Voted: That the town elect a Playground Commission consisting of five persons, two to serve for one year, two to serve for two years, and one to serve for three years, and annually thereafter as the terms of office expires the members shall be elected for a term of three years.

This matter is in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chap. 41, Section 1, (last paragraph) the article in the warrant reads otherwise but inasmuch as the subject matter is before the town for action the above motion will be valid if so voted.

Voted—That the treasurer be authorized to borrow money with the approval of a majority of the board of Selectmen in anticipation of taxes, such money to be paid from receipts of the current year.

Voted—To pay compensation, Medical and Hospital bills for Guido Traverso.

Voted—That the town accept the provisions of Section 4 and 5 of Chapter 143 of the General Laws relating to construction and location of buildings.

Voted—That the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,300.00 for the rebuilding of Howland's Lane in accordance with the decree of the County Commissioners No. 796 recorded with the town clerk, the damages to be paid by the County of Plymouth, the work to be carried out under the direction of the Selectmen.

Voted—That the town raise and appropriate \$27.00 to pay the persons named below the amount set against their respective names as follows: Leo M. Murphy \$5.00, Peter Winter \$5.00, Walter E. Baker, \$10.00, Freeman's Auto Express \$1.25, Plymouth Electric Light Co. \$3.75, Edgar W. Loring \$2.00.

Voted—That the sum of \$1,275.00 be appropriated for the Assessor's Salaries and expenses. Salary of each \$350. Expense \$200, and for Chairman 25.00.

Voted—That the sum of \$1,500 be appropriated for Specials Repairs of the Town Hall the work to be carried out under the direction of the Selectmen.

Voted—That the Town amend the original motion as made by adding thereto the sum of \$100.00 so as to read as amended that the town appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the maintenance of the Town Hall, not including the care of the Town Green and Memorial plot.

Voted—That the sum of \$400.00 be added so as to read \$1,500 for Special Repairs to Town Hall.

Voted—That the School Committee be reduced from 6 members to 5 members, effective March 1931 by electing but one member for the term of three years.

Voted—That the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the relaying of the water main on Howland's Lane necessitated by the proposed reconstruction of said Howland's Lane as laid out by the County Commissioners under decree 796.

Voted—That the sum of \$125.00 be appropriated for the Town Green and Memorial plot.

Voted—That the sum of \$4,500.00 of excess in unappropriated cash be appropriated for the use of the Assessors to aid in reducing the tax levy of the current year.

Voted—That the by-laws be referred to the Finance Committee for consideration and report.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING. At the Reed Community Building on Wednesday the twenty-first day of May, 1930 at 8 o'clock.

Then met the inhabitants of the town qualified to vote in town affairs. The meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock P. M.

Moderator Harold J. Weston asked all present to rise and devote one minute in silent prayer, tribute to the late Edgar Reed, of Worcester, Mass., donor of the Reed Community Building to the town of Kingston.

The following votes were passed:

That the town authorize and instruct the Board of Water Commissioners to employ the services of an Engineer to make a survey of the town water system and recommend the best method of increasing the supply, the report to be made at a special town meeting to be held not later than thirty days from the date of the above mentioned town meeting, and that the town appropriate and transfer from the Reservoir Repairs Account a sum not exceeding \$600.00 for this purpose.

Voted—That the town authorize its moderator and Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee of three to make a study of the matter of zoning the town.

In the passing of our fellow townsman the late Walter H. Faunce, Kingston has lost an able, honest, and upright citizen. Mr. Faunce was born within sight of the dwelling wherein he last lived nearly a century ago. From early life he was closely connected with the affairs of his native town, represented the town in the general court for two terms and on different occasions the County of Plymouth as a County Commissioner, for many years as a Selectman and assessor for the last fifty years, serving as chairman for the major portion of the same.

The successive honors given Mr. Faunce covering such period by the people who knew him best speaks far more eloquently than any eulogy.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING. At Reed Community Building on Thursday July 31, 1930 at 8 o'clock P. M.

Then met the inhabitants of the town qualified to vote in town affairs. The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Harold J. Weston at 8 o'clock P. M.

Voted—That there be appropriated the sum of \$6,000, for the purchase and installation of a pump and necessary equipment for the purpose of increasing the water supply of the town, and to meet said appropriation the treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen be and hereby is authorized to borrow the sum of \$6,000, and to issue notes of the town therefor said notes to be payable in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44 Section 19 of the General Laws, so that the whole Loan shall be paid in not more than five (5) years from the date of the issue of the first note, or at such earlier date as the Treasurer and Selectmen may determine.

This required a two-third vote 41 voting in affirmative, 15 voting in Negative.

Voted—That there be appropriated the sum of \$735.50 to be expended by the highway surveyor for resurfacing and draining by the construction of catch basin and underground pipes connecting with an existing catch basin on Main Street a portion of Evergreen Street beginning at its intersection with Main Street and to provide for the payment thereof that \$500, be transferred from the balance now in the appropriation made for sidewalk construction, and that \$235.50 be transferred from the balance now in the appropriation made for the construction of Pembroke Street.

Voted—That a Committee of three consisting of Harry L. Tilton, George F. Sever, Edward E. Bird be appointed to act in conjunction with the Water Board for purpose of carrying out Art. 1.

Report of the Selectmen

At the annual town meeting March 1, 1930, the following were elected to the office of Selectmen and Board of Health and Board of Public Welfare:

These departments organized on the evening of March 4th, 1930, as follows:

Chairman Board of Health: Frank L. Armstrong
Chairman Board of Public Welfare: John T. Smith

These three boards having the same personnel meet at the Selectmen's office in the Town Hall on Tuesday evening of each week. In order to take care of the increasing demands made on these departments, especially the Selectmen and Welfare Board, frequent special meetings are held as occasion requires. During the past year many visitations and investigations had to be made by all of the Boards about town, as well as trips outside the town.

STATE ACCOUNTING SYSTEM. This system has been in operation in Kingston for practically four years and has proved itself an efficient method of handling the accounts of the Town. The total cost of the system to date amounts to \$4606.91, or an average over the four years of \$1152.20 per year.

Roland Bailey, Town Accountant, is at the Town Hall each week day afternoon.

Frank A. Randall, Treasurer and Tax Collector, is at the Town Hall, Tuesday evening, and Wednesday and Saturday afternoons.

STREET LIGHTING. At the present time there are in use in town 121-60 C. P. street lamps, at a yearly cost

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Frank A. Randall, Treasurer and Tax Collector, is at the Town Hall, Tuesday evening, and Wednesday and Saturday afternoons.

STREET LIGHTING. At the present time there are in use in town 121-60 C. P. street lamps, at a yearly cost

of \$20 each, for a total of \$2420 annually. There are 2-100 C. P. lamps at \$22 each, and 2-600 C. P. lamps at \$70 each, for a total of \$209. This makes a grand total for lighting the town of \$2629 for the year. The Selectmen have received petitions from citizens in various parts of the town requesting additional lights, and after careful study it is recommended that 10-60 C. P. street lamps be installed during 1931, at an additional cost annually of \$200. This would bring the total for street lights in 1931 to \$2829, which appears to the Selectmen an entirely warranted increase if proper street lighting is to be afforded our citizens.

STATE AID. The amount of money required to take care of our State Aid cases is \$216, and present indications are that this amount will be sufficient in 1931 to care for the three cases now being carried in the department. This amount is reimbursed to the Town by the State.

SOLDIERS' RELIEF. During 1930 there was paid out \$206.98 from this account, and in making these payments the Selectmen adhered to the same rules in determining the amount to be paid each claimant as are followed in making payments through the Board of Public Welfare.

HOWLAND'S LANE. The Town voted to appropriate \$4500 for the rebuilding of Howland's Lane at the annual town meeting in March, 1930, in accordance with the decree of the County Commissioners, No. 796, recorded with the Town clerk, all damages to be paid by the County of Plymouth, and the work to be carried out under the supervision of the Selectmen. The contract was advertised and let to Otis R. Mann, of Hanover, Mass., for \$3650. When the work of re-building the street was completed the Selectmen deemed it advisable to protect certain dangerous edges by building a side-walk. It was found that this work could be done more economically and speedily while the contractor's equipment was still on the job, and therefore the Selectmen awarded Mr.

Mann a further contract for \$300 to do this work. Through the cooperation of the New Haven Railroad the bridge was widened, the fence moved and an exceedingly dangerous point on this road was made safe for both motor and foot travel. On account of the grade being raised at the approach to the bridge the property of one abutter was left in such condition as to be practically inaccessible, which necessitated an expenditure of \$50 to correct this situation. The dangerous approach from Main street to Howland's Lane was remedied by altering and removing buildings. Other expenses, including engineer, advertising, etc., brought the total up to \$4268.33, leaving a balance in the appropriation of \$31.67.

TOWN HALL. At the annual town meeting in March, 1930, the town voted to appropriate \$1500 for special repairs to the Town Hall, this work to be done under the direction of the Selectmen. Bids were advertised for and the contract was awarded to George W. Smith & Son, of Whitman, Mass., the lowest bidder, for \$1083. This work was done according to specifications drawn up by the Selectmen. When the work was completed according to these specifications the Selectmen deemed it advisable to make other repairs and the Smith company was awarded a further contract to carry out the additional work, which amounted to \$302. Certain repairs to the plumbing were made at a cost of \$45.70, together with incidental expenses of \$22.95. The total expenditures amounted to \$1453.65, leaving a balance in the appropriation of \$46.35.

The wisdom of the town in making this special appropriation for repairs to the Town Hall has been reflected in the increased use of the building by the town's people. During 1930 the total receipts from the letting of the Town Hall amounted to \$406, as against receipts of \$40 in 1929. When it is considered that the Town Hall houses the offices of the Selectmen, Board of Public Welfare, Board of Health, Assessors, Town Treasurer

and Collector, Town Accountant, Finance Committee, and storage of the town property, it would appear to be too valuable a building to allow to deteriorate. At the present time, since the special repairs have been completed it presents an attractive appearance both outside and inside, and should be kept so. The roof ought to be shingled as soon as possible and the Selectmen recommend an appropriation for that purpose at the next town meeting.

STREET SIGNS. The Selectmen feel that the present street signs should be kept in repair and are recommending a small appropriation for this purpose.

OLD BURYING GROUND. The Old Burying Ground which is in charge of the Selectmen is each year attracting an increasing number of visitors, all of whom have been unstinted in their praise of its well kept appearance. During 1930 two employees were kept constantly at work, the expense of which amounted to \$971.70. The money for this work is derived from the Lucy Prince Ames Fund which affords a net income of from \$900 to \$1000 per year.

TOWN GREEN AND MEMORIAL PLOT. These two plots are beauty spots of the town and during the past year well taken care of under the direction of William M. Post, at a total expense of \$125, which was the amount of the appropriation made for this purpose at the last town meeting.

WILLIS FUND. Established by William Henry Willis, a former Kingston citizen, the income from this fund is used for the benefit of the poor children of the town. While the distribution of the income of this fund is under the direct charge of the chairman of the board of Selectmen, valuable assistance in determining those who are to receive the money has been rendered by Miss Emma J. Mange, school nurse and Mrs. Margaret B. Lyman, secretary of the Board of Public Welfare. During 1930 the amount expended was \$292.46.

SUPPRESSION OF CRIME. The appropriation for this purpose made at the town meeting in March, 1930, was \$1500, of which \$1401.83 was spent, leaving a balance of \$98.17. These expenditures include salaries, mileage, etc. The present police force comprises seven men. The Selectmen feel that present conditions do not warrant their recommending the adoption of Section 97 of Chapter 41 of the General Laws which provides for the establishment of a regular police department.

Report of Board of Health

The year 1930 was marked by no epidemics or unusual health disturbances.

The Board has an outstanding claim of uncertain amount on account of a case in Fall River, Mass., having a Kingston settlement, which settlement expired in September 1930. No bill was presented for this case during the financial year of the town. The Board made an investigation last spring and found that the case was still in the hospital at Fall River, and after careful deliberation deemed it wise to allow the case to remain, until expiration of the settlement when the town would be absolved of any further liability. It is quite likely that the town will be called upon to make a payment in connection with this case in the near future. As it now stands the Board does not feel it expedient to ask for an appropriation because of the uncertainty of the final amount that may be demanded.

The appropriation made at the March meeting in 1930 for the Board of Health was \$1500, and of this sum there was expended \$1053.31. Notwithstanding there was a substantial balance left in this appropriation the Board feels that \$1500 should be appropriated for carrying on the work of this department in 1931.

While the attention of the citizens of the town repeatedly has been called to the fact that we have a town dump at the top of Stony Brook Hill, which is open twice a week, Wednesdays and Saturdays from 8 A. M. to 5 P. M., and that all waste material is supposed to be disposed of at this location, certain citizens persist in dumping their waste matter wherever they see fit. As a result of this promiscuous dumping by certain people some very unsightly spots have made their appearance about town. Such dumping constitutes a trespass, and if evidence can be secured prosecution will follow. To se-

cure evidence sufficient to bring these persons into court is exceedingly hard to procure, and for that reason the Board urges that anyone knowing of persons who are making a practice of dumping waste material in unauthorized places submit same to the Board.

The dental clinic for the school children, which amounts to about \$200 per year, was continued in 1930. The Board feels that this is a valuable work, and that the school children are greatly benefited by it.

In October 1929, the Board adopted a regulation relative to the emptying and cleaning cesspools, designed to prevent the further annoyance of adjacent property owners. Notwithstanding this regulation many complaints were received this year of abuses in this connection, and numerous calls on offending persons had to be made by the Board. It is very important that all persons contemplating emptying or cleaning cesspools familiarize themselves with this regulation that further trouble on this score be avoided.

The Board again calls the attention of milk producers to the regulation adopted in 1929, effective May 31, 1930, and extended to become finally effective in October 1, 1930, that all milk produced should be from tuberculin tested cows, or otherwise be pasteurized.

Report of Fire Department

For a slight expense a small pump could be attached, this would give us a fine piece that could operate where the large pump could not.

It would be of great help aiding your forest fire department, as well as the more distant parts of the town where small streams and wells are the only means of water supply.

I have asked the town for a small appropriation for this item and sincerely hope it will be granted.

We have been fortunate in having no large fire loss, also wish to commend the town upon their cooperation in the care of their chimneys and the resultant drop in chimney fires. Let us keep up the good work.

Report of Forest Warden 1930

When we responded to ninety-nine calls with the forest fire apparatus in 1929, between March 12 and September 4, it was a record at that time, but that record was broken in 1930 with one hundred and thirty-six calls, the first on February 15 and the last on December 10.

There were seventy separate and distinct fires over this period, eleven Sundays and Holidays patrolled as a preventative measure, and the other fifty-five were second or more visits to fires which were burning underground due to the extremely dry weather.

Even with all these fires and the dry weather also against us, there was very little acreage burned over. The largest fire was less than three acres, one other less than two acres, and the balance all under one acre.

Mr. Paul Po in charge of the tower at Monks Hill continued his good work in 1930. In many instances he called us giving exact location of fires when they were hardly fifty feet in diameter. One instance in particular was on Sunday, May 4, at 4:20 P. M. when he called and said there was a fire in back of the West End Garage. We responded and found a small but hot fire burning in the pine grove right where he said it was. The peculiar thing about it all was that neighbors within one hundred yards of the fire had not noticed it.

At another time he reported a fire in the south end of the town which we went to and extinguished, a fire so small that a man plowing in a field at the edge of the woods less than one hundred yards away had not noticed it at all.

For such careful watch and knowledge of location Mr. Po should be given considerable credit, for it is undoubt-

edly in a large measure due to him that there were no large fires this year.

The Town Dump on Stony Brook Hill which caught fire on August 18 was allowed to burn and continued to burn until the last of November. This has for years been a menace and has caused your warden considerable worry. It is now burned clean and it will not be very hard to keep it burned.

Again this fall we cut out several old roads to help us in driving apparatus direct to the fire. How much this helps has been proved by the fact that we have been able to drive our forest truck with its water supply very close to every fire this year.

I hope that the town will see fit this year to appropriate the usual one hundred dollars to continue the cutting out of these abandoned roads, as we still have a considerable area left through which there are no roads that are passable.

Report of Board of Public Welfare

At the annual March Election of Town Officers, 1930, John T. Cushman, Frank L. Armstrong and John T. Smith were elected to serve you for the ensuing year. Immediately thereafter, your Board organized and John T. Smith was chosen Chairman.

From the experience of the preceeding year in properly handling the various calls and visitations, and the necessity of keeping in touch with recipients at all times, covering a territory from one end of the Town to the other, as well also, of the many accounts and files, it was recommended by the Chairman, that Mrs. Margaret B. Lyman be appointed Secretary and Visitor, and after discussion, Mrs. Lyman was appointed. The results obtained proved very gratifying and your Board feels justified in having made the experiment and in the choice of Mrs. Lyman. The work of the Department covering every week of the year requires many miles of travel, many investigations, and a large correspondence, so that the moneys entrusted to the Department be conserved, and to prevent any fraud or scandal in the disposition of the funds.

Twenty-four families of one hundred and four members have been cared for wholly or in part during the past year. Seven of the families have settlements in neighboring Towns, seven have no settlements in this Commonwealth, and ten have Kingston settlements. The cost of the first two classes has been charged to the several Towns and the Commonwealth, and will be returned in due course to the Town treasury; the cost of the latter class is bourn by Kingston.

Two individuals having no settlement in any Town, have been aided; one entirely until her decease in Sep-

tember; the other coming on in December. Ten individuals having Kingston settlements have been cared for wholly from the time coming on. Five of the above have been boarded out and five caring for themselves in their own habitation. Two individuals of this class owing to the nature of the ailments requiring more or less medical attention at an unusual expense, were admitted to the State Infirmary the latter part of December. Your Department considered these cases institutional.

Two children cared for in an institution during 1929 and a part of 1930, have been removed and are now off the list.

One family having no settlement in any Town and cared for by your Department for a considerable period went off the list in October; this family being unwilling to conform to the rules of the Department of Aid and Relief, State House, Boston, Mass.

The usual number of applications for aid by able-bodied men with families dependent upon them came in a month earlier than common, and November and December proved to be very busy months with expenditures exceptionally heavy.

There are four cases cared for by our Department consisting of families deserted by the fathers who are now in parts unknown. All the above cases have no Kingston settlement and around \$3000, will be required for the same during 1931.

The 1930 appropriation for your Department was \$12000, 116 individuals have been cared for wholly or in part during the year at an expenditure of \$10614.45, with a few claims outstanding consisting of small amounts owed to neighboring Towns for care of families having Kingston settlements and for which no bills have been submitted during our financial year. By estimation the above claims will not exceed \$200. Raising \$5000, of the amount expended will be returned to the treasury; this would indicate that our own welfare Department cases

cost around \$6000. Assuming that the population of Kingston is 2500, around \$2.40 has been expended for each individual; which amount is low compared with other Town expenditures.

During 1931, your Department proposes to carry on the work along the same lines as followed during the past year; it proposes to keep in touch with the health, living conditions, income and expenditures of the persons or families aided; it does not propose to allow imposition. When the visitor or any member of the Board makes inquiry as to earnings or expenditures, truthful answers are required. In all these cases, where aid is given, the same is based upon the facts disclosed by the applicant or recipient, and in all cases where the applicant or recipient is allowed aid by fraudulent disclosures, he or she has committed larceny by false pretense and may be dealt with accordingly.

The outlook for 1931, based upon our present expenditures, will call for an appropriation of \$13000, this increase being made necessary by the increased expenditures on account of families having settlements in other Towns or for unsettled cases. It is estimated that nearly \$7000 will be required for these cases during 1931.

Another new Department within the Welfare Department becomes operative on July 1, 1931, namely, "Old Age Assistance." This must be conducted as a separate Department. As your Department has no information at this time of the number of people over seventy years, having resided in Massachusetts for more than twenty years, without means or having no parent or child of sufficient means who may be liable for such support, cannot give anything more than an estimate. Assuming that there are ten people residing in Kingston eligible for the benefits of the statute, it would require around \$2000, to care for the same during the last half of the year. It is desired that all persons residing in Kingston and who fairly come within the statutory requirements, to apply to the Welfare Department within the first half

of the year, so that your Department may have a complete list of all persons eligible when the statute takes effect.

Report of Highway Department

At our annual Town Meeting there was appropriated \$10,000, for General Highway expenses.

It would seem unnecessary for me to give an itemized report on the expenditures for the year, as the Town Accountant gives us a full report.

From this \$10,000, about \$7,000, of this has been paid out for labor, salary and truck hire; \$2200, for tar, oil, dust layer, patching material, and repairs on trucks. The balance has been used for gravel, insurance, gas and oil, inspecting of boilers, paint, fencing, tools and other accessories.

This year, the same as last, we started our work very early owing to the number of men being out of work.

We have gravelled on the following streets, West, Grove, Lake, School, Winter, Pine, Brookdale Ave., and the Parting Ways road, this road has been very much neglected and needs more repairs.

Some improvements were made on Winter St., Pond St., Center and Cross Sts., Elm St., May Ave., Smith's Lane and East Avenue.

We also did considerable gravelling at Rocky Nook Park and the Point, as well as some repair work on Main St.

In addition to this we do scraping, raking and carting off of stone, which is safe to say has cost the Town about \$400.00.

Then we have the getting out of sand for covering the oil and tar applied to our roads.

It was my intention to get one line of sidewalk through Town to the Plymouth line, but owing to the fact that the poles on the Easterly side of the road were practically in the middle of the sidewalk, did not think it advisable to do any repairs on that side until such a time when our Selectmen could have the poles moved. This should be done so repairs could be made next year.

Having been my fourth term as Treasurer and Tax Collector for the Town of Kingston, I feel that a report showing the progress that has been made in this brief term of time should be made, and herewith submit the following:

On September 16, 1927 I was appointed by the Board of Selectmen to collect whatever taxes that might be due the Town of Kingston. This I proceeded to do according to the law, the method being new to the minority of taxpayers (who intend to pay as little as possible) and the Collector was the subject of much criticism. This storm had only cleared away when the State enacted the Excise Tax on Motor Vehicles. This law went into effect without any too much notice being given to it and when collections were made there was more criticism.

The following table will show the increases and decreases covering the period from December 31, 1925 to December 31, 1930.

It will be noted that the salary of these offices has remained the same while both the expenses and the work has increased.

The outstanding taxes have been reduced from an amount of \$39,500.23 covering 5 years of outstanding to \$37,505.32, covering only 2 years outstanding. This is a reduction of only about \$2000.00, but it should be remembered that we have been passing through a period of depression and unemployment and for this reason I realize that the tax payer should be granted more time to make his payments. There is however a limit to the extensions that may be granted by the collector as he is governed by statute law, and bonded to faithfully perform his duties. The ideal form of collection is where one tax is paid before the next tax becomes due, thus everyone pays at least one tax a year regardless of whether it is the current year or the tax of the previous year. This is the object that I have been working for and I think that the reduction of the outstanding from five years to two years in such a brief period of time justifies my effort.

By further study of the tabulation one will find that in 1926 the number of bills and checks totaled 3446 items.

while in 1930 the number was 8665 or over two and one half (2½) times the 1926 number.

By dividing the total cost of the department by the number of items it will be found that the item cost in 1926 was 44 cents, while in 1930 the item cost was only 22 cents or a reduction of 50%. You will also note that the collection hours have been increased 260% in 1930 over the 1926 hours.

These figures are submitted to you in the hope that you will find space in the annual town report to reprint them in order that the tax payer may see the progress that has been made, with the result that more cooperation between the collector and the tax payer may be secured.

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the accounts of the town of Kingston for the year ending December 31, 1930, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44 of the General Laws. This report is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Edward H. Fenton, Chief Accountant of this Division.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the accounts of the town of Kingston for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1930, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions of the town, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town, were examined and checked with the books of the town accountant.

The books and accounts of the accounting department were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were compared with the treasurer's books and with the records of the departments collecting money for the town, while the payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants.

The ledger accounts were analyzed, the footings and postings were verified, a trial balance was taken off, and a balance sheet, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town as of December 31, 1930.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were checked with the records in the several departments collecting money for the town, with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, and with the accountant's books. The payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds.

The cash book was footed, the receipts were analyzed, the cash on hand was verified by an actual count of cash in the office and the bank balance was reconciled with a statement furnished by the Plymouth National Bank of Plymouth.

The payments on account of debt and interest were verified and checked with the cancelled securities on file.

A table showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash is appended to this report.

The books and accounts of the town collector were examined and checked. The commitments of taxes of the 1930 levy, together with the several commitments of motor vehicle excise taxes, were analyzed. The commitment lists were proved, the cash books were footed, the abatements were checked to the assessors' record of abatements granted, the postings in the commitment book were checked to the cash book entries, the payments to the treasurer were compared with the treasurer's cash book, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved. The levies of 1927, 1928, and 1929 were also examined and checked, the outstanding accounts for 1928

and 1929 being listed and proved with the ledger accounts.

The outstanding accounts were further verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The town collector's books and accounts of water collections were examined in detail. The commitment lists were analyzed, the abatements were checked to the record of abatements granted, the payments to the treasurer were verified by a comparison with the treasurer's cash book, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

A list of all abatements granted by the water commissioners should be furnished to the town collector as well as the town accountant.

Summary tables showing the condition of the several tax levies and water accounts have been prepared and are appended to this report.

The record of tax titles on hand and the additions thereto made during the current year, as well as of all tax titles acquired in 1930, were examined and checked. The deeds on file in the office of the treasurer were compared with the accountant's ledger accounts and all redemptions were verified.

The records of accounts receivable of the several departments were checked in detail, the commitments were proved, the payments to the treasurer were verified, and the outstanding accounts were listed.

It is recommended that the board of selectmen keep a detailed record of all licenses granted showing the fees charged for the various licenses.

The accounts of the sealer of weights and measures and of the library were examined and checked. The payments to the treasurer were checked with the treasurer's cash book and the cash on hand was verified by an actual count.

The town clerk's records of dog and of sporting licenses were examined, the payments to the county were verified with receipts on file, and the cash on hand was verified by an actual count.

It has been the custom of the town clerk to charge and retain for himself a fee for issuing certain licenses, but the statutory authority for such a charge is questioned.

The various trust funds in the custody of the library trustees, of the trustees of the Ichabod-Washburn Fund, and of the town treasurer were examined in detail. The securities and savings bank books were examined and listed and the income, as recorded, was verified.

The surety bonds of the treasurer, town collector, town clerk, and trustees of trust funds for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

For the courtesy and co-operation received from the various officials during the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

To the Citizens of the Town of Kingston:

Your School Committee is required by the General Laws of Massachusetts to "Annually make a detailed report of the condition of the public schools, containing such statements or suggestions relative thereto as it considers necessary or proper." For this purpose the Committee requires from the Superintendent of Schools a report which covers the work in all branches of the School Department. It is customary and proper to submit here, in full, the reports to the Superintendent, which complete his report to the Committee.

The sudden death of Mr. Parker came as a sad shock to the Department and it is fitting that we should retain the memory of his service in our schools.

In the High School there has been a change of principalship. Mr. Merrill gave his best for many years. He turned over to Mr. Burrill a school of Class "A" rating and acceptable to the College Entrance Examination Board.

Another change which may be mentioned is that of the janitor for the High and Maple Avenue Schools. It is now arranged so that a janitor will be on these premises and subject to call throughout the school day. This arrangement should operate for the greater safety and comfort of pupils and teachers.

The Superintendent of Schools is the executive officer of the Department and he is employed for his special training and experience in educational matters. The School Committee is of necessity dependent to a very great extent upon his recommendations. It is obvious that a new Superintendent will bring in new and different ideas of school administration. His recommendations to the Committee should enable the members to look at the Department from a different angle, which is wise and helpful.

Such a change in our school system shows us that we have much room for improvement in our methods of instruction. This is largely apparent in the case of text books and reference books. Many of these should be replaced and brought up to date. Other new educational equipment has been required, particularly for the High School, in order to follow out a policy of giving the pupils a good educational foundation.

All of the real estate in custody of the School Department is in good condition.

The Committee wishes to show here its appreciation for all who have so willingly co-operated with the School Department during the past year. All of the units within the organization have worked together and have helped to make the Department run smoothly and without friction.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Honorable School Committee:

The 64th annual report of the Superintendent of Schools is herewith submitted.

Mr. John Parker, who had been Superintendent of Schools for five years, passed away suddenly on May 5, 1930. During his administration the foundation was laid by the School Committee and Towns people upon which we can build well, and we hope wisely, schools that will give our children a good education.

Your present superintendent took full charge of his work in July. One of the first duties was to become thoroughly familiar with the school plants, their personnel and equipment, then to learn as fully and quickly as possible the educational achievements of the pupils.

ACHIEVEMENT TESTS GIVEN

To learn quickly the present school achievements of the pupils, the Stanford Achievement Tests, Form A, were given in early October. These showed the great majority of the pupils were in the proper grades, but also showed a number who were unwisely retarded from work they are capable of doing, and also many unwisely accelerated in many subjects. Many readjustments in grading were immediately made. Other adjustments in work are being made as rapidly as conditions warrant.

The most acute need was in newer arithmetics, and in readers. The arithmetics have been supplied in grades III to VI inclusive. The readers are being supplied as rapidly as funds are available. The curriculum outlines are being revised by teachers and superintendent to bring them more in line with modern educational thought and standards prevailing throughout Massachusetts.

The content in geography and history in grades IV, V, VI, VII, and VIII in particular is being revised. Minor improvements have been made by the primary teachers in teaching equipment for learning reading, phonics and number work.

The work of the Junior High School is receiving especial attention, to study the aptitude and abilities of the adolescent pupils, and to provide for their special education needs. No sweeping changes are contemplated, but more hand work, shop work for boys and cooking and sewing for girls is urged.

The work of the senior high school continues strongest in the college preparatory and commercial departments. There should be some additional subjects offered for pupils who are not interested in the subjects now offered by these two main courses, such as more history and science, some shop work, and much physical and health education.

The commercial department has received some new typewriters, and has been moved to the large room adjacent to the science laboratory, where it has space to function in larger classes. It is expected that the achievements will be even higher than in the past. It is the aim of this department to fit graduates to discharge successfully the duties of stenographer and typist, book-keeper and general clerk in the usual starting positions of a business organization and kindred subjects on the high school level.

The work of the teachers of the college preparatory subjects, of music, both vocal and instrumental, and of drawing, both mechanical and free-hand is also commendable.

PHYSICAL AND HEALTH EDUCATION

The health development of the students of the high school is a most important piece of work that has not yet been adequately developed.

Through the courtesy of the Playground Commission, the community field and community building are made available to the school students both for social functions, and athletic contests. The out-of-door sports of the Fall and Spring are very welcome opportunities for the physical, and health development of the high-school boys and girls. It is hoped that these can be still further enlarged

when proper arrangements are made in the teaching loads of the high school teachers during the winter months, and some additional athletic equipment is provided.

A special class for children mal-adjusted to their grades is greatly needed and should be started as soon as funds can be provided.

DENTAL HEALTH

The dental clinic was conducted under the direct charge of Miss Mange, the school nurse, with the help of Dr. George W. Bosworth, dentist. It was the aim of this clinic to preserve as many of the six year molars as possible, by proper repair work. The details of this work appears under the report of Miss Mange. Much good was accomplished and a surprising number of children were helped. This work should be carried on this year and enlarged if possible.

In conclusion it is desired to thank the School Committee for their many hours of hard work in giving their time and thought to school problems, the teachers for their loyal co-operation in carrying out their professional duties, and the janitors for their capable work in keeping their buildings constantly ready for use.

SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

Music study in the public schools when administered by interested and skillful teachers may at least approach three important results: (1) A definite beneficial effect upon the physical, mental, and spiritual life of the individual pupil. (2) An excellent type of intellectual training. (3) A socializing force which is of great value. It is with these results in mind that every child is encouraged to take an active part in the periods which are given to music.

It is hoped that in the future ensemble instrumental work will be encouraged in the Kingston schools. This will tend to stimulate greater interest on the part of all the children.

In the first three grades we are stressing the following three valuable plans: (1) To create in all children a better appreciation of good music. (2) To help them learn to carry a tune and to use their voices properly. (3) To establish for them in a simple degree the connection between song-singing and theory in music.

The intermediate grades study theory in a more advanced way covering thoroughly such points as note and rest values, time signatures, notation, and scale tonality. A decided effort has been made to follow this program carefully including the use of rote songs with which we correct tone and study ear training.

The Junior High School, where the pupils should be reading music fairly well, devotes two periods a week to music and reviews during the first of the year enough theory to make a start reading and singing more difficult music. Special attention is given to boys' voices.

In the High School one period a week is devoted to this work. Some unison songs are learned because boys especially enjoy this type of singing. Simple songs are studied in three and four parts after which more difficult one are used for study and sung at graduation. The Senior girls will form a glee club possibly giving a concert in the spring.

With fine co-operation from the teachers the work in Kingston has progressed in a very satisfactory way.

SUPERVISOR OF DRAWING

Starting in September all grades below the Junior High School made free hand nature sketches from specimens gathered from gardens and the woods. The first three grades sketched with pencil and colored with crayon. The fourth, fifth and sixth grades sketched more complicated studies and painted with water color. This work continued somewhat until December with the addition of scene sketching and coloring.

During December appropriate drawings for the month were made. The children also made Christmas cards with designs some of which were original and some copied. Original design is always encouraged. In all grades it is the intention to have stressed free hand drawing. Picture study will be taken up more seriously this year. An effort will be made to study the picture of a different artist each month.

So far during the year the work in the Junior High has been lettering and some work in coloring. The three classes in the High School are drawing from studies using pastel and water color to complete the work. Very satisfying results have been obtained in the Drawing this year.

SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Last year the findings were registered in figures in order that definite comparisons might be made from year

to year. I believe the figures will be self explanatory. It is not out of place, however, to comment on some of the findings.

The most prominent variation is in the increase of pupils having cervical glands, an increase of 100%. This increase was practically general throughout the schools and in view of the fact that there were fewer colds, grippe cases and other illnesses as a whole this past year than in previous years, we must look elsewhere for the explanation.

I feel that the present economic conditions are partly to blame, in as much as it might eliminate certain foods from the diet which are needed, thus lowering the general resistance of the individual and put more work on the lymphatic system in combating germ invasion.

There is also a noticeable increase in the number of pupils having pediculosis (head lice). I can repeat what has been written a number of times. The condition is untidy, unsightly, unhealthly and unnecessary. This condition will persist and be transferred to other pupils until a conscientious effort is made to irradicate it by those who persistently keep it from year to year.

Two hundred pupils (about 40%) have poor posture. The co-operation of parents, teachers and pupils is necessary to remedy this condition which is a factor to good health.

Eye Test, 18 pupils need correction.

Weighing and measuring, 58 (about 11%) underweight.

SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit the following report of the health work carried on in the Kingston Schools for the year ending December 31, 1930.

During the month of October, 503 school children were examined by Dr. Briggs assisted by the School Nurse.

There has been no epidemic of contagious diseases during the past year. During April, May and June, German Measles were reported in High School. An epidemic was avoided as the school rooms were inspected each day by the School Nurse, and those having the disease were required to bring a certificate from the School Doctor on their return to school.

Whooping cough and chicken pox have been prevalent in the lower grades during the year, also a few cases of mumps. Impetigo has been found in all schools. In some cases the pupils have been out for a long period of time. Pediculosis has not been so troublesome in the lower grades.

Weighing and measuring has been done four times during the school year. A large percent of Junior High pupils were found 6% under weight.

Forty five first grade children entered Patuxet and Howland's Lane schools. Seventeen took the Binet Test, eleven successfully passed. All children entering the first grade were vaccinated.

The eye tests were made under the supervision of the school nurse. Twenty defective eyes were found, and those wearing glasses and needing lenses changed. Ten pupils in the various schools have been fitted to glasses.

Audiometer (ear test) was given by Miss Anna Foley, November 21. The re-test for the defective ears will be given January 27, when the home-calls will be made by the school nurse relative to these corrections.

Eight tonsil cases were corrected at the Jordan Hospital Clinic.

Owing to the sudden death of Superintendent, John H. Parker, the Dental Clinic was not carried on last year and the Summer Round Up was not conducted as in the previous year, but the school nurse took special census of all those being five year and eight months, September 1 and found about forty five ready to enter.

A very successful May Day pageant was given at the Community building by the elementary schools. An evening assembly was given by the high school and many beautiful posters were made by all the pupils, and other activities were carried on in the schools pertaining to May Day. Improvement Tags, posture tags and teeth tags were given to children who are interested in this work. Mr. Parker gave out the tags and also the gold peices to those who collected the largest number of gypsy moth nests. Posters made by the elementary grades were exhibited at the Community building the afternoon of the pageant, and a baseball game was put on in the afternoon by the high school team. The day was given for the pageant and other activities by the School Committee, which was enjoyed by everybody.

School Census was completed October 15. 645 were found between the ages of five and twenty one.

The American Red Cross has been very helpful in buying clothing and shoes for needy children. They are providing four children with mid-morning milk this year. One boy was sent to Jordan Hospital for one week and other kind things have been done to help me in this work for which I am very grateful.

First Aid boxes and Kotex re-fills have been purchased by the School Committee. \$25 was given by the Selectmen from the Willis Fund to carry on the nutrition work in the various schools. I wish to express my appreciation for this great help.

The co-operation of the parents has been very pleasant and much interest shown in the health activities carried on in the schools. The teachers and pupils are very co-operative.

500 home calls have been made relative to health work and social service work which is carried on by the nurse outside of school duties, and I wish to express again my appreciation for the help and many useful things given me by the public.

The school work is increasing and it is very gratifying to those who are doing this work. I feel we are progressing, which encourages the nurse and teachers.

I appreciate the co-operation of the school Committee and superintendent and all who so kindly help me on with the many problems which come before me each day in the week.

DENTAL CLINIC

The dental clinic was carried on in the elementary schools from December 1-5. Miss Farr, hygienist was here from December 1 to 3, making a survey of children in grades 1-2-3-4. Talks on dental hygiene were given in all schools through the Junior High by Miss Farr.

The survey gave the number of children needing attention. Cards were sent to the parents, asking them to sign if they wished to have the work done. The co-operation was encouraging, and 80 children were listed for up town and 85 for down town, in grades 1,2,3,4.

Dr. George W. Bosworth began the work of filling and treating these cases in the high school building Dec. 8. From Dec. 8 to 12, 50 children were taken care of. Dec. 15 the outfit was taken to Cobb school where the work was carried on from Dec. 15 to 19, having taken care of 45 cases. In many cases more work should have been done, but as the money was limited, only the very necessary were done.

Dr. Bosworth's kind co-operation was very helpful and the ten days work was very satisfactory, not in the

work alone, but the co-operation of the children and teachers, and I feel the money you have given us has been well spent and I thank you.

HIGH SCHOOL.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby respectfully submit my first annual report as Principal of Kingston High School together with the financial reports of the Lunch Room Fund, the Athletic Association, the Quill magazine, and the Gift Fund.

School opened September 3, with a total registration of 203. Since that time five pupils have left school and fourteen pupils have entered making our present enrollment 211. Of the five pupils who left school four left because their parents moved to another town. The present enrollment is divided as follows:

The school day has been lengthened and the increased time has enabled us to allot 40 minutes of teaching time to each regular period. This is the minimum length recommended by the State Department of Education.

The commercial department has been transferred to the quarters formerly occupied by the drawing department. The purpose of this change was to provide more room and better facilities for the commercial work.

The school band and orchestra under the instruction of Mr. Weeman and the direction of Mrs. Cushing are progressing very well this Fall and the musicians show signs of much promise. It is hoped that more pupils will take advantage of the opportunity and join this group.

One of the more urgent needs at the present time is equipment for the lunch room. An analysis of the lunch room report shows that the year from Dec. 29, 1929 to Dec. 12, 1930 has produced a net loss of \$60.26. At present the lunch room is operating at a loss because of inability to buy goods in large quantities at wholesale prices and store them without spoilage. Some form of refrigeration should be installed to avoid spoilage and to safeguard the health of the children who patronize the school lunch room as well as our own very meager profits.

Careful scrutiny of the accounts of the Athletic Association and of the Quill magazine will show that both of these desirable school enterprises are not paying their own way since both show a deficit and both had some outstanding bills in September with no funds available for payment.

It is hoped that within the next calendar year some form of physical education program for all students can be inaugurated in the Junior-Senior High School since at the present time only the pupils who are candidates for one of the three varsity teams can benefit from the expenditure of athletic association funds by the school.

The scholastic work of the school seems to be on a satisfactory level although more home study on the part of most pupils would raise the standard of achievement within a very short time. This is a matter in which the parents can co-operate with the school authorities to better the schools and the education given to the children of Kingston.

In closing I wish to thank the teachers and parents for their co-operation and assistance which they have so generously given.

PROPOSED BY-LAWS
FOR THE
TOWN of KINGSTON

as recommended by the
FINANCE COMMITTEE

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ARTICLE I

GENERAL GOVERNMENT

TOWN MEETING

Section 1. The annual town meeting shall be held on the first Saturday in March of each year.

Section 2. The polls shall be open at six fifteen o'clock in the morning and shall remain open until three o'clock in the afternoon, or until such later hour as the meeting may by vote determine.

Section 3. All business of the annual meeting, other than the election of town officers and the determination of such matters as by law are required to be determined by ballot, shall be referred to an adjournment thereof to the following Saturday at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Section 4. Notice of every town meeting shall be given by posting an attested copy of the warrant calling the same at the main entrance to the Town Hall, and in at least three other public places in the town, not less than seven days before the day appointed for such meeting, and the return of the officer, stating the manner of notice, shall be endorsed on the warrant.

Section 5. Whenever a town meeting shall adjourn to a future date, the Town Clerk shall cause a notice of the time and place of such adjourned meeting to be posted at the main entrance to the Town Hall and in at least three other suitable places in the Town as soon as practicable after the adjournment. Such notice shall briefly state the business to come before the adjourned meeting.

ARTICLE II

PROCEDURE AT TOWN MEETINGS

Section 1. Only voters shall be admitted to the place of meeting or to a defined portion thereof, except by order of the meeting, and the check list shall be used in the enforcement of such order and that not less than fifty voters constitute a quorum.

Section 2. All articles in the warrant shall be acted upon in the order of their arrangement, unless the meeting by vote otherwise determines.

Section 3. All reports, motions and resolutions submitted for the consideration of the meeting involving the expenditure of money shall be in writing. Any other report, resolution or motion shall be reduced to writing, if the moderator so directs.

Section 4. No person shall address the meeting unless recognized by the moderator, nor speak more than once on the same subject to the exclusion of any other person who may desire to speak.

Section 5. Every person speaking shall address the chair, shall confine himself to the question under debate and avoid personalities; and no person shall be permitted to speak without first obtaining leave of the presiding officer.

Section 6. Any person who is employed as an attorney by another interested in any matter under discussion at a town meeting shall disclose the fact of his employment before speaking thereon.

Section 7. In case of motions to amend, or to fill blanks, the one expressing the largest sum or the longest time shall be put first, and an affirmative vote thereon shall be a negative vote on any smaller sum or shorter time.

Section 8. All committees shall be appointed by the moderator, unless the town otherwise directs, and shall report as directed by the town. If a committee does not report as directed, or at the next annual town meeting held thereafter, it shall be deemed discharged, unless an extension of time be granted by the town.

Section 9. No reports of committees shall be in order at any special town meeting unless made under an article in the warrant which indicates the subject to be reported upon.

Section 10. When a report of a committee is placed in the hands of the moderator, it shall be deemed to be properly before the meeting for its action thereon, and a vote to accept the same shall discharge the committee; for the adoption of the recommendations of the committee, however, a specific vote shall be required. No appropriation shall be made under the report of any committee of the town until the matter has been considered and reported upon by the finance committee.

Section 11. No vote after being once passed at a meeting shall be reconsidered at that meeting or at an adjournment thereof, except by a two-thirds vote.

Section 12. No motion, the effect of which would be to dissolve the meeting, shall be in order until every article in the warrant has been duly considered and acted upon, but this shall not preclude the postponement of the consideration of any article to an adjournment of the meeting to a stated time.

Section 13. The duties of the moderator, not specially provided by law or by these by-laws, shall be determined by the rules of practice contained in Robert's Manual of Parliamentary Practice, so far as the same is applicable to a town meeting.

Section 14. The presiding officer may speak to points of order in preference to all other persons.

ARTICLE III

SELECTMEN

Section 1. The Selectmen shall have the general directing and management of the property and affairs of the town in all matters not otherwise provided for by law or these by-laws.

Section 2. The selectmen may appear in the interests of the town, either personally or by the town counsel or by special counsel, before any court, committee of the legislature, or any state or county board or commission;

they shall have full authority as agents of the town, acting upon the advice of the town counsel or special counsel, to institute and prosecute any and all necessary suits and proceedings in favor of the town, and to appear and defend any and all suits and legal proceedings against or involving the town's interests.

Section 3. All conveyances of land or interests in land which may hereafter be authorized by a vote of the town, or otherwise, shall be signed by a majority of the board of selectmen, unless otherwise provided by law or by vote of the town, and shall be sealed with the town seal.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Selectmen to impose and enforce rules and regulations for the government of the Police Department and for the guidance of the members thereof.

Section 5. The Selectmen shall have charge of and shall draw orders on any and all moneys appropriated for the departments under their control and all appropriations not specifically entrusted to the control of any particular board or committee.

ARTICLE IV

TREASURER

Section 1. The treasurer shall be the custodian of all deeds, bonds, and insurance policies belonging to the town, except that the bond of the treasurer shall be in the custody of the chairman of the board of selectmen.

Section 2. The treasurer shall make an annual report which shall contain a statement of the amount of money received and paid out by him during the year; a full exhibit of all moneys, properties and securities which may be placed in his charge by virtue of any statute or by-law, or by virtue of any gift, devise, bequest or deposit; a list of all notes issued during the year, showing the purposes for which the money was borrowed, and giving the date, term, rate of interest, time of maturity, and the premium.

if any, received thereon; a list of all notes paid during the year, and a list of all outstanding notes, with the dates on which they will mature. His report, however, need not contain such details as are required by law to be shown in the report of the town accountant.

Section 3. He shall have stated hours for the transaction of business, and shall give public notice thereof.

ARTICLE V

COLLECTOR

Section 1. That the Collector of Taxes shall collect all accounts due the Town committed to him by the Assessors, as well as all those which become due and payable through any other Department of the Town.

Section 2. He shall have stated hours for the transaction of business and shall give public notice thereof.

ARTICLE VI

ACCOUNTING AND AUDITING

Section 1. The town accountant shall in his annual report, in addition to such matters as are required by law, furnish a condensed statement of the financial condition of the town and financial transactions for the year covered by such report.

Section 2. The town accountant may, with the approval of the selectmen, by a writing deposited with the town treasurer, appoint a substitute who shall, for such time not exceeding four weeks from the date of such appointment as shall be specified in the writing, perform the duties by law required of the accountant, and for his acts the accountant shall be responsible.

Section 3. There shall be an annual audit of the town's accounts under the supervision of the director of accounts in the department of corporations and taxation, in accordance with the provisions of section 35, chapter 44 of the General Laws, or any acts in addition thereto or in amendment thereof.

ARTICLE VII

TOWN COUNSEL

Section 1. The Selectmen shall have the power to employ Counsel at any time if in their judgment the interests of the town so require.

ARTICLE VIII

FINANCE COMMITTEE

Section 1. There shall be nine members constituting the finance committee. The members shall be appointed by the moderator. When the committee is first constituted three shall be appointed for three years each, three shall be appointed for two years each and three shall be appointed for one year each.

At each annual meeting thereafter the moderator shall appoint three members for a term of three years each.

The members shall serve without compensation.

Section 2. Vacancies. Whenever any vacancy shall occur in said committee by resignation, removal from town, death, failing to qualify, or otherwise, said vacancy shall be filled by said committee, and if any member is absent from five (5) consecutive meetings of said committee, except in case of illness, said committee shall consider his position vacant, and shall proceed to fill the same.

Section 3. Term of Office. The term of office of all persons chosen as aforesaid to fill vacancies shall expire at the close of final adjournment of the annual town meeting next succeeding such vacancy, and at said annual town meeting the moderator thereof shall appoint a successor to fill out the unexpired term of each member whose office has been so vacated in the same manner as the original appointment.

Section 4. Duties. The duties of the finance committee will be to consider and report upon all requests

for appropriations made by the different departments of the town, and make such recommendation for action at the town meetings as they deem for the best interests of the town.

Section 5. Municipal questions. They also shall consider all matters which involve municipal questions or policies and make recommendations as to these to the Town Meetings. It shall be the duty of said committee to make an annual report, in print, of its doings, with recommendations relative to financial matters and policies for the town.

Section 6. Town Warrant. The Selectmen after drawing any warrant for a town meeting shall transmit immediately a copy thereof to each member of the Finance Committee and said Committee shall consider all such articles.

ARTICLE IX TOWN CLERK

Section 1. The town clerk shall, immediately after every town meeting, notify, or cause to be notified, any person elected, chosen or appointed to any town office, or to serve upon any board or committee of the town, of his election, choice or appointment and that all such officers must be duly sworn within seven days after election, or appointment; and shall also furnish the various town officers, committees, boards or departments with a copy of all votes affecting their respective offices or departments.

Section 2. The town clerk shall keep and cause to be permanently bound one or more files of the town reports.

Section 3. He shall not allow original papers or documents of the town to be taken from his office, except as they remain in his custody, or by authority of law.

Section 4. He shall have stated hours for the transaction of business, and give public notice thereof.

ARTICLE X

GENERAL PROVISIONS GOVERNING ALL DEPARTMENTS

Section 1. All officers, boards and committees shall notify the town clerk of their organization, and of their office hours or time of stated meetings.

Section 2. No board or committee of town officers having the power or authority to appoint any town officer or agent shall appoint any member of such board or committee to any salaried office or position the salary of which is in excess of \$200 per annum; but this shall not prohibit any town officer from being chairman or clerk of the board or committee of which he may be a member.

Section 3. No officer or board of the town shall make any contract on behalf of the town in which such officer or any member of such board is directly or indirectly financially interested, except competitive contracts.

Section 4. No contract, involving an obligation of the town, shall be binding upon the town unless it is in writing and is signed by at least a majority of the board or committee duly authorized or having control of the appropriation against which such obligation is incurred; and such board or committee shall make a record of every such contract in a book which shall be the property of the town and all contracts in excess of \$100.00 shall be subject to competitive bidding.

Section 5. No board or officer shall make any contract in behalf of the town, the execution of which shall necessarily extend beyond one year from the date thereof, unless specific authority so to do has been given by vote of the town.

Section 6. Every officer, board or committee of the town charged with the expenditure of money shall furnish the town accountant with a copy of all orders for the purchase of equipment, supplies or materials, and all requisitions for personal services—except services pay-

ment for which is to be made on the regular pay roll of the department, board or committee contracting for the same,—at the time such purchases or requisitions are made. Every officer, board or committee making or entering into any written contract shall file such contract with the town accountant before any payment is made thereon. Every board or committee shall at once furnish the town accountant with a copy of any vote of such board or committee involving the expenditure of money.

Section 7. All bills or any money due or payable to the Town shall be rendered and committed to the Collector through the Town Accountant, and that this section shall not apply to bills, or demands, for taxes or other Municipal Assessments.

Section 8. Any officer or board in charge of a department may, with the approval of the selectmen, sell any personal property or material lawfully in the custody of and belonging to such department, not required for its use and not exceeding five hundred dollars in value. No property of the town of value in excess of two hundred dollars shall be sold except at public auction or otherwise by vote of the Town after not less than seven days' notice in one or more newspapers published in the town, or, if no such paper is published, then in one or more newspapers published in the County of Plymouth.

Section 9. Every officer in charge of a department shall annually, on or before the fifteenth day of January, transmit to the selectmen, in writing, a report containing a statement of the acts and doings of his department for the past financial year, to be printed in the annual report as the selectmen may deem expedient.

ARTICLE XI

STREETS AND SIDEWALKS

Section 1. No person shall break or dig up any public sidewalk, street or highway of the town, or place there-

on any staging or other temporary structure, without a written permit from the Board of Selectmen or the board having charge of the streets in such cases. Any person having such a permit shall, before the expiration of the same, restore such sidewalk, street or highway to its original condition or to a condition satisfactory to such Board. Any permit issued under the provisions of this section shall be in force for such time as the Board may specify and shall be subject to such other conditions as the Board may prescribe, and especially in every case upon condition that during the whole of every night from sunset to sunrise, lighted lanterns and proper barriers shall be so placed as to secure travellers from danger. No person having obtained such permit shall fail to comply with the conditions thereof. The Board granting such permit shall have the right to revoke the same at any time, and may require a bond either before or after the commencement of work or during its progress, to secure its proper performance.

Section 2. No person shall coast on or across any public sidewalk or street of the town, except at such times and in such places as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Selectmen.

Section 3. No person shall fire or discharge any gun, pistol or other firearms in or across any of the streets or public places within the town; but this section shall not apply to the use of such weapons in the lawful defence of one's person, family or property, or in performance of any duty required or authorized by law, nor upon such days as may be designated by the Board of Selectmen.

Section 4. No person shall throw or place or cause to be thrown or placed upon any public street or highway of the town, any nails, spikes, screws, glass, tin cans, or other similar articles.

Section 5. No person shall suffer a platform, or grate of an entrance, or opening to a cellar or basement in any

public street or sidewalk to rise above the surface of any such street or sidewalk, and every such entrance or opening shall at all times be covered by a suitable platform or grate, and in case of a coal hole, by a suitable covering. Such entrances or openings, when in use, shall be properly guarded.

Section 6. No person shall throw or place upon any public sidewalk or street crossing any banana skin, orange skin or other slippery substance.

Section 7. No person shall place ashes, rubbish, or merchandise of any kind in a public street or upon any sidewalk so as to obstruct the free passage thereon.

Section 8. No owner or person having the care of a building, abutting upon any brick, concrete or other curbed or finished sidewalk, the roof of which building slants toward such sidewalk, shall permit such building to be without a barrier, snow-guard or other device to prevent the falling of snow or ice from such roof to the sidewalk.

Section 9. No person shall drive or stop any vehicle on the left-hand side of any street or way in the town, and no person having the charge of a vehicle in any of the streets of the town shall refuse or neglect to stop the same, or to place the same when stopped as directed by a police officer of the town when in uniform or when displaying his badge. Any offender under this section shall forfeit and pay the sum of not less than five nor more than twenty dollars for such offense.

Section 10. No person shall place or cause to be placed in any of the public streets or squares, or upon any public sidewalk, without first obtaining a written permit from the Selectmen therefor, any wood, lumber, coal, barrel or other obstruction.

Section 11. No person shall drive or park any motor vehicle upon any sidewalk of the Town, or obstruct any private driveway.

Section 12. Any person who intends to erect, alter, repair or take down any building, or part thereof, on land abutting on any way which the town is obliged to keep in repair, and desires to make use of any portion of said way for the purpose of placing thereon building materials or rubbish, shall give notice thereof to the Selectmen. Thereupon the Selectmen may grant a permit to occupy such portion of said way to be used for such purpose as in their judgment the necessity of the case demands and the security of the public allows: such permit in no case to be in force longer than ninety days, and to be on such conditions, and by furnishing such security, by bond or otherwise, for the observance and performance of the conditions and for the protection of the town, as the Selectmen may require: and especially in every case upon condition that during the whole of every night, from sunset in the evening until sunrise in the morning, lighted lanterns shall be so placed as effectually to secure all travelers from liability to injury.

Section 13. Any person violating any of the provisions of this article shall be liable to a fine of not more than twenty dollars, unless otherwise especially provided herein.

Section 14. In accepting a new street or townway on petition a Betterment Assessment shall be levied on abutters to the amount of one half of the cost of necessary improvements to make said street or way suitable for a Town Highway.

ARTICLE XII

DISORDERLY BEHAVIOR

Section 1. No person shall behave himself in a rude or disorderly manner, nor use any indecent, profane or insulting language, in any public way or place in the town.

Section 2. No person shall throw any missile, nor unnecessarily make any alarming or tumultuous noise, nor make nor light bonfires, or other fires, except as the

law may provide, nor ride upon the hind part of any vehicles without leave, nor play at football or other games, in any street, public way or square in this town.

Section 3. No person shall loiter or continue to stand on any sidewalk or public place in the town so as to obstruct the passage of or to impede or in any manner annoy other persons; nor shall any person in a street or way stand or loiter after being directed by a police officer to move on.

Section 4. No person shall extinguish any street light, or extinguish or remove any light placed to warn the public against an obstruction or a defect in any street or way, without such person is authorized by those having charge of such lights, or of the street or way, so to do.

Section 5. No person shall disturb or disfigure any sign or guideboard within the Town, and no such sign or guideboard shall be moved without permission of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE XIII

PARADES AND PUBLIC GATHERINGS

Section 1. No person shall form or conduct any parade in any public street, public sidewalk or public way within the town, or form or conduct for the purpose of display or demonstration, any procession or assembly of people, except a military or funeral parade or procession, within such public street, sidewalk or way, without first obtaining a written permit from the Selectmen, and no person shall take part in any such parade, procession or assembly which is not authorized by such a permit.

Section 2. No person shall give any public address, speech or harangue in any public street, public square or public park within the town, without a written permit from the Selectmen.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this article shall be punished by a fine of not more than twenty dollars.

ARTICLE XIV

JUNK COLLECTOR'S AND DEALERS

Section 1. The selectmen may license suitable persons to be collectors of, dealers in or keepers of shops for the purchase, sale or barter of junk, old metals, or second-hand articles; and no such person shall be a dealer in or keeper of a shop as aforesaid without such a license.

Section 2. The selectmen may require that any place, vehicle or receptacle used for the collecting or keeping of the articles aforesaid, may be examined at all times by the selectmen or by any person by them authorized to make such examinations.

Section 3. No person licensed as a junk collector shall, directly or indirectly, either purchase or receive by way of barter or exchange any of the articles aforesaid, except rags or bottles, of a minor or apprentice, knowing or having reason to believe him to be such.

ARTICLE XV

PENALTY

Section 1. Whoever violates any of the provisions of these By-Laws, unless otherwise specifically provided therein, or otherwise provided by law, shall be punished with a fine of not more than twenty dollars.

ARTICLE XVI

REPEAL

Section 1. All By-Laws or parts of By-Laws heretofore adopted, which are inconsistent with the provisions of the foregoing By-Laws, are hereby repealed and annulled; but the provisions of the foregoing By-Laws, so far as they are the same as the provisions of By-Laws heretofore adopted, shall be construed as a continuation of said By-Laws, and not as new enactments.

Section 2. The repeal of a By-Law heretofore adopted shall not affect any act done, ratified or confirmed, or any right accrued or established, nor any action, suit or proceeding commenced or had, nor affect any punishment, penalty, or forfeiture incurred under such By-Law.

ARTICLE XVII

AMENDMENT

Section 1. These By-Laws may be modified or amended at any annual town meeting by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, any article or articles for the purpose having been inserted in the warrant for such meeting.

At the State Convention of Assessors recently held the warning was sounded by Mr. Henry F. Long, Commissioner of Corporations and Taxations, that there

would be a very large deficit from the Income Tax over previous years owing to business depression, and that it was bound to reflect in our tax rates.

It is therefore well to bear in mind the increasing expenditures of the various Departments and in this connection let us look back a few years for a comparison and the following figures show amounts that were raised each year by direct taxation.

It would seem, that in 1919 just following the war when money was more freely spent, and that labor and commodities were at the peak, that an increase of 233% in expenditures called for some serious consideration.

This is not offered in criticism of any Department but for you to bear in mind the money is spent in Town Meeting and your Assessors act only in the capacity of trying to equalize your doings of such meetings.
