ANNUAL MARCH MEETING
and
SPECIAL TOWN MEETINGS

In pursuance of a Warrant served the inhabitants of the Town of Kingston qualified to vote in Town affairs met at their Town House on Saturday, March 4th, 1922, at 6.15 a. m. The meeting was called to order by Henry S. Everson, Town Clerk. Charles H. Fischer was chosen Moderator. The following officers were chosen by ballot:

Voted, That the Treasurer be authorized to hire money
 with the approval of a majority of the Selectmen in antici-
 pation of taxes the same to be paid from the taxes of the
 current year.

Voted, To accept the report of the Town Officers.

Voted, To accept the report of the committee chosen on
 the matter of building by-laws and to regulate the building
 of factories be left in the hands of the Board of Health.

Voted, That the Selectmen be a committee to draw up
 by-laws in regard to buildings, suppression of crime, and pol-
 lution of streams and report at the next Town Meeting.

Voted, That the sum of \$29,000 be appropriated for school
 purposes.

Voted, That the recommendations made by the Selectmen
 be adopted.

Voted, That the wages for labor shall not exceed forty
 cents per hour, and two dollars and twenty-five cents per
 day for a horse, to include Highway and Moth Departments.

Voted, That the matter of laying water pipe in Standish
 Avenue, May and Cole Streets in Brewster Park be laid on
 the table.

Voted, That the purchase of a pulmotor be postponed.

Voted, Not to extend larger water pipes through May
 Avenue.

Voted, That the Water Commissioners be and hereby are
 authorized to purchase a new pump for use at the pumping
 station at a total cost not to exceed \$3,000.00, and that the
 \$2,235.20 remaining from the special appropriation of 1921

with the interest be and hereby is appropriated towards the cost of said pump, the additional funds required for the complete installation are to be taken from the regular appropriation for the Water Department.

Voted, That a committee of five be appointed to organize the business men of Kingston and such others as may be interested in the commercial growth of the town, such organization to have for its object the development of business in the Town of Kingston. That it is the sentiment of this meeting that the Town officials extend to this organization such co-operation as may be within their power and that said organization be requested to bring before the citizens from time to time for action, such recommendations as may seem advisable.

The committee appointed: Isaac Hathaway, Louis Reinhardt, Harold L. Cook, John B. Farrington, Charles H. Drew.

Voted, That the sum of \$1,000.00 be appropriated and expended this year towards making a map of the Town showing the different plots and their ownership and the following committee be appointed: Ralph L. Drew, Fred L. Bailey, Winthrop D. Ford.

Voted, That the Town purchase a motor truck for the use of the Highway Department and the sum of \$900.00 be appropriated for same.

Voted, That the sum of \$600.00 be appropriated for the purchase of hose for the Fire Department.

Voted, That the Annual Town Meeting be held for the year 1923 at the time and hours as voted in 1921, and each year thereafter.

Voted, To renew the vote of last year with reference to alteration upon the Town Green.

Voted, That the Town contribute the sum of \$100.00 in aid of Farm Bureau.

Voted, That the Moderator be paid \$10.00 for his services.

Voted, That the recommendation of the Selectmen be printed in the Town Report.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING.

Kingston, May 10, 1922.

At a special town meeting held May 10, 1922, upon the question: To see if the Town will appropriate an additional sum for the maintenance of schools. Meeting called to order at 8 o'clock P. M., by Henry S. Everson, Clerk. Charles H. Fischer chosen Moderator.

Voted, That the sum of \$3,500.00 be appropriated for school purposes, this sum to be in addition to the amount appropriated at the Annual Town Meeting of the current year.

At a special town meeting held May 24, 1922, meeting called to order at 8 o'clock P. M., by Henry S. Everson, Clerk. Charles H. Fischer chosen Moderator.

Voted, That the Water Commissioners be and are hereby authorized to extend the water supply pipes through the streets of Brewster Park, so-called, provided they find good evidence that the extension can be made at a cost not exceeding \$1,200.00, and provided that a satisfactory guarantee of income from water rates is obtained previous to making any part of the proposed extension.

Voted, That there be appropriated the sum of \$1,200.00 for the purpose of the extension of water mains and improving the distributing facilities through Brewster Park, so-called, and that the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow said sum of \$1,200.00 or any part of it and to issue bonds or notes of the Town of Kingston therefor. Said bonds or notes to be denominated Kingston Water Loan, Act of 1920, and to be payable in accordance with the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 44 of the General Laws, so that the whole loan shall be paid in not more than ten years from the date of issue

of the first bond or note or on such earlier dates as the Treasurer and Selectmen may determine.

At a special town meeting held July 24, 1922, upon the question: To see if the Town will acquire by purchase or take by eminent domain land for playground purposes.

To see if the Town will accept any gift or grant of money for the purpose of acquiring a playground and authorize the Selectmen to apply the same towards the appropriation made for said purpose under Article 2, or to take any action thereto. Meeting called to order at 8 o'clock P. M., by Henry S. Everson, Clerk. Charles H. Fischer chosen Moderator.

Voted, That the Selectmen be and hereby are authorized and directed to acquire by purchase or to take by eminent domain, a certain tract of land consisting of approximately nine acres described in the Warrant for playground purposes.

Voted, That the Town appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the purpose of acquiring land for playground purposes and to meet said appropriation that the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow a sum not to exceed \$1,500.00 and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor, said bonds or notes to be payable in accordance with Section 19, Chapter 44, General Laws, so that the whole loan shall be payable in not more than ten years from date of issue of the first bond or note, or at such earlier date as the Treasurer and Selectmen may determine.

Voted, That all donations received in excess of the amount necessary for the purchase of the playground lot be applied to the improvement and maintenance of said lot.

Voted, That the Selectmen appoint a playground commission of seven.

WATER DEPARTMENT.

There was appropriated for this department, to be paid this year for running expenses,	\$5,000 00

It is pretty evident that necessary repairs upon the reservoir will require a larger appropriation the coming year.

See report of Water Commissioners for further particulars. It will be necessary to provide for the payment of a debt occasioned by the putting in of water at Brewster Park last summer. It is hoped and expected that the increase in income for the use of water will keep pace with the extra sums paid for its extension from year to year.

STATE AID.

There are five soldiers of the Civil War who are receiving State Aid and seven widows of said soldiers and the sum of \$798.00 has been paid to them. This expenditure is paid back by the State the year following the year of payment by the Town.

SOLDIERS' RELIEF.

The sum of \$650 was provided for this purpose and \$854.30 has been paid. The overlay was caused by the relief paid to a disabled soldier of the World War and aid to the widow of a soldier of the Civil War prior to the time of the reception of a pension. One half of said sum will be paid into the Town treasury by the State Treasurer at a later day. It is well to remember, however, that what is represented as paid by the State is no gift, for the State can pay nothing until it has first received from the people, as is evidenced by a State tax in this town of \$8,220.42.

POOR.

The sum paid and charged to this department exceeds the appropriation by \$473.40. The Town has been reimbursed in the sum of \$1,125.98 on account of aid granted to parties

having settlement elsewhere, and there has been given to the Town by Miss Vinal and sister, the sum of \$1,000.00 for previous expenditures in this department.

It often requires careful investigation in order to decide a question of settlement since many conditions are to be considered. Birth gives, but domicile may take away. It is easy to lose a settlement but not easy always to prove that one has been gained and the result follows that one has become a State pauper.

SUPPRESSION OF MOTHS.

There was appropriated for this department \$800.00. There has been expended for Town work \$723.29, for work for private parties \$186.38, for raw material sold 53.43, for destroying moth nests, Fall work, \$300.00, which last amount will be returned by the State. Total amount expended, \$1,563.10. If the Moth Commission were more generally supported by individual effort, the work of the commission would be much more effective. But in this department as in all others there is a disposition to leave everything for the public to do and pay for, under the direction, of course, of somebody who sits in the State House.

SUPPRESSION OF CRIME.

There has been an expenditure of \$975.95 in this department. A sum, that until of recent date, was uncalled for, and which is becoming more and more necessary. A statement not creditable to the inhabitants of the Town or its vicinity. The perils attending a person, old or young, when entering upon our highways, occasioned by modern methods of travel, makes it imperative that certain sections of our highways shall be guarded at certain times and seasons. A

condition that adds largely to the outlay in this department. The sum above named was paid to our police officers and they have well earned the money.

STREET LIGHTING.

It was estimated that the system of lights could be maintained for \$1,300.00, which sum was provided. That sum has been overdrawn by \$111.21, notwithstanding the price per lamp has been reduced to \$19.00. There is still a desire for more lights, which desire cannot be granted, except a larger sum is provided.

FOREST FIRES.

There have been an unusual number of forest fires during the year and the members of the Fire Department have been frequently called upon and they have promptly responded. \$548.33 has been charged to this department, although only \$100.00 was provided. During the dry weather scarcely a day passed that one or more fires were not suppressed. Some of these fires were purely accidental, but probably a large percentage were occasioned by carelessness. If the origin of

these often destructive fires could be discovered and the parties implicated were obliged to pay the damages it might have a salutary effect.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

This department was provided with \$700.00 for ordinary expenses and the sum of \$600.00 with which to purchase a line of hose. The sum of \$524.84 was expended for hose and \$931.97 for ordinary expenses. The overdraw may have been justifiable.

THE GREEN.

The Town appropriated \$500.00 with which to make changes in the location of the walk from the center to the side. The sum of \$462.81 has been expended for labor and material. A new and good walk has been provided but the ground is not properly laid down to grass nor is it enclosed by fence. A large number of loads of earth has been spread upon the surface, the surface raised and with a little top dressing of fertilizer is capable of supporting a fine lawn for a number of years. The iron fence that had stood for more than 70 years is rusting and the rods that held it are gone, and that pattern of fence cannot be replaced. It is a question what kind of a fence shall be substituted. The completion of the work will require a further appropriation.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

Kingston has been extremely fortunate this past year in regard to contagious diseases, due very largely to two things. First to the assistance of our local physicians in immediately

reporting such cases thus enabling us to post the home and isolate the patient at once. Second, to the constant efforts of the new school nurse, Miss Munge, who has located numerous cases both in school and in the home, mild cases, not serious enough to call a doctor and which but for her watchfulness would not have been reported to this board. The prompt isolation of some of these cases has doubtless prevented spreading the trouble through the schools.

A new public dump was established last Spring, off Summer Street at top of Stony Brook Hill on property made available for the purpose due to the kindness of Henry L. Barker. The location is ample and well suited for the purpose and if those having occasion to use it will be careful to dump over the edge of the bank into the ravine the accumulation can be easily disposed of from time to time at very little expense to the Town and the roadway kept clear at all times for both teams and trucks. The dump formerly used off Evergreen Street, has been entirely discontinued and we ask all to refrain from using it.

REPORT OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

We have had evidence for a long time that there was a serious leakage somewhere about the water system and a split has been discovered in the wall of the reservoir that extends from top to bottom of it and through which the water is continuously escaping. The reservoir is built of brick that are laid in cement and the action of ice, winter after winter, may have done the damage. This leakage must be stopped and we are convinced that the only way to permanently repair the damage is to line the interior of the wall with reinforced concrete of sufficient thickness and strength to withstand all pressure. Of course the reservoir must remain empty several weeks while a job of that nature is done, and of course it would reduce the capacity considerably. For good and sufficient reasons there ought to be additional storage for water instead of less and we recommend that at the annual meeting the Town shall authorize the construction of a new reservoir, somewhat smaller than the old one. If this is done we would build it as early as possible in the coming Spring and when it is ready we would put it into service, then shut off the old one and repair it. The constantly increasing consumption of water, with the addition of the loss by leakage, brought us so close to the limit of the supply from the wells that for common safety we decided to drive more wells last Fall. A few good ones have been obtained and enough testing has been done to prove that about all the water that will flow out of that piece of ground where the wells are located, which is owned by the Town, is now flowing. This means that something different must be done at some future time to provide for additional requirements unless a meter system is adopted to check the waste of water.

The new pump is doing excellent work and it is fully satisfactory in every way. The total cost, including foundation, new pipe connections, pulley, belt, etc., was \$2,970.00 of which amount \$2,235.00 was paid from the unexpended balance of the loan of 1921. The pumping station is now well equipped and we hope that no heavy expense will become necessary there for a long time to come.

The receipts from water takers were \$1,089.80 more than in 1921, being \$9,479.62, and from miscellaneous sources \$146.20. For maintenance, repairs, replacements and additions there has been expended \$5,509.87. The extension of water mains in Brewster Park cost about \$550.00 and we have a written guarantee from Mr. Cole, who is developing that property, of not less than \$220.00 annually from water rates.

The water debt has been reduced \$650.00 and on Jan. 1st it amounted to \$18,850.00.

Rigid economy has been practised in all purchases and in other matters, many things, such as certain repairs, purchase of new equipment, etc., having been deferred.

An additional sum of \$3,500.00 was appropriated at a special town meeting for the purpose of meeting actual running expenses only to December 31, 1922, and so the Committee has proceeded accordingly. This course has prevented the purchase of a coal supply at reasonable prices for the entire winter, as has been the custom. As this report is being written, the price of coal is much higher than during last summer and fall and it is difficult to obtain even in small quantities.

Many necessary repairs could not be made without greatly exceeding the appropriation and so they were not attended to. They should, however, be made during 1923.

The Committee recommends that the sum of \$34,000.00 be appropriated for school purposes for the year 1923.

At least \$9,000, possibly a larger sum will be refunded by the State during 1923 on account of Teachers' salaries paid.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Committee of Kingston:

I herewith present this, my third annual report, as Superintendent of Schools for the Town of Kingston.

The year has been one of constant and persistent effort for advancement along the lines already mapped out.

Especial attention has been given to the Physical welfare of the child, and the reports of the School Physician and School Nurse will give something in detail of what has been attempted. Also the work of Physical Training has been put on a better organized program.

The appointment of a Physical Director who would act as Instructor in the High School, and supervise the work in the Grade Schools, would be of great benefit to our school system.

Our schools met with no serious set back during the past year.

The attendance was very good, and the number of retarded pupils comparatively small.

This situation is due, in no small measure, to the hearty cooperation of school and home, and the increasing efforts of the teacher to make the school a happy place for the child. It makes no difference whether I enter a first grade room or a class room in the High School, I find a happy contented group of interested workers.

The largest number of retarded pupils was found in Maple Avenue building and this was due in a large measure to a combination of circumstances, the most serious being too many pupils per teacher, making it impossible for the teachers to give the individual attention needed in many instances. As a result some very teachable pupils suffered.

To remedy this situation, at the opening of schools in September one grade, the 8th, which was small in numbers, was transferred to the Rocky Nook Grammar building, thus consolidating the 8th grade under one teacher. The only added expense to this arrangement is a small additional transportation charge.

Another change in our school arrangements, made necessary by the larger number of pupils in the intermediate grades is the teaching of Grades 1 to 3 in the Howland's Lane building, where previously Grades 1 and 2 have been taught.

School Attendance

While the school spirit, as a whole, in the Town of Kingston is excellent, there are those who each year cause trouble and expense by attempting to evade their opportunities. These children as a rule are found between the ages of 14 and 16 years, and give as a reason, when approached, that they "do not want to attend school".

In order that it may be clearly understood that it is a state law, and not a local regulation, I will quote the Law, and ask parents to realize that this law as well as other laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, must be respected.

Chapter 76. Section 1 (as amended)—reads:

Every child between seven and fourteen, every child under sixteen who does not meet the requirement for the completion of sixth grade of the public schools of the town where he resides, and every child under sixteen except a child holding an employment certificate as provided in chapter one hundred and forty-nine and employed in some regular employment or business for at least six hours per day, and except a child having the written permission of the superintendent of schools of the town where he resides to engage in profitable employment at home, shall attend a public day school in said town or some other day school approved by the school committee, during the entire time the public schools

are in session, unless the child attends school in another town, during the entire time the same is in session, but such attendance shall not be required of a child whose physical or mental condition is such as to render attendance inexpedient or impracticable, or who is being otherwise instructed in a manner approved in advance by the superintendent or school committee. The superintendent, or teachers in so far authorized by him or by the school committee, may excuse cases of necessary absence for other causes, not exceeding seven day sessions or fourteen half-day sessions in any period of six months.

The school committee of each town shall provide for and enforce the school attendance of all children actually residing therein in accordance herewith.

Section 2—"Every person in control of a child described in the preceding section shall cause him to attend school as therein required, and, if he fails so to do for seven day sessions or fourteen half day sessions within any period of six months, he shall, on complaint of an attendance officer, be punished by a fine of not more than twenty dollars.

"No physical or mental condition capable of correction, or rendering the child a fit subject for special instruction at public charge in institutions other than public day schools, shall avail as a defence unless it appears that the defendant has employed all reasonable measures for correction of the condition and the suitable instruction of the child."

Teachers.

But few changes have occurred in our teaching staff, and this is an asset for efficiency. The salary schedule planned the previous year could not be carried out, owing to lack of appropriation, and to this fact we owe the major part of our resignations. One teacher resigned to be married. As will be noted in the school directory, changes have taken place in the commercial department of the High School, at

the Silver Lake School, Lower Center Primary, Maple Avenue and Howland's Lane buildings. We feel that we have been fortunate in our new teachers engaged, as all are doing excellent work.

High School.

At the close of the school year in June, 35 boys and girls were graduated from the eighth grade. Of this number 31 entered the local High School, one is in Quincy, and one in the Agricultural Department of the Plymouth High School. Only two pupils out of the class did not continue in school.

This large entering class made the enrolment in the High School the largest in its history.

Mr. Clarence D. Kingsley, of the state department, supervisor of Secondary education, under date of August 26, 1922, wrote as follows:

"I have before me the High School Organization blank of the Kingston High School in which it appears that you expect 92 pupils.

This expectation together with the number of subjects which should be offered would certainly make another teacher in the school necessary. If the freshman class numbers 37 pupils, two divisions should be made in English and Community Civics. Algebra should be made elective, which will reduce the number of pupils to one reasonable class.

I recommend that a course in Introductory Business be added to the freshman electives. There does not seem to be any offered in Commercial Geography and Commercial Law. I am enclosing a commercial curriculum for small high schools which I think you will find very helpful. According to this curriculum, Introductory Business is offered in the first year, and bookkeeping A in the second year, while Commercial Geography and Commercial Law will be offered one year and Advanced Arithmetic and Advanced Bookkeeping

the other year to juniors and seniors. In view of the fact that the freshmen do not have Introductory Business, this course could be given to both juniors and seniors."

Lack of funds made it impossible to carry out Mr Kingsley's advice, but provision should be made for another teacher, as there is every indication of an increased enrolment another September.

Our laboratory equipment is incomplete, additional furnishings are needed, also additional equipment in the Commercial department.

Of the class graduated last June all but two entered higher institutions and we feel that our High School is doing a good work in the community and deserves the hearty support of the citizens of the town.

By this brief report, including the statistical tables appended, and the reports of the High School Principal, Music and Drawing Supervisors, School Physician and Nurse, we have tried to show you something of the conditions in the schools and we respectfully urge upon you the need of an adequate appropriation, if we are to maintain the present efficiency and make progress.

We would also call to your attention the fact that there was received in 1922 into the town treasury from the Commonwealth and from various other sources, the sum of \$9,033.85 on account of schools, thus reducing the amount actually levied by local taxation.

There is no more important department than that of schools.

What we spend on our young people comes back to us more than twofold.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation of the cordial support given me in my work, of the hearty cooperation of the teachers, school officials, and all with whom I have come in contact. I believe that the people of Kingston as in-

dividuals and through the various organizations, are deeply interested in the welfare of the schools and the moral support and financial aid which have been evidenced, is an indication of the true spirit of our citizens.

After the examinations are completed the follow up work which is being done, helps the work to be more extensively carried on.

Portable Scales, purchased by the Parent-Teachers' Association, have made it possible for all pupils to be weighed and measured twice during the year.

Milk is being served in all Elementary Schools at recess, and hot cocoa is served at noon, to all who bring their lunch.

Health Crusade Work was started in the elementary schools in September, the material being purchased by the Parent-Teachers' Association, with money received from sale of Christmas Seals. This work is very helpful not only in the schools, but in the homes of the children.

Splendid results are being obtained from the Dental Clinic, supported by the Parent-Teachers' Association.
