, especially where there is a large number of foreign children.

In order to overcome this condition it seems advisable to introduce some sort of manual work as carpentry for the boys, and domestic science for the girls, also courses in home-making and sewing for the latter.

The Smith-Hughes bill passed by the federal Congress last

year provides for the payment of a sum of money equal to one-half that raised for the payment of instruction providing that a town will institute such a course in accordance with State and Federal requirements. A supervisor of this work could be secured in much the same way that a supervisor of music and drawing is secured at the present time. Although a permanent teacher would be much more desirable.

High School.

The efficiency of the work at the High School is very greatly impaired, in fact it is limited to about one-half of what it should be because of lack of suitable quarters. It is difficult to mention these many limitations, which, if removed would place our High School upon an equality with others in the surrounding towns, whereas at present we are merely getting by because of the leniency of the State Board of Education.

Here is a wonderful opportunity for a substantial Memorial, of intrinsic value to the Town, to those who offered themselves upon their country's altar.

The teaching corps of the High School consists of Mr. Lee S. Merrill, Principal, and Miss Lucy E. Treat, first assistant, who have proven their worth by several years' service. Miss Ethel V. Thorburn, a graduate of Boston University, is doing most excellent work in the History and English departments. Miss Eunice R. Pierce, who has charge of the commercial work, tho laboring under discouraging conditions, is doing a type of work that is highly creditable.

Physical Training.

During the operation of the Selective Draft Law, one-third of the men who appeared before the medical examiners were rejected because of physical unfitness. Strangely the country boy suffered more than the city boy, for a larger per-

centage of the latter was chosen. The explanation of this is not hard to find when we stop to consider that the City boy had the advantage of the School Gym with its regular work, and also the "Y" Gym. The country boy while he looked more hardy than the city boy, did not have the constitution required for military service. In the public schools we should first see to it that the pupil has a strong physical body upon which to build his mental structure. Really a large part of the deficiency in the schools may be laid direct to the door of physical unfitness that could be wholly overcome under competent and careful physical instruction.

The State has under consideration at the present time a bill that will require each town to provide some sort of physical instruction for each child.

Elementary Schools.

The Efficiency of a school is very largely increased by retaining the services of a teacher for as long a period as possible, and in order to do this it is necessary to make the conditions surrounding her work as attractive as possible. She should be paid sufficient salary so that she may do some professional work the better to enable her to do highly efficient work; hence the question of salary should not be left until the teachers ask for it, but rather should be adjusted by the Committee upon recognition of the merit of the teacher.

We are fortunate to retain the services of Miss Maud H. Marston, Miss Mary A. Curran, Miss Isabell K. Daley of Rocky Nook, also Mrs. Elva L. Browne, and Mrs. Elspeth S. Hardy at the center, and Mrs. Florence B. Blume at Silver Lake, all of whom are maintaining their usual high standard of work. Mrs. Mary F. Gordon at the Maple Avenue, is doing very commendable work. Miss Simmons and Miss West are still maintaining the high standard of work which they did the past year. At Stony Brook, Miss Alice A.

Libby of West Somerville, a graduate of Salem Normal School, has secured the interest and sympathy of the children and gives promise of a strong teacher. Miss Rachel L. Lydon of North Abington, a graduate of Bridgewater Normal is doing a very creditable work with the school at the Upper Primary building. Miss Marcia N. Baker, of Rome, N. Y., a graduate of the Oswego Normal School, is handling the third grade at Rocky Nook in a manner that indicates success.

Special Teacher.

So much of the time of the regular room teacher is taken up with the duties of her work that she is unable to give the proper time to the backward children. As a result, they soon reach the point where they are so far in arrears that they are almost hopeless. On the other hand if the room teacher takes the time required to bring these children up to grade the rest of the pupils, are bound to suffer, thus the teacher is caught on the horns of the dilemma, and both duties seem essential.

If a special teacher could be secured to do this type of work, it is plain to see that the work of the teacher would be lightened, and at the same time she would nearly double her teaching power.

Equipment.

Much that is new in the line of text books, and some new school furniture will be needed in order that we may do our work under the best possible conditions. If we could eliminate the duplication of so much of the simple yet expensive equipment by combining our one room building we would be taking a long step toward increased efficiency.

Time Lost.

Nearly five weeks have been lost owing to the influenza. It is proposed that this shall be made up, or at least a part of it by continuing the school year to July 2, instead of closing earlier in June as would ordinarily be the case, also by lengthening the school day one hour, beginning at 8.30 A. M., and closing at 3.30 P. M. This time would be added to the periods thus giving the teacher more time to drill pupils in those things which are needed to bring the pupils up to grade.

I wish to thank the members of the school committee, teachers and townspeople for the hospitality and kindness which are essential to the successful operation of the schools.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF DRAWING.

Mr. Howard W. Dunn, Jr.,
Superintendent of Schools,
Kingston, Massachusetts.

Dear Sir:—Herewith is my report on the work in drawing in the schools of Kingston for the year 1918.

The work for the past year has been very satisfactory. The course for the primary grades includes the teaching of the use of the tools and materials, as pencil, crayons, scissors, ruler, etc., illustrative drawing of stories and child life; manual work as paper-folding, cutting, pasting, (the construction of paper toys, doll furniture, etc.); nature drawing and simple design.

The grammar grade drawing includes nature drawing and painting; object drawing, involving foreshortening and convergence; design, as decorations for booklets, etc.; color harmony as applied to the home and dress; measuring and lettering, including the planning and making of original advertising posters (those of this year were war posters). In past years we have done some cardboard and paper constructive work as making folio covers, telephone pads, etc. Owing to the increased cost of these materials no work of this kind was done last year.

In the high school the course in freehand drawing includes nature drawing and painting; the designing of surface patterns for textiles; the designing of articles for the home such as bags, boxes, table-covers, etc.; the study of interior decoration of homes; the study of perspective including landscape drawing and painting; and object draw-

ing, including the study of light and shade, as well as the study of form and proportion.

The two-year course in mechanical drawing in the high school covers the teaching of the use of the tools and materials, lettering, geometrical problems, projection drawing of type solids, working drawings of common objects, sections and intersections of solids.

I have no suggestions to offer unless one that more manual work, either in connection with the drawing or taught separately from it, might be introduced into the grammar grades, if provision for materials be made and a little time set aside for the work.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC.

To the Superintendent of Schools:—

I hereby submit the report of the work in Music.

The course has progressed satisfactorily, with the ever ready spirit of co-operation on the part of the teachers. Even during the past four months, during which the schools have been closed for some time, a very marked gain has been made.

Pupils in the grammar grades have been doing a large amount of sight reading with the words in an efficient manner.

A course in music appreciation has been much enjoyed in the grades.

Folk-dancing for rhythmic purposes has met with success in the primary grades, considering the short time allotted to it.

The closing exercises in June gave testimony to the kind of work which the pupils of the High School have been doing.

The basic work in breathing exercises, tone production, sight-reading, ear-training, the interpretation and appreciation of music has been carried forward.

I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, the Principal of the High School, grade teachers and those connected with this work for their hearty co-operation at all times during the year.

REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN.

To the School Committee of Kingston:—

Since taking charge last fall I have examined the pupils in the primary grades and find the general health good. Very many of the children, however, have poor teeth and few of the children in these grade have teeth that show proper care. This, of course, is an economic loss to the individual, and therefore to the community. There has been some lack of observance of the law in regard to vaccination, especially in the Silver Lake School, which I hope to clear up this next term. These children together with a number who have certificates of disability, or whose vaccination didn't take must constitute a menace to the community, and a starting point for an epidemic whenever a case of smallpox shall come to town.

The hygienic condition of the school houses appears to be efficient.

At the beginning of the epidemic of influenza rules were introduced with your authority which excluded from school the most contagious cases of pupils coughing or sneezing or coming from homes where there were active cases. These rules should have made the schoolroom a safer place for healthy children, under supervision than unsupervised visiting and playing together away from school. But on account of pressure of public opinion the schools were closed on two occasions.

There have been two cases of accident attended by the school physician, and one case of truancy has been investigated.
