Voted, that the Treasurer be authorized to hire money with the approval of a majority of the Selectmen in anticipation of Taxes, the same to be paid from the receipts of Taxes for the current year.

Voted, to accept the report of the Town Officers.

Voted, to appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for the Farm Bureau and chose Horace Holmes as representative of said Bureau.

The following resolutions were passed:

Whereas: Thomas Prince, a native of this town of Kingston, deceased, in and by his last will and testament did give unto the inhabitants of said Town under certain conditions as in said will is set forth and expressed the sum of Five Thousand dollars to be added to the Lucy Prince Ames Memorial Fund, the income thereof to be used in keeping in repair the old Burying Ground so-called and especially the burial lot of his father, Noah Prince and family, located in said burying ground.

Also did give to the said inhabitants the sum of Twenty-five Thousand dollars, the income thereof to be used for the Poor and sick of said Town and to be expended by such officers or board of officers as the Town may appoint.

Voted by the inhabitants of the Town of Kingston this eighth day of March in the year 1924 in the annual town meeting assembled pursuant to an article in the warrant for said meeting relating thereto that we do hereby accept and receive with thankful hearts the benevolent and generous gifts as set forth in the said will and that we hereby bind and pledge ourselves and our successors for the faithful performance of every condition as set forth in said will.

Voted, That the Selectmen by their chairman be authorized to receive and receipt for the said bequests in behalf of the town.

Voted, That whatever is received on account of the bequest of Thomas Prince for the benefit of the Old Burying Ground shall be added to the Lucy Ames Benevolent Fund invested and managed by the Selectmen as is the said Ames Fund, the Fund to be known as the Lucy Ames and Thomas Prince Memorial Fund.

Voted, That the bequest of Thomas Prince for the benefit of the Poor and Sick be known as the Thomas Prince Benevolent Fund invested and the Board of Overseers of the Poor as they are elected from year to year

shall constitute a Board of Trustees to invest and manage said fund.

Voted, That upon the question, shall the town petition for the installation of an accounting system by the Commonwealth, was referred to a committee of three persons, Committee, Isaac L. Hathaway, Howard L. Avery and Elspeth Hardy.

Voted, That E. S. Wright, Edward E. Bird and Harold L. Cook be a committee appointed to act with chief Drew in a complete investigation of the requirements of the Fire Department and report at a special town meeting their recommendations.

Voted, that the Town accept as a town way West avenue as laid out by the Selectmen, February 5th, 1924.

Voted, that the sum of \$1200 be appropriated.

Voted, That there be appropriated the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) for the purpose of erecting an addition to the Rocky Nook one-room Grade Four school building to connect said building with the toilets and that the School Committee be and hereby is authorized and empowered to enter into and execute all contracts and to do all things necessary to complete said work within the sum herein appropriated.

Voted, that the office of Moderator be added to the annual ballot each year.

Voted, that there be appropriated the sum of forty thousand, four hundred and ninety-three dollars (40,493.00) for school purposes for the year 1924.

Voted, that the town appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the purchase of the Highway Beacon now on trial at the junction of Summer and Evergreen streets near Railroad Crossing.

Voted, that there be appropriated the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) for new settees in Town Hall.

Voted, that the Selectmen grant pole locations on Main street from junction of Summer and Main streets to

junction of Main and Green streets, to the Plymouth Electric Light or to the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Voted, that the Water Commissioners be and hereby are instructed to increase the rate for first faucets to eight dollars (\$8.00) per year to all water takers except those at the so-called Point of the Nook, the additional revenue thus obtained during the present year shall be added to the regular appropriation for the Water Department.

Voted, that the Assessors be instructed to print in the Town Report <sup>next year and every third year thereafter</sup> a list of valuations of property like the Town Report of 1912.

Voted, that the Town accept aid from the State and County for the building of a section of Pembroke street.

Voted, that the Water Commissioners be instructed to discontinue printing a list of water takers in the Town Report.

Meeting adjourned at 4.30 p. m.

Voted, that the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500) be appropriated for the Fire Department.

Voted, that the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) be appropriated for a Fire Alarm signal.

Voted that the committee appointed be and is hereby authorized to carry into effect the vote of this meeting.

Voted, that the sum of seven hundred and three dollars (\$703) received from insurance companies as a result of fire damage to the High School be appropriated to defray expenses of repairs, etc., to the said building and that the expenditure of said amount be made by the School Committee.

Voted, that the sum of nine hundred dollars (\$900) be appropriated for the purpose of installing a new heating plant at the Maple avenue school.

Voted, that the School Committee be and hereby is authorized to make contract for installation of a new heating plant at Maple avenue school at an amount not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500).

### SUPPRESSION OF CRIME.

At the annual meeting there was appropriated for this department \$1,200.00 and a larger sum has been expended. The auto traffic has been heavy and has caused a larger amount of traffic duty which accounts for the overdraw. The amount expended was \$1,309.37, and it is not probable that a less sum will be required for this department in the coming year.

### STREET LIGHTING.

There was appropriated for this department at the annual meeting \$1,500.00 and \$1,524.37 has been expended. There have been requests made for additional lights and in order to meet these demands a larger sum will be required.

### SUPPRESSION OF MOTHS.

There was appropriated for this department \$1,000.00. There has been expended \$1,404.68 and of this sum \$300.00 has been refunded by the State.

### POOR.

There was appropriated for this Department \$5,000.00. There has been expended \$5,940.02. There has been returned to the Town by the State and other parties, \$1,363.83 with \$400.00 still due, making the net cost to the Town considerable less than the appropriation.

There are several cases which the Town is caring for which are paid in full or partially by outside parties, this condition makes the amount paid out large while the net cost is much less as shown in the above report.

### BOARD OF HEALTH.

Up to the time diphtheria made its appearance in October, we had been particularly free from contagious diseases of the serious sort during 1924.

Each year we must expect a run on the so-called children's diseases i. e. mumps, chicken-pox and measles, but when diphtheria or scarlet fever make their appearance, it is another matter and one which requires quick and persistent attention if their spread is to be stopped. Holding these unpleasant matters within bounds is made possible to a very great extent by the splendid cooperation received from our local physicians and from Miss Emma Mange, the School Nurse.

The diphtheria cases have proven very difficult to hold in check. Three cases have developed and while none of them reached a critical stage still this disease at its best is serious and no one can tell when a mild case may develop alarming proportions or what the after effects may be.

Two of these cases were with girls attending the Stony Brook school. Therefore our first thought was that there might be something wrong at the school but a series of careful examinations failed to prove such to be the case. As a preventative after the first case developed, the School building was given a very heavy charge of fumigation and each child attending the school (with the exception of four whose parents objected) were given an antitoxin serum by the school physician and Miss Mange.

Nearly a month after the first case developed, another made its appearance at the same school. The school was immediately closed for the week, then the Christmas vacation followed which resulted in no children being in attendance in two weeks. In the meantime the building was again fumigated and upon returning to school each pupil had culture taken by Dr. Briggs and Miss Mange. These cultures were sent to the State Board of

Health for examination. A negative report was received on them all. Eleven pupils were not in attendance the first day, but Dr. Briggs has since given them similar treatments and a negative report is anticipated.

It is most certainly hoped the spread of this dreaded disease has been stopped.

There have been several cases of Scarlet Fever during the year, but we are pleased to report all have been very light.

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### TREE WARDEN.

The amount appropriated for this department was \$100.00. Amount expended \$99.19, the greater part of the amount expended was caused by the recent gale.

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### STATE AID.

One has been added to the number of recipients. There has been paid out \$666.00, which sum will be refunded by the State. Of these recipients, seven are widows of soldiers.

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### SOLDIERS' RELIEF.

There has been paid and charged to this account the sum of \$366.00, all of which was paid for the support of one recipient.

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### TOWN HOUSE.

An appropriation of \$500.00 was made for the care and expenses of the building. There has been received for the use of the hall \$196.00, making a sum of \$696.00. There has been expended \$635.88.

#### HIGHWAY.

At the annual Town Meeting there was appropriated for this department the sum of \$12,000.00, \$5,000.00 to be used for work on Pembroke street, together with an equal amount from the State and County. There has been expended for Pembroke street \$15,249.57. For regular highways, \$6,976.97.

For further particulars see Highway Surveyors' Report.

#### WATER.

The amount appropriated at the annual town meeting for this department was \$6,000.00 with the additional amount which may be received on account of the additional charge on each first faucet, which amount was \$800.00, making the total appropriation \$6,800.00. There has been expended \$6,789.56.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT.

At the special Town Meeting held April 26 the sum of \$1,500.00 was appropriated for this department, and there has been expended \$1,161.89. See report of Engineers for further particulars.

#### CONTINGENT.

At the annual Town Meeting the sum of \$4,000.00 was appropriated for this account. There has been expended \$4,721.18, an overdraw of \$721.18. This was caused principally by an assessment of \$701.90 by the County for Hospital at South Hanson.

It is difficult to estimate the amount required for this account—a larger appropriation will be necessary for the ensuing year.

#### FOREST FIRES.

The amount appropriated for this department was \$200.00, and the amount expended \$655.38. The expenses attending this department are very uncertain. It is better to appropriate some amount. It is difficult to estimate, as any reasonable amount is liable to be overdrawn.

#### HIGHWAY, PEMBROKE STREET.

It was voted at the Annual Town Meeting that \$5,000.00 of the highway appropriation, together with a like amount from the County and State, be expended in rebuilding part of Pembroke street. There has been paid out \$15,249.57. There has been received from the State \$5,000.00, and from the County \$5,000.00, the balance, \$5,249.57 was paid from the regular Highway appropriation. For further particulars regarding work done, see Highway Surveyors' report.

#### HIGHWAY BEACON.

There was appropriated for the purchase of a Highway Beacon the sum of \$300.00. There was expended for same \$302.38.

#### FIRE TRUCK.

At a special Town Meeting held April 26, there was appropriated the sum of \$8,000.00 for the purchase of additional equipment for the Fire Department. Said amount to be raised as follows: \$1,000.00 from the tax levy of the current year, and balance of \$7,000.00 in bonds or notes. There has been expended for Fire Truck and equipment \$7,875.50.

See Engineers' report for further information.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

There was appropriated at a special Town Meeting, held April 26, the sum of \$500.00 for the installation of a Fire Alarm Signal. There has been expended for same, \$431.88. This seems to be money well expended.

TOWN FINANCES.

Of the outstanding notes against the Town on January 1st, 1924, amounting to \$71,500, nine, amounting to \$16,500, have been paid as they became due, and a new issue amounting to \$7,000 has been added, and the indebtedness is as follows on Jan. 1, 1925.

This fund of \$8,000, given by William L. Ames in memory of his mother, Lucy Ames of Kingston, has been added to by the generosity of Thomas Prince, formerly of Kingston. By the will of Mr. Prince there has been received \$4,373.89, and added to the \$8,000 as also \$126.11 taken from the income of the fund, making the sum of

On March 18th, 1924, a settlement was made whereby the town received \$20,261.30, which sum was the \$25,000.00 given by the late Thomas Prince less \$4,738.70, which amount was deducted for taxes and other assessments. The sum received \$20,261.30 was deposited in the

Plymouth National Bank by the Treasurer until arrangements could be made for permanent placements.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT

---

Your Fire Department has in the past year responded to a total of thirty-three alarms, of these fifteen were building, and eighteen chimney or grass fires.

At present we have twenty-seven call men besides the Chief and his Assistant.

With the new equipment, we are gradually building up a Department that with practice will soon be as efficient as any in towns of our size.

We are well equipped on a small scale, and while we do need 500 feet of new hose to replace that which was condemned at Rocky Nook Park, the balance of our needs can be taken care of from the regular appropriation. Besides the regular equipment of chemical tank, hose, ladders, etc., we have 1300 feet of double jacket hose, two play pipes, rubber coats, hats and boots for eight (8) men. We expect to add rubber equipment to cover nearly all the men this year.

A chassis has been purchased and the old chemical body placed upon it, giving us an additional piece that can be used for grass or chimney fires, and saving the pump for larger fires. It can also be used to carry ladders and rubber goods that otherwise would take up room on the pumper, as well as transport call men who do not get on the first piece of apparatus to respond.

We wish to extend thanks to the telephone company, and especially to Mr. and Mrs. Bonney and the operators under them, for their fine work with both head and hands in notifying the men of fire calls.

Team work on the part of Department members in case of fire is what counts, as the first few minutes are so valuable. Another matter of pride is the prompt re-

sponse of the men to alarms. When one realizes they are all working in different parts of the town, and even out of town, still have responded to alarms to the extent of very nearly 100 per cent, it shows they have a real interest in the Department that is bound to have its good results, so all we ask is an occasional boost and fewer knocks, and in a short time Kingston will have a Fire Department to be proud of.

One suggestion that is worthy of attention is the placing of some sort of box in the stream at Stony Brook near the business section. There is plenty of water coming down, but of a depth so shallow that a pump would have trouble drafting it. This would cost but a trifle, and would give us a fine supply of water.

The best way to fight fires is before they start, and if each one would clean up all rubbish where a fire might start, they would do a great deal to help keep the fire loss down.

**HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT**  
1924.

**PEMBROKE STREET.**

New Highway constructed this year consisted of 5,500 feet on Pembroke street and 900 feet on Maple street.

The work on Pembroke Street was a Kingston undertaking with exception of a portion of the expense. It was a \$15,000 proposition, divided equally between the State, County and Town, and when one compares the amount and character of road we built with town equipment and labor with similar projects in other towns, it proves conclusively Kingston got as much for its \$5,000 as some other towns paid \$20,000 to \$30,000 for. Several factors have had a lot to do with keeping our construction costs down to this low figure; for instance—our own stone and gravel supply with crushing plant, town labor, town motor trucks, and etc. One of the very pleasing things is that \$11,000 to \$12,000 of the \$15,000 expended went to Kingston people for labor and truck hire.

**MAPLE STREET.**

On Maple street, 900 feet of tar bound, stone road was constructed. The job was carried along with other Highway work, and no exact cost of this particular section was kept.

The following brief outline of how the 1924 appropriation of \$12,000 was expended may prove of interest to some.

In the event of heavy snow fall, no small amount of money is necessary for its removal. We were very fortunate during 1924 in this connection, having but one storm of consequence to contend with, and it was taken care of promptly, and I hope satisfactorily — the expense being kept down to a minimum by using the Town "White" truck with new plow and very little labor. If necessary for us to draw on outside parties for snow plow services or to use any considerable labor for shoveling, it would run into money fast. After listening to the many complaints because certain sections are not cleared immediately or as soon as some others, I wonder whether the townspeople would prefer to have me do this work with town equipment and at a minimum of expense, or hire outside labor and equipment sufficient to clear all highways within say twenty-four hours.

With the ever increasing demands being made on our highways, I feel more money should be allotted to the Highway Department each year.

**1925.**

The State and County are ready to assist us again this year on the same basis as last, toward additional con-

struction on Pembroke street, and I certainly feel we cannot afford to pass up their offer. There remains 6,200 feet to build in order to reach the Pembroke line. It could be built with the same form of construction as that done last year for not exceeding \$18,000, or at an expense to the Town of about \$6,000.

I am sometimes asked why we do not discontinue new construction for a while and put our time and money into repairing the highways we now have.

My answer—It is false economy for us to think we can stop building new roads; in fact, I am convinced the reason our highways are not in better shape today is because we did not avail ourselves of State and County assistance for a period of years some time back.

During those years both the State and County allotted large sums of money to assist towns like Kingston in their highway work. We did not avail ourselves of the opportunity, while some towns were eager to, and did, thereby not only securing their share but ours, too.

Several miles of our highway can be kept in very fair shape with certain repair work each year. It is for this work I feel a larger appropriation is warranted. We have however several bad sections subjected to very heavy travel where to expend much money on repairs is to practically throw it away, as the foundation is nowhere near heavy enough to withstand the strain of our very heavy automobile travel. For instance, Wapping Road from a point near Crossman's Pond to where we put in heavy stone road recently, about one-half mile—Main street from Tura's Store to junction of Main and Summer near "Ye Kingstowne Sweets," also Landing Road.

Something must be done this year, or at least the Southerly end of the above mentioned Main street section. My suggestion would be that the sum of \$2,000 be appropriated for the purpose, and if the Selectmen can then prevail upon the State and County to come in for like amounts, I feel it would be possible to rebuild the

whole section from Tura's Store to junction of Main and Summer streets. This work could not be done for such a figure, but for the fact the job could be carried along in conjunction with a piece of road we are to construct on Howland's Lane in accordance with a decree of the County Commissioners.

## REPORT OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

During the dry period of the Summer of 1924 we pumped all the water that the wells could supply but found it impossible to keep the reservoir full. The time came when water was so dangerously low we sent out a warning for people to be careful and economical in the use of it. This warning helped the situation somewhat but the experience plainly indicates a necessity for securing an additional supply. No more water can be obtained within the limits of the ground which furnishes the present supply by sinking more wells there. We firmly believe that the townspeople want nothing but the high grade spring water they are accustomed to drinking and with that in view a piece of land in the vicinity of the present wells, where there is good evidence that an abundance of water can be found, has been bought by the Town. At the March meeting we shall recommend an appropriation for developing this property and increasing our water supply in order to provide for the ever-increasing demands of the consumers. Before buying the land mentioned a number of test wells were driven last Fall in various places where the prospect seemed good for finding water. This experience was worth all it cost, for it showed us what we wanted to know about underground water courses.

The receipts from water takers for the year 1924 amounted to \$11,077.57. The records show the list of fixtures in use to be 1046 faucets, 561 water-closets, 288 bath tubs and 154 set tubs. They also show that 153 cows and 46 horses are supplied and 291 parties use hose.

New hydrants have been set where they were needed, and we have others on hand to use when they are wanted.

400 feet of 4-inch main pipe has been laid during the year, and we are pleased to say that there is an unexpended balance of upwards of \$100. of the Water Department appropriation.

The debt of this department at present is \$32,000.00, which is the amount remaining unpaid of the loans raised in recent years for the building of the concrete dam at the Pumping Station, for the extension of the mains to the Summer Colony at the Point of the Nook, for repairing and enlarging the Reservoir, and for laying the new and larger pipe from the Northerly end of Crescent Street to the Plymouth line.

The Engineers of the New England Insurance Exchange made a survey of our Water System during the past year and have submitted a report to the Selectmen in which they recommend the installation of much larger main pipes in certain sections of the Town.

To follow their suggestions would cost many thousands of dollars more than the Town can afford. While the present pipes are large enough for domestic purposes, we agree with these Engineers that in places they are too small, or too badly encrusted inside, to give the desired flow for fighting fire with the new Fire Engine.

For about one-tenth of the cost of laying new pipes the old ones can be cleaned out and restored to very nearly their original condition by a reliable pipe-cleaning company.

We think this matter is worthy of serious consideration.

In explanation of the amount of appropriation unexpended a large part of this sum is due to not having to spend as much for teachers' salaries as had been estimated. Then, too, several hundred dollars were saved by employing new teachers at salaries less than those paid to their more experienced predecessors.

The increase in the budget item for teachers' salaries for 1925 is occasioned as follows:

The High School was obliged to have an additional teacher and it was necessary to place a new teacher in the Faunce School. Expenditures of the 1924 financial year included only the salaries of these two teachers since summer,—four months only.

For 1925 we have to figure on ten months for these two teachers. We also must figure on giving four teachers the regular advance of \$50 each that is given to new teachers.

In addition we have to provide for a teacher to care for an overflow or increase in the Patuxet School that may cause the town to employ an extra teacher.

Transportation charges will be largely increased during 1925, as a much larger number of pupils will have to be carried.

Again the committee cordially thanks the Parent-Teachers Association for excellent co-operative work during the year.

Due to some apparently unexplainable cause a fire occurred during June in the basement of the High School Building, which caused considerable damage.

Insurance was promptly paid by the insurance companies and the necessary repairs, etc., were attended to.

After the Fall term had commenced it was found that the fire-pots of the two furnaces at the Maple Avenue School were badly cracked and that a new heating plant was necessary.

Special town meetings were called. The sum of \$600.00 which had been appropriated at the Annual Town Meeting for changes to be made at Rocky Nook one room school building, Grade 4, none of which had been expended, was re-appropriated for the purpose of installing a new heating plant at Maple Avenue School.

A further sum of \$900.00 was appropriated for the same purpose.

The new heating apparatus has been installed and it is operating successfully; an excellent outfit.

The committee recommends that the sum of \$40,173.00 be appropriated for school purposes for the year 1925.

Your careful consideration of the Superintendent's report is requested, particularly that portion with reference to additional school accommodations, the need of which is now so strongly apparent.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

January 2, 1925.

To the School Committee of Kingston:

I herewith submit my second annual report of the work done under my superintendency, and with it the reports of high school principal, supervisors and school physician and nurse.

In the list of schools, in tables of statistics, there may be some confusion in the minds of the parents as to the names of the various schools. These names are the new ones given to the schools formerly known as the Lower Center Primary, Upper Center Primary and Silver Lake units, now being known as the Faunce, Patuxet and William Bonney Schools.

### THE HIGH SCHOOL.

This year has seen an increase in numbers at the high school and the need of another teacher to take up the work. Last spring, it was thought advisable to include another man teacher to assist Mr. Merrill in the work with the boys of the school and Mr. Butler became one of the staff.

The boys had a good baseball team last spring, but the football of the fall was rather a failure, lack of proper support being the main cause. If we are to succeed with boy work in athletics, we must have the moral support of the home and town in having a good, wholesome program that includes the best of physical habits. Many small towns think that they should be exempt from strict rules of behavior on and off the field, scholarship rating, etc., and take offense when anybody comes in and tries to enforce such rules. It was this, as much as anything, that caused the football failure this past fall. I trust that the spring baseball will find a different spirit prevailing.

The addition of \$1300 worth of equipment in the lab-

oratory, has certainly been a fine thing for the school, and the pupils have benefited more than people realize from this. It was just the thing to fill a long needed want.

Ninety pupils were enrolled the past fall in the high school and next year there will be about a hundred. This enrollment includes six pupils from Plympton and we shall receive tuition reimbursement at the rate of \$85 per year for each pupil. This is an advance of \$25 per year, as up to this time Kingston has received only \$60 tuition.

### THE GRADED SCHOOLS

All except eight of the Maple Avenue 8th grade pupils were transferred to the Cobb School at Rocky Nook this past fall. Your superintendent opposed this, chiefly on the ground of the physical welfare of the children. Any child is bound to suffer from constant riding on the electric cars, especially when the road bed of the transportation line is as shaky as the line between the center of the town and Rocky Nook is nearly all of the time. If this transportation is to continue, I think it would be wise to do as was done this fall and allow the parents to volunteer sending the pupils there and not force them to go if the parents object. It is a question, however, as to whether or not we can send many down to that school. If you look at the table of statistics, you will see that we shall have a total of more than 70 pupils in the eighth grade next fall. Of this number, there will be 35 or more from the Cobb School, and about the same number from the center and Silver Lake sections of the town for the Maple Avenue School.

Last year, my report dealt with the situation at Maple Avenue and I went into considerable detail to point out the future of the schools in the center of the town. The situation is going to be infinitely worse this coming fall. Briefly stated, this is the outlook—

You can see at once that both the Patuxet and Maple Avenue Schools cannot possibly accommodate the pupils that will attend next fall. The question is a serious one and should receive attention at this coming town meeting. You must either furnish these schools with extra teachers and adopt a platoon system, whereby part of the number come in the morning and part in the afternoon, or have a new school erected. In my last year's report I pointed out the extravagance of the platoon system and the lack of efficient work due to cutting down of the time allotted for each division of pupils so effected. Let me further call attention to our lack of room in the different buildings, and what will be needed for new equipment to seat all of the incoming pupils.

In the upper room of Maple Avenue, we now have 33 pupils, and we care for grades 7 and part of 8. In the lower room we have grade 6 with 41 pupils.

Next fall we shall have an enrollment of at least 15 pupils in grade 6, 46 in grade 7, and 36 in grade 8. It is out of the question, of course, to grade as we have this year and have the 7th and 8th divisions in one room; so this leaves us with 15 pupils in grade 6 and 46 pupils in grade 7 to care for,—a total of 61. This does not allow for any pupils repeating these grades. As the seating capacity of the room is only 48, you can readily see that we shall have 13 pupils for whom there is no room.

Let us turn to the Patuxet School. This year we have 31 in grade 4, and 15 in grade 5. Next fall we shall have

23 in grade 4 and 42 in grade 5, a total of 65 with a seating capacity in the room of 44, leaving 21 pupils for whom we shall have no accommodations. So, in the two schools we shall have a total of 34 pupils for whom we lack desks and seats, and no place to put them if we had the furniture.

So it would seem that the only thing to recommend is that the school committee be authorized, by an article inserted in the town warrant, to go ahead, get plans and start in the right direction toward the erection of a new building, to be put up in the very near future. I know that there is a feeling that we should not build until it is imperative to do so, but I feel that that time has come and that further delay will mean a waste of finances, due to double transportation and doubling the teaching force in what room may need the platoon system. Sometimes, also, we do not feel that we should take such a step until we can be assured of the support of the parents, and I feel that we now have their hearty support, as many have spoken to me of their objections to transportation and wish that we had suitable accommodations in this section where the children should attend school.

The parents of the town can not afford to accept the prejudices of a few who oppose anything new, simply from the tax payer's viewpoint, and think that what was good enough fifty years ago is good enough now. State law will not permit us to have more than fifty pupils in a room without having another teacher, even if fifty years ago it was not an uncommon thing to have one teacher care for sixty or more pupils. It is a fact that 90 per cent. of the opponents to measures looking for the betterment of the schools, have no children in the schools and do not care anything at all about the welfare of our pupils. Such opposition should be cared for by earnest effort on the part of the parents to work for the ultimate good of the pupils themselves.

In the high school, there will be at least 25 more pupils come into the entering class than graduate this coming June. This will mean new desks and seats for that number as we are now using every available seat in the building. This, of course, adds to the new equipment estimates of the budget, as desks, seats, etc., are classed as new equipment. I mention this as many might think that where we had spent so much for laboratory equipment this past year, we might be asking for still more. The new equipment for which costs are estimated, are for seats and desks and not for laboratory furniture of any kind.

#### THE PARENT-TEACHERS ASSOCIATION.

We are indebted to this organization for a great deal of assistance in the health work of our schools and in aiding the high school students in their lunch proposition. Such support is appreciated by all of the school workers and I trust that in the future there may be even more of this done. Working for the good of the schools makes for closer relationship and harmony and that is needed in every town. I join with the officers of the association in asking for the support of the parents in every phase of their work that is helpful.

#### UPKEEP OF PROPERTY.

There are several things that are needed this year in the way of repairs. The largest bill will be for painting the Cobb School at Rocky Nook. This should be done during the summer vacation. The William Bonney Schools, at Silver Lake, should have new curtains and some new seats. The back room of the Patuxet School should have a new ceiling and receive a coat of paint. New doors are needed at the Stony Brook School. The one-room building at Rocky Nook should be reshingled. The toilets at this school have been improved and no

more work can be done there as there is not room for a modern flush system on the school premises. The foundation of this school has also been repaired and the roof patched.

There are other minor repairs that can not be estimated in advance, as they do not come to our attention until the need is present; but proper allowance for a moderate amount of this work should be included in the budget for the year. Also, there are other things that could be done but that never are because such things never have been done previously.

Among such, I might mention the actual need of mosquito netting in some of the buildings. I am not urging this especially, although, if we have another trying time with mosquitoes as we had last fall, especially at the William Bonney School, where we had to close for two sessions. I shall ask for something to protect the children. I might say that a great many people noticed this same nuisance at the graduations last June and if any building needs to have the windows netted, it is the town hall.

In closing this report, I wish to thank the members of the school committee, the teachers and the parents for their support of this past year.

## REPORT OF DRAWING SUPERVISOR

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The drawing and painting of nature subjects finished in the Grammar grades last year was certainly the most progressive work we have ever put through, age and grade considered.

The high rate of accomplishment received by Mrs. Cushing and Miss Daley in this branch of work at the Rocky Nook school was a decided realization of the things we had hoped for. The work in the other two rooms of this school is well taken care of by the two teachers in charge.

There are so many schools, and so much work of a detailed nature, and so large an attendance in each room that it makes it impossible for me to cover the William Bonney School, Silver Lake, regularly, without holding up the other work in the village schools, as much time is required owing to train service that causes waits and delays.

At present we are making some decided changes in the work being done at the Grammar schools. Nature work of fruits and vegetables finished with wax crayons, is one of the most valuable and effective means to develop a good worker that we have tried.

One of the very pleasant facts to record is the fine work being done in Mrs. Blume's room at the Maple Avenue School.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

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This is a report and summary of the work and findings of the present school year when my duties as a school physician commenced.

A number of cases of pediculosis (Nits) were found. These, mostly were confined to one school. This is a condition which is unnecessary and can be done away with by treatment, personal cleanliness and habits.

The co-operation of the school nurse has been of material value in reducing the number of cases, but more than that is necessary. The co-operation of the parents is needed, and until it is obtained, the same trouble will be present from year to year.

It is not a shame to have pediculosis but it is a shame to keep it.

The following is one of the subjects which I would like to emphasize.

It was surprising to note the number of cases there were of enlarged tonsils and adenoids.

Follow up clinics in many cities have demonstrated the ill health that results from diseased tonsils and adenoids and have observed the benefits both physical and mental, which have resulted when such diseased tissues were removed.

Enlarged and diseased tonsils and adenoids produce mouth breathing, unnatural respiration, sore throat from which complications arise, lowered physical vitality, and a mentality which is less keen and less alert. The resulting ill health is the forerunner of worry, nervousness, irascibility and other symptoms which in turn cause more ill health and thus a vicious cycle is produced.

The sooner such diseased tissues are removed the bet-

ter the results and the sooner will the health and mentality reap the benefits.

This is an age of preventive medicine. Because of the cases of diphtheria which were discovered in pupils of Stony Brook school and the vicinity, it was considered advisable to take all precautions that were possible to prevent the spread of the disease, and thru the willingness and co-operation of the Board of Health, diphtheria antitoxin was given to most of the pupils of that school, and throat cultures were taken from all the pupils.

Fortunately the cases were few and scattered and we feel that all available precautions and preventive measures were utilized in order to limit the disease.

Another condition which was very noticeable was that of incorrect posture. It was amazing to note the large number of cases there were of poor posture. This condition cannot be corrected entirely by the teacher nor can the school nurse or school physician cope with it as well as with other conditions.

The parents are the ones to teach good posture to the children, and this should be done before the children reach school age. You do not want a race of round shouldered, sunken chested, pot bellied citizens; get at the root of the condition and correct it.

There were many cases of enlarged glands found, but as a rule these were associated either with pediculosis or tonsillar trouble.

Although there were no cases of active tuberculosis discovered, yet there were several pupils, who were underweight, undernourished, and apparently of lowered vitality. This is a condition which is often the forerunner of consumption and ill health. All possible means should be taken to build up the body resistance.

An additional case of goitre was found. Such conditions need attention.

There were several cases of scoliosis. Only proper and persistent care can help such cases.

The law requires a notice of all contagious diseases to be reported. Prompt reports and proper quarantine will prevent the spread of such.

If I can drive home the idea of co-operation of the parents with the Board of Health, school nurse and school physician, and the idea of preventive medicine, I shall consider this report well made.

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## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

---

I submit the following report of the health work carried on in your schools the past year.

An epidemic of mumps started in the "Up Town" schools during the spring term, owing to a misunderstanding regarding the quarantine on mumps. Many children were in school with the mumps, while others, excluded from school, were running at large, spreading the disease.

I would like to suggest that parents who do not understand the required quarantine on the minor diseases, would consult their family physician or the school physician. In doing so they will co-operate with the doctor and nurse, and make it possible to control these epidemics. Until this is understood and carried out, these conditions cannot be overcome. If we do not have co-operation with the parents, we cannot carry on and secure the desired results, which means controlling epidemic in schools and the health education of the children.

Two cases of diphtheria were reported from Stony Brook School—Anti Toxin inoculation was given to all children with required permission from parents. Twenty-

five, including the teacher were inoculated. Throat cultures were also taken. The returns were negative, thus showing no diphtheria carriers in the building.

Pediculosis is very troublesome in one building. This is a very serious condition, and one which requires the help of the parents, as well as the teacher and nurse.

I find, however, an improvement over last year.

Home calls were made on parents, regarding the first grade children coming in this year. These calls have been very satisfactory to both parent and nurse, as the condition of the child is taken up, and the diseases he or she may have had. In that way I find out what contagious diseases can be recorded on the physical card. Advice is given as to condition of head and cleanliness of body before entering school.

Forty or more children who entered school last fall, with the exception of six, were vaccinated, which was a much larger percent than the previous year, and I feel this was due to home calls made in June, as at that time I took up the matter of vaccination with the parents.

One case of Scarlet fever was reported in June, and two in August.

All school children have been weighed and measured three times during the year. A great improvement was noticed in many cases. This was due largely to milk and cocoa served in schools. 5,000 straws to be used in serving milk in the schools were given by the Parent-Teachers Association.

Examination of all school children present have been completed. A number of cases of scoliosis were discovered. One case of enlarged thyroid glands.

Fifty-six notices were sent to parents.

Eighty cases of mumps, twelve of measles, six of chicken pox, ten of scabies, diphtheria, two; scarlet fever, four; scoliosis, eight; enlarged thyroid glands, one.

Ten tonsil cases were operated on at the Jordan Hospital clinic.

Patricia Pease, of the fifth grade, Rocky Nook, died in June.

Owing to the epidemic of chicken pox in the Howland Lane school last spring, those children were not examined by the dentist. All other schools were completed before the close of school.

Tooth brushes have been put in all schools again this year, as I find it stimulates the interest of the children in that line. Home calls have been made as usual.

I feel that last year was a busy one, and much was accomplished, owing to help and co-operation of the Board of Health and Parent-Teachers Association, and I wish to thank them and others for their help in the work.

## HIGH SCHOOL REPORT

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During the summer vacation a combination science table, two cabinets,—one for chemicals and one for apparatus—a fume hood, and a teacher's demonstration desk, were installed in the High School. This new furniture provides a laboratory very well equipped for teaching science.

On the earnest recommendation of Mr. Morse, State Agent for High Schools, an extra teacher has been added to the teaching force.

The new laboratory facilities and the extra teacher will make it possible to start a class in biology for the Sophomores next year, an addition to their course which is much needed.

Hot lunches have been served at recess during the present year. The preparation and serving of lunches together with the business management, is done by the pupils under the direction of a teacher. Although at present our facilities are limited, yet I believe a very creditable job is being done. Part of the equipment for this enterprise was earned by the pupils, and part was given by the Parent-Teachers Association.

I have been asked the question, "How can parents cooperate with teachers in order to secure better results in school?" Successful work in High School cannot be done without outside preparation of lessons. It seems to me that parents can best help by insisting that a reasonable amount of time be spent in home study.
