School Committee—William H. Brown, Albert H. Holmes.

Trustees of Public Library for 3 years—Henry L. Barker, Harvey A. Soule.

Tree Warden—Charles H. Childs.

Pound Keeper—Charles E. Low.

Field Driver—James F. Bonney.

Surveyors of Land—George B. Holmes, Thatcher Baker, Stillman B. Small.

Fish Committee—George E. Cushman, Leander Raymond, Edward E. Bird.

Voted. That the Treasurer be authorized to hire money with the approval of a majority of the Selectmen in anticipation of the taxes of the current year, the same to be paid therefrom.

Voted. That the Selectmen be instructed to petition the General Court for authority to borrow money for water purposes, not to exceed \$50,000.00.

Voted. To appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Farm Bureau.

Voted. That a committee of five be appointed to act in conjunction with the Selectmen to take up the matter of tercentenary ceremonies, and Alexander Holmes, Charles H. Drew, Heber S. Kilburn, Ralph L. Drew, and Albert H. Holmes were appointed.

Voted. That a committee of three be appointed by the chair to consider the changing of some of the names of ancient ways. Alexander Holmes, Sarah J. Bailey, and Helen Holmes were appointed.

Voted. That the Water Commissioners be and hereby are authorized to replace by concrete construction or otherwise, the dam and flume at the pumping station and to make such replacement or renewal of the water wheel and shafting connected therewith as in their judgment may be necessary, provided the total cost does not exceed the sum of \$10,000.00.

Voted. That the salary of the Highway Surveyor shall be \$1,000.00 and that \$1.00 per day for labor of men and \$3.00 for each horse.

Voted. That the Moth Superintendent be instructed to make contracts with the owners for work done on private property.

Voted. That the Selectmen be authorized to expend a sum not exceeding \$1,500.00 for repairs upon the Town House.

Voted. That a committee of three be chosen to act in conjunction with the School Committee in selecting a site, securing necessary data, for the erection of a High School building and that this joint committee through the Selectmen have authority to call a special town meeting within ninety days to consider the recommendations of the committee, and to see if an appropriation will be made for the erection of said High School building. Charles Fischer, George B. Holmes and Lewis D. Bryant were chosen.

Voted. That a drain be constructed to take care of the water in the highway from Tura's store to Maple Avenue and that the sum of \$500.00 be appropriated therefor.

Voted. That the matter of bill boards be left in the hands of the Selectmen.

At a meeting held March 20, it was voted that the Selectmen be instructed to raise by notes of the town the sum of \$12,500.00, it being this town's share in the expense attending the rebuilding of a part of Main and Summer Streets.

At a later meeting held May 20, 1920, voted, that the town petition the Legislature for authority to increase the borrowing capacity of the town \$50,000.00 for the purpose of remodeling the High School building and making additions thereto. Petition not granted.

HIGHWAY.

\$10,000.00 was appropriated for this department; \$11,116.12 has been expended, and still modern methods of travel require

large expenditure in some parts of the town. There was paid \$800 for construction of highway at Seaside ordered by the County Commissioners; for oil, coal, freight, machinery and other supplies, about \$9,250.00; for salary of superintendents, \$983.33, and the balance has been paid for the labor of men and teams, at the price voted at the March meeting, \$1,112.82. Some part of the overdraw may be attributed to the work done in order to take advantage of an offer made by the parties reconstructing a portion of Main and Summer Streets, to give of their surplus of good material if the Superintendent would take it away. The Superintendent accepted the offer and made use of the surplus by spreading upon the Landing Road and in places where filling was much needed.

SPECIAL HIGHWAY.

In accordance with a vote of the town the sum of \$12,500.00 was obtained of the State and five notes of the town were issued. One of the notes has been taken up with interest thereon. In addition to this sum a bill of \$179.20 has been paid for extra work done in connection with the reconstruction of the road as per contract. How much more the town may be called upon to pay is a matter of conjecture. It is in the hands of the County Commissioners. They may assess the whole or any part of such land and other damages as they may grant in their decree, a document which has not reached our files. There are now four notes of \$2,500.00 each, which have been made payable one in each year, 1921, 1922, 1923, 1924.

WATER DEPARTMENT.

For the ordinary expenses of this department \$5,000.00 was appropriated and \$6,207.99 has been expended, an overdraw unusual in this department. By vote of the town at the last March meeting, "the Water Commissioners were authorized to replace by concrete construction or otherwise, the dam and flume at the pumping station and to make such replacement or renewal of the water wheel and shafting connected therewith as in their judgment may be necessary, provided the total cost does not exceed \$10,000.00."

A separate account of this special work has been kept and there has been charged to that account \$9,964.45. The work has been well done and it is expected that it will tend to reduce the expense attending the water supply for years to come. The Commissioners may be able to show that a less sum will be required for the coming years for the conduct of our water system. Several hundred dollars received by the Town Treasurer from sales of surplus material should be credited to this account, an account of which may be found in the report of the Water Commissioners.

Of the appropriation of \$500.00 for drainage upon Main Street, \$356.08 has been expended. Two wells were constructed, one on each side of the highway and connected by tile. Should the time ever come when the drain thus provided fails to do the work it may be necessary to obtain permission to lay a pipe connecting with these wells through private lands as was done at the corner of Green and Main Streets.

STREET LIGHTING.

The sum of \$1,000.00 was appropriated and \$1,003.25 has been expended. There are places where other lights might be supplied, much to the pleasure of the inhabitants living near, but to increase the number of lights will require a larger appropriation.

SUPPRESSION OF CRIME.

It has been necessary only for a few years to appropriate any sum for the suppression of crime in this town. Of late years things have changed. The habits of the people are changing. The sum of \$850.00 was appropriated, and \$863.38 has been expended. Notwithstanding this outlay, incendiary fires have been set and buildings wantonly destroyed. Could the perpetrators be discovered they might well receive the punishment the law provides. The office of a policeman is an unavoidable position in some parts of the town at times.

SUPPRESSION OF MOTHS.

The moths are like the poor, we always have them with us, and from present appearance we always shall. The sum of \$1,000.00 was appropriated for their suppression and \$1,605.88 has been expended. The State proposes to reimburse the town in the sum of \$200.00 towards what has been done for the public good and the town pays for what has been done for private interests.

TOWN HOUSE.

The house needed repairing outside and in and an appropriation of \$1,500.00 was made for the purpose. The house has been shingled and otherwise repaired at an expense of \$618.16, and the balance will be insufficient to complete the work inside as the plastering on the walls and ceiling has been shattered to that extent that a large part of it must be removed and painting must be delayed till that work is done. \$717.16 has been expended for the ordinary care and preservation of the Hall and \$431.50 has been received by the Treasurer for its use.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Of the appropriation of \$700.00, \$611.80 has been expended. We have been fortunate in that there have been no disastrous fires during the year. Neither has there been any extensive forest fires owing in part, at least, to the better preparation for their suppression. \$150.00 was appropriated and \$178.11 has been charged to this account, a part of which will be paid by the railroad company as it is admitted by the company that the fires were occasioned by sparks from engines.

CONTINGENT.

This account has been overdrawn. The appropriation was \$2,400.00 and there has been charged to the account \$3,008.17. The \$100.00 voted for the Farm Bureau has been charged to this account, \$186.48 an assessment made upon the town as its proportion of the maintenance of the Plymouth County Hospital and expenses attending auto accidents have been added to the ordinary bills under this heading.

STATE AND

There has been distributed among 11 soldiers and widows of soldiers the sum of \$812, which sum will be due from the State in December, 1921. The number of recipients in this department is fast diminishing. There are but five of the soldiers of '61 now receiving this aid.

SOLDIERS' RELIEF.

By authority given in Section 18, Chapter 19 of the Revised Laws the sum of \$543.00 has been paid to widows of soldiers. One widow having been added to the former number of recipients caused an overdraw above the appropriation of \$73.00.

Notwithstanding the excessive wages that have been paid and are being received there probably never was a time, at least for 299 years, that such demands were made upon the public purse for help as now. In some cases and we may say in many, the necessity for aid is the result of habits and style of living that reserves nothing for the rainy day and there seems to be no let up in the number of calls for such help. This condition may be excusable to some extent in a city but ought not to exist in a small town like this. There has been paid and charged to this account the sum of \$6,137.81. The appropriation was \$3,500.00. But a small part of this outlay will be refunded by other municipalities. There is now due about \$1,100 from other towns and one city.

THE LUCY PRINCE AMES TRUST FUND.

Mr. William L. Ames, the founder of the fund, placed in the hands of the Selectmen a check for \$7,500.00 upon condition that the principal should be invested by the Selectmen and the income thereof should be expended by the Board of Selectmen for the care and preservation of the Old Burying Ground and the monuments erected therein. *By the payment of \$10.10 eight \$1,000.00 Government bonds were purchased and there stands to the credit of the fund \$8,000.00 as a permanent investment, interest being payable in April and October of each year at the rate of 1 1-4 per cent. per annum. The gift of Mr. Ames in remembrance of his mother, Lucy Prince Ames, who lies at rest in this ground with other of his ancestors, reaching back for more than 200 years. Few can fully appreciate until their attention is called to the condition of the old monuments erected therein to the memory of their ancestors. Of the nearly one thousand graves marked by stones of various kinds, fifty or more are broken and neglect for a few more years would remove all legible records. By the terms of the gift, the expenditure of the income was placed in the hands of the Selectmen. There is much to be done that must be repeated from year to year. Now, permanent repairs are called for. A beginning has been made and it is presumed that any Board of Selectmen will gladly receive advice from anyone conversant with the history of this old ground and of those that lie therein.

ICHABOD WASHBURN BENEVOLENT FUND.

The annual report of the trustees of the fund was made to the Selectmen in the Month of March as has been done each March since 1871 in accordance with the requirements of the will of Mr. Washburn. It shows the principal sum to be intact and of the income for the year \$37.50 has been paid for a surety bond, \$23.00 paid to 25 widows and \$125.00 to 15 single women.

WILLIS FUND.

By the will of William H. Willis, another thoughtful bene-factor, a fund was established for the benefit of children in his native town. In his will he stipulates that after the payment of legacies therein named the balance of his estate is to be paid the Town of Kingston and shall be invested by the Board of Selectmen and the income thereof distributed for the benefit of poor children by the chairman of the Board.

The deposits in the Home Savings Bank of Boston and the East Boston Savings Bank have been allowed to accumulate until the deposit in each has reached the sum of \$2,000 and the interest in each case is annually collected and distributed for the benefit of needy children as is the income from bank and railroad stocks.

The deposit in the other two banks have been allowed to run with the intent that the Brockton deposit may reach an even \$1,000 and the Five Cents Savings Bank in Plymouth to the same amount. The Plymouth may be now drawn upon. The Brockton requires a longer time.

The sum of \$1,680 has been distributed from the income as per direction in the will and there is on hand this 31st day of December, 1920, \$151.84 which is liable to be drawn upon at any time, and upon which checks will be drawn at an early day.

Mr. Thomas Prince, another native of Kingston by his last will give to the Evergreen Cemetery Association for their use and also to the town for the benefit of the poor, a liberal sum. The will is being contested and the result is as yet uncertain. Mr. Prince was a wealthy man and the opportunity to get possession of some of the estate is not to be lost sight of by those who often profit by such litigation.

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REPORT OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

At the annual town meeting in March, 1920, we were authorized to construct a new dam, and to make other improvements, at the pumping station. The matter had previously been carefully considered, plans and estimates of costs had been furnished to us by three manufacturers of water wheels, and in due time we accepted the plan proposed by the Roslyn Hunt Machine Co., of Orange, Mass. A contract was executed with them as soon as all details could be arranged and we take pleasure in stating that they filed that contract most satisfactorily. A special act of the Legislature, authorizing the town to borrow the money required, was obtained, and the \$10,000.00 appropriated was raised by the sale, at par, of twenty notes of \$500.00 each, bearing interest at 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ per cent., and payable one each year for twenty years. The old wooden dam and flume were torn away Aug. 25th and the new concrete and iron structure was completed, the pond flooded, and the new water wheel structure was completed. At the work of excavating for foundations, started Nov. 21st. All the work of excavating for foundations, and of construction, was done by the day, and there is no room for doubt about the permanent character of the work. The river bed has been cleared of boulders and other obstructions to a free flow of water for a considerable distance below the dam to prevent back water and consequent loss of power. At the present time there appears to be good evidence that the full efficiency of the stream has been obtained and that the town has made an investment that will be both durable and profitable. An example of the value of our water power was shown during the three months time while the pond was down and when the cost of pumping by electric power was nearly \$300.00 per month. This heavy expense, added to that which was forced

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upon us by the operations of the State Highway people, accounts for much of the overdrawing of the regular appropriation, but we are glad to report that a balance of \$133.61 remains in the treasury from the special \$10,000.00 appropriation. People owning summer cottages near the mouth of Jones River have again petitioned for an extension of the system for the purpose of supplying them with water, and this matter will be brought up at the annual town meeting. It is a considerable distance from the present terminal in Howland's Lane and the cottages are somewhat widely scattered, but that region is being steadily opened up, it is claimed that town water would add greatly to the house building movement, which means additional taxable property, and it deserves a fair consideration.

Thus leaving a balance of \$16,990.70 actually expended from the town appropriation.

Average cost per pupil for year 1920, \$53.13.

Average cost per pupil for year 1919, \$43.02.

While a comparison with last year's report shows an increase in the total expenditure, it will be noted that the greatest increase is in the department of fuel and care. The greater part of the amount is to be found in the fuel bill, which was due to the scarcity of fuel and the abnormal increase in cost.

We would call your attention to the first item of receipts, namely \$1,600.00. This amount is due to the fact that we have been able to keep trained and experienced teachers in our schools; as the amount received from the state under this law is based on the amount paid to the teacher, on training and on experience. This item should be considered as applicable to an increase in teachers' salaries and in basing the present recommendations we have taken this into consideration. Although a small increase in salary has been granted the teachers during the year we are still below the average paid in towns in this group.

The following quotation from the report of the Special Commission on Teachers' Salaries appointed by the Governor will give some light on this situation.

"As a result of the general upward movement in teachers' salaries, and the assistance given by the state to rural towns, hardly more than 2,000 teachers in Massachusetts are now receiving less than \$850 per year, whereas two years ago, nearly 2,000 teachers were receiving less than \$550. The Commission is convinced, however, that much more progress must be made

in this direction. The diminishing enrollment in the State Normal Schools, the small proportion of college graduates who enter teaching, and the failure of the smaller towns to secure a sufficient number of qualified teachers and to retain qualified teachers for a reasonable tenure are conditions that call for further attention and more effective remedy. Although the circumstances under which some teachers work may have a bearing on these conditions, the fundamental case is economic. The tangible rewards of teaching have been too low.

The salaries paid have not afforded adequate recognition of investments in time and money which teachers make to secure the necessary preparation for teaching. After completing the secondary school, the typical elementary school teacher devotes two years to further study, and the typical high school teacher four years. The expenses incidental to this special preparation, plus the income that might have been derived from employment during this period, constitute a substantial sum. In addition to these initial expenses for preparation the ambitious teacher continues during her teaching career to make substantial outlays for professional reading and professional improvement courses. In appraising the adequacy of the teacher's wage as compared with the wages earned in other employments it is necessary to take into consideration these special investments which the teacher makes for professional preparation and improvement in service."

Acting upon the recommendation contained in last year's report a special committee was appointed, at the annual town meeting to consider the question of a new high school building and to obtain plans and specifications which were reported at a special town meeting as follows:

This meeting has been called upon request of the Committee on Increased High School Accommodations appointed at the annual town meeting last March that results of our investigations may be reported. This High School subject has been given a great deal of careful study by your committee, ever

bearing in mind the best interests of our good old town as a whole rather than those of any certain few, in order to provide adequate facilities for a long time to come for the proper education of our girls and boys.

It is hoped most of those present have taken the time to carefully inspect the present High School building, as without so doing you certainly have no idea how entirely inadequate it is. Most of those who have looked it over we believe will agree something should be done and done right away toward remedying this long deferred condition.

One of the first phases of this problem we had to face was whether the present building could be used to advantage in connection with the needed additional accommodations. After an exhaustive study it was decided it could well be incorporated in our plans.

Study of numerous plans and suggestions resulted in those prepared by Mr. Frank J. Cooper of Boston, a prominent architect and an authority on school building being selected and our activities since making this decision have been based on these plans. If the experience of certain other towns of about our size who have provided new or more modern facilities for High School work is any criterion for us to follow, you may rest assured if this meeting votes to provide likewise for Kingston's girls and boys, a very noticeable number of them will be given sufficient incentive to advance from the grades to and through the High School, who would, under the present conditions, leave school for the mill or other work upon reaching the age of 14.

We want especially to call your attention to the 7th and 8th grades being provided for in this new building. If not so taken care of, we will be confronted with a lack of school facilities for these two grades as their present accommodations are being taxed to the limit and believe most of you will agree this town's experience with small schools has been none too satisfactory and it certainly will be less expensive to provide

additional accommodations in the contemplated High School building than to erect a separate building for these grades.

In addition to the economical features, it is doubly advisable from an educational standpoint as these 7th and 8th grade pupils would have the advantage of the High School method of teaching thereby bringing them in contact with several teachers in the building, who, by the way, specialize in certain studies, instead of all studies being taught by one teacher.

Every phase of the construction of this building has been given careful study. We have also given due consideration to the town's financial condition to determine in our own minds if this additional expense could be provided for right away and if so, how? A vote recently taken, shows the committee unanimous, every member expressing himself to the effect that in his best judgment, the town should proceed immediately to provide additional accommodations in accordance with plans we wish to submit to you tonight.

It would be unreasonable to expect to provide the necessary funds to pay for this building from any one or even five years tax levy, and even if possible we do not consider it should be saddled on to the present tax payers in that manner. Why should not the future generation do their bit toward paying for this improvement? Therefore, we are going to suggest it be provided for by a bond issue.

Our investigation develops that there will be no difficulty in negotiating the necessary notes or bonds at from $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. to 6 per cent., which, according to law, may be spread over a period of 20 years.

In order that you may all observe to advantage, we have had prepared three lantern slide reproductions of architect Cooper's drawings which will now be thrown on the screen and as fully explained, as in our power. We welcome your questions and will do our best to answer them.

All the elementary buildings have been examined and the necessary repairs made but owing to the high cost of labor and materials these expenses have been kept at the minimum.

During August, 1920, Mr. Howard W. Dunn, Jr., who had been in ill health for some time, resigned and in September Mrs. Julia Morton, who had been assisting Mr. Dunn during the past year, was elected Superintendent of Schools. In December came the news of Mr. Dunn's death at Ellsworth, Me. Mr. Dunn was interested and enthusiastic in his work, an able man of unusual ability and in his early death the profession suffers a great loss.

For a detailed report of the work of the schools attention is directed to the reports of the Superintendent of Schools, High School Principal, School Physician, Drawing and Music Supervisors, which by vote of the School Committee are incorporated into and become a part of this report.

As estimated at the present time the sum of \$32,000 will be needed for school purposes and we would ask for an appropriation of \$23,000 from the town to be supplemented by the receipts from other sources.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Committee of Kingston:

I herewith present this, my first report, as Superintendent of Schools for the Town of Kingston.

Although elected to this position in September, 1920, my connection with this school system has been such that I will try to cover the work of the schools for the year ending December 31, 1920.

Teachers.

This town has been especially fortunate in retaining its teaching force almost intact and to the continued faithful and efficient work of these teachers, is due in large measure the success of the schools.

When schools opened January 5, 1920, Miss Josephine L. Zarkofski, teacher at Maple Avenue, grades 7 and 8, was granted leave of absence because of ill health. Miss Zarkofski was never able to return to her position, and on May 4, 1920, passed on to the higher life. Too much cannot be said of Miss Zarkofski's abilities. She was indeed a real teacher and leader and her influence on the lives of those who came in contact with her will long be felt. Her's was a distinct loss to her school and to all who knew her.

We were more than fortunate in having Mrs. Maude M. Brackett, an experienced teacher of the town, to substitute in this school. In September, Miss Ruth H. Porter of North Easton, a graduate of Bridgewater Normal School, entered upon the duties of this school. Miss Porter was without experience, but gave promise of making a successful teacher; but

resigned after two months' service and Mrs. Brackett is again in charge of this school.

At the close of the school year Mrs. Linnie E. Davis concluded her services as Supervisor of Music and Mrs. May Blair McClosky of this town was elected to fill the vacancy. Mrs. McClosky is an accomplished musician and teacher of vocal music although without experience in public school teaching. She entered upon her work with enthusiasm and is getting good results.

Just at the close of the year Miss Carolyn V. Walker resigned to accept a more lucrative position in Brockton, and Mrs. Helen B. Cushing of South Duxbury is filling this position at present. Mrs. Cushing received her training at the Bridgewater Normal School and has had considerable experience in substitute work.

Crowded Conditions.

At the Rocky Nook building, Grades 3 to 8 have been taught but at the close of the school year in June it was apparent that an overrowded condition would exist in September and teachers be unable to do their best work. To relieve this condition Grade 8, which was small in numbers was transferred to Maple Avenue, leaving Grades 3 to 7 in this building and a fairly good teaching proposition. This, however, makes a very full school at Maple Avenue.

Pupils at the Stony Brook School when promoted to the 4th grade have attended the Upper Primary School but that school being overrowded it was decided to retain the 4th grade at Stony Brook.

At the Silver Lake School the 5th grade is being taught this year, as the location is such the parents of the children making up this grade requested this arrangement. This, however, makes a very full program and would hardly have been feasible, if we had not had an experienced teacher in this school.

Probably the greatest need at the present time is a new High

School building to take care of a Junior and Senior High School. Not only is the present High School building wholly inadequate for school purposes of any kind but a Junior High School takes care of the pupils from the 5th grade up. There are 12 years of school life for the child and the best organization at the present time is the 6-6 plan so called, that is the first six years as elementary school—the next 3 years as Junior High School and the remaining 3 years as Senior High School.

With a new High School building as provided for in the plans already submitted to the town, the other buildings would amply provide for the elementary grades.

Health and Physical Training.

In every department of education attention is being given to the health and the physical condition of the child, believing that only as the child has a sound body will he do his best work. A careful study of retardation shows that in many cases the child's retardation is due to malnutrition. To obviate this condition our hygiene teaching has especially dealt with health habits, with especial attention to cleanliness—care of teeth—pure air—dress; and nutrition and food values with careful attention to the school lunch.

The hot school lunch is available for all elementary children who remain at school during the day. This lunch which consists mostly of hot cocoa to accompany the sandwiches brought by the children has become very popular and we believe we see beneficial results from the supervised noon hour. Hot soups and chowders are also provided occasionally at some of the buildings.

The children are taught to prepare, serve and clear up after the lunch.

Many of the parents have shown an interest in this feature of school activity and we appreciate their hearty cooperation and material assistance.

More modern textbooks are needed in the upper grades. While we have no gymnasium, simple physical exercises in the school room with special attention to posture are given. Playground activities are supervised.

At the High School the girls have become interested in field hockey. We are looking forward to the new High School building when with the added facilities it will be possible to give a systematic course in Home Economics and Physical Training—as those teachers could also give assistance in the lower elementary schools.

Retardation.

At the close of the school year comparatively few cases of retardation were reported and we believe the number will be less this year. No retarded child is ever happy. Commissioner of Education, P. P. Claxton, in his last report says, "Retardation never yet brightened a child's intellect. It has a tendency, on the contrary, to benumb his faculties and to inhibit those natural abilities with which he has been endowed."

Civics.

A recent enactment of the Legislature makes the teaching of Civics compulsory in all grades of school work, elementary and high. This law went into effect September 1, 1920, and is as follows:

Chapter 411, Acts of 1920.

"There shall be taught in all public elementary and high schools in the commonwealth courses in American history and civics for the purpose of promoting civic service and a greater knowledge of American history and of fitting the pupils, morally and intellectually, for the duties of citizenship. All pupils attending the said schools shall be required to take one or more of the courses herein specified at some time during their attendance at said schools."

To the Superintendent and School Committee of the Town of Kingston:

After having taught drawing in the Kingston Public Schools a little over a year, the results for that comparatively brief period seem very gratifying indeed. The last word has not been said, nor has the best work possible been accomplished, as yet, but we are on the way and barring accidents the end of the Spring term will prove the results attained.

At present the workers have secured enough foundation work to warrant trying many new branches of work, such as geometric design, conventional design, and the more difficult naturalistic design, all suitable for practical purposes. Then charcoal work on a large scale of various subjects, figure drawing, simple perspective and advanced lettering are some of the other branches that we will try to handle in the order that they are needed.

Our exhibit of drawings given in connection with the High School graduation at the Town Hall in June was a demonstration from second grade to 10th year High of the big things that are possible in Kingston schools, for the advancement has been very rapid here, and I cannot say enough in praise of the excellent help all of the teachers have afforded me.

As for the Kingston High School, everything here seems to contribute to work of an excellent character, and for the cooperation of everyone concerned, I feel much indebted.

HIGH SCHOOL REPORT

The following High School Report is respectfully submitted:
The needed improvements in our courses as outlined in previous reports are still in the future and must await the provision of adequate quarters.

I should like to say for the benefit of those not informed that our High School is on the approved list of The New England College Entrance Examination Board. This gives us the privilege of sending students without examination to the colleges represented on the board. We sent four students, all of them with a very good rating, one of them with an exceptionally high standing, to such colleges last fall.

As a result of having two periods of drawing per week this year some excellent results are being obtained. I would recommend, however, that as soon as possible a third period be added, this period to be given to those pupils who show exceptional ability in this work.

I am glad to report that one of our pupils, Carlton P. West, won the fifty dollar prize offered by the Plymouth Woman's Club for the best essay on "The History of the Pilgrims." This prize was competed for by the Freshman and Sophomore classes of the high schools in this section.

A school is an educational institution. We must not lose sight of that fact. Yet we must recognize that the physical development of boys and girls is a part of their education, and that proper athletics under proper supervision have a place in our school activities. I should like to outline briefly what we are doing and planning along this line. Last spring a

student at Boston University was engaged to work with the boys in baseball. As a result of the interest aroused, practically all the boys in school took part in the baseball practice. An excellent team, which had a successful season, was developed. A tennis court was provided for the use of the pupils. Equipment for field hockey has been procured and as soon as the weather permits the girls will be playing hockey. It is planned to have soccer football for the boys next fall. A ball has been purchased and has already provided much healthful outdoor exercise.

Every dollar of the money involved in the program outlined above has been earned by the pupils of the school. There should be systematic physical instruction for all the pupils from the seventh grade up to and through the High School. Such instruction can be given only when proper facilities are provided.

The High School report would be incomplete without noting the passing from our midst early last fall of one of our number, George M. Holmes, a member of the Sophomore class. At school he was always a gentleman, an excellent student, a happy, wholesome boy whose influence was for good in every school activity.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC.

On assuming the supervision of music in the Kingston schools last September it was apparent from the outset that too little enthusiasm for this particular work was being shown. Consequently it is not surprising that we are far behind other schools in musical advancement. In the High School there are to be found very few pupils who really read music and with a few exceptions the singing is done by ear. This I think speaks for itself. However, in the High School I am glad to report that we have made fine progress. There is splendid response. A number of songs of high grade have been learned, and an appreciation of them gained.

In the grades my efforts have been met with a most gratifying spirit of cooperation and interest on the part of both teachers and pupils so that the work has been most enjoyable. In order, however, that the foundation for the more difficult work in the upper grades and in the High School may be laid it is evident that systematic training is vitally necessary in the first six grades. The Progressive Music Series course as taught in Boston, Brockton and lately adopted in Plymouth is especially adapted to inculcate in the minds of the younger children a love for the study of music which is absolutely necessary for advancement, and is so planned that pupils from grade to grade advance gradually to the development necessary to cope with the more difficult work of the High School. This progressive system (so called) could be adopted with practically no unusual expense as the new books could be secured in lieu of replacements for books destroyed. With but a few new books a beginning could be made at once in a small way, adding more

books as fast as possible until the first six grades are entirely supplied and I earnestly recommend this.

I feel that the Progressive system makes possible through songs which appeal to children a development which on leaving school enables the pupil to carry away a permanent contribution to his or her whole future because singing of good music and the art of self expression which it teaches bridges the difficult period of self consciousness and indifference. I am greatly interested in this work and feel sure that much can be accomplished if its importance is realized and proper equipment provided.
