REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN AND OTHER TOWN OFFICERS

ANNUAL MARCH MEETING.

In pursuance of a warrant duly served the inhabitants of the Town of Kingston, qualified to vote in Town affairs, met at their Town House on Saturday, the first day of March, 1919 at 6.30 a.m. The meeting was called to order by Henry S. Everson, Town Clerk. Howard S. Avery was chosen moderator. The following officers were chosen by ballot:—

Selectmen—Walter H. Faunce, Albert E. Holmes, Frank C. Woodward.

Town Clerk-Henry S. Everson.

Assessor-Walter H. Faunce, for three years.

Auditor-Ezra S. Wright.

Treasurer—Henry S. Everson.

Water Commissioner-Charles H. Drew, for three years.

Overseers of Poor—Albert E. Holmes, Walter H. Faunce, Frank C. Woodward.

Surveyor of Highways-Warren S. Nickerson.

Constables Howard S. Rushton, Louis F. Bartz.

Collector of Taxes-Henry S. Everson.

Tree Warden-Charles H. Childs.

School Committee-Herbert E. Bryant, Harvey A. Soule.

Trustees of Library-F. Russell Adams, George W. Adams,

The following officers were chosen upon nomination:

Pound Keeper-Charles E. Low.

Field Driver-James F. Bonney.

Surveyors of Lumber-George B. Holmes, Thatcher Baker, Stiffman B. Small.

Surveyors of Wood-George B. Holmes, Fred G. Brackett.

Fence Viewers-Alexander Holmes, Truman H. Fuller.

Fish Committee—George E. Cushman, Leander Raymond, Edward E. Bird.

Voled. That the Town House and burial ground be placed in charge of the Selectmen.

Voted. That not less than 50 voters present at a Town meeting, where money is to be appropriated, shall be considered a quorum.

Voted, That the Highway Surveyor be paid a salary of \$909 the same not to be included in the annual appropriation for Highways.

Foled, That no payment be made from the Treasury, except on orders drawn by the Selectmen or by direct vote of the Town authorizing the same.

Voted. That after the Treasurer receives his warrant for the collection of taxes from the Assessors, he shall pay no order on the Treasury until the person in whose favor the order is drawn shall have paid his tax.

Voted, That the taxes are made payable on or before the 15th day of October next, and the Treasurer be authorized to collect by legal process all taxes remaining unpaid after that date.

Voted, That the Treasurer be authorized, with the approval of a majority of the Selectmen, to hire money in anticipation of taxes, the same to be paid from the taxes of the current year.

Voted, To accept the report of the Town Officers.

Voted. To appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the benefit of

the County Farm Bureau, as provided by chapter 27% of the Acts of 1918.

Folcd, That Luke S. White, act as Town Director no provided by chapter 213, Acts of 1918.

Voled, Not, to extend the water pipes on Howland Lane.

Voled, Not to appropriate any sum in aid of the extension of the work that may be done by the Mass. Highway Commission, on Main Street, at Rocky Nook.

Voled, That the sum of \$200.00 be appropriated to complete the drainage system on the land of the estate of Joseph S. Beal.

Voted, That the same rate of wages per hour be paid for forest fires as other town laborers receive.

Foted, That the pay for horses working on the highway be \$2.50 per day.

Voted, That the sum of \$500.00 be appropriated for the purpose of a celebration to the returned soldiers.

Voted, That the sum of \$300.00 be appropriated to erect a roll of honor and that a committee be appointed at this meeting to carry out the proposed plan.

Voted, That F. Russell Adams, Fredk. R. Mattern, and Herbert E. Bryant be a committee for the roll of honor.

Voted, That proper foot paris be built from Seaside line to Tuttle's store, on the easterly side of street, and the necessary funds be authorized at this meeting.

Voted, That the Selectmen and Road Surveyor put in a proper foot path at Rocky Nook at an expense not exceeding \$1500.

Voted, That the School Committee be authorized to dispose of the school house at Northwest Kingston.

Voted, That we accept the very generous offer of William L. Ames to pay to the town the sum of \$7,500.00, the income thereof to be expended for the care and preservation of the Old Burying Ground and the monuments thereon, and with the attendant conditions as expressed in his letter addressed to the Selectmen, and that the thanks of the inhabitants of the town be extended to Mr. Ames for his timely provision for the preserva-

tion of this historic spot, where rest so many of the early residents of this section of New England.

SUPPRESSION OF MOTHS.

In this department the appropriation has been largely overdrawn. The town appropriated the sum of \$1,000.00. There has been expended \$2,044.83 and the State Treasurer has reimbursed the town by the payment of \$157.48. This indicates that a large part of the work is being done for private individuals and charged to the town for which the State assumes no part of the expense. While some of the owners of land are spending their time and money in the suppression of the gypsy and brown fail moth this work is done for others by the superintendent and they who do their own work are assessed to pay the bills. This is unjust and should be remedied by rescinding the vote whereby the town assumes to pay for work done for private parties, or the superintendent should demand pay in eases where the parties are able to pay. Better perhaps to rescind the vote.

The town appropriated for this department \$18,500, to which may be added \$1,950 received from the State Treasurer from the proceeds of the income tax by an act of 1919 and \$500 on account of salary of Superintendent of Schools, making the sum of \$20,950. This latter sum has been paid for support of schools together with an overdraw of \$530.47.

POOR.

There probably never was a time when so many and so large demands were made upon the town for aid as has been the case during the past year. In some cases the Overseers of the Poor were able to deny settlement, in others were obliged to admit settlement and pay the bills. The appropriation was \$2,000. The payments amount to \$3,088.65, and there seems to be no prospect of any reduction in demand for aid at present. About \$400 of this expense is due from other municipals.

STATE AID.

In this department there has been paid to nine men of the Grand Army \$468, to eight widows of soldiers of the Grand Army \$500, and to the wives and parents of soldiers engaged in the German War \$444, making a total of \$1,420. To two widows of soldiers of the Civil War there has been paid \$137 and charged to soldiers' relief.

Three members of the Grand Army have passed away within the year, namely, Charles E. Bryant, who was the oldest man intown at the time of his death, August 26: George E. Owens, who died July 10, and Rev. Thomas Norris, who died in December.

STREET LIGHTING.

The appropriation was, There has been expended, \$900 00

987 50

A part of this overdraw was on account of a bill of 1918, presented too late for payment at the time of closing that year's account. More lights are petitioned for and if the petition be granted a larger appropriation will be required.

SUPPRESSION OF CRIME.

There has been expended \$919, an excess over the appropriation of \$650 of \$299; \$200 of this excess was due to the payment of the award offered at the time of the breaking and entering of the store of Mr. Childs by burglars who were arrested, released on bail, and forfeited the bail to the advantage of the county.



IHGHWAY.

\$6,000 was appropriated for the general highway, \$900 for salary of superintendent, and \$1,500 for special work, making the sum of \$8,400. \$900 has been paid to the superintendent, about \$2,100 for coal tar, lumber and other supplies, and \$6,320.82 for labor and freight bills, making the sum expended \$8,720.82. And notwithstanding this account has been overdrawn in the sum of \$320, we are invited to pay damages to the auto occasioned by imperfections in our highway or possibly on account of imperfections in the driver of the machine. Of the special amount of \$200 appropriated for extension of the drainage pipe at the junction of Main and Green streets, \$162 was expended.

TOWN HOUSE.

There has been paid for lights, fuel, repairs and janitorship \$625.19. The town grant was \$200, and there has been paid to the Town Treasurer for use of the hall \$507.

WATER BOND.

A water bond of \$500 due in June, 1919, has been paid with interest of \$50 and there are now two bonds outstanding of \$500 each, one due in 1920 and one in 1921, and \$110 has been paid for a surely bond for the treasurer and collector of the town and \$2.50 for bond of collector of water taxes, making \$112.50.

CONTINGENT ACCOUNT:

This account is seldom overdrawn but this year has succumbed to the general malady. The appropriation was \$2,100.

There has been expended and charged to this account \$3,796.60. An overdraw of \$1,396.60 and was occasioned by an assessment from the County Commissioners of \$769.46 as this town's share of the sum expended in repairing the Powder Point Bridge, \$193.75 paid towards support of Brockton & Plymouth Street Railway, and \$100 paid to treasurer of the Farm Bureau voted to be paid at the last annual meeting and for which no special appropriation was made.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Changes have taken place that has made the work of this department more effective and at the same time has reduced the expenses. One company has been dropped and better equipment for prompt action in case of fire now exists. Fortunately there has been no serious conflagration during the year. There was an appropriation for this department of \$800 and \$682.28 has been expended. The changes that have been made rendered the hose house at Stony Brook of no further use and it has been sold for \$500.

FOREST FIRES.

Several woods fires have as usual occurred but on account of prompt action of the Forest Fire Warden and his assistants, together with the aid of modern equipments, no extensive fires have occurred. \$150 was allowed and \$105.80 expended.

TREE WARDEN.

There has been expended \$62.75 of the \$100 provided.

WATER DEPARTMENT.

The results of the severity of the weather of the winter of 1948 had to be met during the past year in addition to the usual repairs as are always found in any public business of this kind and the appropriation of \$1,000 is overdrawn in the sum of \$239.14. There has been charged to this account \$175, which was paid to Bailey of Middleboro for repairs of auto truck injured by accident and which has been since paid by the N. Y., N. H. & H. R. R. Co., and should be credited to this account.

The account of the Trustees of the Ichabod Washburn Benerolent fund is on file and represents that \$257 of the income has been distributed among 27 widows and \$133 among 15 single women, and \$37,50 paid for a hond.

Being prohibited from publishing the names of recipients of money from the town treasury in a number of cases by legislative enactment names are not given in this report of the several departments. But anyone desirous of further knowledge of personal matters that cannot be obtained from the reports of different officers which are published each year, may at any reasonable time be accommodated by those having charge of the finances of the town.

The remedy for the large increase in our public expenditures and high cost of living lies not in receipts from the State. It requires but little thought to remind us that the State has noting to give except it first take. The receipt of \$1,950 taken from the tax on incomes and recently paid into the town treasury was like passing money from one hand to the other, allowing another person to make the change and take a percentage for the act.

The remedy lies in an effort by each one to do something that will add to the wealth of the community and towards his own support. Produce something, and in so doing develop both brain and muscle in a way that shall lead to the old fashioned. New England thrift and a sturdy race of men and women. Encourage industrious habits instead of furnishing playthings at the public expense.

Those who pay faxes are assessed to the extent of their ability to pay. Excessive demands from Nation, State, County and Town follow one another with such frequency that no time is given for recuperation and tends to discourage the wage earner with his little home as also the man of business. This is true generally, as well as in this town, where the accumulations of those whose energy, industry, ability and long days of hard labor, are being drawn upon to meet these excessive demands. And it is pretty evident that unless a change takes place in the habits of the rising generation this depletion of our resources will not cease. An increase of 150 per cent, to the poll tax, even, is made which will add another tax to the present list and will not add to the income to the town, as the addition of \$3 to the poll tax is to be paid directly to the State Treasurer by collector and if not collected will be a loss to the fown instead of gain. The following taken from "Instruction to Assessors" may be of general interest.

POLL TAXES.

 For each of the four years, 1920, 1921, 1922, and 1923, the poll tax is to be \$5.

By the passage of chapter 283 of the General Acts of 1919, sometimes spoken of as the War Bonns Act, the Legislature provided for disbursements to persons in the military and naval service of the Federal Government in the great war, estimated to aggregate \$20,000,000. About half of this sum is to be provided by an addition to the poll tax for four years, Leginning with 1920 of \$3, making the annual poll tax in these years \$5. Every poll tax assessed in 1920, 1921, 1922, and 1923, must be assessed at \$5.

Veterans of the Uivil War entitled to exemption from the payment of a poll tax under the provisions of the fourteenth clause of section 5, of part 1 of chapter 490 of the Acts of 1909 as amended by section 3 of chapter 144 of the General Acts of 1916, are exempt for the whole poll tax of \$5.

By the provisions of section 9 of chapter 283 of the General Acts of 1919 any person entitled to the benefits of said chapter shall, upon application to the board of assessors of the city or town in which he resides, receive an abatement of the \$3 additional war poll tax assessed upon him.

The matter of exemption from poll taxes of 1920 and subsequent years is somewhat further complicated by the provisions of chapter 9 of the General Acts of 1919. The persons who are to be assessed for but exempted from the payment of poll taxes under this chapter are those who engage in the military or naval service of the United State "in the present war" and "during said war." Enlistments are still going on, and until the war is terminated, by treaty or otherwise, these persons appear to come within the terms of this act. It will also be necessary to take into consideration the last few words of the chapter, namely, "and thereafter up to and including the year of their discharge." This provision appears to extend the exemption to the year of discharge, even though the discharge is effected before the first day of April. As recently enlisted men are not likely to be discharged for several years, this provision must be had in consideration for some time to come.

. The exemption granted by chapter 9 is of the whole poll tax of \$5 and not of the \$3 only, as in the case of men claiming under the provisions of section 9 of chapter 283 of the General Acts of 1919, above described.

In section 12 of said chapter 283 and the following sections provision is made for assessment to the cities and towns by the Tax Commissioner of \$3 on account of each poll. Where pell taxes have remained uncollected in the past the loss of the \$2 tax has been sufficient burden on the municipality to be felt, but under the above-described provisions the municipality must not only suffer the loss of the \$2, which is a part of its own resources, but must also make up to the Commonwealth the \$3

which should have been collected from the person assessed the poll tax: It becomes evident, therefore, that a more prompt and thorough collection of poll taxes must be had in order to prevent serious loss.

An aid to this end has been provided by the passage of chapter 319 of the General Acts of 1919. Under the provisions of this act poll taxes may be assessed and committed, with a warrant for their collection, to the collector of taxes in April or May, and section 2 provides that a collector who receives a list of poll taxes and a warrant shall forthwith proceed to the collection.

With this enabling statute there seems to be no reason why the poll taxes may not be all collected and settled into the treasury of the municipality before the property tax bills of the year issue. Such a businesslike course will avoid many losses occasioned by later removals of poll tax payers.

The following recommendations are presented for consideration at the annual town meeting in March next:

TOWN INDEBTEDNESS.

There are two notes issued by the town on account of water supply of \$500 cach. One due in June of the present year and one in June, 1921. There is also due a balance of \$5,000 of a note of \$8,000 issued in 1919 and which became due in Describer and which makes the present indebtedness \$6,000. To offset this indebtedness the Treasurer and Collector's account shows uncollected taxes \$6,069,50, and cash on hand \$1,159,50. All of which is respectfully submitted.

WATER COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

WATER COMMISSIONERS REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1919.

Nothing of importance has happened in the affairs of the Water Department during 1919 excepting the loss by death of F. C. Chandler, and the election, as provided by law, of W. D. Ford to fill the unexpired term as Water Commissioner.

The auto truck was damaged by collision at the railroad crossing on Summer Street, in the darkness of night, by an unguarded and unlighted freight ear, for which the railroad company acknowledged responsibility and paid the costs of repairs.

In the report for the year 1918 it was stated that the dam at the pumping station was leaking so seriously as to make it questionable whether the Town was losing or gaining by continuing its use, and that a new one would save much water power that now runs to waste through many leaks. Repairs have been made upon the dam and the flume from time to time and both are now so old as to be, in our judgment, unreliable and unworthy of having any more expensive repair. New leaks are constantly developing and a heavy freshet might do so much damage as to deprive us of our water power until such time as a new dam could be built.

Under the conditions we recommend that we may be authorized at the coming March meeting to replace the present dam, flume, etc., with concrete, or such other material as may be most desirable, and to make any changes in the power outfit that modern practice has proved to be efficient in developing more power from water.

Electricity is costing more than formerly, our water privilege is valuable to the Town, and is well worth the expense required to place it in first class condition.

One of the first of the electric motors that were installed in the pumping station many years ago is yet in position there. It is old and unreliable and must be replaced by a new one before another summer.

The consumption of water has increased so much that the reservoir will hold only enough for one or two days supply during dry times, and common safety demands that there be no risk of failure in the power, or the pumps, that can be reasonably avoided.

A line of 4-inch pipe has been laid on the premises of the Mayflower Worsted Co. at a cost of \$169.78 for materials, which amount has been paid into the Town Treasury by that company since Jan. 1st.

The receipts for the year 1919 are greater than ever before, and, as usual, no water rates remain uncollected. There has been received



REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The school committee respectfully submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1919.

All schools in town reopened January 13, 1919 after being closed several weeks in December and January because of influenza and the regular Christmas vacation.

Since that time the work has gone steadily forward, including a three weeks term in July for retarded pupils who desired to make their grade for the fall term. For a detailed report of the work of the schools attention is directed to the report of the Superintendent of Schools, High School Principal, School Physician, Drawing and Music Supervisors which by vote of the school committee are incorporated into and become a part of this report.

Careful attention has been given to the financing proposition, but the increased cost of all supplies and material, together with the increase in teachers' salaries, and in wages of all kind, has caused a large expenditure. All the buildings are in a good state of repair, with the exception of the High School building, upon which an expenditure of any amount does not seem advisable. The building has been inadequate for real high school purposes for some time and something must be done, if the boys and girls of Kingston are to receive the High School advantages to which they are entitled, and which they must have if we are to obtain the best results in the citizenship of our country. We would recommend that the town give this matter serious consideration at its annual meeting.

A conservative estimate, based on the actual expenditure of 1919 and the estimated increase in expense of maintaining our schools shows that at least \$25,550.00 will be needed for educa-

tional purposes the coming year and we would respectfully recommend that the sum of \$25,550,00 be appropriated for school purposes.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The demands made upon society at present are of a nature that require we shall give the best we possess in order to meet the unusual conditions forced upon the world by the World War. We responded to the call which came to sacrifice our best, in order that right might rule. How well we responded is told by the outcome of the Great Struggle.

New conditions have arisen as a result of the cessation of the Struggle which present demands that are of a different nature but none the less imperative if we are to maintain the position we have taken as a leader in world thought.

We were impressed by the success of our army and the rapidity with which it was organized, trained, etc. We were also impressed with the collapse of the opposing forces. Have we thought why this occurred? Here is the answer. The Psychology of the American youth was not reckoned with. The dwelt within each one a consciousness of power in the right which made him a vibrating, living, active soul. This consciousness is nothing more nor less than the reflection of the public school. Hence if we are to develop this type of manhood and womanhood we must keep our schools up to the standard which develops such character.

Legislation.

The Massachusetts Legislature has passed some very important legislation which directly affects our schools in this district. The school fund hill, appropriated \$4,000,000 for the schools of the state from which we derived \$1950 income for the past year and will receive about \$1500 for next year. This

amount is solely for the salaries of teachers, thus enabling us to pay salaries that compare favorably with larger towns. We are at present paying our Elementary teachers \$850 per year.

Pupils applying for employment or educational certificates must have completed the sixth grade where, as formerly completion of the fourth grade was required.

Pupils who have been retarded for three years, must now be placed in special classes provided there are ten or more to be found in the town.

Any town may maintain continuation classes and Americanization classes and the state will reimburse the town to the extent one half of the expense.

Teachers.

There have been several changes in the teaching force the past year. The teachers in the High School are the same as last year and the same high grade of work is carried on. There is at present a splendid spirit of cooperation between teachers and pupils worthy of a much more convenient and modern building and equipment. This is a crying need here in this town. It's a safe venture to say that for ten years at least the cost of building materials will not be cheaper than they are at the present for the fact that as demand increases prices will increase. This is proved by the increase in cost of fuel oil in the west. When the threatened coal shortage was known the oil promoters increased the price 300 per cent, in 30 days. Hence what are the prospects for a school building unless we at the present time take advantage of the present opportunity?

Much new equipment at the High School is needed but as there is no place to keep it, it seems unwise to buy until suitable storage room is available.

The teaching force in the grades is the same as last year except in the schools mentioned below. When we say this we are exceedingly fortunate to be able to say it, with the changes that have taken place in Educational Circles. It is unnecessary

to comment upon their work for we are familiar with the type of work they are doing and that they have done in the past.

At Stony Brook, Miss Eunice K. Lydon is doing excellent work with the first three grades. Miss Lydon lives in Abington, is a graduate of Bridgewater Normal, and did some work training in the Abington schools.

Mrs. Brackett, who has so faithfully and efficiently taught the 7th and 8th grades at Rocky Nook is on a years' leave of absence and her place is being filled by Miss Carolyn V. Walker. Miss Walker's home is in Mansfield. She is graduated from Emerson College of Oratory and has had one years' experience in the schools of Acushnet. The spirit and interest of the pupils is good.

Overcrowding.

The lower grades are at present over crowded. Mrs. Hardy at the Lower Primary has had to add extra seats to accomodate the pupils in these two grades. With such a congested condition and such a large number of pupils it is difficult to do the work in a satisfactory manner as a great deal of individual work has to be done in these grades. The fewer pupils a teacher has the better work she is able to do. A teacher in the lower grades should not have more than twenty-five pupils, thirty at the most.

Miss Rachel Lydon at Upper Center Primary has a similar condition; Mrs. Browne at Maple Avenue has a larger school than is desirable. Miss Baker at Rocky Nook has an unusually large class, having had to put in additional seats, thus a much overcrowded condition prevails and does not enable the teacher to give the pupils the time they ought to receive, hence retardation results and a very serious problem arises. This problem is to be handed to the next teacher and the pupils are below grade through no fault of their own or the teacher's.

The only solution of the problem is to secure at least two new teachers, one for this part of the town, and another for

Rocky Nook, whose duties shall consist of going to the schools at different times to assist teachers in earing for their classes, taking the regular work and letting the room teacher work with those who need special attention. In would be an excellent plan to purchase two portable school houses to allow extra teachers to have their own rooms, avoiding the necessary confusion of two teachers working in the same room.

The ideal solution is the central school building, with all the schools under one roof, under the supervision of one principal, whose work is almost wholly supervisory. This plan is the one that most towns will ultimately adopt when they are desirous of securing efficiency and economy. Conservation of power and effort always result in these.

Athletics-Physical Training.

Some plan ought to be developed to promote athletics or physical training amongst the younger children. Base ball, volley ball, track, tug of war, and such things ought to be made a part of each child's work, not so much for exercise but for the development of the spirit of aggressiveness, self-confidence, precision of action and thought. These are attributes that are inestimable to the success of a man and without these he does not reach that place in life that he should.

Our boys and girls get fresh air, good water, etc., but they should be taught that only as they use the best methods of thought and action is it possible to succeed. This idea is developed by careful instruction and encouragement to attempt tasks that offers opposition and obstacles to be overcome, for the measure of success in life be it school, business or social is determined by the persistance with which one overcomes difficulties.

Athletic contests develop this characteristic hence inter class and inter school contests should be encouraged and a field day or picuic could be arranged for just such a purpose.

A movement is on foot to secure the services of an instructor

to do some physical training work, this is a most excellent place and should be carried further than one or two days per week.

There ought to be a man to take charge of the Grammar Schools in this town, who would promote the athletic spirit in the schools. The need of a man principal at Rocky Nook is very evident for the pupils should come under such influence and discipline before leaving school. Such a man might be secured at some of the Normal Schools in the State. He should have the care of the grammar schools spending part time at the center and part at Rocky Nook. This system is used in many large cities, one man being principal of a district, containing several schools.

Teachers meetings have been held regularly with a view to keeping before the teachers the latest and best methods of teaching.

The proposed organization of a Parent-Teachers Association is a move that has unlimited possibilities for development of a very hearty and wholesome interest in the progress of the schools. Close relationship between the parents and teachers is desirable and cannot help but result in more efficient work by the teachers and greater cooperation on the part of the home. Here many of the misunderstandings between teachers and pupils can be removed by an earnest conference between parent and teacher. It is the duty of every parent to join this organization and attend regularly its meetings.

Textbooks.

New Geographics have been added to the supply of textbooks in the schools and is resulting in a greater interest in the study of this subject. The Arithmetics have been changed, the Wentworth-Smith scries having displaced the Southworth-Stone series. The Wentworth-Smith books take up the everday life of the child and relate this to his arithmetic in such a manner as to make the subject of vital interest. Language books have been added that enable the pupils to come in direct touch with

the best forms of literary, social and commercial writing, but related in such a way to the experiences of the child that he cannot fail to see how necessary this is to his development. Oral work emphasizing careful choice of words and clear and exact expression is a large part of the work. Silent reading is also taught the pupil, in order that he may be able to separate and digest the real purpose and intent of literature and current events rather than read haphazardly. The value of this is apparent when we realize that much of the education of man is through such reading after he leaves school.

Summer School.

The experiment tried last summer of the three weeks school session for those who were retarded proved to be very profitable, both to the pupils and the teachers. It was the aim to teach only those subjects which the pupils were deficient in and then only to emphasize the essentials; this aim was met very well.

It would be exceedingly desirable to carry on another session of six weeks this year, extending the work to the first, second and third grades, giving in these grades especially the first two a start in the work and at the same time making organized games and play under the teacher, the major part of the work. In this way the child would become used to the routine and organization of the schoolroom. Much of the time at the beginning of the term has to be spent in getting the children accustomed to schoolroom conditions and activities which if the child could become familiar with some of these things it would greatly lessen the teacher's burdens in this line and give her more time for regular school work.

Manual Work.

The Superintendent last year recommended that something be done in the way of work in manual training and domestic science. There is a greater need than ever before for this work and while the expense of such work is large it will grow larger each year and when we are forced to do it the outlay will more than equal the principal and interest of an investment at this time.

The suggestion has been made above that portable buildings could be secured for extra teachers. These could be used later for a manual training and domestic science building with no outlay but the equipment.

Some system of toilet for the children ought to be installed at the Lower Primary building to avoid the necessity of the children going out of doors in extreme weather. Above all other schools this ought to be done at the primary school.

A similar condition exists at the High School here, the idea of cleanliness and sanitation should be held before the student. A positive demand by the School Committee for these improvements may result in the realization on the part of the townspeople that it is unwise to "put new wine into old bottles," and result in action of some kind towards supplying the great need of a new high school building.

I wish to thank you, gentlemen of the School Committee, the teachers, and townspeople for your kindness and support during the past year.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF DRAWING.

To the School Committee of the Town of Kingston.

Dear Sirs:—Having been requested to take the position of Supervisor of Drawing to the Town of Kingston, sometime during the end of the Spring Term. I found the need of much foundation work in all grades. Also the need of closer and more searching study of a subject. The necessity too, of taking up less subjects and concentrating upon a few, rather than getting so little in the way of results from casual study of many subjects.

The scheme, or method I have used is a result of twenty-five years of hard work and experimenting on my part. I thoroughly believe that with serious and steady work this method of drawing will enable anyone to learn how to draw, even if they be absolutely without any natural ability for drawing whatever, and the fact that so many of my Boys and Girls in the different towns, where I teach, who were found without any inclination or talent for drawing, in any form, have developed as very able draughtsmen, proves very clearly to me that drawing. like other things can be taught with success to anyone possessing good eyes and a little patience.

Clever workers of natural ability will develop easily enough, but this is of little account for the most part, as it's the less favored ones, who will eventually prove, whether it's workable or not. We hope to be able to prove this contention later on by way of an exhibit of the work done in drawing.

That there is plenty of ability for drawing possessed by the school workers in the Kingston schools is without dispute, but that plenty of hard work and co-operation on the part of teachers, scholars and myself is absolutely necessary, is without question too. The work is coming on very well indeed now, and the next few months will deside the answer.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC.

To the School Committee and Superintendent of Schools: Our aims in music study are these:

First, to encourage in the pupil the inherent love and appreciation of music through the singing of good songs. Second, to teach a method of music reading which makes it possible for the pupil to read vocal music of reasonable difficulty. Nothing helps a child to be a good independent reader so much as individual work. That is the reason such great emphasis is placed upon it. Third, to encourage the study of applied music outside the school. Fourth, to co-operate with parents and to welcome co-operation from the outside.

There is urgent need of better music material for the primary grades to develop the child's musical taste in the right direction.

To all who have assisted me in my work I extend my sincere thanks.

REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN.

To the School Committee:

As the examination of individual pupils has not been completed, it is not possible to make any detailed report at this time. However, a survey of general conditions shows that the health of the pupils as a whole is very good.

The sanitary conditions of the various buildings and their surroundings are good.

No epidemic of disease of any kind have appeared since the beginning of the school year in September.

A number of cases have been found requiring exclusion from school. These were mostly cases of scabies, head lice and impetigo contagiosa. The latter, commonly called "fruit sores" by the laity, is a disease which is extremely infectious and the greatest care should be exercised to prevent its spread from one member of a family to another. Personal contact and the use of a common towel are probably the principal means of its spread.

HIGH SCHOOL REPORT

The following High School Report is respectfully submitted: For the first time in a number of years there were no changes in the teaching force in the High School. This fortunate circumstance made it possible to begin the school year without the readjustments and delays that always follow a change of teachers.

The remainder of this brief report aims to direct attention to some constructive measures that may well be considered in connection with the High School.

The facilities for doing effective work in experimental Science, such as Physics and Chemistry, and in the Commercial Course, are entirely inadequate. If the most successful work is to be done in these branches, and worth while results accomplished, adequate quarters, properly equipped, must be provided.

It is a recognized fact that the mental ability and natural inclination of some boys and girls indicate that their education to some extent, be directed along manual lines. This side of education has been neglected in the High School because of lack of room facilities. If we are to meet fully the educational needs of all the boys and girls in our community, we must provide training in Household Arts for our girls and Manual Training for our boys.

Experience has taught that the social life of boys and girls of high school age ought not to be neglected. Experience has also taught that the proper center for this side of school life is the school building. If we had a building with suitable accommodations for affairs of this kind, it could be made very useful as a social center for the whole community.

An effort has been made during the past year to provide

physical training for the pupils at the High School. Through the efforts of the boys and girls themselves, the school officials and the townspeople, a beginning has been made. If this important work is to be carried on during the winter months and made most effective, a suitable place and equipment must be provided.

During the past year there have been more visitors at the High School than ever before. We hope that the number will be greatly increased during the coming year. We believe that mutual benefit would result if everyone interested would make use of the opportunity to visit the school and find out for themselves what we are trying to do, how we are doing it, and under what conditions we are doing it.

Early in January, 1919, a committee was appointed of forty representative men of Kingston to be known as the Welcome Home Committee of the Soldiers, Sailors, Marines and Nurses.

The first activities of the Committee were to call at the bomes of those returning from the service as soon as possible after being notified of their arrival and present them with a bronze token in behalf of the Town of Kingston in grateful recognition of the services they had rendered. On the token was the Scal of the Town of Kingston and on the reverse side the inscription "In Grateful Recognition of Patriotic Services in World War 1917-1919," Your Committee spent many pleasant hours welcoming home those from the service, proffering them a hearty hand shake and assuring them how glad we were to have them back in our midst again.

Later a celebration was planned for July 1th, a great deal of time was spent making arrangements and great preparations were made. Major General Edwards was expected to be the speaker of the day, but after learning of his inability to be present it was deemed advisable to postpone the celebration until some later date.

After careful consideration of the matter from every angle your Committee finally completed arrangements for a titting demonstration which was held on Saturday, October 1s, 1919, as a tribute of grateful recognition to those who went from our town and participated in the World War. A parade was formed in the south part of the town at Croscont Street in which all the organizations in town were asked to join. Parade started at one o'clock led by Mr. Frank L. Chandler, Chairman of Parade Committee. The boys in uniform, under commuted of Lieut, Ralph L. Drew, and the nurses made a very impressive appearance entering into the spirit of the day with an enthusiasm which your Committee appreciated to the utmo-t. Many beautiful floats gave ample proof of the interest taken in the event. Mile Burke's Band of Brockton farrishing music for the occasion. The automobile section of the parade made a very pleasing sight. Line of march from Crescent

Street to Summer, counter march, to Evergreen, thence to Main, thence to Town Green which was handsomely decorated for the occasion. The entire line of march being one grand display of flags and bunting tastefully arranged by a professional decorator. At the Green the guests reviewed the parada followed immediately by a Band Concert after which Chairman of Selectmen, Walter H. Faunce with a few words of welcome to the Nurses, Soldiers, Sailors and Marines, introduced the speakers of the day, Lieut, Gov. Channing H. Cox, Hon. Albert Washburn and Deputy Tax Collector Joseph Beleher. At six o'clock a turkey supper was served by the ladies in the Town Hall, the tables were handsomely decorated and at each plate was a souvenir programme fied with red, white and blue ribbon. Immediately following the banquet was an entertainment by a number of the young ladies of the town. The whole affair then closing with a Grand Ball which was apparently enjoyed by the boys and their guests much to the delight of this Committee.

It will be noticed in the Treasurer's report under disbursements there is no mention of the cost of the turkey supper. There was a fund, raised by an organization of the town solely for the purpose of welcoming home the boys, which was never turned over to this Committee, therefore we regret we cannot make a report on the same. We presume this fund was used for the turkey supper.

In regard to the twenty-one dollars balance on hand from the Treasurer's report we will have to purchase about six more tokens the cost of which we do not know for such a small number. There are a few boys who have not yet returned to Kingston and one or two we do not know their addresses, so the balance will be much less when we render our final report.

Thanking each and every one who helped in any way to make the day a success we respectfully submit the above report.
