The removal of sod and loam from any land in the Town, not in public use, to any location outside the Town is hereby prohibited under all circumstances; and the removal of sod, loam, soil, clay, sand, gravel or sub-surface rock from any land in the Town is also hereby prohibited except as may re authorized in any zoning district by a permit issued hereunder by the Selectmen, or authorized by an exception hereunder. No such permit shall be issued except upon written application therefor to the Board of Selectmen with a copy there to the Planning Board and after a public hearing before the Board of Selectmen. Such application shall include a topography plan to scale of the land concerned, indicating existing and proposed elevations in the area to be excavated and stating the ownership and boundaries of the land for which such permit is sought. the names of all adjoining owners as found in the most recent tax list, the approximate locations of exisiting public and private ways nearest such land, and the publication fee as required by the Board of Selectmen. Notice of such public hearing shall be given by publication in a newspaper having general circulation in the Town at least 7 days prior to the date of such hearing.

Prior to such hearing, or renewal of existing permit, an inspection party, comprising representatives of the Planning Board and Selectmen, shall inspect the locus under application, and shall submit a written report to the Selectmen with its recommendations.

- 2. A copy of any permit granted hereunder by the Selectmen stating any conditions imposed, or a copy of the denial by the Selectmen of any application for such, stating the reasons for such denial, shall be made forthwith to the applicant, Planning Board, and the Town Clerk. The conditions imposed in a remut may include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - a. extent of time (not in excess of one year, except by renewal)
 - b. area and depth of excavation
 - c. steepness of slopes excavated
 - d. distance between edge of exeavation and neighboring properties or ways
 - e, replacement of loam in excavated area
 - f. lemporary or permanent drainage
 - g the posting of security or bond stipulating conditions contained in permit
 - h. the replacement of not less than the depth of topsoil required by the Selectmen over the whole of any area from which earth materials are removed where the location of such removal is afterward to become a residential sub-division.
- 3 The provisions hereto shall not be applicable to gravel pits which have been operated within five (5) years; and shall not prohibit the removal of such sod, loam, soil, clay, sand, gravel or sub-surface rock as may be required to be excavated for the purposes of constructing structure fundations for which building permits have been issued, or for the purpose of constructing on site streets, drive-ways, parking areas or paved surface installations. However all loam removed in conjunction with the foregoing shall be stockpiled until completion of the project, at which time the necessary loam shall be used for grading and the balance or remainder thereof may then be removed from

the locus. No earth removal shall be permitted below the level of any adjacent street within 200 feet of said street, unless in conjunction with any construction excavation authorized hereunder. These regulations shall not prohibit the transfer of sod, loam, soil, clay, sand, gravel or sub-surface rock from one part of a lot, tract or parcel of land to another part of the same lot, tract or parcel of land in the same ownership.

No motion was made under Article 46.

Article 47. On the motion of Harvey C. LeSuear, Voice Unanimously: To amend Section 3, paragraph (i) of the Zening By-law by striking the words "within 300 feet of a highway line" and adding the following after the word "piggery":

In authorizing the removal of sod, loam, gravel, son sona or sub-surface rock the Board of Appeals shall impose conditions which it deems appropriate to insure the restoration of the land for future uses.

LeSueur Voted: That the town accept the provisions of Chapter 40A, Section 20 General Laws, which provides than no appeal or petition for a variance from the terms of the Zoning By-law and no application for a special exception to the terms of the Zoning By-law, which has been unfavorably acted upon by the Board of Appeals shall be considered on its inerits by said board within two years after the date of such unfavorable action, except with the context of all of the members of the Planning Board.

Article 50. John B West Moved: That the sum of \$49.050.00 is raised and appropriated to the use of the Fire Engineers for warchase of a piece of fire equipment, and to provide for payment of said equipment, \$5,005.00 shall be raised by tax levy, and transfer the balance of \$5.35 remaining in the account entated Fire-Purchase of Fire Truck-1955 and the balance of \$34,59465 he raised by a lean, under clause (9) Section 7, Chapter 44, and the treasurer is hereby authorized with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow said balance of \$34,994.65 and to issue notes of the Town therefor, said notes to be payable in accordance with the provisions of Section 19. 





ELIZABETH B. SAMPSON MEMORIAL FUND

It is a pleasure to report that the trustees have acquired the land regarded as essential for the creation of the Elizabeth B. Sampson memorial tract. This has been accomplished without expending all that had been set aside for this purpose. With the modest amount thus remaining available for land acquisition, further adjacent acreage will be added if the apportunity offers. The cooperative attitude displayed by other departments in the town encourage the conclusion that the improvements to the property will exceed that which we aught reasonably expect from the \$15,000, alloted for that purpose. Working with the Conservation Committee, preliminary clearing has begun and plans have been approved that should ensure substantial progress on this project by the summer of 1957

This year it has also been possible to recommend all requests for allotments from the income account without in any case suggesting that a portion be raised by appropriation. As in the past these items are deemed beneficial to the town in no instance likely to preduce substantial maintenance expensive possibly beyond what the town might be expected to approve in regular departmental budgets.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The report of the activities of the Police Department is resectifully submitted for the year ending December 31, 1966.

Your police department once again had an active and busy year in 1966, as there were 1124 complaints investigated in this record Despite continued effort and enforcement of the motor vehicle violators, there were 102 motor vehicle accidents involving personal injury and/or property damage. Kingston had a fatal accidents in 1966, one in which a pedestrian was victim, the other 2 involving motor vehicles.

Unfortunately, 3 persons were murdered in Kingston during the past year. These were the first such cases that have happened in the 17 years. I have been on the department, and it is my prayerful wish that they are the last that we will have happen in our town.

With the changes in the laws and the recent Supreme Court Decisions being handed down to the law enforcement exenctes, our job of enforcement and detection is becoming more difficult. Members of this department will attend the various seminars and lectures that are being planned for 1967 man effort to become more familiar with the changes and enable 95 to do our job of apprehension and prosecuting criminals within the confines of our jurisdiction. The rights of the honest vitizens of our community must be protected as well as the "rights" of the criminal element. All of the citizens can and should cooperate with their police department by coming forward with the information that they may be able to provide, when they have witnessed crimes of any nature. Without that cooperation, many a criminal who should be institutionalized. will be still walking the streets free, and be looking for the opportunity to "strike" again.

Our Auxiliary Police Officers continue to train and assist us whosever they are called upon to do so. Their cooperation has been excellent, and to them we owe a great amount of "Thanks."

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF CIVIL DEFENSE

The most active segment of Kingston's Civil Defense continues to be the Auxiliary Police, with 18 members at the close of 1966. The principal duties of the force are night police desk work and church crosswalk supervision. The Auxiliary has also functioned well several times during the year when increased police vigilance seemed necessary.

For the first time the Auxiliary has had its own staff of officers, and this factor has facilitated duty assignment and dissemination of information. In the over-all picture, the Auxiliary Police provides a training ground for men appointed as Special Officers.

The Scuba team scheduled several drills during the summer months, and sufficient equipment has been purchased to outsit two men, with the exception of wet suits, which are more a matter of custom fitting rather than for general use.

Our Deputy Director, John B. Drew, completed an advanced course in Radiological Instruction at Bridgewater. Finally, through cooperation from Area and Sector headquarters, we have begun a course in Radiological Monitoring involving Auxiliary Police,

Our group of four licensed radio amateurs is ready for emergency operation at any time. "Vern" Cushman, our communications officer, has responded faithfully to all monthly Sector radio drills.

State-wide emergency test alert drills have been received and acknowledged promptly. We extend our thanks to Chief West and his men of the fire department for their cooperation in the drills.

All monthly Sector 2B meetings at South Hanson during 1966 have been attended by both the Director and Deputy Director. An additional special Sector meeting at Middleboro in October was also attended.

All appointments at Taunton Surplus Depot during 1966 were kept, with results better than in 1965. Approximately \$1.40 value of good equipment was purchased for \$100. This catigment was assigned to the highway and fire departments.

Going into 1967, Kingston CD has added an aerial observer to the program for use in possible emergencies. Bernard "Bud" Wrightington of Grove Street owns and pilots a low-wing Swift monoplane which he will operate in a volunteer capacity. Communication between plane and base station located at the police headquarters, plus contact with mobile ground positions will be possible with the use of one of our three portable transcenters.

We in Civil Defense will endeavor to continue volunteer ejerations as well as make surplus purchases which will prove to be of real benefit to our citizens. With regard to volunteer services, when the hours are added up for police duty performed during 1966, the cost to the town if the men were to be reimtursed would far exceed the total budget figure in the Civil Defense Fund.

We are most grateful for the cooperation shown us by the Polace, Fire, and Highway departments, as well as by our Board of Selectmen and the Town Accounting department.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The purchase of additional land adjoining the \$3.7 acres owned at the time of our last annual March meeting, has been completed.

The Town of Kingston Conservation Commission now owns 95.2 acres of land Eordered by Elm Street, Jones River, Furnace Brook and abuttors.

The area bordering Elm Street has had most of the trash cleared and piled up, and some of it has been burned. The main road leading into Furnace Brook has been cleaned out so that the area is accessible to fire trucks, or other vehicles necessary for the maintenance of the area. This is not a road for pleasure vehicles nor is it intended as such, but it does make a pleasant walk into the center of the property, should anyone enjoy looking it over. The Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts have started a path along the edge of the Jones River, but it is rather rough walking and continues for only a short distance. We hope to have this and several other paths completed and plainly marked before the end of another year. We have a committee of wemen who have volunteered to beautify the area along Elm Street by the addition of shrubs, flowers and trees as well as trimming out the objectionable briars and undergrowth.

We plan to open up the property adjoining Elm Street, so that cars can be parked there whenever anyone wishes to walk through the property.

This area belongs solely to the Town of Kingston, Conservation Commission and is a natural forest that we hope will remain that way forever. There are several plots owned privately hordering this land and although we feel that 95.2 acres is a very good start we certainly hope to enlarge it whenever possible. This can be accomplished by gifts, purchases or by eminent domain should the latter be necessary. There is a new law allowing Conservation Commissions to take land in this manner, but the town cannot pay more than 1257 of the assessed value of the parcel in question. It is not our intention to enlarge the property in this manner unless it is absolutely necessary. We shall be asking for money at the next annual town

meeting for the purchase of land or down payment of same and certainly hope your votes will support us in the project.

We wish to thank the people who have helped to clear some of the land as well as the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts for their help. This help is certainly appreciated, but there are many more hours of work needed to beautify the entire area. Should you wish to help or can offer any suggestions relative to the property the Commission would be glad to hear from you.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

For a short period this year we entered into a land-filled operation at the Town Dump. In an effort to eliminate in a small way pollution from the atmosphere of our lovely town. We feel that it has brought some relief to those living in the neighborhood and in addition has removed an unpleasant association for motorists passing through Kingston. Many complimentary remarks were received in regard to our progressive action in being one of the first towns in the area to utilize the land fill operation. The budget for 1967 will include funds to continue this operation, should the voters at the annual meeting vote in the affirmative.

The Board has continued with its semi-annual inspection of cating establishments in the town through the use of registered sanitarians. In all instances they were graded as standard, or better. Your Board will continue to conduct these inspections during the coming year.

As the town continues to grow and its needs grow we must look forward to greater care of our health. The Board at this time calls your attention to the need for a municipal sewerage system and intends to work with our Planning Board for the development of the various plans.

This past Spring a special Diphtheria-Tetanus Immunization Clinic for adults was held with the co-operation of Dr. W. Vernon Mayo and the Plymouth Community Nurses. On May 25th the first of a series of three clinics was held. Following are the statistics:

> May 25 — 75 immunizations administered June 28 — 110 immunizations administered Sept. 29 — 23 immunizations administered

It is again emphasized that communicable diseases must be reported to this Board, who in turn must report them to the State Department of Public Health.

Following is a list of duties that have been performed by the Health Inspector, George A. Walsh, for this Department: Inspections made, 504; Complaints received, 70; Percolation tests made, 23; Kindergartens inspected, 4; Sewerage Permits issued, 123.

REPORT OF THE PLMOUTH COMMUNITY NURSE ASSOCIATION

We are submitting the following Annual Nursing Service Reput for the year, 1966.

During the twelve month period, January 1, 1966 through December 31, 1966, a total of 1,010 visits were made to patients in Kineston, by the P.C.N.A. nurses. Of this number of visits, 49 were made on behalf of the Kingston Health Department. The marsing service breakdown is as follows:

Twelve Well Child Conferences were held during 1966, at which 235 infants and preschool children were seen and examined by Richard O. Elliott, M. D., our W. C. C. pediatrician. A total of fifty-two Tuberculosis skin tests were applied at these teaferences.

Thitteen immunization clinics were held, twelve of which were combined with the Well Child Conferences and one special clinic for measles and smallpox vaccine only. A total of 304 infants and preschool children were immunized for Diphtheria, Tetanus Pertussis, Polio, Measles and Smallpox, by the physician and the P. C. N. A. nurses.

Three adult immunization clinics were held in May, June and September. These were evening clinics, for Diphtheria-Tetanus only. A total of 207 adults were immunized by W. Vernon Mayo, M. D., Board of Health physician, assisted by our nurses.

The advent of Medicare proved the highlight of 166 for our Association. From January through June, we made many changes in preparation for our survey by the State Department, which would certify our agency as one qualified to give care. One of the greatest obstacles to overcome, was to provide a second service in addition to our nursing service. We were extremely fortunate to have had the Easter Seal Society aircady established at the Jordan Hospital. We were privileged to obtain as our second service the resources of this society which provides Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Speech Therapy and Medical Social Service.

On June 28, 1966, our Association was formally accepted by the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, as a provider of home health services.

We are pleased to serve the residents of Kingston in our capacity as Home Health Agency and wish to thank the Kingston Selectmen and Health Department for their support and interest.

PLYMOUTH COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

I will briefly outline your Project's activities for 1966.

We are increasing expenditures in our budget for permanent centrel measures this past year, as we now have two power trenchers. The elimination of production areas and clearing waterways releasing stagnant waters, is proven mesquito control Coastal areas that we have trenched to date show a marked decrease in the sollicitan mosquito. Larviciding with chemicals is the next positive approach to the elimination of larvae before emergence. This is costly and complex. Our appropriations will allow us to treat only a fraction of these wet areas. Some areas could not be treated even if funds were available. Wildlife sanctuaries, domestic watersheds, and fish producing waters are not treated. These areas will also produce mosquitoes.

The culex mosquito is the most serious inland problem after the spring brood emerges in May. Our truck-mounted units are transity for this purpose. Scheduled treatments to filter systems, dumps, catch basins and recreation areas are a must. Backvard treatments are a constant pressure to this project and not accomplishing our purpose for Leing. The homeowner himself has an obligation. Any and all water containers are a potential and probable source of mesquito breeding. Old tires, auto todies, toys, birdbaths, clogged gutters, open and overflowing sewage are all violators. Changing the water in birdbaths every three or four days will eliminate the breeding potential, as will emptying water from other containers. Oil of any kind poured in a catch basin will deprive the larvae of air. thus killing it. It is impossible for us to inspect and treat everybody's backyard. Our job is to eliminate breeding areas. Most towns supplement the efforts of this Project with additional programs for adult control. Contrary to understandable beliefs, new housing and road construction in wet areas increases rather than decreases breeding sites. Every new home is a potential and probable source of mosquito larvae, while highways obstruct natural drainage areas and surface waters are detoured into areas that would ordinarily be dry.

The marsh trenches were cleaned as in the past. This is a yearly necessity. Back-hoe work was accomplished in the Winthrop Street area to the Havey property, ditching at the rear of the pumping station, trenching between the Stop and Shop to the Kingston Lumber Company. Also ditches were cleaned and re-opened at the south side of Route 3A-Smelt Brook. The french from Route 3A at Summer Street to the Kingston pumping station was also brushed and cleaned witth our back-hoe.

Your project has responded to hundreds of calls Numerous calls that were honored came from homeowners and commercial areas that were plagued by other than mosquitoes. Although we would like to honor all calls, our funds are fixed and will only allow for mosquito abatement practices in the future.

I wish to thank your town officials, and especially Mr. Earl C. Paulding and Mr. Weldon A. Thomas, for their interest and cooperation.

Service is as the law states "to aid in diffusing among the people of the United States useful and practical information on the
subjects relating to Agriculture and Home Economics and to
encourage the application of same."

Resources of the University of Massachusetts and the United States Department of Agriculture are avai'able to the State of the Plymouth County Extension Service because of an assistance agreement. Members of the staff provide educational information pertaining to Agriculture, Home Economics and 4-H Club Work, through correspondence - newspapers and radio - meetings -- office and telephone calls - and farm and home visits

To make this service available to you, funds are provided by the Federal, State and County Governments. Thus the name - Cooperative Extension Service.

Since 1965 when the Southeast Extension Region was creamized the Agricultural Agents have conducted Regional Programs and activities for the commercial farmers in Barnstable, Bristo! Norfolk and Plymouth Counties.

Each Agent is responsible for specific commodity program(s), i.e. Dairy and Livestock; Fruit and Vegetables; Floriculture; Nurseries; Horticulture; Poultry and Turkeys. For this reason, the Acent can keep up-to-date with research, participate in advanced training at the University of Massachusetts and offer the farmers a more effective service.

The Extension Home Economists supply information, conduct meetings and programs that meet the need of home-makers in Plymouth County. At the request of social workers in the communities of Plymouth County, they have provided information pertaining to the many phases of the homemaker's life. They have also conducted programs for the elderly, blind and handicapped. The Extension Home Economists have been coordinators of programs for underprivileged families. In short, homemakers in just about every age group and walk of life have access to information from the Plymouth County Extension Home Economists.

4-H clubs are organized by the 4-H Club Agents for boys and girls 10-19 years of age and who are interested in projects in the broad areas of Careers, Citizenship, Clothing, Conservation, Crafts, Foods, Horticulture, Livestock, Recreation, Safety and Science.

With other youth programs, 4-II Club work contributes to the character building process of Plymouth County young people.

4-H Club members have the opportunity to participate in local 4-H Club Programs and through it, receive excellent training in conducting meetings; giving demonstrations; public specing and committee work. They also receive training in \$\xi\$ paring all types of exhibits in the community; at Fairs and at some statewide activities.

This year 4-H club members were enrolled in 26 of the 27 communities of Plymouth County.

Adult volunteer 4-H club leaders are to be commended for their contributions to the 4-H Club Program in Plymouth County for without their services, such a 4-H program would not be possible.

You are invited to make full use of the Extension Service but remember, that although the Extension Service furnishes the information, it is you who make the decision as to how the information may be used to best advantage.

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY SUPERINTENDENT

Chapter 90 Construction continued on Grove Street, and Chapter 90 Maintenance work was done on Wapping Road, Elm Street, Pembroke Street and Evergreen Street.

Maple Avenue was reconstructed with drainage and Type I Bituminous Concrete surface. Curtis Avenue, Frank Street, White Pine Lane and portions of Woodland Avenue and Country Way were accepted as town roads and constructed as such.

Drainage was installed in various locations on Maple Avenue, Main Street, the dump road, Howland's Lane, Gray's Beach, Shirley Avenue, Leigh Road, Jones River Drive and Smith's Lane Type I surface was constructed on Shirley Avenue, Sylvia Place Road and a section of South Street.

Peck Street and a part of Ring Read were seal-coated with asphalt. The small section of road from the Elementary School parking lot to Second Brook, and the driveway in front of the new Town House Annex was excavated and constructed with a gravel road base, the surface to be put on next year.

New sidewalks were constructed along sections of Landing Read, Pembroke Street, Main Street and Summer Street.

Mr. A. Lewis Keene retired in January upon reaching the tenwalsory retirement age. Mr. Antone J. Cazale was hired as a primanent employee replacing Mr. Keene.

Librarian's Report

The library has Leen the scene of continued growth in use, as well as in the number of new books and periodicals made available during the year. Records show that 40,104 books and reriodicals have circulated during 1966, as compared with 37,040 during 1965. The number of persons using the library in 1966 was 27,168, and in 1965 was 23,061.

Special effort has been made to enlarge the collection of cooks in the Art and Music section.

Increased attendance in the Young People's Room has made it necessary to establish study-hall rules during the evening hours to make sure that the test use is being made of the room and its reference facilities. There were 1,034 students recorded in 1963, an increase of 294 over the 740 students recorded in 1965. These figures include only actual students, and is not the otal attendance figure.

The Old Colony Library Association held its annual meeting at the library on May 26, using the additional facilities of the Reed Community Building to accommodate approximately 150 librarians who attended. The Friends of the Library group helped make this occasion a pleasant one by serving a coffee hour before the meeting.

Twenty new reference books were purchased with funds made available by the Division of Library Extension of the

Massachusetts Department of Education, under the Library Services and Construction Act, Pitle 1, for the Book Collection Improvement Grant program of the federal government.

Sincere appreciation is extended to the many individual patrons of the library who have presented reading materials as well as gifts of flowers, and to the Reed Community Club, the Friends of the Library group, and the American Legien Auxiliary, Harold F. Govoni Post.

We, as a Board, wish to express our thanks to the citizens of the town making it possible to move our employees to more adequate quarters. These quarters will meet our needs for many years. For those of you who were not able to come to our open house you are wolcome to visit and see our facilities at any time.

This year brought many changes in our Department Medicare came into operation beginning July 1, 1966. Fflective September 1, 1966 the Medical Assistance Program under Title XIX of the Federal Social Security Act was initiated in Massachusetts. This brought about an entirely new concept of Assistance in Massachusetts, whereby, we have been instructed by the State Department of Public Welf to to make all our citizens aware of this program and the basic eligibility requirements so that people who are in need will get the necessary medical care essential to their well being. Although we are unable to cover all areas of eligibility we will give you the following highlights.

Ad persons are eligible for Medical Assistance who are currently receiving grants for Old Age Assistance, Aid to Families with Dependent Children and Disability Assistance. In addition all persons who are eligible for Old Age Assistance. Aid to Families with Dependent Children or Disability Assistance and children under 21 years of age except for the durational residence income or personal property, provided they meet the eligibility requirements for Medical Assistance.

Financial Eligibility

Personal Property Exemption — Personal property is defined as the ownership of bank deposits, securities, cash surrender value of life insurance, cash on hand or similar assets readily convertible into cash. An individual is allowed personal property up to \$2,000. A married couple or family of two persons are allowed combined personal property up to \$3,000. An additional sam of \$100 shall be allowed for each additional dependent member of the family.

Real Property -- An applicant may own real property used as a home or from which he is absent because of mental or physical illness.

Income Exemptions — The monthly net income exemption is \$150 for an individual and an additional exemption of \$56 for each additional family member.

Exemptions in Licensed Facilities -- A person receiving care in a latensed nursing home, licensed chronic hospital, or approved medical institution who has income shall be allowed to retain the first \$23.60 a month of such income for personal needs. If the spouse is living outside of an institution there is an additional exemption up to \$225 per month from their combined total monthly income for the maintenance of the spouse.

Relatives' Responsibility—The financial responsibility of any person for any applicant or recipient of Medical Assistance will be limited to the responsibility of husband for wife, and of parents for children under 21 years, or blind, or permanently and totally disabled.

Life Insurance—There is no restriction regarding the amount of life insurance a person may have. However, in order to meet Federal requirements, the cash surrender value of life insurance must be considered in the determination of personal property.

Place of Application — Application for Medical Assistance is made with the Board of Public Welfare in the city or town where the applicant resides.

If you desire further information or feel you or a member of your family need these benefits you may contact our office between 8 A.M. and 4 P.M. Monday through Friday to discuss your problems.

We wish to report that we sent our Director of Public Assistance to represent our Town in the South Shore Community Action Council, Inc. of which 12 towns are involved. The meetings of this Council are held the second Thursday of each month at 8 P.M. This is a poverty program which has now been funded by the Federal Government in the amount of \$31,651.00 There is no direct cost to the Town for this program as our share in the program is being met by volunteer services, etc. These meetings are open to the public and interested citizens are welcome to attend. The Executive Director is Charles Reynolds, Jr., from Pembroke who now has a full working staff with headquarters at 8 Bay Road, Duxbury. Their job will be to study our total area to determine the needs in our affected areas and present programs acceptable to the Federal Government to give our citizens in need help to return to self-sufficiency. This could be the answer for some of our more unfortunate citizens. This Board does question, "Is this the right approach to our poverty problems?"

We wish to thank the citizens of our Town, other Town Departments, State Department of Public Welfare and other Social Service Agencies for their continued cooperation with this agency.

The trustees wish again to bring your attention in preparing your will that you remember the Educational Fund and gifts from individuals and organizations are most welcome.

We extend our thanks to our many friends for their continued support and we also extend our appreciation to all who have made it possible for this fund to grow from \$1.200.09 to \$22,000.00 in a short span of 10 years.

REPORT OF THE PARK DEPARTMENT

The year 1966 had a good, dry summer, making Gray's Beach a busy place on week-ends with both local and out-of town people. We feel that it is really unfortunate that more Kingston people do not use the beach. Sand was put on the beach only once during the year, which seemed to be enough to keep it in good condition. Usually the northeast storms wash out much sand, but a minimum of storms cut this expense down. The ticket booth was repainted because of vandalism.

The float blocks, rope, and one float were replaced late in the year. Another float is in the budget for 1967. These floats are more than ten years old and cost of repairs would be excessive. We also purchased three sets of flags. Most years we have to get along with only one or two sets and they get shabby rather quickly.

We have made application to the Trustees of the Elizabeth B. Sampson Fund for an amount to cover the cost of juvenile playground equipment for the younger children at Gray's Beach Many people have requested swings, slides, etc. be made available there.

In the town warrant is an article requesting funds for the installation of hot water at the concession stand and wash basins at Gray's Beach. The local and state departments of health have requested that this be accomplished.

The culvert in front of the concession stand was repaired for us by the Highway Department and a few loads of fill were placed behind the stand. The Park Department wishes to express its thanks to the Highway, Police, Water and Fire Departments for their co-operation during this past year. We also wish to bring to your attention the fact that even a charcoal fire at the beach requires a permit, issued by the Fire Department.

We had a petition before us requesting the opening of the old boat-launching ramp at Gray's Beach. This ramp has been closed for the past six years and we voted to keep it closed. A representative of the Division of Motor Boats agreed with us and stated that if we opened it the ramp would create more police work for the town than would be practicable. It should be stated here that complaints relative to this department should

be made directly to this department and not by way of any other town department. Your Board of Park Commissions is elected by the people and answerable directly to the people. It seemed unfortunate that a petition listing 100 names, when presented for discussion at an open meeting, was attended by only five or six of the petitioners.

In Kingston Center a drinking fountain was installed which lasted only three weeks before destruction by vandals. It was enjoyed by many of the older folks during that brief duration. It seems a shame that a fountain will last indefinitely in Boston Common but not in Kingston Center. Whether the fountain will be repaired and replaced in operation is at the discretion of the 1967 Park Commission. Shrubbery was planted around the fountain and a new park bench installed there, which has been used quite a lot.

The Department has made every effort to serve the people well during the past year. We are always open to suggestion and welcome your presence at our monthly meetings.

REPORT OF CAPITAL OUTLAY COMMITTEE

The Kingston Capital Outlay Committee began meetings on September 7, 1966 to develop and implement plans for fulfilling the objectives outlined in the enabling by-law (Article 8, 1986 Town Meeting Warrant), but the closing months of the year afforded little more time than that necessary to organize the new committee and determine a course of action to get the work started. The preparation of a meaningful long range capital budget is a substantial undertaking that is dependent for its success on the efforts and cooperation of all the various departments, committees, commissions and boards of the Town who must identify most of the projects and research them sufficiently to furnish a broad picture of the projects' benefits and costs. Needless to say, this could not be accomplished in the short period available in 1936, and our report must be a report of progress that statts a foundation on which following committees can build.

The first task of the committee after organizing was to determine which item should be considered in the Town's budget program. A typewriter is, indeed, a capital item to the accountant but the cluttering of a budget with relatively small expenditures can mean losing sight of larger expenditures impact potential on the tax rate. After a review of past purchases and expenditures, the committee adopted an initial policy te limit items for inclusion in the budget to those costing \$5,000.00 or more for (1) the purchase of property, (2) the construction of a new facility, (3) the improvement of an existing facility to increase its value, and 4) departmental equipment additions or replacements.

The committee plans to include almost any proposal within the above scope in the budget, however, those of doubtful merit, in the opinion of the committee, will undoubtedly be deferred to five or six years hence to afford an opportunity for that merit to develop. Proposals for expenditures beyond six years will be included as future possibilities. The listing of possibilities is sufficient in itself to force the Town and its leaders to think about them and examine them more closely as the date for the expenditure draws near.

Requests for proposals were sent in late 1966 to all the boards, departments, committees and commissions of the Town, but the replies were few—perhaps understandably so since these requests were made at the time when deadlines for 1967 wages and expenses were pressing. Future requests will be made in early spring when department heads will have more time to give serious thought to their needs for the next five or six years, and allow the committee time to prepare a budget with recommendations which can be available to the Finance Committee and other interested parties by November 1st.

While a well designed capital budget affords a view of the Town's needs, with the impact of prospective expenditures spread more or less evenly over the future years, it is not the final approach to tax rate stability. An important partner of the budget in helping to achieve stability is forchandedness in putting money aside in the years when the demands are not too heavy. This is difficult a job for the Town in years of rising costs as it is for the family, but it is a job with rewards in either case case. We are, therefor, recommending the creation of a Stabilization Fund (Article 48, 1967 Annual Town Meeting Warrant) to accumulate money in advance of the needs.

The advantages of using stabilization funds to smooth out the tax rate are obvious. There is, however, another important advantage which is seldom recognized. Additional school buildings assistance funds are available to the Town only when matching amounts from a Stabilization Fund are used in lieu of borrowing. Simply, this could mean reducing the Town's costs for Elementary School expansion by as much as \$100,000 if an equal amount were available in a Stabilization Fund.

Finally, we are indebted to those departments submitting proposals this year—these are published in the accompanying chart and we urge all departments to look ahead to their future needs and forward a proposal forecast to the Capital Outlay Committee before June 1, 1967. We also urge appointing authorities to act promptly after Town Meeting to fill vacancies where terms of office have expired.

REPORT OF THE REGIONAL VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT PLANNING BOARD

By a vote of the 1966 Town meetings Regional Vocational School District Planning Committees were authorized and duly appointed. Committees from the Towns of Carver, Duxbury, Halifax, Kingston, Marshfield, Pembroke, Plymouth, and Plympton, acting under the provisions of Section 14 of Chapter 71 of the General Laws, formed the Regional Vocational School District Planning Board.

The Board has made the following findings:

- 1. The region under consideration will have by 1971, 4,344 students in grades 9 through 12.
- The division of Vocational Education of the State Department of Education estimates that a co-educational Vocational school for 829 students would be required for this region.
- 3. 161 Towns within the Commonwealth already are operating Vocational High Schools either as a part of their own school system or as a member of a region, and 49 other towns are in the regional planning stage.
- From 307 to 507 of all high school graduates in this region do not continue their education at the college level.
- Capacity, limited entrance requirements, transportation, and course offering are at present denying students in this region a vitally needed vocational training experience.
- Industrial growth in the area depends upon a reservoir
 of trained personnel having a degree of skill greater than
 heretofore and at present vocational school graduates
 are in great demand by industry.
- The mobility of labor today will allow this region to include courses that previously could not be presented in a limited industrial area.
- Greater education value at a lower pupil cost can be realized by the eight towns joining a regional district than would be possible by individual school vocational programs.

The Board therefore recommends:

 That a Regional Vocational School District including the towns of Carver, Duxbury, Halifax, Kingston, Marshfield, Pembroke, Plymouth, and Plympton be formed according to the provision of the attached agreement which is a part of this report.

- 2. That the region be operated by an elected Regional School Committee with each town being represented as set forth in the attached agreement. That such Regional School Committee shall have all the powers and duties and responsibilities as set forth by law and this agreement. This agreement further sets forth the provision for Capital and Operating costs budgeting, amendments to the agreement for admission and withdrawal of member towns, transportation, admission of tuition students, employment of teachers and extension of tenure.
- 3. Further recommend the construction of Regional Vocational High School within the confines of the region described, for approximately 829 students at a currently estimated net cost of construction and financing of \$3,731,323.00. This capital cost will be shared by the member towns on the basis of pupil enrollment in the regional school. For the purpose of estimating apportioned costs per town the estimated pupil enrollment of the member towns in grade 9 through 12 for the year 1971 has been used. Operating costs are also estimated to be about \$800.00 per pupil at full enrollment and is similarly apportioned.

This sum of money to be raised by a Regional District Bond issue the cost of which will be prorated to the member towns substantially in accordance with above schedule.

The Vocational High School may include grades 9 through 14 covering courses in sixteen subject areas.

In addition the facilities may be utilized for adult education, trade extension courses and special training courses.

It is further recommended that an initial operating and planning budget of \$25,000.00 be provided the Regional Vocational District for the balance of the year. This amount to be raised by the member towns as follows:

Shall the town accept the provision of Section Sixteen to Sixteen I, inclusive, of Chapter Seventy-One of the General Laws, providing for the establishment of a Regional School District, together with the towns of Carver, Duxbury, Halifax, Kingston, Marshfield, Pembroke, Plymouth, Plympton and the construction, maintenance and operation of a regional school by the said district in accordance with the provision of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen.

WATER COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

The year 1966 justified in the main the optimistic predictions with which it opened. It represented uninterrupted forward economic progress, almost unique in Kingston experience. No water department has ever enjoyed such material well-being; yet progress has not been devoid of problems against this background of plenty and with an increased supply of water, it has a bright promise for the future technological and economical progress for the water in Kingston.

The core of our problem in 1966 was to obtain Federal funds for the water project approved at the annual town meeting The Water Commissioners contacted our Senators and Federal Agencies for their help and cooperation in obtaining a grant of approximately \$100,000.00 for the water project of replacing the main from the old reservoir, down Indian Pond Rd. Elm St. and down Brook St. and to extend the main from the present main on Winthrop St. to Brookdale Ave. Our efforts were disappointing when on June 27th, 1966 we received a letter frem the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration informing the Water Commissioners that they were unable to take favorable action because the Farmers Home Administration can only make grants to towns or communities that are in financial difficulty or the cost of water per user is excessive; also where the primary use of water is for domestic use and not for fire protection. They went on to state further that the increase of water rates to the users of the system will result in a rate that would still be reasonable and much below the rate that is considered as meeting the criteria for Grant consideration. According to the 58th Edition Financial Statistics of Mass., 1966, it indicates Kingston is in a very sound financial condition with ability to issue bonds for the full amount of the project cost.

Your Water Commissioners discussed this problem with the Beard of Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to see if any other avenues were opened for the purpose of obtaining a grant. Other Federal Agencies were called in as well as interested citizens and those that are connected with the Federal Government locally.

On September 16, 1966 a letter was sent to the Board of Selectmen enclosing a copy of a letter that had been received

from the Acting Administrator of the United States Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration. There again the same information was made available to the Board of Water Commissioners -- that a grant was not possible for our pending water project. Still being hopeful, arrangements to do the water project were delayed until late Fall, at which time the "green light" was given by all concerned to proceed with the borrowing of money for the project in its entirety; and as we begin a new year, bids were opened for the water project. As this report goes to print, an award for a contract has not been made; however, the Water Commissioners are hopeful that this project will be underway and completed sometime late in the spring. We are very sorry that we could not get this grant for our citizens and taxpayers in order to reduce the cost of this most worthy project but we give you the assurance that every avenue to Washington for a grant was taken but to no avail.

Your Water Department installed a telemeter system late in 1965, giving us better control of our electric pumps which gave us the opportunity to conserve water and although we had one of the driest summers in 1966, you will note the total gallons of water pumped is less than in 1965.

Searching for Additional Water Supply

Again this year, we continued to search for additional water supply. We are of the oninion that we have located a good site for additional wells, off Wapping Road, and we are planning to ask the town to purchase the land at the 1967 annual town meeting.

The Future

At the request of the chairman of the Capital Outlay Committee your Water Commissioners on October 21, 1966 informed them of our present thinking in the future growth of your water system. Items listed in our letter were:

- 1. Land Acquisition.
- 2. Replacement of the pump at the so-called diesel well
- Development of new wells.
- 4 A million gallon water tank.
- 5 Water meters.

- 6 Replacement of old mains, particularly that main on Landing
- 7. The extension of new mains.

The Use of Water for Outside

Water has become a critical problem for most Massachusetts communities. As population and the amount of water used her person continues to increase and with a continuing deficiency in precipitation, the problem will become more acute. Many towns have already imposed restrictions on outdoor water use. Citizens should be aware of the seriousness of the situation and strive to conserve water at every opportunity.

We are very pleased that we did not have to curtail the use of water last year and this was due to the fact that our water takers cooperated 1009 with your Water Commissioners. This is another reason less water was pumped. We cannot stress in words our appreciation for your fine cooperation. It is wonderful to have such fine citizens in our town.

Proposed Projects for 1967

1. To replace the Dodge truck.

2. To replace the main on Adams Avenue.

3. Land Acquisition.

4. To replace the main on Loring Avenue and to tie it in with River Street.

Conclusion

With acceleration of the technological rate of change in the operation of a water system, our ability to make effective use of new methods and equipment depends entirely on the capacity of our citizens and employees of our town. We are proud of the record we have achieved and the citizen satisfaction they have earned for the town, and we intend to take every step to maintain and augment this superior capability.



REPORT OF THE PLAYGROUND COMMISSION

A notable increase in the use of the Reed Community Building and playground facilities was noted in 1966. There were 475 requests for use of the building compared to 370 in in 1965. Of this total 413 were free rentals to town civic, church and youth groups. There were 62 paid rentals totalling \$1.060.

A Kingston Youth Center, now under the sponsorship of the Playground Commission, was organized this year and makes its headquarters in the lower hall. This group meets every Saturday night from 7:30 to 11:00 and Sunday afternoons from 3:00 to 5:00.

With the organization of this youth group and all other active huilding is now being utilized seven days a week. A great deal of the success of all these activities both in the building and on the playground is due to the fine cooperation and faithfulness of our custodian. Mr. Edward Cadwell. We wish to rublicly thank him for his untiring efforts.

The summer playground program has grown to the point where assistants to the regular supervisors were needed in 1966. With the youth activities growing each year, the Commission anticipates in the very near future the need to engage a full time Recreational Director for the Town of Kingston.

The principal maintenance projects planned for 1967 include the modernization of the shower room and extensive repairs to the steps and walk at the main entrance of the building.

The Commission meets the third Tuesday of each month at 7:39 P.M. in the Reed Community Building.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Kingston

During 1966, the Kingston Elementary School system underwent further physical expansion with the re-opening of the Maple Avenue Annex for two Grade IV classrooms. Our enrollment reached 613 youngsters assigned in twenty-two classrooms plus a Special Class. Next year it is likely we will utilize a basement classroom at the annex. After that time we are hopeful the town will have built new school facilities to accommodate further growth of our school population.

It is now a matter of law that collective bargaining shall occur between school staffs and the School Committees, that sole and exclusive bargaining agents shall represent the staffs, and that contracts governing wages, hours and conditions of employment shall be entered into where it is the will of the staff so to to We therefore have recognized the Kingston Teachers' Association, and as a result of several bargaining sessions have agreed on a three-year contract subject to annual review in the area of wages in particular.

The State Survey Report of the Kingston schools has been received. We were happy to have been singled out by the Commissioner of Education, Dr. Owen B. Kiernan, for commendation "for recognizing the need for both short and long-range planning, the dedication of the faculty, and the keen interest in providing quality education."

Pupils now enjoy a school library, put into operation late this year. All new schools are required to have such a facility and by taking this desirable step we have brought our own system into line. A gift of books from the Kingston PTA was accepted with thanks; the co-operation of the Adams Library should likewise be acknowledged.

Tests administered again this year showed our school to be preparing youngsters as well or better, generally speaking, when compared to national and regional results. As reported in the past, we have done some modifying of the curriculum and some teacher re-orientation, as well, in an effort to get just these results. It seems to us the program is being effective.

School operating costs have for a number of years increased about five percent per year on a per-pupil basis. This has been accounted for by increased charges in the form of salaries and supplies to some extent, but we have also been able to follow the policy of applying a bit toward making it a better school. Now it has been pointed out that there is a sizeable "gap" in Massachusetts Schools between what is and what ought to be. The authority is the Willis Report, supported and now being implemented by the State Executive and Legislature branches. We can expect, we think, some greater pressures to close this "gap" in a relatively short time. We feel this will result in somewhat larger increments in per-pupil costs throughout the State.

The characteristic of a free society is that there is no privilege that is not counterbalanced by an appropriate responsibility. Education is a privilege—and it implies the responsibility of a free society's full support.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS - 1966
To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Kingston

A year ago at this time the School Department was awaiting the report of the Massachusetts Department of Education on a survey which they conducted of our elementary and secondary schools in the fall of 1965. While I am pleased to report a commendable rating in all schools it is my intention to point out areas lasted as needing special consideration.

Elementary schools—provide more library space and services, re-evaluate the role of phonics, increase remedial reading services, continue inservice program in modern mathematics, consider kindergartens and an increased instructional day.

Secondary schools—increase and expand special facilities; reduce teacher turnover; increase space and personnel in guidance, physical education, and foreign language; improve selectee services to non-college students; extend correlation in all subject areas 1-12.

In general our Elementary efforts should be directed toward increasing services and quality of program. In the High School everything hinges on improving present space limitations and then expanding facilities and personnel. The opinions of outside experts and consultants are refreshing and objective. As a rule their observations are not limited by local inhibitions or tradition. Union No. 31

The Massachusetts Superintendency Union No 31, of which our town is a member, has continued to grow and thus required more cersonnel. We are engaged in constant evaluation of program and procedures. This past year all towns have adopted an extended school day, uniform starting and closing hours, and a shortened day on Wednesday during which the Union staff attends central workshops, local in-service programs and local teachers meetings.

The total elemetary staff participated in a reading workshop last spring during which we had the assistance of specialists from the Boston University School of Education and Boston College. While the purpose of this study was to up-date our reading techniques and background, a further dividend was the development of the Individualized Reading Program now being used in

all schools. The modern math program is still showing excellent results and is being evaluated by the math curriculum committee. Union programs in Music, French, and Physical Education have been expanded slightly to accommodate increased classes. Our Art program is undergoing a complete revision under the direction of our new Art Director, Mr. Hugh J. Sloan, Jr. In brief the new art program involves the classroom teacher more, with in-service workshops and strong supervisory assistance.

A new and vital service has been added this year in the area of speech therapy. Mrs. Lianne S. Harris has began the monumental task of surveying and, in so far as possible, initiating the speech therapy program in all schools. I'm sure parents of children needing this help are appreciative of this new program.

Summer Program

Each town participated in a Title I Summer Reading Program under the federally sponsored Elementary and Secondary Education Act. Excellent results were realized with pupils from grades three through six in small-group reading classes for six weeks. Plans have been submitted for a continuation of this program in 1967. The total cost of this project is home by Federal funds.

Another successful summer program conducted in some towns was the summer kindergarten, or ABC program. The success of this pre-school training project prompted the supervisors to recommend its continuance and recommend it to other towns. As of this writing it is budgeted and accepted in three of the four towns. Another year should produce sufficient evidence to justify the permanent acceptance of the kindergarten philosophy with the hope of future day-school programs in all towns.

Correlation

This past year saw the implementation of another recommendation of the State Survey Report. This is the Continuing Curriculum Committee which has been organized in each major subject area. Composed of teachers at all levels, grades 1-12, these committees have been meeting all year and hope to complete their recommendations by the end of this academic year. It is gratifying to see the time and effort which these committees have expended toward improving our curriculum correlation.

Silver Lake Regional High School

For the first time the secondary school takes on a divided mage, a senior high school and a junior high school. The Silver Lake Regional School District has launched the new junior high school with the start of construction in May of 1966. Completion is scheduled for September, 1967. In the meantime Silver Lake is operating with 1753 pupils in grades 7-12. This is more than 300 in excess of rated pupil capacity. Some relief was provided by the leasing of five classrooms in the Central School in Halifax.

In his report Principal Arthur P. Silvester highlights the following observations for school year 1966:

- -Introduction of new math in grade 7. This is a correlated program with the elementary grades started last year.
- -- Extension of the core curriculum to grade 12. This completes the cycle and provides special attention for poor achievers grade 9 through 12.
- Addition of five and one-half additional teachers but noting a replacement of nineteen teachers because of resignations. A search for causes of this turnover reveals a minimal salary schedule and distance from the urban center, Boston, as two of the contributing factors. We are in a sellers market for competent teachers and we must be able to compete with our neighboring towns.
- --Participation in Title I Summer Reading project for a limited number of students. This will be expanded in 1967. The evening summer school continued as in the past under the joint sponsorship of the Silver Lake School Committee and the Division of University Extension of the Massachusetts Department of Education.
- Expression of concern over the limitations placed upon high school program by the present system of bus scheduling and contract control. Mr. Silvester points out that regional control of the high school transportation would permit independent scheduling for high school and junior high school activities as well as save the towns the basic five dollar (\$5.) per pupil cost since



the regional district would be reimbursed 1007 on all transportation expenses. Such a proposal was rejected by the four town meetings several years ago but in the light of the junior high expansion perhaps it should be re-examined.

The junior high preliminary organization shows evidence of unusual interest and activity on the part of the core junior high faculty and administration. The Curriculum Committees have been working since last Spring. Department specialists have assisted in the design of the various special subject spaces included in the new school. This activity was recently strengthened by the appointment of veteran administrator, Arthur T. Hand, as Principal of the new Junior High School.

Ralph H. Binns, Director of the Vocational School reports as follows for school year 1966:

- Establishment of a new cabinet making shop. This program supplements the carpentry program which has been so successful since Silver Lake opened its doors in 1955. Significantly most of the equipment required for the new shop was provided under federal assistance. P. L. 88-210.
- Expansion of the mathematics offering to vocational students by the addition of a part-time teacher.
- Continuation of the MDTA program (Manpower Development Training Act) extending the facilities of our vocational shops for the training of adults in late afternoon and evening classes.
- Introducing a Student Work-Study program this past summer to help pupils who might need financial assistance in order to be able to continue in school.

For the first time in many years Kingston was forced to return to the Maple Avenue School for classroom space this September. A survey committee reported a need for a new building committee and this was appointed at the March town meeting. Their report will be ready for the March 1967 town meeting. A target date of September 1968 is the earliest we can expect relief if the town votes to build additional space. By

this time we will have from four to six classes in excess of rated capacity.

Of interest to citizens will be the recommendation to keep our central location for future expansion. Last year's report indicated administrative support of a school in the western section of the town. Further study has changed my opinion and I now feel the interests of both pupils and taxpayers can be served by using our present central location. It is my hope that the citizens will consider favorably the new space proposal of the Elementary Building Committee.

Conclusion

There seems to be no end to problems of providing a quality program of education. The fact that so much emphasis is placed on the importance of quality education for our community, for our nation, and for the world is reason enough to make education the most important service we can provide A start has been made with the Sales Tax toward relieving the towns of some of the burden of spiraling costs of this education. It is my hope that next year will bring greater assistance.

In conclusion I should like to express my appreciation to all who contributed to the achievements of this past year — school committees, administrators, and teachers. Their support and counsel made the past year a most enjoyable experience.

SILVER LAKE REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of the Silver Lake Regional School District:

Continuing growth of the Silver Lake District has brought our present Junior and Senior High enrollment to 1,753 pupils as of October 1, 1966, an increase of 141 over the previous year.

Planning for next fall is based on about 160 additional

pupils in September 1967.

Even our present enrollment far exceeds the canacity of our building, but we have been fortunate to be able to use the five classrooms at the Halifax Central School for the school year 1966-1967 to house some seventh grade classes.

has been appointed Principal of the new Junior High, which will house all of the seventh and eighth grade pupils, and which is scheduled to open in September, 1967. We are pleased that this building should solve, at least for a short period, our space problems which have plagued us for some time; the effect has been felt to the greatest extent in the Junior High area. This should make it possible to offer an adequate and complete Junior High educational program.

The new Junior High School voted in December, 1964 is soon to be completed at the site on Route 27 in Pembroke. Plans and specifications were rendied for bidding and the contract was awarded to the low bidder, Tocci Corporation of Newton-ville, according to all reports a reliable and conscientious contractor.

Faced with widely differing opinions from the separate town Finance Committees regarding the proposed bond issue, the School Committee finally voted to issue fifteen-year bonds. The general tight money situation and rising interest rates have also proved disappointing to the Committee, as the low bid on the bond issue was at an unusually high annual rate of 4%.

Future growth and population trends in our town will have to be studied continually in order to plan ahead for future construction. Future planning should consider changes in the Senior High building, which is now twelve years old, in order to make the most efficient use of the space in the light of current educational philosophy.

Another step which must receive aftention in the not too distant future should again be in the Junior High area; one consideration would be to plan another Junior High building, possibly in Halifax. At that time both Junior High buildings could house the ninth grade, as well as the seventh and eighth.

We wish to thank the administrators and staff for their time and energy expended in behalf of the large and small tasks of education. We appreciate the continuing interest and understanding of the townspeople in the District. We shall all continue to strive to make your school one of which you can be justly proud.

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town who are qualified to vote in elections and in Town affairs to meet at the Elementary School on

SATURDAY, THE ELEVENTH DAY OF MARCH NEXT, 1967 for the following purposes:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town officials, the following officers are to be chosen on one ballot—viz: A Moderator, a Town Clerk, a Treasurer, a Tree Warden, all for one year. One Selectman, one Assessor, one member of the Planning Board, one member of the Board of Public Welfare, one member of the School Committee, two trustees of the Frederic C. Adams Public Library, one member of the Park Commission, two members of the Playground Commission, one member of the Water Commissioners, all for three years. One member of the Planning Board for five years.

ARTICLE 2. At the close of the Election and after the announcement of the results of the election, the meeting will stand adjourned until Saturday, the eighteenth day of March following, at 1:00 P.M. in the Reed Community Building, when such officers as are to be nominated from the floor will be chosen.

ARTICLE 3. To hear and act upon the reports of the Town Officers.

ARTICLE 4. To fix the salaries of elected officers.

ARTICLE 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges:

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue for the financial year regimning January 1, 1967 in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to renew any note or rotes as may be given for a per cel of less than one year, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will establish a "Local Government Committee" to be composed of five members appointed by the Board of Selectmen, for the purpose of studying all phases of local government structure, and manietyal positions and duties; and, from their conclusions, recommend to the Town at the next annual meeting whether or not a Charter Commission should be formally established as outlined by the "Home Rule Amendment" of the General Laws; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the expenses of the committee.

Any vacancy occurring among the elected members, other than by the normal expiration of a term, shall be filled by the Board of Selectmen of the town concerned to serve until the next Annual Town Meeting at which time an election shall be held to fill the balance of the term. Any vacancy occurring among the appointed members shall be filled by the School Committee of the town concerned to serve for the balance of the unexpired term-

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will yote to accept the following ways: Diamond Street starting at Center Hill Road and extending to its intersection with Chestnut Street, for a distance of 200 feet, more or less, and for the acceptance of Chestnut Street, from its intersection with Diamond Street aforesaid, for its entire length to intersection thereof with Willow Street, a distance of approximately 1000 feet, more or less, and for acceptance of Willow Street between Chestnut Street and Riverside Drive, a distance of 250 feet, more or less, all as laid out by the Selectmen, plans thereof having been filled with the Town Clerk in accordance with the General Laws; and raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the construction thereof and for acquiring titles. (By Petition)

(By Petition)

ARTICLE 62. To see if the Town will vote to accept the way now known as Off Smith's Lane for a distance of 540 feet, more or less, and said way to be known as Anderson Avenue, as laid out by the Sciectmen, plans thereof having been filed with the Town Clerk in accordance with the General Laws; and raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the construction thereof and for acquiring titles. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 63. To see if the Town will vote to accept the way known as Off Rennedy Road, beginning at the southerly side of Kennedy Road and continuing in a southerly direction to Braunecker Avenue, a distance of 850 feet, more or less, and to be known as Union Street, as laid out by the Selectmen, plans thereof having been filed with the Town Clerk in accordance with the General Laws; and raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the construction thereof and for acquiring titles. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 64. To see if the Town of Kingston will vote to amend the Zoning By-Law and the official Zoning Map of the town of Kingston so as to change the following lots of land from a residence district to a business district, these lots being shown as Lots 23, 24, 25 and 26 on Plat I, Block 11 of the town of Kingston Assessors' Plan, said lots being the property of Hugh R. Maraghy. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 65. To see if the Town will repeal Section 1 and Section 2 of Article I of the By-Laws of the town of Kingston and insert the following sections:

Section 1. The annual town meeting shall be held on the first Monday evening in March each year for the transaction of all business of the town, other than the election of officers and the determination of such matters as by law are required to be elected or determined by ballot, and shall be Selectmen; if the meeting does not complete the transaction held at an hour and a place determined by the Board of of the business of the town on said evening, the meeting shall adjourn to the next and consecutive evenings until the business is concluded.

(By Petition)

ARTICLE 66. To see if the Town will vote that a sum of money now available in Free Cash be appropriated for the use of the Assessors in the reduction of the tax levy.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be opened at seven o'clock A.M. on Saturday the eleventh day of March, and may be closed at seven o'clock P.M. on Saturday the eleventh day of March, 1967.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting up attested copies thereof at the main entrance to the Town House and at the Post Office in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting.

REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE KINGSTON FINANCE COMMITTEE

THE TAX RATE .

The major items of increase in the budget affecting the 1967 tax levy are:

Elementary School operation	\$40,217.
Silver Lake H. S. operation	53,393.
Silver Lake H. S. construction	13,026.
1966 Water loan	28,200.
Town salary increases	26,367.

\$161,203

Our items of income are considerably less than last year. On January 1, 1966 our "free cash" in the treasury was \$163,927; on January 1, 1967 "free cash" was only \$86,665. We therefor recommend the transfer of \$25,000, for use of the Assessors to reduce the tax levy (last year we voted \$81,000.). We cannot foresee any large amounts of increased funds from the State when Cherry Sheet arrives. We therefor predict, at this writing, an estimated increase of between \$14.00 and \$17.00 per thousand on the 1967 tax rate. The voters will be required to carefully follow the recommendations of the Finance Committee in order to even hold the 1967 rate to \$80.00. We urge the voters to attend the annual meeting on March 18, 1967, to work with us on the 1967 financial program.

THE RESERVE FUND

Last year, we recommended an appropriation of \$20,000 for the Reserve Fund. This action was successful -- no special town meetings were held and we were able to assist departments to carry on throughout the year. In 1967, because of our financial situation, we recommend the use of only \$10,000. for the Reserve Fund - \$2,000, from the tax levy and \$7,000, to be transferred from Overlay Surplus. Therefor, departments will have to "live within" their budgets except for extraordinary or unforeseen expenses—the normal operation of departments must be limited to the budgets.

SALARY INCREASES

Town departments submitted salary schedules to the Committee which indicated an increase of 17% over last year's total. In the absence of a report from the Wage and Personnel Board, the Committee spent many hours considering the increases.

An over-all review of requests for 1967 showed a pattern of wage increases substantially favoring some departments or individuals while ignoring others. In view of this and its contribution to the development of additional inequities on pay treatment for the Town' employees as a whole, the Committee voted to recommend pay increases as requested for full time employees. However, the Committee did not recommend individual increases exceeding 101.

UNACCEPTED STREETS AND WATER

The Committee considered petitions for accepting streets and the installation of water mains totaling \$54,050. It was decided to recommend the acceptance of all the streets with residences thereon including the lay-out and rough grading at a total cost of \$17,200. Property and street lines would be estabhshed, and the street would be gravel filled and rough graded -suitable for traffic this year. The installation of permanent water mains and final road surface would have to be programmed for a later date.

IMPROVEMENTS IN TOWN GOVERNMENT

Volumes of words pour 10rth over the value of a Master Plan for the town, but no action is forthcoming. Each year the rmance Committee ponders over street acceptance, waterfront problems, zoning, industry, and so on, trying to justify recommendations which should be the basic pattern of a long range municipal Master Plan, Immediate steps must be taken to implement such a plan.

The town should authorize the Board of Assessors to enter into a contract for an expert appraisal of the taxable property. within the town, placing all property on its full and fair eash value.

The Committee again suggests that the Board of Selectmen establish fees for use of the public facilities at the Town Landing on River Street for out-of-town visitors. The Committee cannot recommend the improvement articles in the warrant until some revenue is forthcoming.

The Committee unanimously recommends the establishment of a Regional Vocational-Technical School District with seven neighbor towns, and, in addition, the "phasing out" of vocational education at the Silver Lake High School.

THE EDUCATIONAL BUDGET

The cost of our educational program in the Elementary and Regional Schools is listed below. The total cost to be raised by taxation is \$551,242.

To see if the Town will vote to accept a portion of the way known as Mazzihi Avenue beginning on the southwesterly side of Crescent Street and continuing in a westerly direction for a distance of 650 feet, more or less, as laid out by the Selectmen, plans thereof having been filed white Town Cierk in accordance with the General Laws; and raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the construction thereof and for acquiring titles. (By Petition)

Recommend favorable action with an appropriation not to exceed \$1,500.

Article 61. To see if the Town will vote to accept the way known as Rocky Nook Avenue, a distance of 780 feet, more or less, as laid out by the Selectmen, plans thereof having been filed with the Town Clerk in accordance with the General Laws; and raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the constituction thereof and for acquiring titles. (By Petition)

Recommend favorable action without an appropriation or transfer of money.

ARTICLE 62. To see if the Town will vote to accept the way now known as Off Smith's Lane for a distance of 540 feet, more or less, and said way to be known as Anderson Avenue, as laid out by the Selectmen, plans thereof having been filed with the Town Clerk in accordance with the General Laws; and raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the construction thereof and for acquiring titles. (By Petition)

Recommend favorable action with an appropriation not to exceed \$2,000.

ARTICLE 63. To see if the Town will vote to accept the way known as Off Kennedy Road, beginning at the southerly side of Kennedy Road and continuing in a southerly direction to Braunecker Avenue, a distance of 850 feet, more or less, and to be known as Union Street, as laid out by the Selectmen, plans thereof having been filed with the Town Clerk in accordance with the General Laws; and raise and appropriate, or transfer

from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the construction thereof and for acquiring titles. (By Petition)

Recommend no action (\$1,100, was requested)

ARTICLE 64. To see if the Town of Kingston will vote to amend the Zoning By-Law and the official Zoning Map of the town of Kingston so as to change the following lots of land from a residence district to a business district, these lots being shown as Lots 23, 24, 25 and 26 on Plat I, Block 11 of the town of Kingston Assessors' Plan, said lots being the property of Hugh R Maraghy (By Petition)

Recommendation will be made following the report of the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 65. To see if the Town will repeal Section 1 and Section 2 of Article 1 of the By-Laws of the town of Kingston and insert the following sections:

Section 1. The annual town meeting shall be held on the first Monday evening in March each year for the transaction of all business of the town, other than the election of officers and the determination of such matters as by law are required to be elected or determined by ballot, and shall be Selectmen; if the meeting does not complete the transaction held at an hour and a place determined by the Board of of the business of the town on said evening, the meeting shall adjourn to the next and consecutive evenings until the business is concluded.

Section 2. The annual election of town officers and the determination of such matters as by law are required to be elected or determined by ballot, other than the transaction of all business of the town, shall be held on the second Saturday after the first Monday in March each year at an adjournment of the annual town meeting, and the polls shall be opened at an hour and a place to be determined by the Board of Selectmen, which is not earlier than fifteen minutes before six o'clock in the forenoon and not later than twelve o'clock noon; and shall be kept open for the election of such officers and the determination of such matters as by law are required to be elected or determined by ballot, at least eight hours, and until such time specified in the warrant when they may be closed and until

such later hour as the meeting may by vote determine, but shall in no case be kept open after eight o'clock in the evening. (By Petition)

Recommend favorable action.

ARTICLE 66. To see if the Town will vote that a som of money now available in Free Cash be appropriated for the use of the Assessors in the reduction of the tax levy. Recommend the transfer of \$25,000.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

ARTICLE 2. To vote "Yes" or "No" by ballot in answer to the following question:

Shall the town accept the provision of Section Sixteen to Sixteen I, inclusive, of Chapter Seventy-One of the General Laws, providing for the establishment of a Regional School District, together with the towns of Carver, Duxbury, Halifax, Kingston, Marshfield, Pembroke, Plymouth, Plympton and the construction, maintenance and operation of a regional school by the said district in accordance with the provision of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen.

Recommend favorable action.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the initial operating and plannine Eudget for the Regional Vocational District for the balance of the year.

Recommend an appropriation of \$1,965.
