Voted-That the sum of \$321.00 which is the premium less the cost of issuing and marketing the issue of \$34,000.00 "High School Addition Bonds" be appropriated to be applied to the payment of the first bond of this issue due July 1, 1927.

Voted-That the Treasurer be authorized to borrow money with the approval of a majority of the Selectmen in anticipation of taxes. The same to be paid from receipt of taxes for the current year.

Voted-That the Town accept aid from the State and County for rebuilding of Wapping Road and Main Street.

Voted-That the interest on the World War Memorial Account amounting to \$92.10, be appropriated for the purpose of improving the grounds about the Memorial and for dedication exercises.

Voted- That the Moderator be authorized to appoint a committee of two citizens of this town and the Water

Commissioner to appoint one citizen to conduct a thorough investigation as to the Town Reservoir and to be empowered to have access to all official information now in the possession of the town officials and to employ the services of a recognized engineering firm skilled in the art of Reservoir construction and repairs. This committee to report their findings and recommendations at the earliest opportunity consistent with the problem, to the voters of this Town at a special Town Meeting. To cover the expenses of this committee " sum of \$500.00 be appropriated.

Voted—That there be appropriated the sum of \$6500.00 for the purpose of relaying a water main in Wapping Road with 6 in, pipe and that to meet said appropriation the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow the sum of 6500,00 and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor, said bonds or notes to be payable in accordance with the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 14 of the General Laws so that the whole Loan shall be paid in not more than fifteen years from the date of issue of the first bond or note or at such earlier date as the Treasurer and Selectmen may determine.

Voted—To increase the salary of the Fire Department "call men" from \$12.00 per man per year to \$25.00 per year and appropriate \$350.00 therefor.

Voted-That we rescind vote made at the Town Meeting of July 14, 1926 in the matter of renaming certain streets in the Town.

Voted—That the proposition as submitted to the Selectmen by the State Highway Department under date of March 3, 1927 covering the reconstruction of the State Highway between the Kingston Railroad Crossing and Prouty's Garage and the Island Creek line whereby the Town of Kingston agrees to assume the land damages and expense of top surfacing the sidewalks, be accepted by the Town and the Selectmen be hereby authorized to complete the necessary arrangements with the Commonwealth.

Voted-That the Town will idemnify the Commonwealth of Massachusetts against any and all claims for land grade and drainage damages which may be caused by or result from the laying out, alteration, construction or reconstruction of the State Highway on the Duxbury Road in Kingston or any section or relocation thereof and that the Board of Selectmen be authorized to sign an indemnity agreement therefor in behalf of the Town indemnifying the Commonwealth as aforesaid.

Voted-That the Town accept with thanks the bequest of the late Arthur F. Wadsworth. That there be established a fund to be called the "Arthur F. Wadsworth Fund", the same to be in the care of the Town Treasurer to be deposited in a Savings Bank. That the income from said fund be used for the benefit of the Poor of the Town and to be subject to withdrawal on orders drawn by the Overseers of the Poor.

Yoted-That \$5000.00 be appropriated from surplus revenue in the Treasury and that the Assessors be authorized to use that sum in reducing the taxes.

Voted-That the Committee on Celebration be discharged and that the property in its hands be turned over to the Trustees of the Library with authority to sell the same.

Voted-That the Moderator be requested to appoint a third member to the Town Map Committee.

To carry out the votes of the Town at Annual Meeting, I hereby appoint: Herbert F. Sollis, George F. Sever, as two members of the Committee to investigate the Reservoir situation.

As a third member of the Town Map Committee, I appoint Roland Bailey.

SELECTMEN, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE, BOARD OF HEALTH

At the Annual Town Meeting, March 5, 1927, the following were elected to the Office of Selectmen and Overseers of Department of Public Welfare:

John T. Cushman. Albert H. Holmes, George F. Sever, and the same three automatically comprise the Board of Health.

These Boards organized the evening of March 8th, 1927 as follows: Albert H. Holmes, Chairman, Selectmen; George F. Sever, Chairman, Department of Public Welfare; John T. Cushman, Chairman, Board of Health.

The Boards are in session Tuesday evening of each week at Selectmen's Office in Town House and by necessity conduct frequent special meetings as occasion requires.

STATE ACCOUNTING SYSTEM

The books and accounting of the Town have been conducted according to the State of Massachusetts System of Accounting for the past year and a half. It proved

rather confusing at first for some of the Departments to adapt themselves to the new and altogether different methods and requirements, but these difficulties have been overcome and all concerned appear to have adapted their work to the new system nicely.

Roland Bailey, Town Accountant, is at the Town House each week day afternoon.

Frank A. Randall, Treasurer and Tax Collector, is at the Town House Tuesday evening and Friday afternoon and evening of each week.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE

Appropriated \$6000.00. Expended \$8037.86.

Until this year this Department was known as "Overseers of the Poor". It has been considered wise to change the title in order to conform to corresponding change in title of the State Department handling such matters.

\$6000.00 was appropriated for this work but unforseen demands have made that amount insufficient.

An amount in excess of \$1000.00 was advanced (according to law) for aid to persons residing in Kingston but with settlement in other towns and cities, against whom these items are charged, returns from same going directly to the Town Treasury and cannot be applied as a

Many times cases handled are very trying, requiring a lot of time in interviewing many people in an effort to secure all possible facts and often secured only under very unpleasant circumstances, all being necessary in order to provide for really needy persons and at the same time keep expenditures within bounds. In order to properly handle this important work, one must make a considerable study of human nature as many types of people are dealt with, some willing to be fair in every way and ex-

pecting only the actual necessities, while others are out for all they can get, by "hook or by crook".

This is one Department permitted under certain conditions to overdraw the appropriation. These requirements were complied with in connection with overdraft this year.

On April 19th, Mr. Sever submitted a proposition which provided for employment of a clerk at a salary of \$200.00 per year to carry on the details of this Department. The other members could not see the necessity of a clerk or authorize the expenditure of an extra \$200.00 so declined to go along with the proposition whereupon Mr. Sever immediately resigned as Chairman.

After considerable discussion and some persuasion, Mr. Cushman consented to assume the Chairmanship in addition to the Chairmanship of the Board of Health to which he was elected in March.

STREET LIGHTING

Appropriated \$2000.00. Expended \$1673.72.

There have been new lights installed and considerable rearrangement of lights to the extent of the appropriation based on an annual rental not to exceed \$2000.00. As these changes and new installation did not take place until well into the Summer, the whole \$2000.00 was not required this last year.

If the lights now installed are continued during the coming year on present basis of \$166.25 per month, an expenditure of \$1995.00 will result, or an amount just within the \$2000.00 figure.

The following lights are now in operation:

94 lights, 40-W each @\$19.00 per year \$1786.00 3 lights, 100-W each @ 23.00 per year 69.00

2 lights, 600-W each @ 70.00 per year 140.00

Your particular attention is called to the two new 600-W lights in the "Down Town" business section. It

More lights could be installed about town to the mutual benefit of many people, provided the voters see fit to authorize a larger appropriation for the purpose.

MOTH DEPARTMENT

Appropriated, \$1300.00. Expended, \$1297.68.

In spite of the efforts of Superintendent Charles H. Childs and his helpers, which resulted in control of these pests in most parts of the Town, they made tremendous inroads in the wooded section in the South part of Town, although not to the extent of damage experienced in several near by towns.

In Kingston there was a section extending from the Kingston-Plymouth line through the Smelt Pond district to Brook Street where the foliage was so completely eaten away as to resemble the havoc of a forest fire.

When these pests get into action in the wooded sections, it is extremely difficult to combat them. Many methods have been tried, the most successful of which has probably been that of dusting the area affected with powdered poison from an airplane, but this method is too costly thus far to be considered in most sections.

The State Department is making an extensive study of the problem and Mr. Childs being in close touch with them, will have the benefits resulting from their investigations and findings.

TOWN HOUSE

Appropriated, \$700.00. Expended, \$699.80.

The repairs and alteration to the Town House have been subjects for much discussion and some publicity for the past two years or more. It is a difficult problem without running the cost into a large amount.

There are many who feel the assembly hall, lower halls,

and connecting rooms, should continue as such, subject of course, to repairs. That a separate heating unit should be installed in the Selectmen's Office and piped across the vestibule thereby providing suitable heat at all times in the "Treasurer, Collector, Assessors" Office as well as that of the "Selectmens". The repairs to the whole building with installation of heating unit mentioned, could probably be accomplished for \$2500.00 excluding much needed changes and additions to the equipment in the Town Offices. We are handicapped in many ways due to crowded condition in the vault and lack of filing equipment in general. This situation could be very much improved with an expenditure of not to exceed \$500.00.

There are others who feel the Community Building should entirely take the place of the Town House, halls, offices, and all, while there is also quite a demand for the abandonment of the halls as such and remodeling of the whole building into offices for the various town departments. This would, of course, run into much more of an expenditure than the first mentioned plan.

The proposition will probably be presented to the Annual Town Meeting next March in all its phases for such action as the voters may decide upon.

BOARD OF HEALTH

Appropriated, \$2000.00. Expended, \$1200.00.

A year ago this Department commenced its work with what bid fair to require the entire appropriation due to our having three Town cases at the Plymouth County Hospital at South Hanson which, if they were to require treatment for the entire year, would draw on this Department to the extent of \$1400.00.

Fortunately, such was not the case. One patient left the hospital early in the year. The other two, both of whom were children, responded to the treatment wonderfully and were discharged in June, cured.

This hospital has demonstrated many times that if a case comes to them in the early stages of tuberculosis, it can be cured. They are certainly doing a wonderful work toward the elimination of this dreaded disease and it is hoped the Institution is appreciated by the people throughout Plymouth County.

As mentioned in previous reports, the "Town Dump" has been a difficult proposition for this Department but new arrangements made this year have much improved the situation, we believe. The dump location remains the same, namely, just off Summer Street to the Northwest, nearly opposite Prouty's Garage. Whereas it was formerly open at all times, it is now protected by a closeable entrance and opened to the public on Wednesday and Saturday of each week at which time an attendant is in charge. Only by resorting to this method has it been possible to keep the roadway and approaches to the pit cleaned up to a degree safe for autos to be driven in and load dumped directly into the pit without taking chances of puncturing tires. It is hoped those who have occasion to use the dump, appreciate the new conditions.

To Milk Producers and Dealers in Denatured Alcohol.

Any one producing milk and offering it for sale, is required by law to secure a permit from the Board of Health. There is no difficulty in securing such permit provided the dairy is in a sanitary condition.

Dealers in denatured alchol must obtain a permit from this Board.

Failure to obtain such permits is likely to prove costly to the offenders.

All permits must be reissued as of May first of each vear.

We have under consideration the adoption of a by-law which will necessitate all producers of milk for sale, having their herd subjected to the so-called TUBER-CULIN TEST, or pasteurize their milk. Due to such a regulation having been adopted in Plymouth about two years ago, most of the Kingston herds have already been subjected to this test that the owners might sell at least a part of their milk in Plymouth.

There are but few herds in Town at the present time supplying a milk route, which have not been tested. It is hoped that these parties will see the wisdom of protecting their customers against the possible contraction of diseases which have been known to come from unhealthy cows and which cannot be definitely determined without the TEST. It may mean the elimination of one or more cows from the herd and if same is a valuable animal, the established award made by the State and the Federal Government may not entirely repay the owner for the cow condemned, still other dairymen in town have taken the necessary steps to protect their trade and it is hoped the untested herds will be so cared for without further regulation by this Board being necessary.

There have been but few contagious diseases to deal with this year aside from those always encountered, Measles, Chicken Pox and Whooping Cough, and due to the cooperation of our Doctors and School Nurse, these have been kept within bounds.

One case of Infantile Paralysis developed but fortunately proved a very light case and has shown no permanent injury as a result.

STATE AID

Appropriated, \$500.00. Expended, \$486.00.

These expenditures are on orders from the State

One person receiving such aid over a period of years Department. passed away during the past year:

Mr. Nahum Sampson, died October 5, age 97 years,

Leaving but six now entitled to receive such assistance. 4 months, 24 days. Two Civil War veterans and four Civil War veterans' widows.

The amount paid each month is small but of vital consequence to most of the recipients.

TREE WARDEN

Appropriated, \$150.00. Expended, \$149.26.

All trees bordering on the highway, whether of town or private ownership, come under the supervision of the Tree Warden and must not be removed or disturbed without that official's permission.

We refrain from commenting on Suppression of Crime, Fire, Forest Fire, Highways or Schools as the head of these Departments have prepared reports which will be found elsewhere in this general report.

LUCY PRINCE AMES MEMORIAL FUND

This fund was established in 1919 by Mr. William L. Ames of New York City in memory of his Mother and for whom the fund is named. Mr. Ames spent his early life in Kingston and while here but little in late years, he always took great interest in the Town. He observed things in the Old Burying Ground were not kept up in an altogether satisfactory manner which prompted him to offer the Town the sum of \$8000.00, the interest of which would be used for preservation of the Old Burying Ground and the monuments erected thereon. The Town accepted the gift and has under the direction of the Selectmen applied the income from the fund as requested.

In 1924 as the result of a stipulation in the will of Thomas Prince, another former Kingstonian and very close friend of Mr. Ames, this fund was later increased by \$4500.00.

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the accounts of the town of Kingston for the period from July 12 to December 31, 1926, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44 of the General Laws. This report is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Edward H. Fenton, Chief Examiner of this Division.

Sir:

As directed by you I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Kingston for the period from July 12 to December 31, 1926, the following report thereon being submitted:

The financial transactions of the town, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town, were examined and verified.

The books and accounts of the collector of taxes were examined and checked. The commitment books were footed and reconciled and the outstanding accounts were listed. In checking the commitment list of the 1926 levy with the warrant, it was found that the commitment list was \$720.20 in excess of the warrant. The collector's cash book was added and checked in detail, and the payments to the treasurer were checked to the amounts as recorded on the treasurer's books.

As in the previous audit, payments were found credited on the commitment book and not entered on the cash book; also payments were found credited to the wrong levies. More care should be taken by the collector so that the true condition of the various levies may be available.

The abatements as recorded on the commitment books were checked to the assessors' records of abatements granted. A verification of the outstanding taxes was made by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received I am satisfied that the outstanding accounts, as listed, are correct.

While the collection of interest on overdue taxes has been more strictly enforced since the previous audit, the levies of 1922, 1923 and 1924 are still unsettled; it is therefore recommended that a determined effort be made by the collector to settle these levies without further delay.

The tax title deeds held by the town were examined and a tax title account was set up on the ledger, the necessary adjustments being made to correct the account as a result of an invalid sale of two parcels of property, the taxes on which have been paid. Correcting entries were also made to adjust the erroneous entries in the collector's accounts, the result indicating an overpayment to the treasurer of \$82.09.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The cash book was footed and the recorded receipts were analyzed and checked by a comparison with the records in the departments collecting money for the town and with the several other sources from which money was paid into the treasury. The payments were checked with the orders and warrants approved by the selectmen authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds and also with the original bills on file.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in reconciling the treasurer's cash with the cash book balance, due to the unsystematic manner in which the treasurer keeps the accounts. A proof of the bank balance could not be readily obtained, for the reason that the treasurer, apparently, had not reconciled the bank statements since the previous audit. The statements furnished by the bank indicated two charges of \$300 each for which no cancelled checks were on file, although the treasurer stated that the two checks, apparently for the treasurer's salary, had been returned by the bank. Unpaid orders, reported in the previous audit, have not yet been paid by the treasurer.

In checking the cancelled securities representing payments of debt, it was noted that a revenue note of \$10,000, due December 31, 1926, was not paid until February of 1927.

As may be seen from the appended table showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, there appears a cash overage of \$342, which sum may represent some receipts not previously entered, since receipts have not been promptly entered in the cash book by the treasurer. Thus, a special bequest of \$1,623.01 and interest on deposits in the Second National Bank amounting to \$123.70 were not entered when received. It is therefore recommended that all receipts be entered promptly by the treasurer and that reports thereof be made at the end of each month to the town accountant.

The accountant's ledger was footed and analyzed, and the postings were checked to the warrants authorized and approved by the selectmen, as well as to the receipts as recorded on the treasurer's books. The appropriations and transfers as entered on the ledger were checked to the town clerk's records.

The books and accounts of the collector of water rates were examined and checked. The commitment cards were footed and reconciled and the outstanding accounts were listed. The cash book was footed and the payments to the treasurer were checked to the amounts as recorded on the treasurer's books. It was found that collections for guarantees and certain other items had been made by the commissioners and paid by them to the treasurer. All collections should be made by the collector and entered on his cash book, so that a proper record may be on file.

The records of dog and of hunting and fishing licenses issued by the town clerk were examined, and the payments to the state and county treasurers, respectively, were checked to the receipts on file.

The accounts of the sealer of weights and measures were examined and checked, and the payments to the treasurer were checked to the treasurer's books.

Upon examining the bonds of the several town officials it was found that no bond was on file for the town clerk, although attention was called in the report of the previous audit to the fact that such bond is required by Section 13, Chapter 41, General Laws. The bonds of the other officials were found to be in proper form.

The various trust funds in the custody of the library trustees, the selectmen, and the treasurer were examined and checked. The securities and savings bank books were personally examined, and the income and payments as recorded were verified. At the time of the previous audit, it was found that the income of the Willis Fund had not been reported on several bank books. Attention was called to this matter, but to date the income has not been added on these books. Income on all funds should be added regularly and reported to the town accountant, so that the true condition of the funds may be at all times available.

Appended to this report are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax accounts and trust fund transactions, together with a

balance sheet showing the financial condition of the town December 31, 1926.

For the courtesies extended and the assistance rendered by the various town officials during the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

I submit herewith my report of an examination of the books and accounts of the treasurer and collector of the town of Kingston for the period from January 18 to September 16, 1927, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44 of the General Laws. As directed by you. I have made an examination of the books and accounts of the treasurer and collector of the town of Kingston for the period from January 18 to September 16, 1927, and submit the following report thereon:—

The books and accounts of the collector of taxes were examined and checked in detail. The collections as posted on the commitment books were checked to the entries in the cash books, and the receipts as shown by the collector's cash books were compared with the treasurer's record of receipts. The abatements were checked with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the necessary adjustments were made to correct the various errors in the clerical work of the collector, and the outstanding accounts were further verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as

owing money to the town, the replies thereto indicating that the accounts are correct as listed.

The collector personally assumed the liability for the balance due on the levies of 1922, 1923 and 1924, although this settlement did not include interest on the overdue taxes.

The outstanding accounts on the levies of 1925 and 1926 were recommitted to the new collector and a detailed list was given to him.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The cash book was footed throughout for the period of the audit, and the recorded receipts were analyzed and checked by a comparison with the records in the departments collecting money for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the treasury. The payments were checked with the orders and warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds and also with the original bills on file.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in reconciling the treasurer's cash, due to the methods employed by him in disbursing the amounts called for in the treasury warrants. A large number of unpaid items were found, for which checks were drawn at the completion of the audit; errors in the check book, overpayments and underpayments were adjusted, with the result that on September 16, 1927, a discrepancy of \$689.50 was noted in the accounts of the town treasurer and collector, of which \$299.70 was paid into the town treasury on October 11, 1927, leaving a balance of \$389.80 due on that date.

For the courtesies extended by the various town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation. Respectfully submitted,

Report on Highways

There was appropriated \$14,000.00 for use on highways and in addition to this there has been returned to the General Highway \$1,117.00 which was for the expense of trucks and tractor used on Wapping Road.

In making my report as to what has been occomplished with the Town's money there were so many small jobs that it would be difficult to enumerate them in this small space, so I will give you a list of the most important ones.

First, we built 1100 feet of tar bound road on Maple Street at a cost of \$2800.00.

We have surfaced about 1200 feet on Main Street at a cost of \$1800.00.

The repairs made on Evergreen Street amounting to \$1500.00 were much needed as with the heavy trucking in connection with the State Highway work on Summer and Tremont Streets in Kingston and Duxbury respectively, as done by the Lawton Construction Company over this road, very little would have been left of the road had not the repairs been made. I think it was money well spent.

On our dirt roads we graveled extensively on about four miles, namely, East Avenue, Brook and Elm Streets, South Street, West Street, Lake and Grove Streets, Winter Street and Brookdale Avenue.

In addition to the above, we got out sand for a part of Wapping Road, Landing Road, Howland's Lane and a part of Pembroke Street, but, owing to the serious situation existing on Main Street and there being no immediate liklihood of the Street Railway discontinuing service and removing their rails to permit rebuilding of this through way, I was ordered by the Selectmen to do

certain repair work there. This resulted in an expenditure of \$1800.00 which I had not anticipated and which made it necessary to refrain from doing the oiling and sanding I had laid out to do. I am very sorry not to have been able to have finished the work but lack of funds was the answer.

Oiling and sanding which was done amounted to \$1500.00 and the gravelling was done at a cost of \$4000.00. To this add the Highway Surveyor's salary of \$1600.00 together with our outfit for patching, which cost \$480.00, and you have about all of the appropriation. The balance of the appropriation has been used for gas, oil, patching material, tools and repairs on machinery.

WAPPING ROAD

There was \$25,000.00 contributed for this work-State \$11,00.00, County \$7000.00 and Town \$7000.00. We have built 6650 feet of tar bound Macadam stone road. This road runs from 18 to 23 feet in width with an average of 6 inches of stone and 2 gallons penetration to the square yard, 15 gallon seal. The drainage pipe used on Wapping Road cost approximately \$450.00 The extra work done on Jones River Bridge at the Mayflower Worsted mill was done at a extra cost of \$1000.00. With the extra cutting and filling we had to do which amounted to considerably more than we expected, I feel, as expressed by our engineer quite often, that this was a \$40,000.00 job accomplished for \$25,000.00 with a little assistance from the County Commissioners, which was greatly appreciated by me. By so doing they saved my serving time at the County Farm. Notwithstanding the fact that Mr. Sever took the trouble to go to the State officials and complain that it was a very rough piece of road and he thought the State should demand a better job. It was gratifying to have them, after going over the road pronounce it satisfactory. Had it been otherwise the State could have compelled the Town to rebuild any parts of the road.

The only place we feel particularly dissatisfied with, is in front of the Mayflower Worsted Mill, where there is a slight sag due to a newly filled flume way and water trench crossing the road which had not had time to properly settle, before the road was built. This can be attended to in the early spring.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1928

I would recommend that \$10,000.00 be appropriated for general purposes and \$3000.00 for Howland's Lane. This is not as much as ought to be asked for for this job, but in order to keep the appropriation down have not recommended more. I would recommend \$2000.00 for Elm Street, from Horace Holmes' to Brook Street and would recommend that the Town take action to straighten a point on factory hill.

Report of The Kingston Fire Department

FOR 1927

Our Town has a department that is second to none for a town of its size and compares very favorably with towns much larger.

We have a willing group of men and our record of recent years is one to be proud of.

The response has been nearly 100% at fires and drills and we feel that the townspeople at last realize they have a fine little department.

A survey has been taken of the available ponds and brooks in the districts outside the water mains and we know just where to go if any water is available.

We have installed two cement boxes of a depth to allow pumping in Stony Brook near the business district, which gives us a double source of water at all times. More of these will be installed in the outlying sections as the cost is low and it insures a supply of water where otherwise there would be insufficient depth to pump.

We are now well equipped with rubber clothes and new longer ladders have been added.

I feel we should have 500 feet of hose to allow for emergencies and replacements.

The hose house at Rocky Nook has been shingled and painted inside and is in very fair shape.

Engine house No. 1 needs painting and repairing inside and some few minor repairs,

The best way to fight fires is to stop them before they start and this can often be done by cleaning out the chimney each fall and by keeping all dangerous material away from fire.

Water Commissioners' Report

The Water Commissioners appointed by the Honorable Board of Selectmen to complete the unexpired term of 1927 caused by the resignation of the former Board of Water Commissioners submit the following report.

The first meeting of the new Board was held March 31, 1927, since which time meetings have been held on the fifteenth and last day of each month.

A general survey of the Water Department property was made soon after the Commissioners assumed office and the equipment and buildings in general were found to be in good condition.

Reservoir:— The condition of the Town water reservoir which was made the subject of investigation by a special committee authorized at the annual Town meeting in March 1927, whose report was accepted at a special Town meeting in May 1927, a copy of which was placed in the hands of the voters, describes the condition of the reservoir and offers a method of repair.

The Commissioners believe this to be the logical method of repair and will present a definite proposal for adoption at the next annual Town meeting.

Extensions and Maintainence:— An extension of 1200 ft. of 6 in. pipe from South St. along Wapping Road and a 6 in. line from the corner of Pembroke St. to the corner of South St., a distance of 3400 ft. to conform to the bounds of the new Wapping Road, have been completed under the supervision of Supt. Bird.

Both projects were completed by Department labor, the latter project being done for approximately \$1500.00 less than the appropriation the saving being due to favorable buying of pipe by the former Water Commissioners and a labor saving of approximately twenty-five cents per: foot under the lowest contract price.

The labor cost of trenching, laying pipe, setting hydrants and shutoffs and backfilling was approximately thirty-seven cents per foot for the entire 4600 ft. of pipe laid on Wapping Road.

The widening of Summer St. from the Railroad to Prouty's garage necessitated the relocation of five hydrants and all the curb boxes along this section and the renewal of service leads where necessary.

Approximately 2600 ft. of 6 in. pipe was cleaned in connection with this work.

The cost of Summer St. work including pipe cleaning was approximately \$1650.00.

Better cooperation of State Engineers in furnishing the Department with detailed prints showing grades and bounds of street improvements would enable the Department to furnish closer estimates on work of this character.

Hydrant and Service installation:— In addition to the above work there have been seven of the old type hydrants replaced by the new modern type and sixteen new services have been connected and two of the old service connections have been increased in size.

Power and Water consumption:— The Department was very fortunate in the matter of purchased power during the past year as very little electric power was used for pumping.

The minimum monthly consumption of water occurred in November when 6,044,000 gallons were pumped, the maximum monthly consumption of 8,628,000 gallons occurred in July and the maximum daily consumption occurred on June 10th, 409,000 gallons being pumped on that date which represents an average of 283 gallons per minute for 24 hours and since the maximum flow from our present well system is only 300 gallons per minute it can readily be seen that the time is approaching when additions to our present supply will become imperative. This fact is also emphasized by the increasing demand

for extensions of our system to supply new real estate developments.

The Commissioners feel that the time is approaching when competent talent should be employed to make a complete survey of our entire water system and recommend the proper proceedure to assure the Town an adequate supply of water for a long period of time.

Pipe cleaning:—There are at present approximately 17 miles of pipe in the system with 92 Department hydrants and 4 privately owned hydrants.

The condition of some of the older pipe is not all that could be desired as it has become partially choked with corrosion, the only remedy for this condition being to either clean or relay with new pipe.

Some cleaning has been done in the past which has materially relieved the condition and it is hoped that next year a systematic program of pipe cleaning can be started which will enable us to keep the mains in condition until the indebtedness of the Department has been reduced to a point where the laying of larger mains in the center of the Town may be undertaken.

New Work:— In connection with any future extensions the Commissioners desire to go on record at this time as opposed to any street main smaller than 6 in. pipe, as a smaller main will not provide satisfactory fire protection.

Insurance:— Accident insurance has been purchased which covers all Department labor and protects the Town in case of accident to any Department employee. The policy conforms to the requirements of the State workmen's compensation act.

Water analysis:— The State Board of Health requests samples of water for analysis at regular intervals which insures that our supply is kept pure, any disturbance of the pipe lines for repairs, extensions or service connections will cause discoloration of the water due to dislodged sediment on the interior of the pipe.

It is the desire of the Department that this disturbance be kept as small as possible but at such times as it becomes necessary, we ask your indulgence.

Forest Fires

We had very few Forest Fires during the year 1927 which I think is due in a great measure to the efforts of the Plymouth County Foresters Association, publishing persistently, the danger of fires that occur as a result of carclessness. We spent this year in forest fire work, \$537.55 divided as follows: Patrolling at dangerous times \$16.75, trimming woods roads, \$247.25, fighting fires \$205.25, new equipment \$56.60, supplies \$11.70. Money spent for patroling in dry times is well spent, and keeping the woods roads trimmed out so they are passable for fire patrol as well as for reaching a fire, is I think, a very important part of a forest warden's duty. We are asking that \$100.00 be appropriated for this work this year.

All owners of wood lands should carefully observe the law regarding the disposal of slash and brush after wood cutting, as this law is for the purpose of preventing the spread of forest fires.

During the session of 1927, an act was passed by the legislature that made the setting of fires in the open, unlawful at all times, without a written permit from the forest warden, unless the ground is substantially covered with snow.

Mr. Harold L. Cook has been appointed Forest Warden for the year of 1928, and I trust that every one will give him the same hearty cooperation in observing the law regarding fires in the open, and in aiding in extinguishing forest fires, that has always been given me.

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Kingston for the period from January 1 to December 31, 1927, and submit the following report thereon:—

The financial transactions of the town, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town, were examined and verified.

The books and accounts of Henry S. Everson, treasurer and collector of taxes from January 1, to September 16, 1927, had been examined and checked previously, a report of which was submitted on November 4, 1927.

The outstanding taxes of the levies of 1925 and 1926 were recommitted to Frank S. Randall, collector of taxes.

The books and accounts of these levies, together with the commitment of the levy of 1927, were examined and checked. The commitment books were footed and reconciled and the outstanding accounts were listed. A further verification of the outstanding accounts was made by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received it appears that the outstanding accounts, as listed, are correct.

The collector's cash books were added and checked in detail, and the payments to the treasurer were checked to the amounts as recorded on the treasurer's books. The abatements as recorded on the commitment books were checked with the assessor's records of abatements granted.

Deeds representing tax titles held by the town were examined and listed. It appears that the validity of a number of these deeds is questionable, and it is therefore recommended that the validity of all deeds be established.

Attention is called to Section 50, Chapter 60, as amended by Section 2, Chapter 126, Acts of 1927, relative to foreclosure of tax titles held by the town.

The books and accounts of Frank S. Randall, treasurer, from September 17 to December 31, 1927, were examined and checked in detail. The cash on hand was reconciled with statements furnished by the bank and with the pass books representing savings bank deposits.

The cash book was footed and the recorded receipts were analyzed and checked by a comparison with the records in the departments collecting money for the town and with the several sources from which money was paid into the treasury. The payments were checked with warrants approved by the selectmen authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds and also with the original bills on file.

The cancelled securities and coupons representing payments of debt and interest were examined and checked.

The accountant's lcdger was footed and analyzed, and the postings were checked to the books of original entry. The appropriations and transfers, as entered on the ledger, were checked to the town clerk's records.

The books and accounts of the collector of water rates were examined and checked. The commitment cards were footed and reconciled, and the outstanding accounts were listed. In checking the commitments to the accountant's ledger, it was found that the amounts reported were \$174.88 in excess of the detailed lists. It was also noted that abatements amounting to \$145.58 were entered on the cards in excess of the amount authorized by the Water Commissioners. It is recommended that, in the future, the cards representing the various charges be kept in the custody of the commissioners, that a detailed list be committed to the collector, and that no abatements be posted by the collector unless approved by the Water Commissioners.

The cash book was footed and the payments to the treasurer were checked to the amounts as recorded on the treasurer's books.

The records of dog and of hunting and fishing licenses issued by the town clerk were examined, and the payments to the county and state treasurers, respectively, were checked to the receipts on file.

The accounts of the scaler of weights and measures were examined and checked, the payments to the treasurer were checked, to the treasurer's books, and the cash on hand was verified by an actual count.

The various trust funds in the custody of the library trustees, the selectmen, and the treasurer were examined and checked. The securities and savings bank books were personally examined and the income and payments as recorded were verified.

For the courtesies extended and the assistance rendered by the various town officials during the audit, I

Report of Police Department

The past year has been a busy one in the department. As in many lines of work, unless one is actually engaged in it, it is difficult to realize how much there is being done.

An innovation this year was the "evening patrol" and judging from reports and results it was a paying proposition.

The dog situation has been a serious one in town the past year. Last spring rabies broke out and we have had one of the worst, if not the worst, epidemic in the history of the town. Since March 10, 1927 it has been necessary to kill 33 dogs many of which had a well developed case of rabies. Although several persons were attacked nothing more serious has developed than a few minor bites or scratches.

There have not been the usual number of arrests due to various causes, but we have not been able to carry on to the extent we would like, in fact it has been necessary to drop many cases on account of lack of funds. The past year it has been necessary to carry on more correspondence than ever before due primarily to infractions of the auto laws.

I often think General Sherman's remarks about "war" might well apply to the Policeman's lot where it is necessary to be "on call" 24 hours a day as happens in the small towns like ours.



Kingston World War Memorial

Early last Spring the plot around the World War Memorial was regraded and seeded. The weather which followed was particularly favorable and a splendid "catch" of grass resulted, so that by Memorial Day it was nicely grassed over.

On Memorial Day afternoon, at the conclusion of the annual Memorial service at the Town Green, the assembly proceeded to the World War Memorial where a dignified dedication was participated in by the G. A. R., American Legion, Spanish War Veterans, Sons of Veterans and the public. Mr. Fred A. Jenks of Plymouth delivered a brief but very impressive address. The band rendered several selections and provided an accompaniment for the School chorus under the direction of Mrs. Rose Blair Delano.

The expense of laying down the lawn was accomplished at a very low figure due to the interest of Sidney Brewer who did the work for us. Inasmuch as the band was participating in the afternoon exercises anyway, they were very willing to render the additional music in connection with the dedication without extra charge. The total expenses of regrading and laying down the lawn and dedication exercises were but \$27.65.

There is a balance of \$81.23 remaining in the Town Treasury against this fund and we are informed it is sufficient to do quite a credible evergreen landscape job at the back of the Memorial. Something of the sort is really needed to set it off well, but the Committee has hesitated about going ahead with the work feeling the Town might wish to authorize a more extensive piece of

work. The matter will be presented for your consideration at the next annual meeting.

Report of School Committee

Another school year has passed with very few changes taking place in our teaching corps. One teacher resigned in the high school, Mr. Holden taking the place of Mr. Loud.

We feel that the voters should be acquainted with the condition of the school buildings. Is it good policy to let repairs go over from one year to another, just because one can get by? It has to be done sometime, and work done at the right time saves money, time, and is more convenient. Would you in your own homes, allow conditions that exist in your schools, the home of your child?

The sanitary conditions in Maple Avenue and Howland's Lane Schools are bad and should be repaired to meet State requirements. In the High School one old toilet should be replaced, and four new flush tanks are necessary. The floors in the basement need to be painted, the walls and ceiling kalsomined. The High School needs one coat of paint on the outside, the wood on the old part being exposed to the weather. Maple Avenue School should be refinished inside.

We recommend that the Cobb and Howland's Lane Schools be wired, as there are times when light is a great help to the pupils.

The fences around school lots should be kept up, not only for looks but to keep the boys from annoying the neighbors. Just place yourself as living next to a school. Would you feel the necessity of a fence?

By a mutual agreement the town of Duxbury was allowed to withdraw from the Superintendency Union, and July 1, 1927, a new Union was formed with the four towns as formerly.

For the welfare of the children the dental hygiene work should be taken up again next year.

The Stony Brook School, being unfit for school work in more ways than one, has been turned over to the selectmen to dispose of.

The Faunce School, being centrally located and away from the roads of traffic should be retained for school work in the future.

During the summer, lights were installed in the Maple Avenue School, a gift of the pupils. Also a gift of a set of Encyclopedia Britannica was presented to the High School by Miss Ruth D. Northey, for which we are very grateful.

The committee wish to thank all who have helped the schools, and the Parent-Teachers Association for the support and financial assistance rendered the schools. particularly to the lunch room in the High School.

Superintendent's Report

1927

To the School Committee:

In submitting this, my third annual report, your attention is called to the outstanding items of interest of the year not as a matter of information, but rather as one of record, for the committee is conversant of all that has transpired within the year.

One of the noteworthy things is the small turnover in the teaching force, one resignation, as against seven in 1925, and four in 1926. In cases where the teacher is efficient, such continued service is a boon to the schools.

Also it is apparent that the present arrangement of grades in the various buildings is assisting greatly in raising the standard of work accomplished. This is particularly noticable with regard to the seventh and eighth grades and to those classes with a single grade in a room. This change has been effected since September, 1925, at which time there were six rooms in the town housing more than one grade, as against only two at the present

On the whole the schools have made excellent progress during the year. The chief unfavorable condition has been the necessity of operating with insufficient funds, due to a cut in the school budget as presented to the town by the committee. Supplies, equipment and building repairs have suffered, most noticeably in relation to sanitary requirements. I trust the committee will make a concerted move to convince the voters that such a condition is not for the best interest of the schools.

Kingston is not spending excessively for schools as the herewith comparison shows.

There were in 1926, nine towns in the state having a valuation from \$2,500.00 to \$3,000.00 with approximately equal school enrolments. Their rank, determined by the amount raised from local taxation per \$1,000 of valuation is as follows:

In addition to these, there are ten towns in the state whose valuations are all below \$2,500,000, that raise more per \$1,000 of valuation than Kingston.

I wish to supplement the report of the Principal of the High School, by again calling your attention to the letter submitted by the State Supervisor of High Schools to the committee during the year, in relation to additions to the teaching force of this school.

Mr. Morse, the Supervisor at that time, advised two more teachers, and that there must be one more before he could give his approval to the organization of the school.

There being no funds whatever available for such additions, your superintendent made arrangements with Bridgewater Normal School to have a young man who is finishing the four year course at Normal School, take his practical training work in the high school here. This solved the difficulty for the first sixteen weeks of the school year, but as there are no more Normal Students available, we are back in the position we started from in September.

The registration of the high school is the highest in its history and shows no indication of dropping. If we are to continue as a "Class A" school, provisions will eventually have to be made for an adequate teaching force.

HELPFUL AGENCIES

Under this heading I wish to note the support accorded our schools by the Parent-Teachers Association. To this Loyal body of women is due our sincere appreciation for much substantial support and encouragement. The schools could ask no better guarantee for progress than that of the enrolment of every parent in this association.

A SUGGESTION

What Should the School Teach?

First, as a mechanical proposition, the school should teach all pupils to read, write and figure well enough to meet the requirements of modern life. In reading, this would mean the ability to get thought from the pages of the newspaper, the magazine and the best books of current literature.

However, the ability to understand the thought alone, is not education. The education of an individual is judged by his reactions to thoughts gleaned in reading, contact and observation.

The mere power to read is mechanical, but the power to react in a reflective way to the impressions gained by reading, contact and observation, is the test of education. The able teacher is continually assisting the pupil to think, to reflect, to resolve his thoughts and feelings into reasonable conclusions. Such a teacher conceives education to be the instrument by which a pupil's life will be made most useful to himself and to the community. No person is well educated unless able to attain a comfortable living for himself and at the same time give a surplus of time and service to the community.

Learning does not mean education. Many college graduates are failures. A brain filled with facts does not

guarantee power to think. Many men without learning are successful. The primary function of the school is to teach the pupil to THINK.

The above suggestions have to do principally with the so called cultural and academic aspect of education. I believe the Kingston schools are carrying on this kind of education in a highly efficient manner.

Report of Supervisor of Music and Drawing

To the Superintendent of Schools:

MUSIC—A decided improvement is shown in this subject this year.

Every year there is seen an improvement in the ability of children to read, also to sing with more intelligence and interest. This is surely the result of careful work by the teachers in charge. Most of them realize more each year the importance of much individual work with pupils.

In all grades may be heard beautiful tone. This, I think was partly proved when the Cobb School gave their concert in November, the tones sounding like violin, high and sweet.

Mrs. Cushing, in charge of the Junior High music is working on a cantata to be given in January. It has been remarkable to notice the quickness with which these boys and girls have read and learned the cantata, showing, too, the appreciation they have gained of good music and the ability to group the idea of interpreting a story through music.

Several concerts and musical entertainments will be given before spring, the children in this way having an opportunity to appear in public and also show what they are doing in their music.

DRAWING—It is very encouraging to notice throughout all the schools the interest taken in drawing.

In high school, outside the freshman who are obliged to take drawing, we have never had so large a class, there being several from each of the other classes. In this group we have finished a study in free hand drawing showing interesting results.

Several are now working in charcoal drawing and there will be studies in pastel and water color.

In the grades the children are working along the same lines in a simple way. They make sketches from still life, also of each other.

At first some of these would seem pretty crude, but often if one has any imagination or vision in this direction, one may discover talent where it is least expected.

In all this work it is possible to teach most of them to draw a little, and some remarkably well. When children get the idea to some extent they love to draw and should be encouraged to practice at home.

There are many children in these schools with extraordinary talent and if they are helped and interested may find their work in the future lying in this direction.

Report of School Physician

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The examinations for this year have shown no marked difference from those of the previous year, although there are a few things which might be mentioned.

Occasionally a case of pediculosis has been seen, but these cases are not as frequent as they have been, and prompt steps were taken for treatment.

Throat examinations showed nothing alarming. There were some cases in which tonsillectomy was advised, undoubtedly the report of the school nurse will give an accurate statement as to the number treated in this manner.

Posture this year was about on a par with that of last year. Although posture may not seem of much import to some, yet it does have some bearing on the general health of an individual, and also a good posture conveys a better impression.

There were fewer cases of enlarged glands this year and a noticeable improvement was observed in some that were reported last year.

There was a marked increase in the number of pupils who had enlarged cervical glands. This condition is one which arises, as a rule, secondary to an infection which drains through the lymphatic circulation to those glands in the neck. Infected tonsils, pediculosis, ear infection, infection of the scalp, infectious fevers and tubercular extensions are among the causes of such a condition.

There has been no epidemic of contagion, although a number of whooping cough cases have been reported. One case of Infantile paralysis was reported but fortunately there were no other cases.

I wish to thank those who are associated with and cooperated in the school health work.

Report of School Nurse

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The annual report of the activities carried on under my supervision are as follows:

I assisted Dr. H. G. Briggs, School Physician, in the physical examination of all school children, which was completed October 5. Up to date there are 514 children in the Kingston schools. A large percent of cervical glands were found in the lower grades, and six cases of thyroid glands were found in the upper grades.

Swollen glands or enlarged gland condition found in children is attributed to milk. Mr. Edgar Keene who has served the schools faithfully for four years will have a tested herd after January first, thus eliminating any further trouble or criticism from that source.

Weighing and measuring of all pupils up to the Junior High has been done four times during the school year.

All children entering school the past fall were vaccinated during the summer. Fifty calls were made in relation to vaccinations, thus eliminating the trouble of sending the children home after entering school. The parents showed much interest and cooperation in this matter.

Nutrition work is carried on with good results, mid morning milk being served to the under weights, also to many children staying to lunch, all showing much improvement. Ten dollars has been given for free milk by one of the parents interested in the work. It was greatly appreciated. The free nutrition is carried on from the proceeds of the Christmas Seal Sale of 1926, which was \$85.00.

A rest rom has been fitted up in the high school building. A cot, mattress, pillow, blankets and table has been donated by people interested in the rest room. A kotex machine has also been installed.

Straws have been purchased for the use of the lower grades by the P. T. A. The school census was completed October 31, finding over five hundred children between the ages of five and sixteen, and about twenty-five not yet five but who will be able to enter school next fall.

There has been no epidemic of contagious diseases the past year. There were twenty one cases of Chicken Pox from January to March, 1927. The cases were scattered and at no time were the schools closed.

The children show much interest in their school work, and I feel that this is due to better health. The attendance has been better, owing to the truancy work done.

All schools have been visited twice each week during the school year. In this way I keep in touch with the teachers and children. Home calls are made from the teacher's report of those out sick.

Eight tonsil cases have been cared for at the Jordan Hospital Clinic.

Two eye case were sent to Dr. J. H. Shaw's Free Clinic. Four eye cases were fitted to glasses by Mr. J. P. Farrington.

- 21 Cases of Chicken Pox.
- 6 Enlarged Thyroid Glands.
- 1 Scarlet Fever.
- 1 Infantile Paralysis.
- 2 Whooping Cough.
- 2 Impetigo.
- 6 Pediculosis have been reported.

The cooperation of the Superintendent, the school committee and the teachers make the work seem worth while. I appreciate the help and cooperation of the Board of Health, the Red Cross, Parent-Teachers Association, teachers and parents.

Senior and Junior High Report

To the Superintendent of Schools:

In this report I should like to comment briefly upon the fact that this year the Senior High School has the largest enrollment in its history, there being 121 pupils enrolled, an increase of 14 over last year.

One of the projects of the Senior and Junior High this year has been starting a school library. It is a well-Known fact that an up-to-date reference library is almost, if not quite, as important as up-to-date text books. During the year the school has purchased a set of INTERNATIONAL ENCYCLOPEDIA, 9 books, a set of AMERICAN HISTORY, 15 volumes, and POPULAR SCIENCE, 15 volumes. This is only the beginning of an up-to-date reference library and it is hoped that means can be found to add other much needed books.

As a result of experiences last year, the method of presenting certain subjects in the Junior High has been changed. This experiment seems to be showing very favorable results.

May I call the attention of parents, once more, to the fact that pupils who intend to continue their schooling, after completeing their high school course, must make a choice very early in the school course and must do their work in such a way as to maintain a "B" or better grade in order to be entitled to a certificate. The corollary to the preceeding proposition is that parents should see to it that pupils do their home work faithfully. This applies to both the Junior and Senior High School.

I should like to take this opportunity to thank the people of the community for the many courtesies they have extended to me during the year.
