**REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE  
FINANCE COMMITTEE**

---

To the Citizens of Kingston:

Your Finance Committee presents the following recommendations for action at the annual town meeting.

At the risk of becoming monotonous we feel obliged to again point out to you that this year's budget represents an all time high to date. This annual increase is of course to be expected, not only because of increasing costs of everything during the past ten years or so, but is also due in great part to the increase in population over the same period requiring additional services of the town as a result of this growth as illustrated below:

We have, in our review of the town budget, effected some worthwhile reductions. This is important when you realize that every net dollar of the budget must be raised by tax levy.

The warrant articles are, in our opinion, both excessive in number and dollars (\$79,315.00 requested). The Regional School project calls for \$33,311.42 as our share in this year's school budget to be raised by taxation. This increase, despite the savings effected by your committee in the budget, plus the large warrant would, if all articles were approved, produce a tax rate of \$40 to \$42, a prohibitive increase.

We ask, therefore, that you accept our recommendations. If this is done we anticipate a tax rate of approximately \$37.50. You will

recall in last year's report we advised you that we favored a constant rate of \$35 (under present day conditions.) However, new large enterprises such as the regional school make this impossible. We feel any increase should be limited as near as possible to the amount required for the new school.

By and large within reason, your committee is favorably disposed to any program of continued improvement in services to the Town for protection of life and property, more and better water service and improved roads, provided they all fit into a pattern of common sense and long range planning.

We wish to draw your attention to the following remarks pertaining to various warrant articles.

#### CIVIL DEFENSE (Article 26)

Generally speaking and with few exceptions your committee feels it can take a firm stand on all articles, both as to their need and cost. This article we feel is the exception. To the best of our knowledge, no governmental agency has ordered us to erect this structure. Our civil defense director can and will, however, explain to you how far they have gone in this direction. Unfortunately, we do not possess a magic crystal ball, so we cannot tell you whether we will have a war or not and we know you are just as much in the dark. We do not think this is a question of money; if you feel we need this tower and if you approve it and if war comes with its disaster or if this tower lessens it to some degree or saves the life of one single solitary soul, then it will have been money well spent. We do not feel that the possibility of severe criticism from governmental authority should rest on any recommendation we might make.

Therefore, this decision cannot and should not be ours alone, but belongs to all of us as citizens to decide definitely once and for all, if possible, what stand we wish to take on this article.

#### FIRE (Articles 15, 19, 20)

We have approved article 18— additional fire alarm— after our discussion with the fire engineers and feel sure you will find their ex-

planation at the Town Meeting satisfactory. We believe Article 19 is familiar to all—a new pumper replacing the old 1925 Seagrave.

We feel that any piece of equipment as old as the one in its present condition should be replaced as a matter of public safety. Article 20 we feel should be postponed in view of the expenditure for Articles 18-19.

#### HIGHWAY (Article 21)

We feel that the total requests in the warrant for the acquisition of additional or replacement motor vehicle equipment are too high and that this one should be postponed for further study as to its need in 1955.

#### POLICE (Articles 12, 13, 14)

We feel that the acquisition of an ambulance for the town would be an excellent move in the right direction for continued improvement in the protection of life and property. The old Hudson Sedan now used as a makeshift so-called ambulance is in such poor condition that it is a hazard and a poor advertisement for the town.

In connection with the radio for the ambulance, we recommend no action, as we are not convinced as to the need of a radio.

We have been assured by the selectmen that it will be used as an ambulance only and not as a second police cruiser (except in the event of a real emergency and if really needed, to augment the police protection to the town for Labor Day, Decoration Day and Fourth of July holidays.) On this basis, therefore, we feel there should be some actual experience gained in the operation of the ambulance before purchasing a radio.

The turn-in of the present cruiser for a new one merely continues the original recommendation made by this committee in 1952 as a permanent policy on this particular piece of equipment and this one only.

## PUBLIC HEALTH (Article 22.)

We still do not feel the town has grown to the point where garbage collection sponsored by the town on a contract basis is needed. As we pointed out to you the last time this article appeared in the warrant, if approved, can become a prohibitive expense. Witness the fact the previous request was for \$6,000.00; now it is \$10,000.00 and can and will, in our opinion, continue to climb. There is much precedent to show that when the proper time comes service should be undertaken only as a town operated project by town employees.

## PETITIONS (Articles 15, 36, 38, 39, 40.)

We have approved Street Petition Articles 35, 39 and 40 as necessary projects at this time. Article 36— Braintree Avenue— we have disapproved as this can definitely be left until we have a much smaller warrant, both in number and cost.

We have approved Water Petition— Article 15— as a move in the right direction for an overall improvement in the water system, eventually completing the looping of Pembroke Street and Grove Street with Lake Street.

## WATER (Articles 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34.)

We have no additional comments on Articles 27, 28, 29, 33 and 34. On Article 30 we have recommended postponement in view of the \$25,000 granted and spent by this project last year because of the speed-up required by the Regional School. The project is one and a half years ahead of its original schedule of \$10,000 a year and, therefore, because of this year's heavy requests, can be postponed.

Article 31— Wapping Road— is in line with our general feeling as respects long range planning and matches our 1953 approval to continue until Wapping Road is completed.

Article 32. We believe this to be the most important request from the Water Department this year. This reservoir is in a deplorable condition. Your committee visited the site and each member can confirm this fact. We have a fine supply of water from our present wells, but insufficient storage capacity. The repairing of this reservoir will

temporarily aid this storage problem. The cost is \$10,000 but if available transfers are used as recommended by this committee the sum to be raised will be \$8,000.

Your committee is of the opinion that the condition of our reservoir represents but one of the acute problems of our water system. It may well be that rather than temporize to the extent of another \$10,000, the time has come to obtain an expert professional survey of our water needs and if necessary face the need of a major long-term expenditure and permanently remedy these problems.

## ZONING (Article 25)

We approve of this article, feeling that the time has come for Kingston to accept zoning as a permanent function. We do wish to point out to you that the wording of this article apparently presented some difficulties in composition. We want you to realize that this is not a request for a further year's study and then a vote on zoning. This is the time for those who favor zoning to vote "yes" on this question and those who oppose zoning should vote "no".

We wish to thank all departments for the cooperation received and once again urge you to attend both the annual election and the annual town meeting. We trust this year that each one of you who attended last year's annual Town Meeting and the special Town Meetings will endeavor to persuade two non-attending citizens to attend. Perhaps if everyone realizes the significance of a total request for budgets and articles totaling \$556,939.61, plus a possible \$10,000 to \$12,000 for snow removal (actual figure cannot be determined until Town Meeting) we will enjoy full participation at this year's Town Meeting.

We wish again to advise that the continued early receipt of requests from department heads and petitioners will be appreciated, as it gives us a real opportunity to evaluate the request, particularly department heads' requests for additional vehicles and other major equipment. Petitioners are advised that we shall be pleased to meet with them at any of our regular monthly meetings which are held at the Town House the first Tuesday of the month from October through May.

We shall again this year forego the customary summer recessions and continue our monthly meetings for the purpose of conference with

all department heads and our study of various town problems and operations, always looking for economies and operational improvements.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1954 and to issue a note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Recommend favorable action.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800 for the purpose of maintaining during the ensuing year, the Mosquito Control Works as estimated and certified to by the State Reclamation Board in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 92, Acts of 1931.

Recommend favorable action— not to exceed \$400— by tax levy.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the Greenhead Fly control project in conjunction with the State Reclamation Board.

Recommend favorable action— not to exceed \$500— by tax levy.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90 Construction, or take any action relative thereto.

Recommend favorable action— not to exceed \$4,500— from available funds.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to transfer the unexpended balances in the following Highway accounts: Baker Avenue — Construction \$173.35, Bay Path — Construction \$55.09, Brightside Avenue — Construction \$252.00, Leigh Road — Construction \$1,130.67, Marsh Road — Construction \$175.36, Prospect Court — Construction \$36.27 and Prospect Court — Construction \$37.41, for the purchase of a compressor for the Highway Department.

Recommend favorable action.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to accept the layout of the corner of Bay View Avenue and West Avenue, consisting of 199 square feet, a plan thereof having been filed with the Town Clerk in accordance with the General Laws.

Recommend favorable action.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purchase of a so-called station wagon type vehicle, to be used as an ambulance for the Police Department and authorize the Selectmen to turn in the present Hudson now owned by the Police Department, and apply the allowance thereof to the purchase price of the new vehicle.

Recommend favorable action— not to exceed \$2,200— from available funds.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purchase and installation of a two-way radio for the Police Department ambulance.

Recommend no action.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purchase of a new police cruiser for the Police Department and authorize the Selectmen to turn in the present 1953 Ford cruiser now owned by the Police Department, and apply the allowance thereof to the purchase price of the new cruiser.

Recommend favorable action— not to exceed \$550— by tax levy.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of extending the water main from the end of the present main on Grove Street, near the property of John King, a distance of approximately 1200 feet. (By Petition)

Recommend favorable action— not to exceed \$5,000— by tax levy.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to rescind the votes passed under Article 1 at a special town meeting held on June 17, 1948 which read as follows:

"That the Town of Kingston hereby determines, finds and declares in accordance with Section 26-K of Chapter 121 of the General Laws, that there is need for a Housing Authority in the Town of Kingston for the purpose of providing housing for families of low income.

In accordance with the foregoing determination, a Housing Authority for the Town of Kingston be and hereby is authorized to function and transact business".

Recommend favorable action.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purchase and erection of an appropriate stone for the World War II memorial plaque, and for beautification of the grounds.

**Recommend favorable action— not to exceed \$1,800— from available funds.**

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purchase and installation of an additional fire alarm for the Fire Department.

**Recommend favorable action— not to exceed \$500— from available funds.**

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise, by loan or otherwise, a sum of money for the purchase of a piece of fire equipment. Payment for said equipment to be provided by raising the amount required under Section 7, Chapter 44, by tax levy, and the balance required by borrowing under Clause .9<sup>1</sup>, Section 7, Chapter 44.

**Recommend favorable action— not to exceed \$5,000— by tax levy.**

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purchase of a new truck for the Forest Fires Department and authorize the Selectmen to turn in the present 1950 Chevrolet Forest Fires truck now owned by the Forest Fires Department, and apply the allowance thereof to the purchase price of the new truck.

**Recommend no action.**

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purchase of an additional dump truck for the Highway Department.

**Recommend no action.**

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the collection of garbage within the town and authorize the Board of Health to contract for such service for a minimum of 3 years.

**Recommend no action.**

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for further improvements at the Jones River Basin, said money to be used either alone by the town, or in conjunction with money allocated by the State or County, or both, or take any action relative thereto.

**Recommend favorable action— not to exceed \$1,500— from available funds.**

Article 24. To see if the town will assume liability in the manner provided by Section 29 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws, as amended by Chapter 516 and 524, Acts of 1950, for all damages that may be incurred by work to be performed by the Department of Public Works of Massachusetts for the improvement, development, maintenance and protection of tidal and non-tidal rivers and streams, harbors, tide-waters, foreshores and shores along a public beach outside of Boston Harbor, including the Merrimack and Connecticut Rivers, in accordance with Section 11 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws, and authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver a bond of indemnity therefor to the Commonwealth.

**Recommend favorable action.**

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee consisting of the Committee appointed in June, 1953, who have reported on the need for zoning and four additional members; two to be appointed by the Moderator, one to be appointed by the Selectmen and one to be appointed by the Finance Committee; said committee to bring in a zoning plan with recommendations at a subsequent town meeting and to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the use of the committee.

**Recommend favorable action— not to exceed \$1,400— from available funds.**

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purpose of erecting and equipping a building on town-owned or leased land for Civil Defense purposes, in accordance with Chapter 639, Acts of 1950 as amended, or take any action relative thereto.

**Please refer to our report— if passed not to exceed \$1,800 from available funds.**

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, the sum of \$2,000 for the "Replacement and Extension of the Water System".

**Recommend favorable action—not to exceed \$2,000—by tax levy.**

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to transfer any unexpended balance now in the appropriation for the "Replacement and Extension of Water Mains" to the appropriation for the "Replacement and Extension of the Water System".

**Recommend favorable action.**

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to transfer the sum of \$1,752.21 now in the appropriation for "Cleaning Water Mains" for the purchase of a new truck for the Water Department, and to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to turn in the present 1951 GMC truck now owned by the Water Department, and to apply the allowance therefor to the purchase price of a new truck.

**Recommend favorable action.**

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money to be added to the present appropriation for the purpose of extending the water main on Pembroke Street and Lake Street.

**Recommend postponement.**

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money to be added to the present appropriation for the purpose of extending the water main on Wapping Road from the end of the present main.

**Recommend favorable action—not to exceed \$8,000—from available funds.**

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money, and transfer from the South Street Well appropriation the sum of \$2,000 for the purpose of making the necessary repairs to the reservoir situated off Indian Pond Road.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

December 6, 1954

Then met the inhabitants of the Town of Kingston qualified to vote in Town Affairs. The Town Meeting was called to order at 8:05 P.M. by the Moderator, Mr. Horace C. Weston.

The Warrant was read by the Town Clerk.

Article 1. To see if the Town of Kingston will vote to adopt the Zoning By-Laws as proposed by the Zoning Committee, or to take any other action relative thereto.

Mr. Harry R. Saftel Moved: That under Chapter 40A of the General Laws (The Zoning Enabling Act) the town vote to accept the recommendations of the Zoning Committee for a Zoning Ordinance in accordance with their report and plans filed with the Town Clerk on December 6, 1954.

This was followed by Mr. Saftel giving a very complete report on what zoning would mean to the Town and what effect it would have if the town does not accept zoning.

This was followed by Mr. John L. Carrier explaining the plans showing what they had laid out as residential and what had been laid out for business.

Mr. Weston appointed the following tellers; and the oath was administered by Mr. Weston: Santa G. Rossi, P. Cabot Rushton, Louis H. Class, and George A. Walsh.

Mr. Anthony R. Caldera moved an amendment: Voted to amend Section 2 of the proposed Zoning By-Laws by changing from residential to commercial or business use, 2B, 3, 15B and 14 of Division 1, Block 3, Plat A of the Kingston Assessors Maps, being lots owned by Anthony R. ## REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

The Board was organized on March 9th and immediately went to work on the many problems confronting it. Throughout the year we had splendid cooperation from all other town officials, departments and committees. Other than our regular Tuesday evening meetings, we held many other meetings with department heads and committees. These were largely informal sessions but much was accomplished in a friendly and cooperative way.

The photograph of the Frederic C. Adams Library entrance on the cover of this town report is the third in our series showing public buildings or other objects of public interest.

It was impossible to rebuild Howland's Lane as voted at the annual meeting because a number of the abutters would not release to the town the frontage necessary for the work. We will ask at the 1955 annual meeting that the appropriation for this work be transferred to an appropriation for the rebuilding of Smith's Lane.

A County layout for Lake Street was asked for in anticipation of the much greater traffic that this street will be sure to have with the opening of the new Regional School. The layout was made but was not entirely satisfactory to many of the abutters and to the Selectmen. At the close of the year the second hearing had not been held and consequently no final decision had been made.

Another step toward the completion of our street lighting program was completed late in the year. Under the 1954 allotment for this work, new and additional lights were installed on Landing Road, Evergreen Street, Smith's Lane and Crescent Street.

At Gray's Beach Park, many of the needed improvements were made in 1954. However, many more are needed and our 1955 budget request will cover the most essential items.

It is well to bear in mind that the improvement in facilities being made are largely being paid for by the fee for parking that is charged for out-of-town cars. In 1954 we raised this fee to one dollar. Our income from this source was \$1,769.00.

The hurricanes "Carol" and "Edna" did a great deal of damage to many of our trees, making it necessary to entirely remove some and heavily trim others. The expenditures for this work was costly, but by making prompt application for reimbursement, we were able to reduce the town's cost by a considerable amount.

After the erection of the World War II Memorial in May, it was decided that the upkeep of the plot could be best taken care of in conjunction with the World War I plot and with the Town Green. For this reason the budget item for this work in 1955 will read Town Green and Memorial Plots. A somewhat larger figure will be asked for so that World War I plot may be relandscaped and a suitable flagpole erected on World War II plot.

The 1955 town meeting will be asked to authorize the establishment of a Park Commission of three members and elect them from the floor. These members to serve without compensation.

The 1955 town meeting will also be asked to establish a planning board under Chapter 41, Section 81A General Laws, to consist of five members and to elect these members from the floor of the meeting.

In December, Emil Sauer, who had served the town faithfully for ten years as custodian of the Town House resigned, effective the last day of the year.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ZONING BY-LAWS

The following zoning by-laws with zoning maps consisting of sheets from A to E inclusive were filed with the Town Clerk on Monday, December 6, 1954 at 3:30 P. M. and were accepted by the voters of the town at a special town meeting held on December 6, 1954 at 8 P. M.

The by-laws, with the plans as amended, are now awaiting approval of the Attorney General.

Preamble: A By-Law to promote the health, safety, convenience and welfare of the inhabitants of the Town of Kingston by dividing it into districts and regulating the use and construction of buildings and premises with a view to encouraging and promoting the most appropriate use of the land in the Town.

### SECTION I. DEFINITIONS

Lot:

A lot is a parcel of land occupied or to be occupied by a building and its accessories, together with the required open spaces.

Detached One-Family House:

A detached one-family house is a dwelling accommodating but a single family, and having no party wall or walls in common with an adjacent house or houses.

Detached Two-Family House:

A detached two-family house is a dwelling accommodating but two families, and having no party wall or walls in common with an adjacent house or houses.

Story of a Building:

A story of a building is that part of any building comprised between any floor and the floor or roof next above; the first story being the lowest story which is seventy-five percent, or more, above the average level of the ground adjacent to the exterior walls thereof.  
Half-Story:

The term "half-story" shall mean a story within a sloping roof, the area of which at a height four feet above the floor does not exceed

two-thirds of the floor area of the story immediately below.

**Farm:**

A farm means any tract of land used for the production of crops or the rearing of animals.

**Front Yard:**

A front yard is the required open space between the street line and the nearest part of any building on the lot excluding projections.

**Way:**

A way is a passage, road or bridge, public or private, set aside or used as a thoroughfare.

**Projections:**

Projections shall mean cornices, eaves, gutters, outside chimneys, steps, bay windows and terraces.

**Guest House:**

A guest house is a dwelling house in which rooms are rented by the person resident therein to persons occupying such rooms for the night or for longer periods.

## SECTION 2.

### ESTABLISHMENT OF DISTRICTS

**Classes of Districts:**

For the purposes of this Protective By-Law the Town is hereby divided into two classes of districts, to be known as:

- (a) Residence Districts
- (b) Business Districts

These districts are shown on a map entitled "Map of Town of Kingston, Mass., dated ....., which is on file at the Kingston Town Building and is hereby made a part of this Protective By-Law.

## SECTION 3.

### RESIDENCE DISTRICT USES

In a residence district no building shall be erected, altered, used or maintained, and no building or premises shall be used for any purposes, except:

- (a) Detached one-family or detached two-family house.
- (b) Church.
- (c) Educational Use.
- (d) Farm, garden, nursery or greenhouse, which may sell produce the major portion of which is raised on the premises and excluding any use injurious or offensive to the neighborhood.
- (e) Municipal Recreational Use.
- (f) Telephone exchange, not including a service station or outside storage of supplies.
- (g) Home occupations, classified as follows:
  - 1. Professional Offices in private residences.
  - 2. The use of a room or rooms in a dwelling for customary home occupations, such as dressmaking, millinery or the sale of antiques; but no dwelling so used shall be reconstructed or enlarged for such purposes unless especially permitted by the Board of Appeals.
  - 3. Trade occupations, such as real estate, electrician, radio repair, plumbing and carpentry; excluding any use injurious or offensive to the neighborhood, and any use which alters the character of the property and buildings in a residential district.
- (h) Accessory uses on the same lot with and customarily incident to any of the above permitted uses and not detrimental to a residential neighborhood, but excluding a garage for storage of more than three automobiles, and including signs or bulletins not over 6 square feet in area.
- (i) Any of the following uses, provided it is not injurious or offensive to the neighborhood and only if authorized by the Board of Appeals: aviation field, cemetery, golf club, private club not conducted for profit, hospital, convalescent home, sanitorium, funeral house; institutions for philanthropic use, commercial riding stable, establishment for breeding, boarding and sale of dogs; establishment for building, repairing and storage of boats, or boat or canoe livery; tourist home, guest house, trailer, motel, or overnight cabins; establishment for

slaughtering; storage of more than three commercial automobiles except on a farm; gravel, clay, loam, sand or stone removal within 300 feet of a highway line; ice harvesting and storage on the same premises; cider mill or temporary saw-mill; fur farm, poultry farm or piggery.

#### SECTION 4.

##### BUSINESS DISTRICT USES

In a business district, no building, premises or land shall be used for any purpose injurious, or offensive, to a neighborhood. The following uses shall be permitted:

1. Any uses permitted in a residence district.
2. Places of assembly or amusement.
3. Retail, wholesale, jobbing and manufacturing business, service or public utility; signs advertising goods or services offered by an occupant of the premises for sale, hire or use.
4. The following uses may be permitted by the Board of Appeals:
  - (a) Storage of junk for commercial purposes.
  - (b) Filling station or garage.

#### SECTION 5.

##### NON-CONFORMING USES

Any building or use of a building, structure, lands or part thereof, existing at the time this By-Law is adopted may be continued, although such building or use does not conform to the provisions thereof, provided such use has not been discontinued for a period of three years, exclusive of a time of war emergency.

A non-conforming building which has been damaged or destroyed may be repaired or rebuilt, but the restoration shall not substantially exceed the original area and volume and shall be placed no nearer the street than the building which it replaces.

#### SECTION 6.

##### RESIDENTIAL AREA REGULATIONS

(a) Lot Sizes: No building shall be erected on a lot containing less than 12,500 square feet in area or having less than 100 feet width at the way line. There shall be only one building for each lot if the required size and frontage above except for the accessory uses outlined in Section 3 paragraph (b).

(b) Front Yards: In this district where the way is 40 or more feet in width, no building or roadside stand shall be erected or placed within 25 feet of the way line. Where the way line is less than 40 feet in width the building or stand shall be placed not less than 45 feet from the center of the way.

Where present buildings on adjoining lots are less than 25 feet from the way line, new buildings may be placed as near the way line as the average of the buildings on said adjoining lots. A vacant lot shall be treated as though occupied by a building set back 25 feet.

(c) Side and Rear Yards: In a residence district no dwelling shall be built within 12 feet of the side or rear lot line, and no other building within 5 feet of such lines.

(d) Corner Clearances: Within the area formed by the lines of intersecting ways and line joining points on such lines 15 feet distance from the intersection, or in the case of a rounded corner, the point of intersection of their tangents, no structure and no foliage shall be maintained between a height of 2 feet and a height of 6 feet above the plane through their curb grades.

(e) Projections: Nothing herein shall prevent the projection of steps, stoops not exceeding 30 square feet in area, eaves, cornices, window sills, or belt courses into any required yard.

(f) Nothing in SECTION 6, more particularly items (a) and (b) therein, shall apply to a lot of land described in a deed or shown on a plan duly recorded in the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds when this By-Law becomes effective, the area of which is less than 12,500 square feet or the frontage less than 100 feet; however, in the case of subdivisions so recorded, or in the case of two or more contiguous lots so recorded, title to which is vested in the same owner, his agent or straw, then and in that event such subdivisions shall be re-

divided, or such lots shall be merged in such a way as to conform in area and frontage to said section and items.

## SECTION 7. ADMINISTRATION

(a) The Board of Selectmen or their authorized agent shall enforce the provisions of this Zoning By-Law.

(b) Permits: No person shall erect or structurally alter a building or other structure in this Town without a permit from the Selectmen or their authorized agent granted upon application made to them upon a form prescribed by them. If the Selectmen find that the construction, location, and proposed use of the building or structure to which the application relates in the place specified in the application are authorized by this By-Law, they shall grant such permit; otherwise they shall refuse it.

(c) Board of Appeals: There shall be a Board of Appeals of three members and two associate members, appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Section 40A of the General Laws, which shall act on all matters within its jurisdiction under this By-Law in the manner provided in said chapter of the General Laws. Vacancies shall be filled by the Chairman of the Board of Appeals for the balance of the unexpired terms. No member shall act on any case in which he or any member of his family have a personal or financial interest, an associate member being designated to act in such cases by the Chairman of the Board of Appeals.

(d) Public Hearing and Notice: In the case of every appeal made to said Board and of every application for permit or variance made to it under the provisions of this Zoning By-Law, the Board of Appeals shall hold a public hearing to consider the appeal or application in question and shall cause a notice thereof to be published in the local newspaper and on the Bulletin Board in the Town Office Building not less than ten days before the date set for said hearing and shall cause a copy of the notice to be sent by registered mail to all abutting land owners as shown by the records of the Assessors of the Town of Kingston and to any other person or persons who, in the opinion of the Board of Appeals, may be interested in said application or appeal.

(e) Variance: At all times hereafter, after giving notice and holding a public hearing in the manner provided by this By-Law, the

Board of Appeals may authorize with respect to a particular building or parcel of land a variance from any of the terms of this Zoning By-Law where, owing to conditions especially affecting said building or parcel, a literal enforcement of the provisions of this Zoning By-Law would involve substantial hardship to the owner of said building or parcel and where desirable relief may be granted without substantial detriment to the public good and without substantial derogation from the intent or purpose of this Zoning By-Law, but not otherwise.

(f) Court Appeal: Any person aggrieved by the decision of the Board of Appeals may appeal to the Superior Court sitting in equity for Plymouth County, provided that such appeal is filed in said Court within 15 days after such decision is recorded.

## SECTION 8. PENALTIES

Any person violating any of the provisions of this By-Law shall be fined not more than Twenty Dollars for each offense. Each day that such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

## SECTION 9. LEGAL ASPECTS

The invalidity of any section or provision of this Zoning By-Law shall not affect the validity of any other provision thereof.

This Zoning By-Law shall not interfere with or annul any By-Law or other law in effect in the Town of Kingston.

So much of this Zoning By-Law as is approved by the Attorney-General shall take effect upon its publication as required by law.

## REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

---

Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The report of the Police Department is herewith respectfully submitted for the year ending December 31, 1954.

As has been customary during the past two years, an officer of this department was sent to the Massachusetts State Police Training School for local police officers in Framingham, Massachusetts. Donald W. Savery was sent to this school on November 1, 1954 and was graduated on Nov. 24, 1954, after an intensive four week course in Police Techniques and Procedures. Criminal law, motor vehicle law, first aid, and police report writing were just a few of the many subjects taught during this training cycle.

It is my desire to send another officer to the training School in the coming year to take advantage of this most beneficial course in Modern Police Science.

On August 6, 1954 a six months leave of absence was granted to Officer Adriano L. Crave, Jr., of this department who was accepted as a State Police Officer Trainee. He was one of a class of 50 graduated October 9, 1954 and is now a Trooper with the Massachusetts State Police.

You will note in the report of the police activities that follow, 64 ambulance trips were made with the new station-wagon type police car that was purchased after the March town meeting. On many occasions this piece of equipment has saved a life, and in so doing has paid for itself many times. Your cooperation in helping us to obtain this much needed piece of equipment is greatly appreciated.

## REPORT OF THE SHELLFISH CONSTABLE

Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Early in the year your Shellfish Constable requested assistance from the Department of Conservation, Division of Marine Fisheries, asking them to examine the flats and water of Kingston Bay to determine, if possible, what might be done to increase the natural production of our shellfish. In September, a representative of the Division visited with me and went over the flats and the harbor. It was his opinion and is mine, that the return of natural seeding has begun in our bay. Therefore, at the Division's recommendation and my request the flats were closed for an indefinite term. It is believed that this will enhance very materially the growth of the 1954 natural seeding. Under this program, the natural seeding of scallops, which has developed in our harbor will be protected.

Another recommendation from the Division was that a complete record of all shellfish taken be kept for future reference to assist in determining the State's share of shellfish propagation.

Prior to my appointment as Shellfish Constable, the town had rented the necessary equipment for use of the Shellfish Constable and Harbor Master. It seemed to be to the best interest of the town that it own its own equipment. Consequently, a large portion of the 1954 appropriation was spent for this purpose. We now have a new boat, a new motor and other miscellaneous equipment. It is well to point out at this time that this equipment is also at the disposal of the Harbor Master and might, if an emergency should arise, be of help to either the Fire Department or the Police Department.

In 1955 we hope to make heavy seeding of quahogs. It has been found that this type of shellfish grows rapidly in our harbor, but does not naturally multiply as fast as other types.

## REPORT OF THE MOTH SUPERINTENDENT

There were 51 traps set this year for the control of Gypsy Moth. Five male moths and three other species were caught. There is much concern over the Saw Fly, which is fast becoming extremely troublesome. Methods of alleviation are being considered to combat this problem.

This year for the first time, the Moth and Health Departments availed themselves of aerial spraying in an effort to control the mosquitoes. This spraying also helped materially in controlling other insects.

Your department will make further effort to control the poison fly situation during the coming year.

The Department of Natural Resources has recommended the renaming of this department to be known as Insect Pest Control. This change becomes effective immediately.

## REPORT OF THE TREE WARDEN

There were 28 samples of Elms taken and sent in to the State Laboratory for analysis. Of this number, eleven were found to have Dutch Elm Disease. These trees have been removed and burned. Again this year, we repeat that no Elm wood is to be stored for fire wood or other purposes.

The record breaking Spring rains favored disease fungus growth, especially in breeding galleries of the bark beetles which spread the fungus. Also the dormant spray applied to control bark beetles was often delayed or less effective because of rainy weather.

This year your department again planted trees along various streets in the town. The brush cutting along the sides of the roads, which was formerly done by the Highway Department, has been taken over by this department, which we believe is proper.

An article will be found in the warrant for the 1955 annual town meeting for a new power saw. This will replace the present one, which received heavy use during the recent hurricanes.

## REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1954 the Fire Department answered 66 calls, twenty building fires, two chimney fires, eight oil burner fires, four electric motors and wiring, five ambulance calls, seven automobile fires, two calls for resuscitator, two boat fires, seven runs checking fires, one automobile accident, one for tires burning in the street, five times to stand by at the station and two out of town calls.

The hurricane "Carol" demolished the storage building at the fire station which had just previously been moved and renovated. The loss of this building has handicapped this department greatly and plans are being formulated to build an addition to the main station.

At the March meeting the town voted \$15,000.00 for the purchase of a new pumping engine. After careful planning and detailed specifications, the Board of Engineers awarded the contract to the low bidder, the Farrar Company, Woodsville, Mass. The truck was delivered November 23, 1954 at which time it was put directly into service. The ease of operation and the many new innovations of this truck make it a valuable asset to the department.

This department expresses their appreciation to Emil Sauer for his assistance and cooperation. Mr. Sauer, last May, completed 42 years of service with the Kingston Fire Department, the last 18 years as a member of the Board of Fire Engineers.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRES WARDEN

A record number of forest and grass fires were answered this past year, the total number being 166 alarms.

Five of these fires were of suspicious origin. Upon investigation the offender was apprehended and proper means were taken to dispose of the case.

Invitation for bids were mailed late in December for a new wagon. The successful bidder was John Hamilton, Inc.

The State Department of Natural Resources, working under the Hurricane Emergency Act, cleared over 50 miles of our woods roads which were blocked with fallen trees. This service has eliminated a serious fire hazard which the town otherwise would have had to cope with for years to come.

There were 4,255 fire permits issued in 1954. This figure shows the continual cooperation on the part of Kingston residents in reporting to the fire station when fires in the open are contemplated.

## REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF CIVIL DEFENSE

To the Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Kingston:

Progress in Civil Defense was made in 1954, particularly in the erection and equipping of an observation post for the Ground Observer Corps of the U. S. Air Force. This was done in accordance with the vote under Article 26, at the annual town meeting.

The observation tower has been erected on town-owned land on the elevation opposite the water tank on Smith's Lane, near the site of the tower which was used successfully during World War II. It commands a wide view in every direction. The tower consists of a trailer equipped with special glass and metal tower mounted through the roof. It is equipped with lights, heat, running water, toilet and small waiting room. From it our volunteer observers report aircraft seen and heard over government provided telephone to the appropriate filter center.

The Air Force stresses the need of this work 7 days a week, 24 hours a day, and its importance to them. To do this fully would require about 175 persons, working 2 at a time. This means our need is for several times the 40-odd faithful observers now carrying a part of this load. Many more volunteers are needed for this work, and to aid in transporting observers.

### COMMUNICATIONS – VITAL TO DEFENSE

Communications nets were very satisfactory from State levels to Local levels. The Kingston Fire Net, which is in the "Plymouth County Fire Net", operated very well under the toughest conditions. The Kingston Police Department, which is in the Plymouth Police Net, has been strengthened by the new ambulance and its C. D. sponsored radio. Already it has proven its great value in several accidents. Our Police Department communications are about adequate for present conditions, but should be much expanded to meet Civil Defense emergencies. Probably a new fixed station unit at the police station would be vital in supplementing the Plymouth central station unit. Several mobile units in private cars which would be sponsored by the Police Department would be vital in controlling traffic in an emergency.

The C. D. emergency radio station, operated in Kingston under "R. A. C. E. S." plan of the F. C. C. worked well until hurricanes "Carol" and "Edna" struck. These put our station out of action for some time with power lines cut off and antennas blown down. Immediately after the hurricanes an auxiliary power unit was bought for this station, and "hurricane-proofed" antennas were erected. These should keep our C. D. emergency station "on the air" in about every foreseeable condition.

The State Police Air Raid Warning receiver has functioned well all year, so that daily reports to headquarters on signals received in Kingston, are no longer sent.

#### HURRICANES — and a SUDDEN NEW PROBLEM

Hurricanes "Carol" and "Edna" gave us unexpected tests for an emergency. They suddenly cut off power supply, telephones and blocked the roads with fallen trees and debris. The Highway Department made a notable record in clearing the roads, with its equipment and some new power saws. The Fire Department was ready for instant response, the Police Department continued duties almost normally.

However the C. D. Department and the Health Department were suddenly faced with a refrigeration problem on a grand scale to prevent spoiling of milk and perishable foods, for infants, the sick and the general public. Loss of electricity had cut off power for essential refrigeration in the stores as well as every home. Emergency steps were taken to get a supply of dry-ice, from the State C. D. Depot in Boston and distribute it to the stores as "Emergency Food Depots" to protect their supply of milk and perishables, and for their neighborhoods. The supply of dry-ice would stretch no farther, and was uncertain in quantity for more than two or three days at a time.

Therefore a preliminary study was made of the possibilities of making all stores "Emergency Food Depots" for perishable milk and other foods, and further providing some auxiliary power equipment which would help keep certain essential refrigerators working. One store keeper has already bought his own power unit. There are a few small mobile power units in the town available for limited services, but not enough for real emergencies. It may be advisable for the Town

of Kingston to solve this problem by purchasing four mobile units of kva. size, and moving them from store to store to supply power to selected refrigerators in stores designated "Emergency Food Depot". The best solution is each store having its own power unit.

A year ago we were notified of major changes in the overall C. D. plans. Our function is still to be entirely a Support or Reception Area, with first steps to be begun in 1955. These plans will continue the present functions of the Fire Department, and the Rescue Unit. The work of the Police Department will be much expanded. A corps of active wardens covering each neighborhood of the town will have to be set up and trained. The town will plan to receive a very large number of persons evacuated on very short notice from target areas, and to be ready to shelter, feed and care for them for a very short or perhaps a very long period.

Our most pressing need is for people for Wardens, Auxiliary Police, first aid and medical and nursing care units, and many watchers for the Ground Observer Corps Tower.

Grateful acknowledgements are made to all the town officials: Selectmen, Finance Committee, Police Department, Fire Department, Highway Department, Town Clerk, Town Accountant and the staffs. Individuals who deserve special recognition are: Mr. George L. Chandler, Mr. Clarence R. Drew, Mr. James Whalen, Mr. Joseph T. Dickson, and the many observers of Kingston, Duxbury and Pembroke who gave freely of their time and services to Civil Defense.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

---

There were thirty-eight reports of communicable diseases received during the past year. This small number should be very encouraging to the townspeople. There were seven reports of dog bites received. We wish to impress upon you the importance of reporting immediately to this Board all communicable diseases and dog bites.

The annual \$400.00 appropriation was used in maintaining mosquito control ditches.

During the past year the town dump was kept very clean and in an orderly condition by the present caretaker, Francis W. Brown.

The disposal of garbage still presents a problem as legislation prohibits the feeding of uncooked garbage to pigs. Your attention is called to the Regulations of the Board of Health, which requires that all persons maintaining one or more pigs must obtain an annual permit. Application must be filed with the Board of Health.

The Town of Kingston is growing steadily and your Board was kept busy this year checking, and taking care of the various health problems that were brought to our attention. We believe that through our investigations of the numerous complaints received, we terminated to a great degree, a large number of the unsanitary conditions that existed, thereby maintaining a higher health level in our community.

We feel that the aerial spraying this past season proved very beneficial, in that many places otherwise inaccessible were reached.

The budget item here-to-fore known as Suppression of Insect Pest herenafter will be known as Insect Control.

## REPORT OF INSPECTOR OF ANIMALS AND INSPECTOR OF SLAUGHTERING

---

Honorable Board of Selectmen:

During the past year, approximately 350 cattle were shipped into Kingston from Vermont, New York State and Canada. These cattle were inspected and found free from disease. Reports of these inspections were made and forwarded to the State Division of Livestock Disease Control.

The past year has witnessed the quarantining of ten dogs on suspicion of rabies because of bites imposed. However, all these dogs were released after the customary 14 day observation period, inasmuch as no signs of rabies appeared. Reports on the above cases were forwarded to the proper State authorities.

There have been no cases of slaughtering in Kingston during the past year.

The annual inspection of animals and the premises in which they were kept has been made, and the report has been submitted to the Division of Livestock Disease Control.

I wish to thank Mrs. Irma A. Russini, and the members of the Board of Health for their help in organizing these inspections.

## REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The Highway Department constructed three new streets which were accepted as town ways at the annual meeting in March 1954, namely, Foster Lane, Riverview Avenue and Sara Avenue. These streets were all built on the original layouts except for some widening in Foster Lane.

Two of the gravel roads namely, West Street and Ring Road, were rebuilt and surfaced with an asphalt penetration and seal. It is the intent of this department to surface some of these gravel roads each year, and in so doing cut the maintenance costs materially.

Several roads received a sand seal treatment but more of this work is needed to hold many of our older surfaces from breaking up. Three major drainage jobs were done. These were of an emergency nature and were not included in the budget. More provisions have been made in next year's budget for drainage.

The hurricanes "Carol" and "Edna" were another emergency our highway department had to contend with. The major part of this expense, however, is reimbursable by the State and Federal Government.

The Chapter 90 program on Wapping Road was carried on under private contract, P. Lanzillotta and Sons of Pembroke, Massachusetts doing the work. The major part of the 1954 contract called for installing drainage and building the sub-grade. Next years work will further the type I surface.

On February 1, 1954 the Selectmen accepted the new highway barn. The added features and overall facilities have paid off many times in the better operation of the Highway Department.

 PLAYGROUND PARKING AREA COMMITTEE

Since the first of the year your committee held various meetings in an effort to eliminate the parking problem of the patrons of the Reed Community Building. It was at first thought the land adjacent to the playground, owned by Mrs. Ermelinda Sassi, might be purchased. ## REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE PLYMOUTH COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE

In the program of "Down to Earth" helps for farmers, the Plymouth County Extension Service, in cooperation with the University of Massachusetts and the U. S. Department of Agriculture has held frequent get-togethers at farms where outstanding work has been accomplished in dairying, poultry raising and green pasture farming.

Several meetings of the Cranberry Club have been held in Kingston, as a center of the cranberry growing area. For the farmer who is unable to attend these field meetings, letters have been sent them on the many phases of the Agricultural Conservation program.

On many occasions personal problems have been submitted to me and I have passed them on to specialists in that particular field. Several home visits have been made at my request.

The Massachusetts Broiler Contest is attracting much attention. The Massachusetts Extension Service in cooperation with station WBU-TV have two weekly programs, on Wednesday from 2:45 - 3 P. M., featuring good buying for the home and family and on Saturdays from 8:00 - 9 P. M., for those interested in agriculture and problems of the gardener.

In the Home Demonstration field, the interest in making lampshades and furniture refinishing has kept up, requiring additional classes. Kingston has been chosen as a center for meetings in Shirt Making, Creative Stitchery, Weight Control, Buy and Alter to Fit, Easy Does It and the latest, Childrens Clothing, with meetings in January and February.

The annual Home Makers Day was held in Kingston, May 5th with a fine program and exhibit of the work done in the County. Mrs. Franklin W. Zwicker of Kingston has been elected president of the Womens' Council of the County Extension Service.

## WATER DEPARTMENT

---

To the Citizens of Kingston:

The Board of Water Commissioners are pleased to submit its 70th Annual Report. Water mains were extended on Grove Street, Wapping Road, Mayflower Street. There were forty-two applications for new installations, two applications from summer service to winter service; two accounts cancelled because the buildings were removed; this brings the total to 1,530 services connected to the Town's water system.

In accordance with a vote at the Annual Town Meeting in March 1954, a 1954  $\frac{1}{2}$  ton International pick-up truck was purchased with a Lift-o-matic tailgate, which aided greatly in the handling of heavy hydrants and fittings, at a total cost of \$1,592.70.

The pumping station on Elm Street received two coats of paint on the exterior and one coat of paint on the interior. The pumping station on South Street and the station off Elm Street were painted one coat on the exterior. Several minor repairs were also made to the Elm Street station.

### Development Program

Studies, gathering data and field surveys will be necessary during 1955 for additional water supply in order to be certain that sufficient water will be available, thereby keeping abreast with the needs

of a fast growing town. For this purpose your water department is requesting the transfer of unexpended balances in several appropriations where the projects have been completed.

### New Projects

During the year, several meetings were held with the Board of Selectmen, the Finance Committee and the Board of Fire Engineers, to discuss methods for improving the water system.

After making a complete study, it has been agreed that an article be inserted in the 1955 warrant for the Town to raise by loan, or otherwise, a sum of money for replacing many mains with larger pipe and installing new mains on various streets for a total distance of approximately 70,255 feet of water main of not less than six (6) inches in diameter, nor greater than fourteen (14) inches in diameter.

As stated in previous annual reports, there are still several mains that are of insufficient size and should be replaced to give a larger flow of water and better fire protection. The water system should be extended on various developed streets for the benefit of many citizens who have long waited for water and new mains should be extended to take care of the future growth of the town.

The streets being considered in this project are: Brightside Avenue, Brook Street, Center Street, Chapel Street, Foundry Lane, Grove Street, Hillcrest Road, Lake Street, Maple Avenue, Maple Street, Landling Road, Pembroke Street, Prospect Street, Ring Road, Second Brook, Summer Street, Station Street, School Street, Wapping Road, West Street, Winter Street, Winthrop Street, and tie-in Thomas Street and Home Park Court.

The vote under article 82 of the 1954 annual town meeting for making repairs to the Indian Pond Reservoir was ruled invalid by the Director of Accounts on March 19, 1954 as the funds being transferred were from a bond issue and the money to be spent under said article was not a purpose for which such a loan may be issued, therefore your water commissioners were unable to make the much needed repairs. An article will be inserted in the warrant for the necessary funds in order that the repairs can be made during 1955.

This report, would not be complete unless we gratefully acknowledge the continual cooperation of the Town Officials and the interest and support of the Citizens of Kingston.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

---

This past year has seen the last of makeshift housing in the upper grades. By using the basement of the Maple Avenue School for Shop and Home Economics; and the Basement Room in the High School for a class room, we made physical space to accomodate the students. The Silver Lake Regional High School will open for the 1955-56 School Year and provide ideal space and a new, broader curriculum. Your school committee views these changes, planned for so many years, with the satisfaction of seeing much needed improvements brought about at the opportune time.

The problem of housing is still with us. It is difficult to make a decision, using any other information than that available at the time consideration of that problem is taking place. It appeared a year ago that we must have additional space for the elementary grades. It appears, at this time, that the present Elementary School and the Maple Avenue School can give us the minimum number of classrooms needed.

The influx of new people into the town in the future is unpredictable. The age of the children that they will bring into Kingston's Schools is even more uncertain. Using birth figures for 1951 it appears that we will need only two classrooms for the first grade of 1960. We are making every effort to be conservative. If too conservative we will find ourselves without the proper number of classrooms six years from now, and we will have guessed incorrectly. We feel this to be wiser than finding ourselves with too many rooms. Information and events, next year, may cause changes in our thinking and we plan to make a continuous study of our needs.

We have given consideration to retaining the High School as a safety valve for the possible expansion of our elementary grades; but we feel strongly and definitely that this building is as inadequate and unsound for an elementary school building as it has been as a high school. Repairs and alterations to the high school would be costly and unsatisfactory. We recommend that it be abandoned as a school building.

Our bus problem is constantly with us, and is more complex due to the necessity of transporting the High School Students to Silver

Lake. We could solve this simply by hiring more buses and making more runs; this would transport all the children in comfort and ease, but would double our present transportation costs. We are seeking improvements at a moderate increase in expenditure.

We wish to call your attention to the budget for next year. It is about 10% higher than this past year. The ever growing enrollment requires more supplies and equipment. The competition for good teachers requires an adequate salary level to insure retention of a well rounded teaching staff. We feel the basis of good schools is built around able teachers furnished with the right text books and supplies. The funds requested should be adequate to meet the needs of this next school year.

The following pages contain the reports of the Superintendent of Schools, Principals, Supervisors and health officials.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS AND SUPERVISORS

---

To the School Committee  
and Citizens of Kingston:

In summing up our year's activity in the school department, we have several items worthy of consideration and report. Our schools are continuing to show growth for another year. This translated into costs necessarily means again an increased budget.

Probably the most significant progress made this year is in the direction of the Regional High School. Other pages of the Town Report will contain more definite information on the construction of this new building. The individual towns, however, should be interested in knowing of the development of the Program of Studies. As we described last year, the teachers of Kingston and Pembroke High Schools worked during the school year 1953-54 with five staff consultants from the Wellesley Massachusetts High School in developing the content of a Program of Studies for our Silver Lake School. This was a real task and represented many outside hours in development. It was ready for the printer in late June, 1954.

One of the best ways to fully appreciate what the new school will offer our youth is to study our booklet, "Your Opportunity at the Silver Lake Regional School." In the event you have not seen the booklet and you would really desire doing so, please contact the office of the superintendent of schools. Briefly, however, specific information is given prospective pupils regarding program planning, followed by a descriptive statement on every course to be offered. It should be noted that the school is considered a "comprehensive" school, in that vocational as well as academic courses are to be offered. If it were not for the size of the new school, such a complete program would be impossible. It is the completeness that will provide our youth with the greatest opportunity for scholastic growth.

We in this department are happy to be able to help plan such a program and school building. Here we will be able to develop one

of the finest school programs in this area and produce untold benefits to the youth of the four towns of the district. It is seldom that a new secondary school is built without many restrictive features that hold back its true effectiveness. Silver Lake Regional School is an exception and the only restriction imposed was that of practical economy.

We are very fortunate in that the total cost of the building, land, equipment, architect fees, and so forth, ready for occupancy will be less than \$1700 per pupil, while the average secondary school in the Commonwealth is about \$2,200. Ours is the lowest cost Regional School to date. Many schools are costing much in excess of this average.

As you study the new school with its 80-acre campus and approximately 50 teaching areas with untold possibilities as to program, please keep in mind the fact that it is an economical school as well. This is a tribute to the efforts of your building and planning committees and the many hours of work they have given without thought of financial gain—a value that all taxpayers will receive in future years. Some of these important facts are sometimes forgotten in our quick critical judgements, but if the aims and principles upon which the school is built are studied, its true value will be outstanding.

May I call your attention to the following reports of the administrative officers and supervisors of our department:

### Principal's Report — High School

Our year has been a busy one, beset by many adjustments brought about by the advent of the Regional High School as well as by the physical limitations of our own buildings. Our enrollment showed a marked increase to 283 as of October 1, 1954 compared with 260 October 1, 1953. I expected a still larger pupil load than this but for some reason it did not materialize.

Our physical adjustment to this increased enrollment was as follows: The boys shop was transferred from the high school to the Maple Avenue basement. One of the vacated shop rooms was made into a classroom and called room 9, to house one division of the 9th grade. The other shop room was converted to an art room. The home

economics class which formerly was housed in one of the up-stairs rooms of Maple Avenue was moved to the other half of the basement. This was made necessary by the transfer of still another elementary grade to the Maple Avenue building. These changes have, in effect, given us a much better situation than we have had in previous years. It has increased our number of classrooms by one and given us an art room which we have never had before. It has necessitated an additional teacher and the school committee appointed Mr. Leonard S. Hamilton. Mr. Hamilton is a graduate of the University of Massachusetts and has done graduate work at Northeastern University in chemistry. At present he is teaching science in the junior high school but will take over the chemistry department in the transfer to the new Regional High School.

Other teacher changes have been more numerous than in the past but we have been more than fortunate in obtaining excellent replacements. Mr. Wilbert P. Cingolani has accepted a position with the Marshfield schools and his position was filled by the transfer of Mr. Anthony F. Sirico from our elementary school to the junior high school. Robert C. Loring has accepted a position with the Greenfield public schools and he has been replaced by Miss Grace M. Belcourt who has had experience in the Lynn public schools as well as the U. S. Women's Marine Corps.

In the light of the aforementioned changes and adjustments it is indeed most fortunate that the town has had the foresight to take the steps which it has for the establishment of a regional high school. Ten years ago the only double divisions in classes were found in grades 7 and 8. This year the only class which does not have two divisions is grade 12, and next year all six classes would have two divisions. Kingston has reached its peak in this present building and the regional school comes to reality at the exact moment of greatest need. The crowded condition of our building is most felt now in the assemblies, cafeteria and corridors. These common facilities have been geared for a school population of about 150 to 175. They have been stretched beyond all reasonable limitations.

School lunches have reflected our growth as much as any other place. School lunches for the past year have totalled \$1,840. Last year our total was \$1,092, an increase of 10,000 lunches in one year! Our high school lunches are still being prepared at the elementary

school and are being transported to the high school by one of our juniors. This has been a most satisfactory arrangement and we intend to continue it as long as necessary.

We have continued our guidance program with Mr. Hand devoting some of his time to the guidance of seniors and underclassmen in the careful choice of careers and colleges in preparation for careers. Of last year's graduating class of 28, six went on to college, seven are in the service, ten are working locally, two have moved out of the area, two are married and one is unemployed. This has been the smallest proportion going on to school that we have had in several years. It was probably affected by the number that went into the service, several of whom would undoubtedly have gone on to school. Guidance in helping these young people make their choices in respect to schools and vocations is becoming more and more a necessity in our modern high schools. It is hoped that an even greater amount of teacher time can be devoted to this kind of work in the new school so that no time or work will be lost from the program as it has been set up here in Kingston.

In closing, may I extend to the faculty and staff of Kingston High School, the School Committee, and to you my sincere appreciation for all the help and support given me in the past ten years and in this, my last year as principal of Kingston High School. Many changes have been made in the past decade and I hope that I have been instrumental in improving the educational opportunities which have been made available to our youngsters.

#### Principal's Report — Elementary School

Due to the high enrollment in September it was again necessary to divide the first grade into three classrooms. We were fortunate to have the use of a second room at the Maple Avenue School; thus, we were able to house two first grades at Maple Avenue, another first grade and three second grades as well as the rest of the grades at the elementary school. The children who live within the areas of upper Main Street, Wapping Road, Pembroke Street, Smith's Lane and Howland's Lane attend the first grade at Maple Avenue School while all children on lower Main Street, Elm Street and within walking distance attend the first grade at the elementary school.

Several changes took place in the elementary school staff during the year. In February 1954, Mrs. Shea was granted leave of absence through June to work for her B. S. Degree in Education, and Mrs. Mary Venti substituted for her. In September, Mrs. Venti replaced Miss Jean Lyons in grade two. Miss Lyons resigned to accept a position in Needham. Mrs. Peck transferred to the Maple Avenue School to teach first grade there. Miss Joan McBeth replaced Mrs. Valerie Sirrico in the other first grade in this building. Mrs. Sirrico resigned to assume additional home responsibilities. Mrs. Lois McSorley was added to the staff to teach in the newly set up second grade at the Elementary School. In the sixth grade, Mr. Robert Barrows replaced Mr. Anthony Sirrico who left to teach in the junior high school area.

During the period between September 8, 1954 and December 1, 1954 thirty-six children have entered our elementary grades and twenty-seven have moved out.

The goal set for the elementary school is for the development of the whole child. We meet the needs of the children by teaching the 3 W's, reading, writing and arithmetic. We drill on fundamentals. We allow children to learn by doing. We give opportunities for self expression and we encourage self discipline. We allow time for creative activity such as drawing, painting, writing stories and poems. We cooperate closely with the music, art and handwriting supervisors. We supply our children with the most modern teaching equipment to help carry on an active school program.

Emphasis is placed on the development of reading skills at all times because upon this subject depends the rest of the school curriculum. Comprehension, vocabulary, word meaning, word enrichment, word analysis, skimming, outlining and organization skills help to give each child a broad acquaintance with informative and recreational reading. Home reading for children to share and enjoy with their parents is highly recommended.

Each year we try to bring our textbooks, materials and equipment up to date. This year we hope to finish the replacement of science and music books and to begin the purchasing of new spelling texts. A roll rack or book case has been added to our equipment and we plan to build up a reference library on wheels - one that can be

transported to each room to provide adequate sources for research. Several sets of encyclopedias, dictionaries, atlases, reference books on social studies, science and nature study will be placed on this rack.

One of the most important feelings to develop is that learning is worthwhile. Many varied activities have been carried on to help create an interest in school. Publishing the school paper three times a year, our assembly programs, our educational films and filmstrips, our showcase exhibits, the presentation of the operetta "Johnny Appleseed" by grades six, the spring excursion to Boston and the organization of a citizenship club by grades five and six all help to meet special needs and interests.

Going to school means preparation for living. Many problems have to be considered in the process of growing up. Transportation is one that begins right here. Proper behavior on the bus is very important and with teachers, parents and drivers working together as a team we strive to teach the children courtesy, cooperation, self control and respect for each other. Eight bus loads of children are transported daily to and from the elementary and Maple Avenue schools. Of the 460 pupils enrolled, 340 are transported while 120 walk to school.

A well-balanced and nutritious hot lunch is served every day. An opportunity for learning to eat with a group and become acquainted with different kinds of food is provided. From September 8, 1954 to December 1, 1954 approximately 14,882 lunches have been served to children in the first six grades, an average of 275 lunches daily.

Another good habit to acquire for adult life is that of thrifit. The banking program, started several years ago, again continues to be worthwhile and popular. The main purpose is to teach the children to save systematically but at the same time the program teaches practical lessons in arithmetic. As depositors, pupils learn how to use a bank book and how to keep track of deposits and withdrawals. The sixth graders, who act as tellers, learn how to add long columns of figures, and the importance of accuracy, neatness and legibility of records and figures. Last year the children deposited \$5,874.51 and in the period between September 30th, 1954 through December 2nd 1954 of this year, they deposited \$1,635.71 with the average weekly deposits being around \$205.00.

The harmonious team of administrative, teaching, supervising, housekeeping and janitorial staff helps to promote an atmosphere of good will, friendliness, interest and enthusiasm where children are helped to develop the best there is within them. Many thanks are due to this team for their patience and perseverance. Proper attitudes make effective work possible.

### Art

Art is a natural means of expression for the child and it is often used to correlate and strengthen other subjects taught in school. We are interested primarily in the child's personal development through the use of art media rather than the art product he produces.

The aims of our art program are to encourage the child in creative expression, to develop the child's appreciation of beauty, to develop discriminating taste in a future consumer in the various art fields such as architecture, and to teach specific art principles throughout the grades.

An Elementary Art Program has been prepared and placed in the hands of all elementary teachers.

### Music

The music program in our School Union No. 35 has been geared towards the new Silver Lake Regional High School. Instrumental music is being offered in the four towns, especially in the elementary grades, to help build a good Band and Orchestra in the years to come.

We are making changes in the elementary vocal music books in the four towns in order to offer each child the same music background so that when they reach the new high school the music program will continue as planned in the elementary schools. This task of changing books should be completed in the next two years.

I have endeavored to combine the students of the four towns as much as possible. This has been possible through the use of the vocal and instrumental programs when the students have had the same musical background training in our schools.

### Report — School Physician

Examinations have been underway since the start of the present term with one morning each week being devoted to the school health program of Kingston. A detailed examination is being given to all pupils in grades 1-4-7-11, all new pupils in all grades, and all students taking part in any competitive sport.

At least one of the parents of pupils in grades one and four are invited to be present at the examination.

All defects noted are referred to the family physician for further study.

In addition to the usual health check-ups and home visits incidental to school absences, the facilities of the following state and county clinics were used:

**A REPORT OF PROGRESS**

---

To Citizens of Halifax, Kingston, Pembroke and Plympton:

As of January 1955, the contract for the construction of our new school has been in effect for approximately twelve months. Our original rather optimistic schedule was pointed toward opening in early 1955 but we have been beset with strikes, lawsuits, two hurricanes and the normal delays encountered in the construction of such a large building. However, at the present time we are pleased to report that as of March first we are about two or three months behind our original schedule and since it obviously would not be feasible to open the school for a period of four or five weeks we are now planning to have it completely ready, including grading and equipment, for the opening of the fall term, September of 1955. The building itself will be substantially completed in June.

In connection with the loss sustained by the hurricanes, a word of explanation is probably in order. For a period of some weeks prior to the hurricanes, there had been a steel erector strike. This delayed the erection of the supporting steel which would have reinforced the brick piers to the final result that little or no damage would have been sustained from the hurricanes. It was entirely due to a lack of this supporting steel that the large damage was done to the school. The school was thoroughly inspected and tested by both our own engineers who originally designed the structural part of the school and by the firm of Fay, Spofford, Thorndike, Consulting Engineers of Boston. They both agreed on the areas of the school where reconstruction was necessary, and this has been done so that at the present time the building is as good, if not better than it was before the hurricanes. The insurance has been settled financially at no cost to the Regional School District.

When the original contract was awarded on this school, we were sued by an unsuccessful bidder and spent a great deal of time in court as a result of this suit. The court overruled an application for an injunction which would have stopped construction of the school and subsequently the suit was settled out of court at no cost to the Regional School District, excepting that of legal fees.

The equipment for the school has been purchased with a few exceptions and some of this equipment is at present in use in some of our member towns on a loan basis until the school is open. There is a certain amount of equipment and books in the high schools of Kingston and Pembroke which we anticipate will be transferred to the new school. Also through the interest and continual search by Mr. Ray, the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Moran, the Principal of the Kingston High School and Mr. Creighton, the Principal of the Pembroke High School, we were able to purchase from the Government materials worth many thousands of dollars at a very small cost to the District.

Early in 1954, the Silver Lake Regional School District was approached by the Town of Carver relative to their joining our school district. We made a thorough investigation of the whole matter and found that the acceptance of Carver would lower the reimbursement for construction that we would receive from the state. Also, we feel that the school would be large enough with our own populations without including Carver. We therefore did not recommend that the towns vote on acceptance of Carver. It was impossible, however, to dismiss the bad situation that Carver was faced with since they could no longer attend Plymouth schools, and after a review of our own situation it was decided by the Committee to accept Carver students on a one year basis at a rate of tuition not to exceed that being paid to Plymouth. We made an added requirement that this was conditional upon their investigating a permanent solution of their school housing problem. We feel that temporarily this is a neighborly act on our part and, in addition, it may make possible some added instruction at the beginning.

As you can see from the following pages, we have set up a budget for the operation of this school for next year. After a great deal of time was spent by our Budget Committee on the investigation of this matter we invited the Finance Committees of all four towns to come to a meeting and discuss the details of this operational budget with us. We are pleased to report that we had a very fine and rewarding discussion with the Finance Committee and we all feel that this round-table discussion should become an annual event. In passing, we would like to point out that our cost of operation for the first year must include the cost of books and similar materials which we cannot legally take from the construction money. If it were not for this situation our cost would have been substantially lower.

A great deal of time has been spent on our new vocational program which is similar to that being conducted at the present time at Weymouth. This program is set up for the training of students so that they can go from this school to gainful employment and be

adequately trained for it. The Massachusetts Department of Education is very much interested in this program and makes substantial financial contributions to the cost of the staff and materials. They also have given us a great deal of advice and help in the setting up of this program. In order that we would be sure that this program would meet the needs of the various trades which we plan to teach, we have appointed local advisory committees which are as follows:

These committees have met both with all of our school administrators and with the State Vocational Educational Department representatives and have been of very material help in the recommendation of the equipment and type of program which is to be used in our school. We extend our hearty thanks to all these people for their very substantial contribution and help.

In order to mesh the educational program offered by Kingston and Pembroke, it has been necessary for all the high school teachers and principals to spend a great deal of time standardizing each individual course of study. A great deal of research work had to be done and final courses selected so that there would be little confusion when we gathered all students under one roof. This work had been done primarily by our teachers on their own time and they gave of their time and efforts enormously. If it had been necessary to do this by means of paid consultants which would otherwise have

been necessary, the cost to our District would have run into many thousands of dollars. Here again our thanks go to those who worked so hard on this phase of our problem.

In the meantime, Mr. Creighton, Mr. Moran and Mr. Ray have been also coordinating such activities as athletics and extra curricular activities. The amount of planning which has been done has been infinite and we anticipate the move into the regional high school will be accomplished with little adjustment necessary. The co-operation and help that we have been given by Mr. Chester Ray, our Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Lloyd Creighton, Principal of Pembroke High School who will be Principal of the Silver Lake High School, and Mr. Francis Moran, Principal of the Kingston High School, who will be Assistant-superintendent and accounting officer for the Silver Lake School District and Director of the Vocational School, are outstanding. The thinking and planning of these men is reflected in every phase of this project from details of construction to the vast detail of our educational process. We are indeed fortunate that men of this caliber happened to be with us at a time when we need them so badly.

Your chairman would like to thank the members of our own Committee who have served on Committee sub-committees and have met on an average of at least once a week with the main committee and many other times with their own sub-committee. One change in membership has taken place this year. Mr. Robert Olson of Kingston resigned because of a change in residence and Mr. Orfeo Sgarzi was appointed in his place. The work of all of these members has been substantial.

In closing, we feel that our school is going to be an outstanding school, both structurally and educationally and we feel that it is going to be one of which our whole Committee can be justifiably proud.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Kingston for the period from January 1, 1954 to October 6, 1954, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined, checked, and reconciled with the records and reports in the town accountant's office and with the records of the town treasurer.

The town accountant's ledger was analyzed and the receipts were checked with the treasurer's books, while the payments were compared with the treasury warrants and the treasurer's records. The appropriation accounts were checked with the town clerk's records of town meeting proceedings and the recorded transfers from the reserve fund were verified by comparison with the records of the finance committee. A trial balance was taken off proving the accounts to be in balance, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on October 6, 1954.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The receipts, as recorded, were analyzed and checked with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds. The cash book additions were verified, and the cash balance on October 6, 1954 was proved by actual count of the cash in the office, by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks of deposit, and by verification of a deposit made in the bank on October 7, 1954 at 3 p. m.

It is recommended that the town treasurer deposit receipts in amounts to correspond to the aggregate receipts for a given period as entered on the cash book, and that the cash balance as called for by the cash book be properly reconciled with the cash in the office and in the bank at least as often as once a month. A permanent record should be kept of these cash reconciliations.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were compared with the cancelled securities on file and with the amounts falling due.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the trustees were examined and listed. The income was proved and all transactions were verified and compared with the treasurer's and the accountant's records.

The records of tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were examined, listed, and compared with the records at the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the town collector were examined and checked. The tax, motor vehicle and trailer excise, departmental, and water accounts outstanding at the time of the previous examination, as well as all subsequent commitment lists, were audited and compared with the warrants issued for their collection. The payments to the treasurer were verified, the recorded abatements were checked with the records in the departments authorized to grant them, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective accounts in the accountant's ledger.

Verification of the outstanding accounts was made by sending notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The financial accounts of the town clerk pertaining to dog and sporting licenses issued were examined and checked. The payments to the town treasurer were verified and the payments to the Division of Fisheries and Game were compared with the receipts on file.

The surety bonds of the town treasurer, town collector and town clerk were examined and found to be in proper form.

The financial records of the sealer of weights and measures, the board of selectmen, and the police, health, school, and library departments, as well as of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked, the recorded collections being compared with the treasurer's recorded receipts.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, tax title, tax possession, departmental, and water accounts, as well as schedules showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

During the progress of the audit cooperation was extended by all town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

## REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of Kingston:

Your Finance Committee presents the following recommendations for action at the annual town meeting.

We again advise you that the budget has increased and will in our opinion continue to do so as long as the town continues to grow and expand. We spent a lot of time on each budget. However, increasing demands for the town's services particularly education, police protection, roads, water and various public welfare agencies make it almost impossible, except for a few budgets, to permit any drastic reductions.

The warrant articles exclusive of the Water Department's bond issue under article 38, and assuming the final figure for the Highway Department's request under article 12 calls for a maximum sum of \$8,000.00, the total money requested for the entire warrant amounts to \$94,339.33.

We are asking you to go along with our recommendations which will then produce a tax rate of approximately \$42.00 an increase of \$4.00 over the 1954 rate. This means your complete approval of the water bond is essential. This article was sponsored by your Finance Committee. In our opinion a favorable vote will assure the start of a program to correct and complete in as short a time as possible the replacement of inadequate pipe and the extension of water service. This article has the complete backing of your Selectmen, the Water Commissioners, the Fire Engineers and the Highway Department.

Should the water bond issue be approved no motion will be made under articles 40, 43, 44 and 45. However, should the bond issue be defeated, we are asking for specific approval of articles 40, 43, 44 and 45 totaling \$21,300.00, which would then produce a tax rate of approximately \$44.00.

The approval of the bond issue (eliminating articles 40, 43, 44 and 45), and should you approve all the other articles to be voted on, contrary to our recommendations, there will be a tax rate of approximately \$45.75.

Finally, if the bond issue is disapproved and you approve the balance of the warrant in it's entirely, contrary to our recommendations, the result will be a tax rate of approximately \$47.75.

The preceding figures do not include any sum for article 16, Wire Inspector. At the time it was necessary to prepare this report, your Selectmen had not yet decided on an amount or the basis of remuneration for this appointive position. We recommend, however, that the sum approved be a nominal one. When experience has shown what the duties of this position will entail, it will then appear as an annual budget item. Further, the possibility and legality of a fixed fee per inspection with 50% of the fee to the town as income and 50% to the inspector as his sole remuneration should be considered.

Article 26—Selectmen—Concerns the subject of the removal of sand, loam, soil or gravel from private land within the town. We dislike very much not to take a firm stand on any article, but felt after considerable discussion that this article was originally incorporated in the proposed zoning laws and then eliminated so that it could be voted upon specifically at this town meeting. Any recommendation by us would in our opinion have no financial bearing on the final result.

We wish to thank all officials and employees of the town for their continued co-operation and again invite petitioners to discuss their problems with us. We meet the first Tuesday of the month at S.P.M. in the Town House from October through May.

We shall continue to meet at various times during the summer months for conferences with all department heads to continue our efforts to grasp, understand and deal with all problems we are able to, financial or otherwise, the better to report to you at town meeting.

In conclusion we wish to say we do not normally single out any one department for our thanks, however, inasmuch as we sponsored the water bond issue we wish to thank the Water Commissioners for

the splendid job they did in preparing the voluminous data necessary to finally be able to bring in the article. In addition our thanks to the Fire Engineers, the Selectmen, and various citizens who assisted us so ably with this issue.

To see if the town will vote to accept the way known as Hillcrest Road beginning at a point on the westerly side of Main Street between the properties of Raymond Russo and Robert W. and Catherine D. Crosscup, a distance of approximately 2,200 feet more or less, as laid out by the Selectmen, a plan thereof having been filed with the Town Clerk in accordance with the General Laws; and raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the construction thereof and for acquiring titles. (By petition)

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to raise by loan or otherwise a sum of money for improving the water system by replacing various mains with larger pipe and installing new mains on many streets in the Town of Kingston for a distance of approximately 76,255 feet of water main of not less than 6 inches nor greater than 14 inches in diameter or take any action relative thereto for the improvement of the water system.

Article 39. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of installing a water main not less than 6 inches in diameter for a distance of approximately 2,200 feet more or less on Hillcrest Road. (By petition)

Article 40. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of extending the water main from the end of the present main on Prospect Street to and including the residence of Wallace C. and Bruna M. Gorn, 1,600 feet, more or less. (By petition)

Article 41. To see if the town will vote to transfer the unexpended balance of \$4,412.22 now in the appropriation "South Street Well" made under Article 24 as a bond issue at the Annual Town Meeting on March 17, 1951 to the appropriation for the "Improvement of the Water System" made under Article 38 at the Annual Town Meeting in March, 1955.

Article 42. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purpose of making the necessary repairs to the reservoir situated off Indian Pond Road.

Article 43. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purpose of extending the water main on Lake Street.

Article 44. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury a sum of

money to be added to the present appropriation for the purpose of extending the water main on Wapping Road from the end of the present main.

Article 45. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purpose of extending the water main on Grove Street from the end of the present main.

Article 46. To see if the town will vote to transfer the unexpended balances in the following Water Accounts: New Truck \$159.54, Howland's Lane \$639.69, Howland's Lane \$35.46, and Shore Drive \$275.79 to the appropriation for "Additional Wells."

Article 47. To see if the town will vote that the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) now available in Free Cash, be appropriated for the use of the Assessors in the reduction of the tax levy.

Article 48. To see if the town will vote that the following appropriations balances be closed out to Surplus Revenue:
