Article 6. On the motion of George W. Cushman, Voted: That the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1952 and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 7. On the motion of Percy W. Bailey, Voted: That the sum of \$400 be raised and appropriated for the purpose of maintaining, during the ensuing year, the mosquito control works as estimated and certified to by the State Reclamation Board in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 112, Acts of 1931.

Article 8. On the motion of John J. Moore, Voted: That the sum of \$500 be raised and appropriated for the purpose of participating during the ensuing year the Greenhead Fly control project in conjunction with the State Reclamation Board.

Article 9. On the motion of John J. Moore, Voted: That the sum of \$4,500 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 highway



construction, and that, in addition, the sum of \$13,500 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the state's and county's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the state and county to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

Article 10. On the motion of William M. Post, Voted: That the sum of \$2,500 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury for the purchase of a new dump truck for the Highway Department, and that the Selectmen be authorized to turn in a 1½ ton truck now owned by the Highway Department, and apply the allowance thereof to the purchase price of the new truck.

Mr. Orfeo H. Sgarzi Moved: That we reconsider Article 10. Motion seconded and unanimously carried.

William M. Post moved an amendment to read as follows: That the sum of \$2,500 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury for the purchase of a new dump truck for the Highway Department, and that the Selectmen be authorized to turn in the present International Dump Truck now owned by the Highway Department, and apply the allowance thereof to the purchase price of the new truck. Motion seconded and voted unanimously.

Article 11. On the motion of Percy W. Bailey, Voted: That the sum of \$1,000 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury for the purchase of a ½ ton pick-up truck for the Highway Department, and that the Selectmen be authorized to turn in the present ½ ton pick-up truck now owned by the Highway Department, and apply the allowance thereof to the purchase price of the new truck.

Article 12. William M. Post Moved: That the sum of \$1,000 be raised and appropriated for the purchase of a sidewalk plow for the Highway Department. Motion not carried.

Article 13. On the motion of William M. Post, Voted: That the following unexpended appropriation balances be transferred to the appropriation made for Leigh Road Construction:

Article 14. On the motion of Percy W. Bailey, Voted Unanimously: That the sum of \$650 be raised and appropriated for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser, and that the Selectmen be authorized to turn in the present 1951 Ford Cruiser and apply the allowance thereof to the purchase price of a new cruiser.

Article 15. On the motion of G. Palmer Holmes, Voted Unanimously: That the sum of \$750 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury for the purchase of a new resuscitator for the Fire Department.

Article 16. On the motion of Irma A. Ruffini, Voted Unanimously: That the town accept Chapter 751 of the Acts of 1951 which will increase the pensions of town employees who retired prior to November 1, 1949 and at the time of such separation from service had fifteen years of creditable service.

Article 17. On the motion of Norman E. Thomas, Voted: That a committee of five be appointed by the Moderator to consist of the Superintendent of Streets, one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the Finance Committee, and two citizens of the town for the purpose of studying the need and preparing plans for a town barn for the Public Works Department, and to report at an annual town meeting.

Article 18. On the motion of Norman E. Thomas, Voted: That a committee of five be appointed by the Moderator to consist of the Superintendent of Streets, one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the Finance Committee, and two citizens of the town for the purpose of studying and planning the establishment of a town parking lot and to report at an annual town meeting.

Article 19. On the motion of Fred L. Bailey, Voted Unanimously: That the sum of \$1,500 be raised and appropriated for the

purpose of making further improvements at the Jones River Basin, said money to be used in conjunction with money allocated by the State or County, or both.

Article 20. On the motion of Clarence R. Drew, Voted Unanimously: That the town assume liability in the manner provided by Section 29 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws, as amended by Chapters 516 and 524, Acts of 1950, for all damages that may be incurred by work to be performed by the Department of Public Works of Massachusetts for the improvement, development, maintenance and protection of tidal and non-tidal rivers and streams, harbors, tidewaters, foreshores and shores along a public beach outside of Boston Harbor, including the Merrimack and Connecticut Rivers, in accordance with Section 11 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws, and authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver a bond of indemnity therefor to the Commonwealth.

Article 21. William M. Post, Moved: That the sum of \$6,000 be raised and appropriated for the purpose of collecting garbage within the town, said work to be under the supervision of the Board of Health. On the motion of Henry J. Prouty, Voted: To lay Article 21 on the table.

Article 22. On the motion of Horace C. Weston, Voted Unanimously: That the sum of \$150 be appropriated for the purpose of publishing and distributing the report of the Regional District School Planning Board.

Article 23. On the motion of Irma A. Ruffini, Voted Unanimously: That the balance of \$50,000 remaining of a loan for \$430,000 authorized for schoolhouse construction under Article 1 of the warrant for the Special Town Meeting, held on March 1949, be rescinded.

Article 24. On the motion of Ralph F. Santoro, Voted Unanimously: That the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00, the same to be added to the present appropriation for the purpose of extending the water main on Pembroke Street from the end of the present main.

Article 25. On the motion of Ralph F. Santoro, Voted Unanimously: That the town transfer the sum of \$5,000 from unappropri-

ated available funds in the treasury for the purpose of replacing the present 4-inch main with an 8-inch main for approximately 1500 feet on Howland's Lane starting at Leigh Road and running South.

Article 26. On the motion of Henry Lemieux, Voted: That the sum of \$5,000 be raised and appropriated for the purpose of replacing the present 2" main (summer service) with a 6" main for approximately 2400 feet along Shore Drive:

Article 27. On the motion of Ralph F. Santoro, Voted Unanimously: That the unexpended balance of \$749.80, made for Water--Thomas Street--at a Special Town Meeting held on October 20, 1950 (Article 12), be transferred to the appropriation for the Replacement of Hard Surface Roads.

After Article 27 was voted, Parker A. Glass, Secretary and speaking for the Finance Committee, Moved: To reconsider Article 26. Voted. Mr. Glass stated that the Finance Committee have reconsidered Article 26 and recommend that the \$5,000 be taken from free cash. Therefore, on the motion of Parker A. Glass, it was Voted that the original motion be amended to read: That the \$5,000 be taken from free cash.

Article 28. On the motion of Ralph F. Santoro, Voted Unanimously: That the following unexpended balances be transferred to the appropriation made for Water-- Replacement and Extension of Mains.

Article 29. On the motion of John J. Moore, Voted Unanimously: That the town accept as a town way the private way known

as Prospect Court, beginning at a point on the easterly side of Mayflower Street so-called, and running east approximately 300 feet, as laid out by the Selectmen to be 49.50 feet in width, a plan thereof having been filed with the Town Clerk on February 28, 1952, together with a layout thereof, and transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury the sum of \$450 for the construction thereof.

Article 30. On the motion of William M. Post, Voted Unanimously: That the town accept as a town way the private way known as Brightside Avenue from the end of the present town way to the way known as Park Avenue, a distance of approximately 300 feet, as laid out by the Selectmen, to be 50 feet in width, a plan thereof having been filed with the Town Clerk on February 28, 1952, together with a layout thereof, and transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury the sum of \$500 for the construction thereof.

Article 31. On the motion of Percy W. Bailey, Voted Unanimously: That the town accept as a town way the private way beginning at a point on Main Street between the residences of Worth B. Crothers and Orfeo H. Sgarzi, to a point opposite the dwelling of Frederick Elwell, a distance of approximately 1357 feet more or less, said road to be known as Mayflower Street as laid out by the Selectmen to be 40 feet in width, a plan thereof having been filed with the Town Clerk on February 28, 1952, together with a layout thereof, and transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury the sum of \$3,500 for the construction thereof.

Article 32. On the motion of William M. Post, Voted Unanimously: That the town accept as a town way the private way beginning at a point on the northerly side of Cole Street, a distance of approximately 600 feet more or less, said road to be known as Bagnell Street as laid out by the Selectmen, a plan thereof having been filed with the Town Clerk on February 28, 1952, together with a layout thereof, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$950 for the construction thereof.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to discontinue, and to sell to Frank M. Janeiro and Maria R. Janeiro, husband and wife, of Kingston, Mass., as tenants by the entirety, the parcel of land laid out as a town way formerly owned by them or one of them, in the Town

of Kingston, consisting of approximately 470 square feet, taken by the Department of Public Works of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for the Town of Kingston, on January 16, 1951, and shown on the State map of the taking as Parcel 1-T, at the price awarded by the said Department to the owners, said parcel not being needed for any use or benefit of the Town of Kingston or the inhabitants thereof.

No motion made on above article. Goes by default as declared by the Moderator.

Article 34. On the motion of George L. Chandler, Voted Unanimously: That the town accept Chapter 484 of the Acts of 1951 authorizing certain changes in the uses of the Fund established for the support of a Congregational Minister in the Town of Kingston and relative to the duties of the Treasurer and Trustee of said Fund.

Article 35. On the motion of John J. Moore, Voted Unanimously: That the town vote to release the conditions in its deed to the Trustees of Kingston Grange, No. 323 P. of H., dated March 24, 1934 and recorded with the Plymouth County Registry, Book 1657, Page 404-405 and release to said grantee, all of its rights, title, and interest in and to the premises therein described.

Article 36. On the motion of Irma A. Ruffini, Voted Unanimously: That the following appropriation balances be closed to Surplus Revenue:

## REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

With this issue of the Town Report, a new step for the town of Kingston has been taken. While your Board of Selectmen fully realize they cannot speak for any future personnel, it is the intention to have a series of photographs of interesting buildings or places in Kingston used for Town Report covers. The picture of the Town House, used with this issue, we believe, is the most appropriate for the beginning.

An innovation at Gray's Beach Park last summer was the charge for parking out-of-town cars. With a special officer present on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, the plan worked very well for the first year. The sum of \$792.50 was realized from parking fees. With the probability of these receipts becoming larger in succeeding years, we are asking this year an appropriation of sufficient money to hard-surface the road, extend the beach area about sixty-five feet and to purchase a small power mower. It is also our intention to plant a few new trees.

Our present police cruiser has been about 30,000 miles since it was delivered in May. It appears to us that to trade each year is good business on the part of the town. This recommendation was also made by your Finance Committee in their report for 1951. We are, therefore, asking the town to purchase a new cruiser this year.

Extended telephone coverage is soon to become a fact. The action for this move was started some time ago by your Board and we are assured now by both the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company and by the Department of Public Utilities, that the additional service should be in operation by the Fall of 1953.

Last summer a street lighting survey for the town was undertaken by the Plymouth County Electric Company. Late in the year a plan for additional lights and increased power in others, was sub-

mitted to your Board of Selectmen. This plan was discussed with representatives of the Finance Committee in attendance. In consequence, some additional money will be requested in the 1953 budget.

The Fire Department answered 43 calls in 1952, this coupled with the 163 forest fire calls made a busy year.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

---

During 1952 the Forest Fire Department answered 163 calls for grass and woods fires, this being the largest number of runs ever to be reported by this department. This fact was due, largely, to the extreme dry season experienced by all of Plymouth County. On ten different occasions, we were called upon to render aid to other towns as per our County Mutual Aid system which has proved to be a boon at many fires this year.

There were 3,146 permits granted for fires in the open during the year. This is an excellent indication of the continued cooperation by Kingston residents in enabling the department to determine the location of these fires; which fact, also, eliminates the number of unnecessary runs to a minimum.

The State Department of Conservation has cooperated to a great extent in both the detection and extinguishment of fires. Special emphasis should be given to the fine work of the tower man at the key fire tower in Manomet.

There have been thirteen loads of cattle shipped into Kingston from Vermont during the year. These animals were all inspected and found to be in proper order and free from disease. Charts and permits were checked and then reported to the State in proper form.

This year twenty-two dogs were quarantined but all were released after the fourteen day period. In my opinion most of the difficulty with these dogs was due to children annoying them, thereby causing the animals to bite. Four cases of dog bites were reported by persons from other localities, all of which were reported to the proper authorities in the respective towns.

There has been no slaughtering reported in the town.

I have made my yearly inspection of the cattle in the town and submitted my report to the Division of Livestock Disease Control.

## REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

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Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The town in 1952 accepted Mayflower Street, Bagnell Street and portions of Brightside Avenue and Prospect Court as public ways. Mayflower Street and the new sections of Brightside Avenue and Prospect Court were excavated, gravelled and the drainage installed.

School Street, Chapel Street, Station Street, Leigh Road, Winthrop Street and the road leading to the Town Dump were gravelled, penetrated and sealed. Tarkiln Road received a two-inch mixed-in-place treatment.

The Chapter 90 program for 1952 was divided into three contracts. Two of these contracts were for work on Wapping Road where a two-inch Type I surface was laid after widening. The other project being done by town forces, consisted of a mixed-in-place job on Elm Street.

At the last annual town meeting a committee was appointed to study the article regarding the request of the Selectmen to construct a new town barn for the use of the Public works Department. This committee has carefully studied the needs for such a building and will recommend an appropriation be voted at the next annual town meeting for the construction of a suitable building to house the equipment of the Highway and Tree Departments.

## REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE PLYMOUTH COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE

More and more residents of Kingston are realizing that they can go to the Plymouth County Extension Service for help on practically every farm or home problem: cooking, family living, a more attractive home, repairing furniture, sewing, preservation of food, gardening, poultry raising, and such broad subjects as animal husbandry, soil conservation and cranberry culture.

Pamphlets are available on thousands of subjects and there are neighborhood meetings for group instruction.

Headed by Joseph T. Brown, County Agent-Manager, the Extension Service is divided into three sections: agriculture, home-making and the 4-H Clubs. Mr. Brown has two assistants, Dominic Marini and Elwood Spear. The house-hold department is headed by Miss Beatrice I. White with Miss Carol M. Shute as her assistant. In charge of 4-H Clubs are Robert B. Ewing and M. Christine Downing. This department works with the youth of the County in gardening, live-stock care and home-making.

Subjects are chosen by polling the residents of the County. The women's programs are composed of a Women's Council, consisting of one representative from each town in the County. Kingston is represented by Mrs. Franklin W. Zwicker.

Besides district meetings, home visits, bulletins and newspaper articles, information is given by radio and television.

Every resident of Kingston with a farm or home problem is invited to write the Plymouth County Extension Service, Court House, Brockton, or ask for more information of the town chairman or local director.

## WATER DEPARTMENT

To the Citizens of the Town of Kingston:

The department installed 35 new services, and changed several summer services to winter services. Even with the increase in operating costs and the many problems that the department was faced with during the year, we were able to operate within our budgets. It is pleasing to report that an unexpended balance of \$512.03 has been turned back to the treasury from the general maintenance account.

The water main on Pembroke Street was extended about 1,500 feet with a 14-inch pipe; 1,500 feet of pipe on Howland's Lane was replaced with an 8-inch main. The 2-inch main on Shore Drive was replaced with a 6-inch pipe for winter service and on Maple Street, 900 feet of 4-inch pipe was replaced with an 8-inch main.

The pumping station on South Street was painted, signs were erected, the driveways were black-topped and the grounds beautified. You are invited to inspect this station and the grounds. As a direct result of the new station and pumping equipment, it was not necessary to curtail the supply of water this year, although we experienced an unusually dry summer. This new station is a valuable addition to our system.

You will notice an increase in the 1953 budget, which is due to the continued increase in operating costs and salary adjustments. Also, with new developments in our town, the demands on your department will be greater than ever.

There will be four articles in the 1953 annual warrant. 1. To continue the extension of the main on Pembroke Street; 2. to replace the balance of the 4-inch main on Howland's Lane; 3. to extend the main on Wapping Road for approximately 1,500 feet (we were petitioned to insert this article); 4. for Forest and Improvement work on the Walter H. Faunce Grant.

The increase in revenue for 1952 over 1951 was \$857.29. It might be of interest to you that the amount of revenue collected in 1942 was \$16,215.79, or an increase in the past ten years of \$6,959.05. This increase was not because of any increase in rates, but due to the tremendous growth of the town. The water rates remain as they were in 1886, at the start of the department.

The total number of gallons pumped into the system was 147,397,115 gallons.

No report on the year's operations would be complete without grateful acknowledgment of the splendid cooperation of the family of the water department and the citizens of the town of Kingston. We appreciate that cooperation and are proud of the accomplishments of your department.

## PARTIAL REPORT OF TOWN BARN COMMITTEE

This committee has met regularly since its appointment by the Moderator, following a vote of the townspeople at the annual town meeting in March, 1952. The following members were duly appointed: William M. Post of the Selectmen, William A. MacPhail of the Finance Committee, G. Palmer Holmes, Superintendent of Streets, Earl S. Sampson and Orrin C. Colley. An organization meeting was held at the Town Barn and Mr. Orrin C. Colley was elected chairman. During the year Mr. Colley resigned, due to a change of residence to a neighboring town. Mr. George A. Walsh was appointed to replace Mr. Colley as a member of the committee and was later elected its chairman. Several meetings were subsequently held. The committee was unanimous in its decision that a new town barn was needed. Several locations were considered and the committee decided that the town property located on Evergreen Street was the most suitable location. The present building was considered inadequate and unsuitable. Spending money in the present building was deemed inadvisable. The committee recommends that an article be placed in the Town Warrant for funds for the construction of a fire-proof building. This building will house all of the highway, tree and moth equipment.

## PARTIAL REPORT OF THE TOWN PARKING LOT COMMITTEE

Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Your Committee has met on several occasions throughout the year and have discussed the parking problems that exist. We feel, however, that they have been reduced somewhat by the improvement that has been made to the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad property.

Two proposals were submitted to us. One by Mrs. Helen H. Adams regarding her property adjacent to the railroad parking lot. There were two main objections to her proposal: first, as per Mrs. Adams' specifications, we felt it would cost the town too much money, and second, the distance from the stores was too great. The second proposal was by Mr. Howard B. MacFarlane, who offered to sell to the town, the house and land next to his garage. This, the committee felt, would require further study as the building would have to be removed and the land graded before it could be used for parking purposes.

The committee contacted the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad with reference to the possibility of hard-surfacing their property between Toabe's Hardware Store and the railroad tracks, but as yet no word has been received.

The summation of the Parking Lot Committee is that the location, when finally selected, should be as near as possible to the main shopping district. Further study will be required before any definite action is asked.

### Old Age Assistance

Our case load in this category has been steadily decreasing since the lien law went into effect January 1, 1952. A few cases were closed because some recipients did not wish to have a lien put on their home. There have been fewer applications since, supposedly for the same reason. In October, 23 cases received an increase in their Old Age and Survivors Insurance and a decrease in Old Age Assistance.

### Aid to Dependent Children

The case load in this category has remained the same during the entire year. One case was affected by the increase in Old Age and Survivors Insurance during the year.

### Disability Assistance

The case load in this new category is steadily increasing. We were told by the State Department of Public Welfare last year that this would be a very expensive program and we are now realizing the truth of their statement. We are advised by the Department of Education and Bay State Society for the Crippled and Handicapped, Inc. that one of our cases will quite probably cost us \$1,500.00 for a period of approximately six months. At the end of the training period this young person is expected to become self-supporting or at least partially so.

### General Relief

The ten cases opened during the year were for temporary aid. These cases are also included in the closed cases. Among the remaining 14 closed cases 10 were transferred to Disability Assistance and 3 became self-supporting. One was committed to a State Institution.

### REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF CIVIL DEFENSE

The Civil Defense program in Kingston has changed very little in basic plan from that outlined in previous reports. We have known for some time of many changes which were pending. During the last three months of 1952 many new manuals were received, which included most of these changes. These basic manuals affect the Divisions of Fire, Police, Transportation, Rescue and Evacuation, Utilities, and Civilian War Aid. Most of the division heads are familiar with these changes and have planned accordingly.

During the year your Director and several of the division heads have attended special conferences, schools and meetings, called to impart important information of a very beneficial nature.

#### IS YOUR BLOOD TYPED?

Keep your Card with You!

A blood-typing clinic will be held on January 19 and 20, 1953 for residents of Kingston and Plympton as part of the State-wide campaign to eventually get 100% of Massachusetts residents blood-typed. This program can be of the greatest importance to every individual in saving life, in case of accident or disaster. The typing is to be done by staffs of technicians of the Mass. Department of Public Health Clinical Laboratory, using the latest techniques. Each person gets an identification card, showing his blood type, and also a record card is kept at the Town House.

Many persons have already been typed by other clinics, hospitals and Red Cross technicians. These persons are requested to report in writing their names, address, and blood types and Rh factor to the Board of Health office, Town House, Kingston, so that proper cards can be kept in the town file.

#### "SKY WATCH" - Kingston being called!

In July 1952, the Aircraft Warning Service was ordered to 24 hour watch duty as an essential part of the total Civil Defense plan. The Kingston section of the Ground Observer Corps, which is charged with the duty of observing and reporting movements of military-type

aircraft, could *not* respond to this order for full 24-hour duty. The only observation tower available, the Kingston Fire Tower on Monk's Hill is almost wholly unsuitable for such continuous duty. It has been previously so reported.

Your Director with the assistance of several interested citizens examined a number of buildings and various sites for an observation tower but found nothing that would be suitable without the expenditure of a considerable sum of money. However, it was generally agreed that a small building placed on the town owned land on Smith's Lane would be the best under all conditions.

The Air Force officers who are charged with the effectiveness of the Air Craft Warning Service have made repeated calls on your Director and the Board of Selectmen to report that there is a *serious gap* in the flow of information about aircraft from this vital area. These officers urge in strong terms that a watch station be established and kept in operation, at the earliest possible moment.

There is an article in the warrant for an appropriation by the town, which will enable the Kingston observers to do their duty in operation "Skywatch".

I wish to thank all persons who have aided in the Civil Defense program. Their support has been a great aid in the past, and will be essential to the success of future programs and future directors. Especial mention should be made of the facilities furnished by the Playground Commission, the Harold F. Govoni Post A. L., the Kingston Fire Department, the Kingston Police Department, the Kingston High School, and many others.

The duties and responsibilities of Director of Civil Defense have come to the point where much more time and energy must be devoted to them than the usual unpaid volunteer can afford. It is probable that the post will have to be placed on a part time, and a paid basis, in the very near future.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of Kingston:

The function of a school department is to provide the kind of education that will result in each of its students obtaining the background that will prepare him for the next phase of his development.

Kingston has done a reasonably satisfactory job of providing educational advantages. This has, of necessity, been limited by the size of our system and the ability of the Town to provide funds.

Kingston's school system is fortunate in having a better than average teaching staff, but unfortunately our salary rate has been such that we have paid less than average salaries. The committee is recommending increases in salaries, particularly to those teachers who have been in our system for many years. It is our intent to bring our rate of pay to a competitive level, and in that manner retain competent teachers in our system.

We must furnish the supplies and text books that are the tools used in education; and these in an ever greater amount as the number of students increase.

We will need to add one additional teacher in the High School and one in the Elementary grades to take care of increased enrollment.

For the present our housing in the elementary grades is adequate except for the first grade; indications are that we may have to provide an additional classroom in 1953, if the enrollment forecast, as shown by our school census, is correct.

We have two classrooms in the Maple Avenue School. This school building was retained in our system to provide extra space, as needed. The High School will expand one classroom in the fall of 1953, and will use the Maple Avenue School.

Maintenance of our High School Building will be at a minimum as it will be needed only until the Regional School is erected.

The School Committee is ever mindful of the increasing tax burdens that this department and other departments of the Town has visited upon the taxpayers. The budget for 1953, of necessity, must be larger than that of past years; your committee and Superintendent Chester T. Ray, have estimated this budget as conservatively as possible and requested the minimum amount necessary to carry on the functions of the department.

Our educational facilities in the future should be excellent; with a fine Elementary School in Kingston and participation in an expanded junior high and high school program in the Silver Lake Regional High School.

Mr. Richard R. Cessner, a valuable member of the School Committee for many years, resigned when he moved to Falmouth. His position was filled by the appointment of Mr. Howard B. MacFarlane.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS AND SUPERVISORS

To the School Committee  
 and Citizens of Kingston:

The year 1952 may well be the most eventful year educationally for our schools that we will ever be privileged to witness. In adopting the recommendations of the Regional School Planning Board, the town has, in our opinion, taken the most advanced outlook toward modern secondary education. A new and democratic policy for improving our school system is at hand. We of the school department appreciate our chance to be a part of this expanding school philosophy, and thank the citizens for this confidence.

This whole report could well be used to restate the work of the Planning Board previously mentioned. However, it would be impossible to improve upon the phrasing of the educational objectives that it has so well stated in its report to the four towns of our Region. This unpaid, citizens' Planning Board has, in two years' time, presented a theme and plan for united action that will present our youth with a new and broader educational horizon.

One of the wonderful concepts of our Democratic Way of Life is still alive when twelve committee members from four towns can honestly discuss mutual problems and arrive at a unanimous recommendation. In a smaller sense it is a parallel to the growth of our vast country through the united action of the several states. It has been recognized as a fundamental of progress wherever it has had the chance to be truly demonstrated.

The secondary school that will emerge as a result of this fundamental recognition will be outstanding in its contribution to our towns. This school may well be the laboratory for pointing out how unity and democratic action is essential to the lives of our youth. We all appreciate that the better understanding of our neighbors and their prob-

lems enriches our own lives and influences our decisions. This appreciation will now have a chance to reflect itself in the maturing vision of our youth.

Your school administration is sincerely concerned now with the deep responsibility the town has bestowed on it. It is with great humility, and yet a tremendous sense of inner satisfaction, that we enter the next phase of planning and building our school of the future. To state in principle that the higher ideals and aspirations of our Planning Board must be carried forward into successful completion is but part of the task ahead. Cooperation at all levels and in the four towns is most essential in expediting the work ahead. We feel sure that in the light of the favorable action of the towns that this may soon become an accomplished fact. If any townspeople has any suggestions for improving the basic qualities of our new Regional School, we are sure his help would be welcomed. Any practical help that can be rendered that will save our taxpayers money will certainly be welcomed. The principle of receiving sound value for every dollar invested has been inherent with the Planning Board and will certainly be carried forward. As fair-minded citizens we hope that everyone will cooperate to the end of providing the best in secondary education for all of our youth, ever mindful of the limitations of our towns' financial capabilities.

The departure of this report from the concrete recitation of facts and accomplishments to one of a statement of philosophy and a tribute to the work of the Regional Planning Board is justifiable at this time because of the tremendous importance of this proposal. To move forward with the same genuine backing and ideals will be most gratifying. With the marshalling of all the forces for creating the ideal, the practical, the functional, and the basically sound school building, we cannot fail.

One of the immediate financial advantages of our towns' action in setting up the Regional Organization is that of the 15% increase in reimbursements. This increase is effective as of the date of approval—December 6, 1952, and will approximate 10% for the remainder of the school year. The advantage this school year will be about \$6,000 to the four towns and nearly \$10,000 for the first full year.

due in 1954. The very favorable educational potential of our Regional School, coupled with its increased revenue from state sources, certainly promises well for the future.

### High School

In the light of recent happenings concerning the future of Kingston High School it may be assumed that this will be the next to last such report before we will be absorbed by the Regional High School. In the excitement of these new developments it is difficult to separate my thinking into plans for Kingston High School and plans for the Regional School. May I make this report simply a summary of significant items which stand out in my mind for the year 1952.

Our enrollment December 31, 1952 was 249 pupils. Compared with the figures for October 1, 1951, 238, and the estimated 262 in 1953, 284 in 1954, our growth trend is steadily upward. Some adjustment may be necessary next year to take care of the increased enrollment. We hope any changes made will carry us through until the Regional School is ready.

Our teacher turnover continues to be small. Last year we lost only one teacher, Mrs. Daphna Stratton who resigned due to the transfer of Mr. Stratton from this area. She was replaced by Miss Winifred Labonte, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and a former instructor of sewing at Westbrook Junior College in Portland, Maine. I'm sure that one reason for our ability to hold our teachers during the last two years is the possibility that the Regional School would provide the professional growth which they might have sought elsewhere. I have felt their keen interest and support throughout the many months of planning that have been given to this project. Kingston is indeed fortunate to have such fine teachers and the region will be enriched by their transfer to the new school.

There have been few changes in the academic program offered during the past year. The addition of a room to the Shop area has made a remarkable improvement in the woodworking program. This new excavation provided room for a separate machine room, leaving the original shop for woodworking tables and mechanical drawing. Two new electric sewing machines have been added to the Home

Economics room to help relieve the overcrowded condition which obtains particularly in the 7th and 8th grade sewing classes. This year we are again able to offer the complete mathematics program for students wishing a technical training after high school. We notice a growing interest in the math and science area, probably because larger and larger numbers of our graduates are going on to colleges and special schools. Eleven out of twenty-seven of the class of 1952 went further to school and this year's class (1953) of thirty-nine has more than twenty preparing for schools or colleges.

Athletics have required some changes this year. Mrs. Janet Giammarco helped us by coaching the girls field hockey team to a very successful season. Miss Laboute will take over girls basketball and softball. Mr. Pooler has been assigned boys basketball to replace Mr. Cingolani who requested that he be relieved of this position for this year. Mr. Cingolani will continue as coach of soccer and baseball.

Our lunch program is enjoying one of its most successful years. This year we have served 56,109 type A (hot) lunches in both elementary and high schools. Looking back at some figures for 1949 we find a total served of 31,521. This is an increase of 25,000 lunches in three years! A change in service was tried this year. All food is prepared at the elementary school and the high school portions are transported to the high school. This change has made possible a saving in per meal costs as well as providing excellent meals. I would like to make note here of the retirement of Miss Eugenia B. Trow and Mrs. Frank Hazeldine who have served in our lunchrooms for many years. We owe these ladies a debt of gratitude for their many services over and beyond their assigned tasks.

### Elementary School

Reading constitutes one of the most crucial responsibilities in the first six grades. The child must be taught to read so that he can extend his experiences, follow his interests and obtain fun and recreation.

How are we striving to motivate the reading program? The first step has been a reading workshop where the teachers of the four towns of Union No. 37 have met in a cooperative effort to discuss ways and means of improving reading methods. Under the leadership of

Mr. Ray, superintendent, Miss Biggy, director of education in Waltham, and Miss Sylvester, reading consultant from Ginn and Company, problems were discussed and ideas exchanged and put into practice. New textbooks for teachers were purchased and circulated among the staff. The workshop proved to be very successful and many teachers expressed a desire to continue it in another subject area next fall.

The most important materials in the reading field are books. The lone textbook, however, has become obsolete. Vivid, attractive, vitalized textbooks, with simple enough vocabulary and meaningful materials, are being placed in the hands of the youngsters. New reading books, social study books, language books and arithmetic books have been added to our curriculum. Music books and science books will be replaced while reference books and supplementary books will gradually be supplied.

We have a number of mechanical aids that we use to help improve reading. The filmstrips and filmstrip machines supplement our books. These stimulate interest by presenting illustrations and reading material on a screen. Our two machines and the new daylight screen make it possible for the teacher to use the filmstrips in her own classroom when the need for them arises.

Moving pictures are the greatest tool invented for conveying human experience. They influence learning and attitudes. Our weekly film is chosen to help increase the interest of the youngster and to help him remember certain facts. It is selected to correlate with classroom activities and to help develop a spirit of tolerance and understanding.

The public address system, installed shortly after the school was built, has been a very worthwhile aid. Reading has been done for a purpose when programs were prepared to be broadcast over the loud speaker. Stories, poems, and dramatizations have been read as well as many messages and announcements. It's surprising what a challenge an audience can be— even an unseen one.

Our newest aid is the tape recorder. Plays and historical events can be dramatized on tape recordings. Scripts for slides are written and recorded by students. Poems, stories, and discussions can be

recorded and played back. It is ideal in helping to correct faulty oral reading as it makes suggestions and criticisms easier to understand and act upon.

The lantern slide machine is an old device but still a good one. Children are able to present data they have collected on slides. Research in social studies, science, reading, artistic ingenuity and expressive meaningful oral reading are a few of the skills that are encouraged and developed.

The reading accelerator is a machine that helps pupils learn to read better and faster. This accelerator trains the reader to concentrate. It increases reading efficiency and encourages the reader to perceive groups of words rather than single words. Its function is to help eliminate poor reading habits and develop good ones. At present this machine is being used in the sixth grades.

Our several duplicating machines help teachers prepare materials which are directly related to what is being done in the classroom. Teacher-constructed tests and materials are invaluable as they can be properly graded and based on familiar vocabulary. These machines make it possible to supply each pupil with a copy of the material.

There is no evidence yet that the radio, television, or motion picture provides a really acceptable substitute for reading as a means of keeping up with the world for self improvement, conversation topics, and pleasure that comes from reading good books. Every help that encourages children to read more skillfully and thoughtfully should be employed. If youngsters can be taught to do this, they add greatly to their personal living and they will have a better chance of preserving and improving the world in which they live.

### Music

With the advent of the Regional High School in the near future, one can look with enthusiasm to the possibilities that can and will open up.

The vocal program in the one high school will be enriched with the students of all four towns. This will also mean that a greater unit

of students who prefer music to other activities will be the main backbone of each course.

There is now being given in the elementary schools in all four towns, instrumental lessons which will make a nucleus for a well proportioned band and orchestra. There are approximately 107 instrumental students in our school union. All will not reach the high school at the same time. However, a better than 75% average (figuring on present enrollment) will matriculate in a given 4 years which comprises the four year high school.

### Art

During 1952 the art department has tried to stimulate an increased interest in its work through its application to special school projects such as proms and plays. Starting at the lowest level—the first grade—creativity has been stressed, adding the basic principles of design and technique as needed and applicable. In a number of cases the results of this combination have been admirable. The elementary school pupils prepared simple scenery for an operetta and brought a Safety Poster Contest to a successful culmination. In the junior and senior high school scenery was made for several productions including an elaborate set for the fashion show.

Both schools held exhibitions of student work at the end of the 1951-1952 school year.

### Report — School Physician

Examination of the school pupils in accord with the new legislation which became effective Sept. 1, 1952, is in progress. These new regulations require a more detailed examination than was required in the past and the examination is conducted in private. The parents of pupils in grades 1 and 4 are invited to be present and discuss health problems relative to the child.

Defects noted during these examinations are reported to the family for correction by their family physician.

### Report — School Nurse

In addition to the usual health check-ups and home visits inci-

dental to school absences, the facilities of the following state and county clinics were used:

Plymouth County Hospital: X-ray total, 16. 10 contacted, 6 requested by family physician. All negative.

Plastic Clinic, Mt. Auburn Hospital, Cambridge. 1 child attending.

Crippled Children's Clinic, Brockton Hospital. Examinations for curvature of the spine, poor posture, post infantile condition, ding-toes. Revisits second Thursday of each month. Follow up by State Department of Public Health. 9 children.

Speech Clinic, Brockton. Recommendation—attending clinic until recovered or improved. 5 children.

Nerve Clinic, Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston. 1 child examined. Recommendation—attending Language Clinic.

Ears—Pure Tone. 590 pupils tested, 572 passed, 55 retested. 45 tested individually, 27 passed, 18 failed. Parents notified and were advised to see ear specialist. 12 of the failures were seen by the Mass. General Eye and Ear Infirmary. 1 by family physician.

Mass. Vision Test. Grade 1 complete. Screened grade 2. Telebinocular: Grade 3, 6, 9, and 12 complete. Screened 4, 5, 7, 8, 10 and 11. Total tested: 312, Passed 247. Slow, retested next year—27. Failures—39. Seen by physician and now wearing glasses—17. 11 of failures due to muscle balance. Seen by doctor, no glasses necessary. All on eye exercises. 6 not seen as yet.

# REPORT OF STATE AUDITOR

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Kingston for the year ending December 31, 1952, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Herman B. Dine, Assistant Director of Accounts.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Kingston for the year ending December 31, 1952, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined, checked, and reconciled with the records and reports in the town accountant's office and with the records of the town treasurer.

The town accountant's ledger was analyzed and the receipts were checked with the treasurer's books, while the payments were checked with the treasurer's records of payments. The appropriation accounts were checked with the town clerk's records of town meeting proceedings and the recorded transfers from the reserve fund were verified by comparison with the records of the finance committee. A trial balance was taken off, proving the accounts to be in balance, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on December 31, 1952. An examination of this balance sheet indicates that the town is in a satisfactory financial condition.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The receipts, as recorded, were analyzed and checked with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds. The cash book additions were verified, and the cash balance on January 7, 1953 was proved by actual count of the cash in the office and by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks of deposit.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were compared with the cancelled securities on file and with the amounts falling due.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the trustees were examined and listed. The income was proved and all transactions were verified and compared with the treasurer's and the accountant's records.

The records of tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were examined and checked. The reported redemptions of tax titles and sales of tax possessions were compared with the treasurer's receipts, and the tax titles and tax possessions on hand were listed, reconciled with the accountant's ledger, and compared with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the town collector were examined and checked. The tax, motor vehicle and trailer excise, departmental and water accounts outstanding at the time of the previous examination and all subsequent commitment lists were audited and compared with the warrants issued for their collection. The payments to the treasurer were verified, the recorded abatements were checked with the records in the departments authorized to grant them, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective accounts in the accountant's ledger.

Verification of the outstanding accounts was made by sending notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The financial accounts of the town clerk were examined for dog and sporting licenses issued. The payments to the town treasurer were verified and the payments to the Division of Fisheries and Game were compared with the receipts on file.

The surety bonds of the town treasurer, town collector, and town clerk were examined and found to be in proper form.

The financial records of the sealer of weights and measures, the board of selectmen, and the police, health, school, and library departments, as well as of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked. The recorded collections being compared with the treasurer's recorded receipts.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, tax title, tax possession, departmental and water accounts, as well as tables showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

During the progress of the audit cooperation was extended by all the town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself. I wish to express appreciation.

## REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of Kingston:

Your Finance Committee presents the following recommendations for action at the Annual Town Meeting.

We are again obliged to report to you that this year's budget represents a new all-time high. We have reviewed each budget carefully, but your Town is growing and the additional services needed to handle this growth plus the continued increase in operating costs left us with little opportunity for reductions.

According to figures made available to your Committee, if the items in the Budget and the Warrant Articles are passed as requested, there will definitely be an increase in our present tax rate. We are opposed to any increase in this rate level of \$35.00. We believe our rate to be equitable, safe and favorably compare to any town of our size in the Commonwealth. It is our belief that in the long run, we will all benefit by a constant tax level so that in those years when our expenses are low we can build up a reserve to offset the impact of the heavy years and still maintain our present rate level. This method of handling the tax rate is being looked upon with favor by more and more townships and the Commonwealth tax experts.

Your Committee plans to continue the policy inaugurated last year of refusing to approve warrant articles and new or increased budget items that are not presented sufficiently in advance of the Town Meeting for full consideration.

We wish to draw your attention to two items in the budget and several of the articles on which we have expanded our remarks below.

Budget Item 10. Police — Maintenance. This year's budget proposes the addition of a full-time officer to the force which will give practically twenty-four hour protection to the Town. This represents, however, an increase of better than 50% in the operating costs for this department. We have approved favorable action, but feel that this

Budget Item 37. Street Lighting (additional). This item represents a decided, and in our opinion, a much needed improvement in the Town's street lighting system. This project covers three phases for a total length of 4.3 miles covering Main Street from the Plymouth line to Tura's Store, and covering Summer Street from its start at Linden Street to the top of Stoney Brook Hill, and covering Green Street in its entirety from Main to Summer Streets. The work itself will cover a two-year period, 1953-1954 with the amount of \$1,518.00 now requested, representing approximately 50% of the total annual cost for this improvement. This item has our approval for favorable action. Mr. A. W. Blackburn, Street Lighting Engineer of the Plymouth County Electric Light Co., spent many hours in cruising our streets, studying the motorists and pedestrians. We wish to thank Mr. Blackburn at this time for his cooperation and the excellent report he gave this Committee.

Street Lighting, however does more than afford protection to motorists and pedestrians. It also discourages vandalism and theft. It indicates to the outsider that a community is progressive and a good place for them to buy and build a home, or establish a business. It "extends the day" and promotes civic pride and activity. In brief, street lighting, in our opinion, saves more than it costs, in economic loss to the community, whether by fire, theft or accidents.

Article 10. Your Committee feels that there are other considerations as well as those of a financial nature involved in this article which should be resolved in open debate at the Town Meeting.

Article 14. Your Committee has recommended postponement of this article at this time because we feel after careful consideration of this article and all other warrant articles and budget items plus future heavy financial obligations facing the Town, that in order to maintain an ample reserve and a steady tax levy, we must forego this \$25,000.00 expenditure.

Article 19. Your Committee has not recommended favorable action on this article as we feel that if the emergency arose, this building could be erected in a very short period of time.

Article 31. Your Committee has approved this article on the basis that the sum earmarked from "Available Funds" has been done

so in order to expediate this water project in conjunction with the new Regional High School and is not to be considered as a precedent in the use of "Available Funds" for future projects.

We wish to thank all departments for the co-operation received and again repeat the importance of all taxpayers attending both the annual election and the annual town meeting.

In conclusion your committee wishes to state that the response to our recommendation of last March that all petitioners and department heads, etc., submit their requests to us as early in the year as possible, was most gratifying. We would like to see this practice continued and expanded. We would also appreciate it very much if all departments will make every effort to have their 1954 budgets in to the Town Accountant no later than December 15th, as the earlier we receive these budgets the more time we will be able to give each department to study and consider their needs.

Adams Public Library, two members of the Playground Commission, and one member of the Silver Lake Regional School District Committee, all for three years. One member of the Housing Authority for five years.

Article 2. At the close of the Election and after the announcement of the results of the election, the meeting will stand adjourned until the fourteenth day of March following, at one o'clock P. M. at the REED COMMUNITY BUILDING, when such officers as are to be nominated from the floor will be chosen.

Article 3. To hear and act upon the reports of the Town Officers.

Article 4. To fix the salaries of elected officers.
